





Manchester Housing Authority. It's very difficult, for instance, to devise rules that apply equally well to parakeets and dogs, that cover pets being kept temporarily as well as those that are permanent residents, that satisfy both ardent pet lovers and those elderly tenants who think pets don't belong in an apartment complex at all.

One easy way to solve the problem would be to have a vague set of rules, giving broad discretion to the authority's executive director. That would put the director in the middle as an arbiter every time some tenant's pet proved to be an annovance to some other tenant, something that is bound to happen.

Another easy way out would be to make the rules so rigid that they would make it all but impossible to have a pet. But that would violate the spirit, if not the letter, of the federal regulation that requires local housing authorities to allow pets at federally subsidized housing projects.

To its credit, the authority has not taken either one of those courses. It is trying to evolve regulations that set realistic limits on the kind of pets allowed. It is also trying to find a way to protect the taxpayers against the cost of repairing damage done by pets without imposing on the tenants a high security deposit they cannot afford.

If only a few of the tenants decide to have pets, the effort will be have been worthwhile.



Alexander Prechtel, a spokesman for the chief federal prosecutor's office, said the leftist Red Army Faction or the Irish Republican Army were believed responsible for the Monday

"Judging by the fact that it was a car bomb and the size of the bomb, and considering the object of the attack, one would suspect the Red Army Faction or the IRA," he said in a telephone interview from his office in Karlsruhe.




