



Snow and rain ended a Western dry spell today while rain was scattered across the South and cold Canadian air zeroed in on the Plains. Snow was scattered across central and eastern

sections of Washington and Oregon, and was expected to develop across much of the northwestern quarter of the nation. Rain was falling across the Pacific Northwest, and rain mixed with snow over western Washington.

Rain spread from the coastal plains of Texas across southern and central Louisiana into southern Mississippi. Showers were scattered across northern sections of Mississippi and Arkansas. Breezy conditions continued in California, where gale warnings were in effect for the southern coast and a travelers' advisory for gusty winds was

posted for the Owens Valley. Temperatures were near or above normal for most of the nation, although cold air moving south through Canada was headed for the Plains. After two days of record-high temperatures across Minnesota, temperatures were returning to

seasonal levels, forecasters said. In International Falls, Minn., on Tuesday the National Weather Service reported a record high of 10 degrees, topping the 1942 mark of 39 degrees. In the Twin Cities, the mercury soared to 48 degrees, tying the 1891 record.





Budget plan doesn't go far enough

School Superintendent James Kennedy's proposed budget for 1987-88, a \$30.9 million package presented to the Board of Education Monday, appears to show a substantial increase over the 1986-87 allocation. But another document released Monday - the results of state mastery tests - suggests that Kennedy may not be asking for enough.

Kennedy's plan provides significant "new" funds for teachers' salaries, a long-overdue move enabled in part by increased emphasis at all levels of government on excellence in education. But there's a problem: The much-needed boost in staff salaries and fringe benefits swallows up three-quarters of the 11.83 percent spending increase proposed for

With that required addition, and that of other fixed costs such as bus service, there isn't a lot of money left for program improvements. Some of the improvements, which represent just 5.67 percent of the proposed spending increase, aren't improvements at all. Much of the extra money would answer needs dictated by enrollment increases or substitute for reduced or merely level federal and state

Further improvements seem to be warranted by those mastery test results, which indicated that a significant number of Manchester students did not meet minimum standards and need extra help in reading. writing and mathematics.

Manchester's figures reflected the statewide test results, and educators warned that it's too early to expect answers or spot trends because it was the first year every fourth-, sixth- and eighth-grader took the tests. Manchester's curriculum director, Allan Chesterton, predicted that scores would improve as students get used to the tough

A rush to judgment probably would make things worse, as would an effort to gear the curriculum toward a standardized test. But the Manchester Board of Education, as it reviews Kennedy's spending plan, must take a hard look at what's being done to achieve student proficiency, not to mention

excellence, in higher skills as well as basics. It appears that further spending is necessary in areas such as curriculum review, program evaluation and remedial classes. A thorough review will pinpoint the needs, and school board members must not be afraid to adjust Kennedy's proposal upward. If board members decide to beef up

instructional programs, they must also guard against trying to juggle the figures to keep the spending increase within arbitrary limits. One budget area that should not be tampered with is that of capital improvements, because Manchester has not done enough to keep its school facilities up to date.

Last year, Manchester wisely increased its commitment to education, reversing a trend toward reduced school allocations as a percentage of the overall town budget. Townspeople should be willing to increase that investment beyond its current level.

Carlucci says he's ready to dump contras

WASHINGTON - The bell tolled for the Nicaraguan contras last week at a secret meeting of the National Security Council. The anti-Sandinista rebels should start looking somewhere besides Washington for funds to continue their desultory, five-year insurrection against the Marxist regime in Managua.

It was Jan. 5, and the NSC staff had been summoned for its first meeting with the new boss. Frank Carlucci. According to sources who were present, the first words out of Carlucci's mouth were these: "I don't see how the contras can win. We need a serious review of our policy now." As the president's new national security adviser Carlucci presumably spoke with the authority of the Oval Office behind him. So his remark confirmed a policy change that began with the forced resignation of Carlucci's predecessor, Adm.

ohn Poindexter, for his role in the sale of arms to Iran and diversion of the profits to the contras. The effect of Carlucci's verbal bombshell on the NSC staff was revealing: Many breathed a sigh of relief, according to our sources. The "review of our policy" promised a return to sanity, as one staffer out it, a welcome end to the harum-scarum days when Poindexter and his deputy, Lt. Col. Oliver

North, were playing cowboys and Indians in the White House basement. There is more in Carlucci's appointment that comforts the decimated NSC staff. He is the first real pro that President Reagan has put in the job. The first national security adviser, Richard Allen. lacked clout: the second, William Clark, had the president's confidence but was a fish out of water in

the foreign policy area. The president then went the "deputy" route, iving the job to Clark's second in command, tobert (Bud) McFarlane, an inveterate staff officer unaccustomed to the heady air at the top. McFarlane's poor judgment belatedly became evident from revelations of his role in the ran-contra fiasco.

When McFarlane quit in frustration, he was succeeded by his deputy, Poindexter. A cautious man not given to rocking boats, the admiral tried to get rid of the rambunctious North, but was

Carlucci has the crucial qualities that his predecessors lacked: political smarts that tell him what will fly in Washington and what won't. He has ad broad and deep experience in both foreign policy and administration. He is a staunch but pragmatic anti-communist - as his rescue of Portugal's socialist government demonstrated when he was ambassador in Lisbon a decade ago. He is not a man to let the siren song of ideology lure him onto the foreign policy rocks.

Carlucci has friends and respect on both sides of the aisle in Congress, and has served Democratic and Republican presidents with equal skill and

All this is what makes Carlucci's apparent view of the contras so significant. In the past, congressional disenchantment with Nicaraguan rebels led to a cutoff of funds. The NSC's response was to get money to the contras in secret defiance of Congress' expressed wishes.

At the very least, no such end-around play will come out of Carlucci's National Security Council. For the present, of course, these tactics aren't needed: Congressionally authorized aid to the contras had already resumed before the arms scandal broke.

But Carlucci's opening statement to his staff and his general attitude suggest that he is ready to dump the contras overboard at the first
