## Another grocery closing

The Andy's of Manchester grocery store on North Main Street will close its doors for the last time at the end of next week, according to sources at the local food business.

Officials of Andy's, which has leased the 18,000-square-foot building from the GLK Realty Ltd. Partnership for five years, declined to answer several telephone calls to confirm the closing.

However, employees at the store have said that Andy's will close Feb. 14. Other grocery store managers said they have sent employees over to Andy's to check out the situation and were told the North End outlet would be moving soon.

"I talked to the manager," said one shopper who asked that his name not be used. "They're gone. The 14th is their last day there. Everyone in the North End knows that."

Signs on the front windows of the store advertize 10 percent off everything in the store. Some sources said prices will be reduced 20 percent next week.

Andy's, which has 30 full and part-time employees at its Manchester store, also operates grocery outlets in Simsbury and East Hartford.

The Andy's closing will become the latest of several supermarket shutdowns in the last few years. Last year, Mott's Shop Rite closed on East Middle Turnpike and Crispino's Supreme Foods closed on Hartford Road.

Many owners of smaller stores say they cannot compete against the giant "super stores" that carry a greater variety of merchandise.

The Andy's closing has alarmed some elderly residents in the area who normally shop there, said William Diana, the Republican minority leader on the Manchester Board of Directors.

Diana told board members during a meeting Tuesday night that he received several phone calls from senior citizens concerned about losing the food store.

Andy's is directly across the street from the Mayfair Gardens apartment complex for low-income elderly and handicapped people. Many of them shop at Andy's and do not have their own transportation, said officials at the Manchester Housing Authority, which operates the complex.

Mayor Barbara B. Weinberg said at the board meeting that elderly residents can get rides to the grocery stores in town on the town-run shopping bus system. The board agreed to inform the elderly people about the service.

But those buses might not be easy to get on.

Hanna Marcus, the town's director of human services, said this morning that the 22-passenger Senior Citizens' Center shopping bus, which runs each Tuesday and takes elderly people to local grocery stores, have been jammed full.

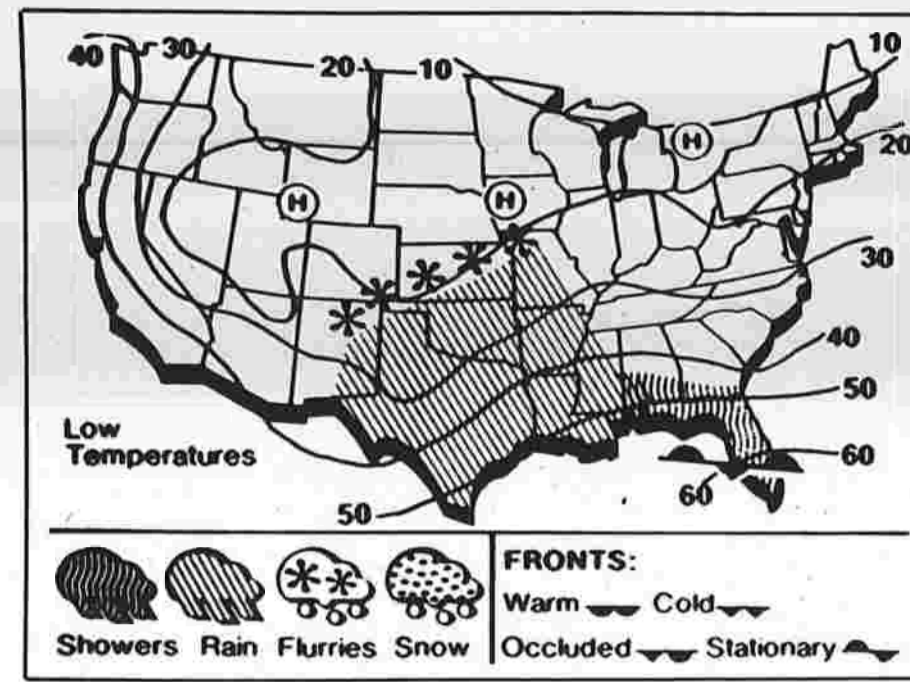

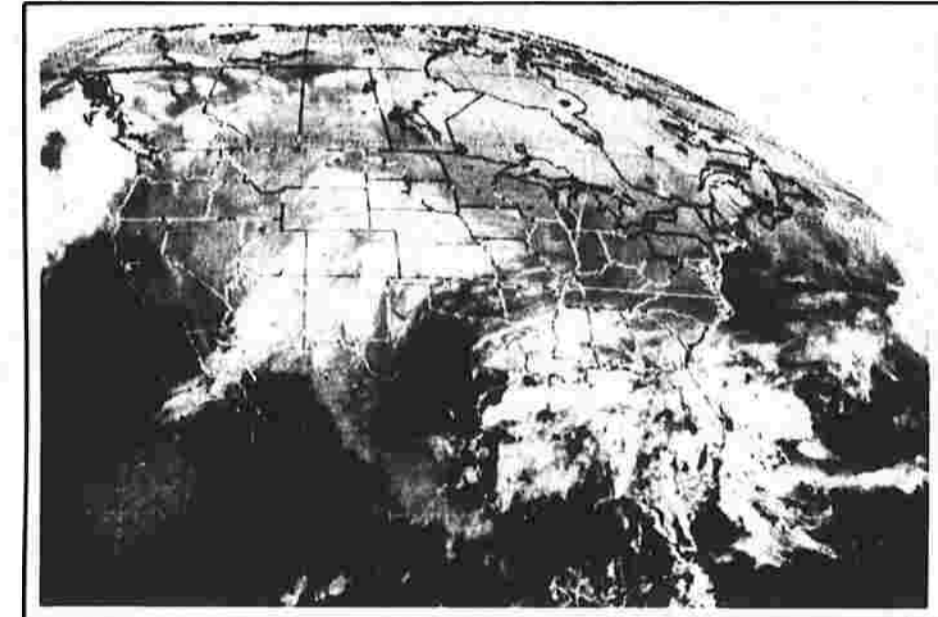

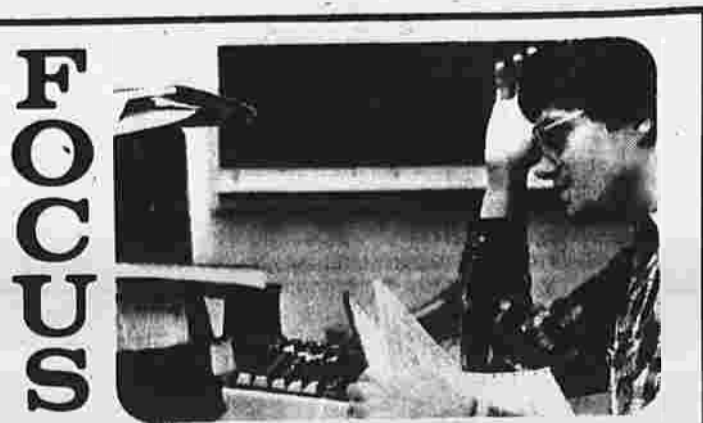

# Suspect in town's biggest drug bust gets 6 years

**HARTFORD** — A man involved in what police called Manchester's largest drug bust last year was sentenced Tuesday to six years in prison.

Francisco Lora, 28, received four concurrent six-year sentences on each of the four drug-related charges to which he pleaded guilty in Hartford Superior Court. His attorney, Maria Foden of Hartford, said he would probably be eligible for parole in a year and a half.

Lora, a native of the Dominican Republic, also faces the possibility of deportation after serving his sentence in the state prison at Somers. He has already spent a year in jail while being held on \$500,000 bond.

Judge Herbert Barall imposed the sentence despite appeals for leniency from Foden and Lora's mother and sister.

"Mr. Lora, I don't particularly relish putting you in prison," Barall said before imposing the sentence. "You obviously come from a very good family... However, you pled guilty to a very serious offense involving the importation to our state of a pound of cocaine."

Barall said that cocaine destroys lives just as a prison sentence for Lora threatened to destroy his life.

Earlier, Foden, telling the judge about the defendant's efforts to pursue education while in prison, described Lora as an "extremely intelligent, articulate man." Outside court, Foden declined to comment on the sentence.

Lora pleaded guilty in December under the Alford Doctrine, which allows a defendant to acknowledge

the state's evidence against him without admitting his guilt. He was charged with possession of more than one ounce of narcotics by a non-user with the intent to sell, possession of narcotics with the intent to sell, conspiracy to sell narcotics, and possession of narcotics. He faced a maximum sentence of life imprisonment and a minimum mandatory sentence of five years.

Jury selection for Lora's trial had been completed when he entered his pleas.

## Directors OK teachers' contract

Clearing the way for more than \$4.2 million in state education money to come to Manchester, the town Board of Directors Tuesday approved a new contract with the union that represents most of the town's teachers.

The new three-year contract replaces a two-year pact that took effect July 1, 1986. In the first year, salaries will be 2.9 percent higher than under the old pact, and they will be 2.5 percent higher in the second year. In the third year, the increase will be 9.9 percent.

By approving the revised contract, the town will get general education funds under the Education Enhancement Act approved by the General Assembly last year. These funds will total \$27,525 in the first year, \$549,050 next year and \$832,575 in the 1988-89 fiscal year.

The Board of Directors also approved a new two-year pact with the union that represents school administrators. The pact, which will take effect July 1 and cover 35 administrators, provides for a 9.5 percent increase the first year and a 9.75 percent hike in 1988-89.

A state-required study of the town's water supply will cost Manchester about \$75,000, town Water and Sewer Administrator Robert Young has reported.

In a letter to Public Works Director George Kandra, Young said that the consultant will have to conduct the study because the work involved is beyond the town's capabilities. In 1985, the General Assembly passed a measure requiring each town to conduct a study.

The deadline set for Manchester is Dec. 15. Once submitted, the study will have to be approved by the state and will serve as the guide for the town's water-supply decisions.

The town Board of Directors has not set a date to act on the matter.

## Rivosa tries to cut truck costs

In an effort to reduce the cost of rebuilding a town of Manchester aerial ladder truck, Fire Chief John Rivosa is studying the only bid submitted Jan. 23 for the work. Rivosa said Tuesday the town may seek new bids based on the same specifications.

In any event, he said, the town will probably not contract for all of the work provided for in the bids. The bidder was American LaFrance Service of Dunmore, Pa., whose bid ranged from \$123,019 to \$219,350, depending on how much of the work is done.

Rivosa said that while no decision has been made, he suspects that the town will decide to have the truck's manual transmission repaired instead of replacing it with an automatic transmission. That would save \$17,096.

Some other cost items could be omitted, but Rivosa said he would like to have the present open cab on the truck replaced with a closed cab. That adds \$26,150 to the cost.

## Town leads in charities helped

The number of Manchester non-profit groups that have benefited from the Neighborhood Assistance Act over the past five years is almost double the number helped in any other Connecticut town, according to Manchester Human Services Analyst John C. Post.

In a letter to Town Manager Robert B. Weis, Post said Manchester's 147 groups have received contributions between 1982 and 1986. Next on the list of towns is Meriden, where 78 organizations were helped.

However, Meriden led the amount of money received — \$1.3 million, compared to Manchester's \$211,389, which ranked second.

## Directors, PZC at odds on curb, walk procedure

A dispute over whether to allow developers to postpone the installation of curbs and sidewalks on Manchester roads has created a potential conflict between the town's Board of Directors and Planning and Zoning Commission.

The directors on Tuesday rejected a proposal that six families on Garden Grove Road be charged the cost of installing curbs and sidewalks in front of their homes. Instead, the board agreed to have the town pick up the estimated \$13,000 cost.

Under a 1984 agreement, the homeowners would have been charged for the work because the Planning and Zoning Commission gave the developers who owned the land in Glastonbury, the PZC is an advisory body and the Town Council has the final say on zoning matters.

George Kandra, Manchester public works director, said Tuesday no other funding options have been explored because the town is hoping to sell the land.

Town Director Stephen Penny criticized the decision to send Water and Sewer Administrator Robert Young to represent Manchester at the Glastonbury PZC meeting. While Young should have been there to provide additional information, Penny said one of the town's attorneys should have represented the town.

He said the failure to do this might have been one reason the some-change application was rejected.

### U.S./World In Brief

#### House gives itself a pay raise

WASHINGTON — House leaders used fancy parliamentary footwork to give themselves and 3,000 high-level government officials substantial pay raises while still casting a symbolic vote against it.

The House leadership deliberately delayed a vote on the controversial raise past last night's midnight deadline when it automatically took effect, thereby throwing into question the validity of a vote expected today.

No matter what ultimately happens to the \$12,100-a-year increase for members of Congress and to the increases for federal officials, federal judges appeared almost sure of having the increase stick for them.

The Constitution says once a judge's salary is raised it cannot be lowered, although that, too, could be open to court interpretation since the rejection is likely to come before the increase actually takes effect March 1.

#### Reagan loses first water battle

WASHINGTON — President Reagan, lustily cheered by Congress last week when he urged restraint in federal spending, is losing his first big fiscal fight as the Democratic-controlled 100th Congress moves to override a \$20 billion presidential veto.

The president took a lopsided wallop Tuesday when the House voted 401-26 to override his second veto of the popular Clean Water bill to reauthorize and strengthen the nation's fight against water pollution.

Despite a plea by Reagan for party unity, 147 of 177 House Republicans joined with 254 Democrats to oppose the president, who says the clean-water spending plan is too costly. He had offered a \$12 billion compromise. The 26 votes to uphold the veto came from Republicans.

There was no reaction to the House action from the White House on Tuesday.

#### U.S., Soviets draft treaty guidelines

GENEVA — U.S. and Soviet delegates are drafting guidelines for an arms control treaty for the first time in their nearly two years of negotiations in Geneva, the chief Soviet arms negotiator said.

Yuli Vorontsov, at a news conference Tuesday, called the guidelines a "kind of frame on which (we) will later on put all the necessary elements" for a treaty. He did not give details of what the treaty would encompass.

The three areas under discussion at the talks are space and defense systems and long and medium-range nuclear weapons. The superpowers launched the arms talks in March 1986, but Vorontsov said the current work on treaty guidelines is "the first time we're working with a paper and pencil in drafting."

#### Shultz says 'Star Wars' far off

WASHINGTON — Secretary of State George P. Shultz says no development of the space-based "Star Wars" program is likely soon.

Despite rapid progress in anti-missile research, President Reagan probably will not face a decision this year on whether to deploy the first phase of the controversial system, Shultz testified Tuesday.

He appeared before the Senate Armed Services Committee immediately after attending a top-level meeting with Reagan on arms control at the White House.

While Shultz refused to say what advice he had offered, he told uneasy senators: "There has been no decision made about development of any kind."

#### Senate panel reviews justice policies

WASHINGTON — With liberal Democrats in solid control, the Senate Judiciary Committee is undertaking a wide review of the policies that prevail at Edwin Meese III's Justice Department — ranging from corporate mergers to civil rights.

"The committee will be showing some vigor in its oversight role, and that begins with the hearing today," Sen. Paul Simon, D-Ill., said Tuesday. "Civil rights and anti-trust laws don't mean much when enforcement is limp or not there at all."

Meese, who has been a vigorous attorney general in advocating his conservative philosophy, was summoned before the committee as its leadoff witness, to be followed over the next month by a parade of top aides who direct every aspect of department policy.

#### Witnesses say bartender urged fire

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico — A U.S. attorney said he has 13 witnesses who allege bartender Jose Francisco Rivera Lopez incited others to start the Dupont Plaza Hotel fire that killed 98 people on New Year's Eve.

Rivera Lopez pleaded innocent Tuesday in U.S. District Court to a federal charge of "procuring," or instigating, arson. Judge Justo Arenas denied bail.

U.S. Attorney Daniel Lopez Romo told the court he had 13 witnesses who had testified to Lieutenant by Rivera Lopez before the fire started at the hotel, which was having labor problems.

## Re-Entry closes; new director sought

#### Odds against finding suspects in murder

Statistics are against Manchester police as they continue to search for two Hispanic men in connection with the Jan. 27 shooting death of a Congress Street woman.

The two men, believed to be from the Hartford area, were acquaintances of Lauren G. Anderson, 28, who was found dead in her kitchen by her roommate. She had been shot once, authorities said, and there were no signs of a struggle.

Gary Wood, police department spokesman, said police have no information as to the whereabouts of the two suspects or the still-missing red Toyota they are believed to have driven from the scene of the crime.

Police do know the names of the two men, he said, based on information provided by witnesses who saw them leave the apartment early that morning and get into the car.

Statistically, Wood said, if police don't have a suspect in custody 48 hours after a crime is committed, then it's likely they won't be able to find one.

Police, he said, are trying to establish other Anderson acquaintances who might be able to offer information.

A statewide bulletin has been issued seeking information on the two men, who do not have criminal records in Manchester, and the missing Toyota.

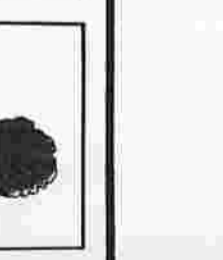
**RAFTS**

Cut head lengthwise into halves, as for wedges, then place cut-sides down on board and slice crosswise with a sharp, stainless steel knife or cut head into halves and cut down the face of lettuce with a sharp, thin-bladed knife. One medium-size head yields about 4 cups shredded lettuce.



**CUPS**  
Hold the previously cored head of lettuce cored-end up, spreading the leaves apart with your fingers. Gently separate outer leaves and lift from head.
