Polly's Pointers

When rust spots stain clothing

DEAR POLLY - I had a new blouse (85 percent cotton, 15 percent polyester) on a hanger in my closet. With all the damp weather, the hanger got rusty and left rust on my blouse. Is there any way to remove rust spots from clothes? - MARY JANE

DEAR MARY JANE - Rubbing stains with lemon juice and letting them bleach in the sun is fairly effective for removing rust spots. However, it may make some colors fade, so test the method first in a hidden spot such as the inside of a hem or a seam. It is safe for white fabrics. Another method for removing rust stains that is sometimes effective and is safe for delicate fabrics is to soak the garment in a mixture of 1 part water and 4 teaspoons cream of tartar. The proportions may be increased as needed. Use water as hot as your fabric will stand.

The manufacturers of home eye products (such as RTI) have a rust-removing product which does an effective job. Look for this in variety stores and markets with the displays of home eyes. - POLLY

Weak no-trumps: the minus side

A cornerstone of the famous Kaplan-Sheinwald bidding system is the weak no-trump. On many deals it is difficult for opponents to judge how best to compete against it, particularly when their own high-card strength is divided evenly. And competing on less than sound values can be a disaster, particularly when a partner is broke. Occasionally the weak no-trump bidder must pay a price. My teammate from last September's World Team Championship in Miami, Dr. Jim Sternberg, has a weak no-trump anecdote that surely must have its place in the world of bridge trivia.

When South bid one no-trump, Dr. Sternberg, sitting West, felt his hand was just as good as the no-trump bidder's, so he doubled. East was happy to pass, and one no-trump doubled became the final contract. When the opening lead of the diamond ace drew the deuce from East, West switched to a low club. East took the king and returned a diamond. Back came a club and back another diamond. West had two more clubs and a good diamond to cash, and on those three winners East discarded all three little hearts. Next came the queen of spades, and you can see what happened. Sad to say, the defenders took all 13 tricks.

I'm the first person to admit that I have had my share of bad results when confronted with the weak no-trump, so don't think of this piece as politically motivated. I do advocate strong no-trump openings and can absolutely testify that I have never been doubled at one no-trump and failed to take a trick.

Japan seeks help after dollar slides

TOKYO (AP) — Japanese officials today called for central bank intervention and possible joint action with other countries to halt the slide of the U.S. dollar which plunged to record lows on currency exchanges.

The dollar closed at 148.80 yen after falling as low as 148.40 during the day.

It was the first time the dollar had closed below 150 yen since modern exchange rates were established in the late 1940s.

Dealers estimated that the Bank of Japan bought between \$1.7 billion and \$2 billion to support the U.S. currency, but said action by Japan alone was not enough to scare dollar sellers.

Bank officials refused to confirm whether they had stepped in, but Japanese dealers said the bank intervened when the dollar began trading at 148.80 to 148.85.

Prime Minister Yasuhiro Nakasone told reporters he had asked Finance Minister Kiichi Miyazawa to take steps to prevent the dollar's further fall. Japan's Kyodo News Service reported.

Miyazawa told members of Japan's House of Representatives that coordinated intervention by the central banks of major nations was needed to prevent the dollar from going lower.

Cops identify suspect in shooting

Police today released the name of a suspect in the Jan. 27 murder of 26-year-old Lauren G. Anderson.

The suspect is identified as Epifanio Vasquez, 34, a Hispanic male who is believed to be armed and dangerous. A warrant for his arrest was issued March 9.

Police have been unable to locate

"Japan cannot allow the yen to appreciate further," Kyoto quoted him as saying.

The stronger yen has not yet translated into reduced trade deficits for the United States or other nations, and pressure in the United States for protectionist and retaliatory measures have increased in recent weeks.

Government leaders of six major nations, meeting in Paris last month, agreed to work to keep exchange rates at about current levels.

Obituaries

R.E. Cooper, was director

Raymond E. Cooper, 77, a member of the Manchester Board of Directors in the early days of the town's council-manager form of government, died Feb. 27 in Key West, Fla., at a local hospital.

Cooper, a Republican, was elected to the board in 1948, a year after Manchester's Town Charter took effect and the new government replaced the former Board of Selectmen. When he was re-elected to the board in 1960, Cooper was the high vote-getter in the election, but he was not successful in his effort to be named chairman of the board.

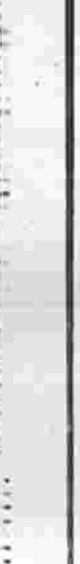
A Manchester Herald story in 1951 described Cooper as a Republican "irregular," voting frequently with the minority Democrats.

Cooper resigned from the board just three months into his second term, when he moved from Brookfield Street to a home in Bolton.

He became active in Bolton politics, serving as chairman of the former School Building Committee, chairman of the town's Board of Tax Review, and chairman of the town finance board.

While living in Manchester, Cooper was employed at the Travelers Insurance Co. for nine years, then served as accountant and office manager for the Orford Soap Co. (Bon Ami) for 15 years.

After Bon Ami left Manchester, he held positions with the Spencer Rubber Products Corp. and the Empire Tool and Manufacturing Co. When he moved to Bolton, he became associated with the T.J. Crockett Insurance Agency. In 1985, he was appointed to the new

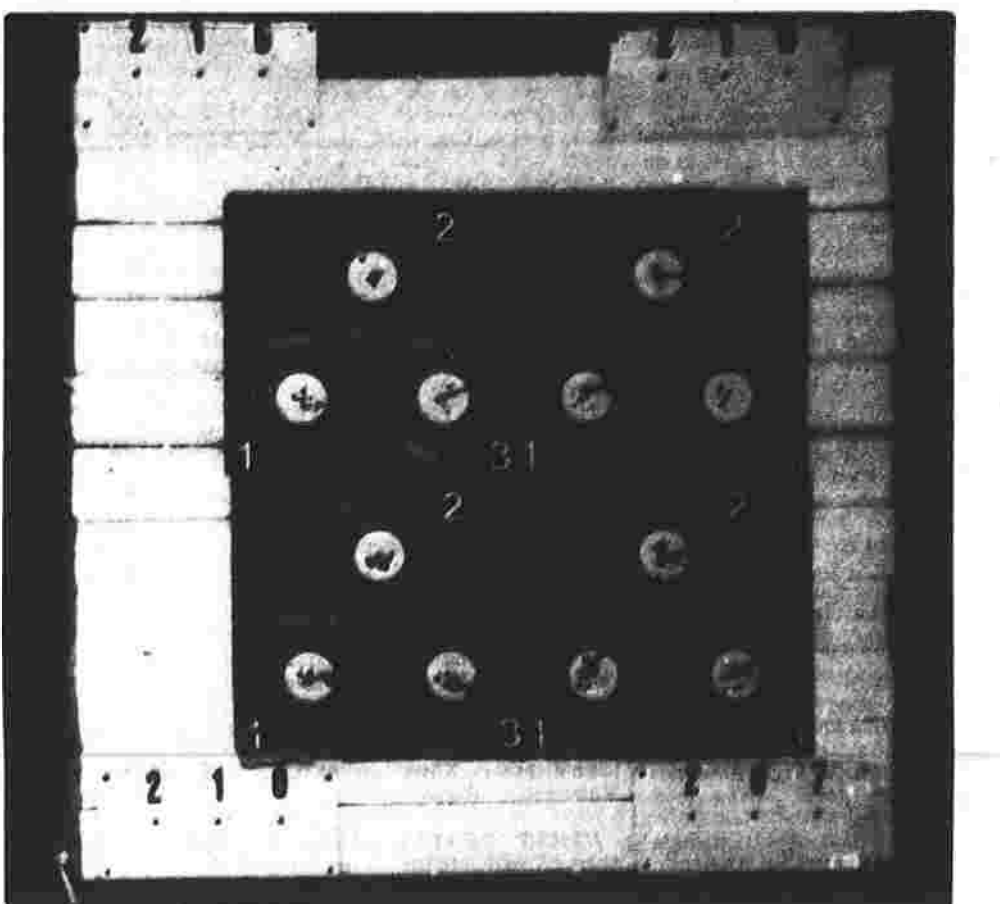

\$2.8 million of budget is to repay loans

Manchester will pay out about \$2.8 million in the next fiscal year in principal and interest on borrowed money, the budget recommended by Town Manager Robert Weiss indicates.

Of that amount, \$2,249,826 represents the payments of principal and interest on bonded debt for which there will be balance of about \$12 million in principal on July 1, the start of the 1987-88 fiscal year.

The remaining \$648,974 is for payment of principal and interest on temporary borrowing.

While the bond payment will decrease next year by \$145,294 from the current year, the payments on notes will increase by \$283,820.

The increase is due to the fact that the town will begin paying the principal, \$268,000 on notes that are more than two years old, as required by law.

The 11 bond issues involved were sold between July 1971 and April 1983 at rates ranging from 4.85 percent to 8.25 percent.

The latest, with the highest rate, is the \$5 million issue for the town-owned Buckland Industrial Park. As of July 1, about \$2.7 million will remain on the principal to be paid on those bonds. Next year's payment on the bond principal and interest will be \$537,719.

In his budget message to the Board of Directors, Weiss observed

that tax assessment of the park is now \$27,117,980. With his proposed tax rate of 80.73 mills, the town would collect \$1,375,694 in taxes in 1987-88, he said.

Of the 11 bond issues, five were for school renovation work.

The three notes on which principal will be due next year were issued for various public improvements, improvements in the Cheney Historic District, and highway improvements.

A note of \$400,000 was issued in January 1987 on planning improvements to elementary schools and Manchester High School, and \$10,350 in interest will

be paid next year on those notes. Voters have authorized a bond issue of \$5 million for the work. Robert Huettis, budget analyst, said Monday morning that if progress on the work warrants it, the bonds would be issued for the school projects as early as July 1988, and the cost of the project would have its first major impact on the budget in the 1988-89 fiscal year. The plan now calls for issuing 10-month notes in September 1987 in anticipation of the bond issue. While the bonds would not have to be issued until January 1989, the early issue would permit the town to get state reimbursement earlier, Huettis said.

Hershberger wins 'round 3' with DMV

Manchester's controversial motorcycleist rights advocate, Robert W. "Kaiser" Hershberger, has won round three in his battle against the state Department of Motor Vehicles.

The new motor vehicles commissioner, Lawrence P. DePonte, has agreed with Hershberger that he would be overcharged \$44 to obtain handicapped motorcycle license plates last fall. In a March 18 letter, DePonte said the money will be refunded to Hershberger.

Under state law, a person can only be charged \$5 for each handicapped motorcycle license plate. However, the department charged Hershberger an extra \$22 for each of the two license plates he was issued because it said the new plates changed the class of the vehicles from motorcycles to handicapped vehicles.

Former Motor Vehicles Commissioner Benjamin Murio refused to refund the additional charges.

Scandals involving evangelists won't hurt cause, leaders say

NEW YORK — Evangelical specialists see the questionable episodes involving television preachers Jim Bakker and Oral Roberts as tarnishing the Christian cause, but not reflecting its reality.

Some also say the affairs may harden attitudes of critics and supporters, while others cite possibly purging effects on TV evangelism.

Generally, however, the impact was seen as sullying the image of such ministries, and reinforcing the aversion of secularist critics toward the Christian faith.

"Inevitably there will be some negative fallout," said the Rev. Carl F. H. Henry of Arlington, Va., considered the country's leading evangelical theologian. "It puts a question mark over the legitimacy of evangelism."

"People out there in the secular city who seal themselves off from the churches are likely to rationalize their non-involvement by appealing to episodes like this."

Bakker resigned last week from his PTL ministry, saying he was blackmailed over a sexual encounter. On Monday, he said his resignation was actually an attempt to thwart a "diabolical plot" to take over the \$60,000-member organization.

Roberts has said God ordered him to raise \$5 million by March 31 to help fund missionary activities. If he didn't, he would die.

"The situations will be used to point the finger at all evangelists," said the Rev. Brien O'Connell of the National Association of Evangelicals in Washington, D.C.

"Some people are going to believe the worst, and say evangelists have no moral integrity. But just because Jesus had a Judas doesn't mean the other apostles were not credible."

"To Jim Bakker's case, he failed, but it shouldn't be characterized as everyone's failure, unfortunate as it was."

O'Connell emphasized that television evangelists are only a small and not typical segment of the broad evangelical community based in the churches, expressed through them, and accountable to them.

However, he said, TV evangelism may suffer. "People paint with a broad brush on things like this," he said. "It will make for more caution about giving money."

The Rev. Arthur C. Borden, executive director of the Evangelical Council for Financial Responsibility, said the overall effect is detrimental to the Christian cause, making it harder to present the faith to non-believers.

"They'll say, 'Hey, just look at these guys,'" Borden said.

However, he said, the results would have pluses and minuses for TV ministries, intensifying the antagonism of outside critics and the loyalty of supporters.

"To Jim Bakker's case, he failed, but it shouldn't be characterized as everyone's failure, unfortunate as it was."

O'Connell emphasized that television evangelists are only a small and not typical segment of the broad evangelical community based in the churches, expressed through them, and accountable to them.

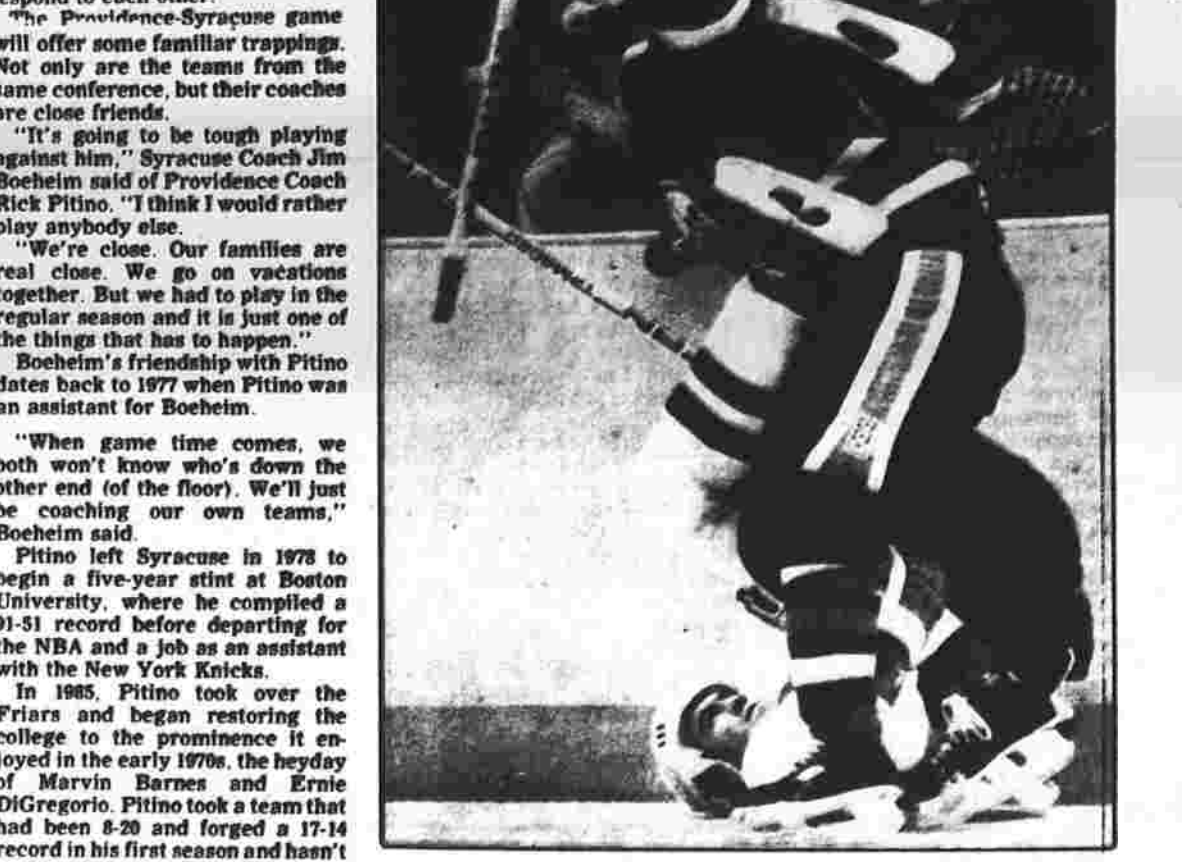

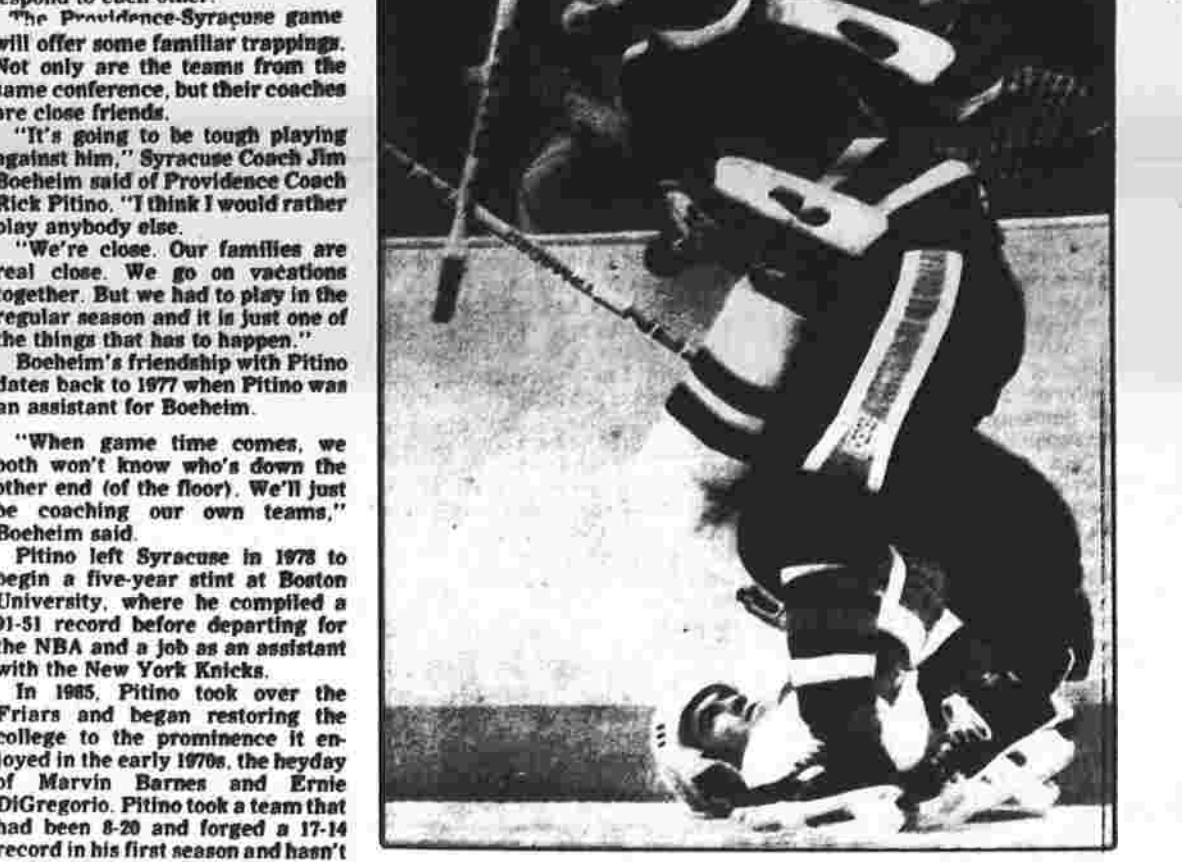
