



Towns have HULME "A HULME "A obligation on housing

At a time when budget constraints have sent towns and cities scrambling for all available aid, it is hard to believe that only three towns in Connecticut have applied for some of the \$35 million in state funds set aside in 1985 for

the construction of low-income housing. The dearth of applications is particularly puzzling in view of the severe shortage of affordable housing in most communities.

A spokesman for the Connecticut Conference of Municipalities suggested this week that since the program is relatively new. towns and cities might not be familiar with it. There is a more distressing possible

explanation for the lack of applications - that towns simply do not want low-income housing. The Legislature's Select Committee on Housing plans to look into the matter and will

consider a bill that would require towns and cities to submit housing plans providing for low- and moderate-income housing or face the loss of all state grants. While the plan needs fine-tuning, the idea

behind it is a good one. Municipalities have an obligation to try to provide housing and other services for their citizens, and the cost of living in many towns is rapidly driving out all but the most affluent. Unless the state is prepared for a rapid

increase in the number of its homeless people and its substandard housing units, it should do something to make sure that towns and cities do not discriminate against low-income Under the 1985 program — part of a \$183 million package aimed at easing the housing crisis - the state pays for the cost of building

the housing, while towns must buy the land

and get the necessary permits. It is then up to the local housing authority to operate the site. Low-income housing developments have served many towns well, including Manchester. With the proper management and attention, they need not become run down and turn into the crime-infested neighborhoods that many people envision

upon hearing the term "low-income." The Housing Committee should not halt its work until it gets to the bottom of why Connecticut's municipalities are not doing more to help low- and moderate-income families find decent housing. If a lack of information is the problem, then the state should spare no effort in publicizing the availability of housing funds, particularly since an additional \$35 million will become available within the next two years.

If the problem is one of discrimination, then the state must act to make sure towns and cities that continue to ignore the needs of low-income citizens pay a hefty price.

Gabor reneges on promise to deaf-mute kids

WASHINGTON - Zsa Zsa Gabor, who won fame singing "Where is your heart?" in the movie "Moulin Rouge" 34 years ago, demanded \$5,000 to appear at a benefit in Turkey for deaf-mute children, then backed out of the deal at the last minute because of her fear of terrorism, according to the Turkish Deaf and Mute Foundation of

Capping the Turkish charity group's sappointment was the fact that it took eight months to get the \$5,000 back from Gabor's personal manager, Kal Ross.

This was not the sixtyish, Hungarian-born actress' first brush with the handicapped. In 1983, her contract with a Philadelphia dinner theater was canceled after she reportedly asked a waiter to move a group of handicapped customers from their front-row seats to the back of the room.

The latest unpleasantness began last February, when the Turkish foundation invited Gabor to judge 'Miss Silence" beauty contest for deaf-mute girls. The pageant was to be held in the old-but-elegant Pera Palace Hotel in Istanbul on May 9. Sources told our associate Lucette Lagnado handle ourselves. We do our own that Gabor is still well known in Turkey, because plowing and sanding and we take one of her eight husbands was Turkish.

> Ross cabled back immediately, stating Gabor's terms for acceptance: two first-class plane tickets, a suite and a single room, a chauffeured limousine and all expenses — plus a \$5,000 honorarium. The Turks agreed at once — except for the \$5,000 fee. They pointed out that theirs was a "goodness foundation," and that the proceeds of the beauty pageant would go to needy deaf-mute children.

Gabor, who was a beauty queen herself once (Miss Hungary, year uncertain), held firm on the \$5,000, which her manager told us was "a third of her usual fee." On March 17, the Turkish charity group accepted Gabor's terms, and a few days ater transferred \$5,000 to the Kal Ross Management account at the Crocker Bank in Beverly Hills, as instructed.

But on April 14, U.S. planes bombed Libya, Four days later. Ross wired the foundation to say that Gabor felt it would be dangerous to fly to Istanbul in May, and to ask that the beauty contest be put off

The Turks replied that there was absolute "tranquility and security" in Istanbul, and said the pageant could not be postponed. Ross wired back that he might be able to persuade Gabor to come in May anyway, on two conditions: that she fly Swissair instead of Pan American, and that she will only manifest itself if this stay at the Istanbul Hilton instead of the Pera Palace. The Turks replied that this was impossible because Pan Am and the Pera Palace were donating their services to the charitable

> On May 3, six days before the pageant, Ross wired the Turks to say that Gabor was canceling because of the terrorism threat. He said he would return the \$5,000, as promised, once he had the name and address of the foundation's bank.

This was quickly supplied, but months of delay followed. Cabled appeals from the Turks were met with various excuses from Ross. The Turkish Deaf and Mute Foundation finally asked the Turkish American Association of Dallas for help, and officials there contacted a congressman. They also warned Ross that they planned to notify other members of Congress, President Reagan and the press, if the foundation didn't get its money soon.

On Dec. 30, Ross finally transferred the \$5,000 to the foundation's account.

Footnote: When we asked for an explanation of the eight-month delay in paying back the money, Ross blamed his bank. He also warned us that we would "be in a world of trouble" if we published the



weeklong protests against the launch of a Trident 2 missile from the Cape Canaveral Air Force Station. A total of about 180 people, including pediatrician Dr. Benjamin Spock, were arrested in the protests, which culminated in a rally attended by 4,000 demonstrators. Spock and about 70 others were released.

Attorneys for the jailed protesters said they obtained an injunction in federal court on Monday ordering the sheriff to move them inside, but sheriff's spokeswoman Joan Heller said uthorities took the action without being ordered to do so. The sheriff's department made room in the jail by shipping 91 felons to a jail under construction in Sharpes, Heller said.

Kennedy seeks minimum wage hike

WASHINGTON - Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, relishing his new committee chairmanship after six years in the minority, wants to raise the federal minimum wage by at least \$1.25 an hour, to \$4.60, and extend catastrophic health insurance to Medicare recipients Kennedy, D-Mass., also said he will use his chairmanship of the Senate Labor and Human Resources Committee to fight President Reagan's proposed cuts in education programs, to raise funding for AIDS research and to enhance job-training

programs. "We have a better opportunity than at any time in the last eight years to make progress on some of these issues," Kennedy said Monday in an interview in his Senate office. He also said the members of the new Democratic Senate majority have "more of a sense of working together" than when they last had control in

Parents can learn 7 secrets

There are seven basic principles parents should understand if they are to establish a successful, working discipline structure in the home says Joan Polulech. Here they

1. Tell children what they can do, instead of what they can't do Language which is overloaded with negatives, such as no, don't stop it, quit that, may cause children to turn out what we say Example: Instead of "Don't throw the bread," say "Put the bread on this plate.'

2. Help children feel they are lovable and capable. Example Child cries because she cannot unscrew the lid on the peanut butter jar. A solicitous paren might say, "You're too little, honey. Let me do that." But "Let's see if we can do it together" will preserve her sense of dignity and worth.

3. Offer children choices only if you are willing to accept their decisions. Example: Two children are involved in an elaborate game in the living room, "Would you like to com to lunch now?" implies that you're willing to allow them to skip or postpone the meal. If that's not an option, try "You'll oven timer rings, in five

4. See if a change in the environment is more approp riate than a change in the child's behavior, Example: Preschoolers seem to spill their paper cups of milk at every meal: try heavy-bottomed plastic cups

5. Work with children instead of against them; in other words, "rub with the grain." A five-vear-old insists on helping with preparations for a complicated supper. Efforts to persuade him to watch television or play outdoors have failed Stop telling him to leave the

6. Give children safe limits they can understand. Maintain your authority calmly and consistently. Rules that may seem obvious to adults may baffle children. Example: Your 6-year-old child wants to carve a par of soap, and has taken a sharp knife from the kitchen drawer. Calmly state, "That knife is sharp and dangerous You may not use it. Let's find
