

The Andy's of Manchester groc-ery store on North Main Street will close its doors for the last time at the end of next week, according to sources in the local food business Officials of Andy's, which has eased the 18,000-square-foot buildng from the GLK Realty Ltd. rtnership for five years, declined to answer several telephone calls to

confirm the closing.

However, employees at the store have said that Andy's will close Feb. 14. Other grocery store managers said they have sent employees over to Andy's to check out the situation and were told the North End outlet would be moving

The Andy's closing will become the latest of several supermarket shutdowns in the last few years. Last year. Mott's Shop Rite closed on East Middle Turnpike and Crispino's Supreme Foods closed on Hartford Road.

Because the diamond suit is a logical source of tricks, you would next play ace and a diamond toward dummy's K-Q. But when West discards on the second diamond, you are apparently left with deciding between the club and spade finesses for your apparently left with deciding between the club and spade finesses for your 12th trick. At first glance you cannot take both finesses. Suppose that you cash the ace and king of spades. May be the queen will fall doubleton. If it doesn't, then you take the club finesse. That's giving yourself two chances,

but playing for the drop has less chance than finessing in spades. What you would really like to do is first take the club finesse without the risk of being set if East holds the king. And After taking the A-K of diamonds



### House gives itself a pay raise

**U.S./World In Brief** 

WASHINGTON - House leaders used fancy parliamentary footwork to give themselves and 3,000 high-level government officials substantial pay raises while still casting a symbolic vote

The House leadership deliberately delayed a vote on the controversial raise past last night's midnight deadline when it automatically took effect, thereby throwing into question the

validity of a vote expected today No matter what ultimately happens to the \$12,100-a-year increase for members of Congress and to the increases for federal officials, federal judges appeared almost sure of having

the increase stick for them The Constitution says once a judge's salary is raised it cannot be lowered, although that, too, could be open to court interpretation since the rejection is likely to come before the increase actually takes effect March 1.

### Reagan loses first water battle

WASHINGTON - President Reagan, lustily cheered by Congress last week when he urged restraint in federal spending, is losing his first big fiscal fight as the Democratic-controlled 100th Congress moves to override a \$20 billion presidential veto.

The president took a lopsided wallop Tuesday when the House voted 401-26 to override his second veto of the popular Clean Water bill to reauthorize and strengthen the nation's fight against

Despite a plea by Reagan for party unity, 147 of 177 House Republicans joined with 254 Democrats to oppose the president, who says the clean-water spending plan is too costly. He had offered a \$12 billion compromise. The 26 votes to uphold the veto

There was no reaction to the House action from the White House on Tuesday.

### U.S., Soviets draft treaty guidelines

GENEVA — U.S. and Soviet delegates are drafting guidelines for an arms control treaty for the first time in their nearly two years of negotiations in Geneva, the chief Soviet arms negotiator

Yuli Vorontsov, at a news conference Tuesday, called the guidelines a "kind of frame on which (we) will later on put all the necessary elements" for a treaty. He did not give details of what the treaty would encompass

The three areas under discussion at the talks are space and defense systems and long and medium-range nuclear weapons The superpowers launched the arms talks in March 1986, but Vorontsov said the current work on treaty guidelines is "the first time we're working with a paper and pencil in drafting."

### Shultz says 'Star Wars' far off

WASHINGTON - Secretary of State George P. Shultz says no deployment of the space-based "Star Wars" program is likely

Despite rapid progress in anti-missile research, President Reagan probably will not face a decision this year on whether to deploy the first phase of the controversial system, Shultz testified Tuesday. He appeared before the Senate Armed Services Committee

immediately after attending a top-level meeting with Reagan on arms control at the White House. While Shultz refused to say what advice he had offered, he told deployment of any kind."

### Senate panel reviews justice policies

WASHINGTON - With liberal Democrats in solid control, the Senate Judiciary Committee is undertaking a wide review of the policies that prevail at Edwin Meese III's Justice Department -

ranging from corporate mergers to civil rights. The committee will be showing some vigor in its oversight role, and that begins with the hearing today," Sen. Paul Simon, D-Ill., said Tuesday. "Civil rights and anti-trust laws don't mean much when enforcement is limp or not there at all."

# Refunds can be elusive

DEAR MARTIN - I am new at finding manufacturers' refund forms. You may have answered this before, JANE MOTZ. HAGERSTOWN, MD.

DEAR JANE - How to find required refund forms is one of the most frequently asked reader questions, and helping you find these valuable forms is one of the portant objectives of this column. The primary place to search for forms is in supermarkets. I was recently shopping at a Kroger store in Atlanta, Ga., and discovered a total of 37 different mail-in forms posted on a revolving display at the front of the

A close look at the forms showed me that six of the ffers had expired. In fact, one pad of forms had a May 1986 expiration date! But the good news was that the 31 remaining forms offered a total of \$96.25 in savings. The best offer was a \$5 one from Scott paper products. In return for 20 Scott Universal Product Code symbols, I will receive a coupon good for \$2 off any meat purchase, a coupon for \$2 off a produce purchase, and a third coupon good for \$1 off any deli-item purchase. This offer gives me, in effect, a 25-cent ount on each Scott Paper product I purchase That's not bad when I know that I have Scott coupon and can wait until my local supermarket has Scott products on sale.

On this display rack, I also found two offers from Campbell's soups, a\$1 Pampers refund offer, a\$1 meat refund from Green Giant, a \$1 refund of Adolph's Marinade, and a \$2 offer from Mrs. Dash. Many of the forms were for health and personal shampoo, Vicks Vitamin C Drops, Dristan and Anacin-3. Of course, there were also some forms for

premium offers and for those Kroger customers who are already stocking up on gifts for next Christmas. These included M&M T-shirts and a radio-controlled truck from Johnson Wax. There were a dozen forms that I intend to use. I plan to swap the remainder by mail with my trading pals

All in all, Kroger has a good selection of refund forms on display, and the results of my form-finding expedition were inproved further by those I found on specially marked packages on the supermarket THE SMART SHOPPER AWARD goes to Ida Hernandez of West Monroe, La.: "I had to share my Thanksgiving good fortune with you. My total supermarket bill for the dinner came to \$49.37. I used

\$11.48 worth of coupons, which reduced my final cost to \$37.89. The way I look at it, the turkey was \$9.66, and since I saved more than that with my coupons, it was like getting the turkey free. 

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
