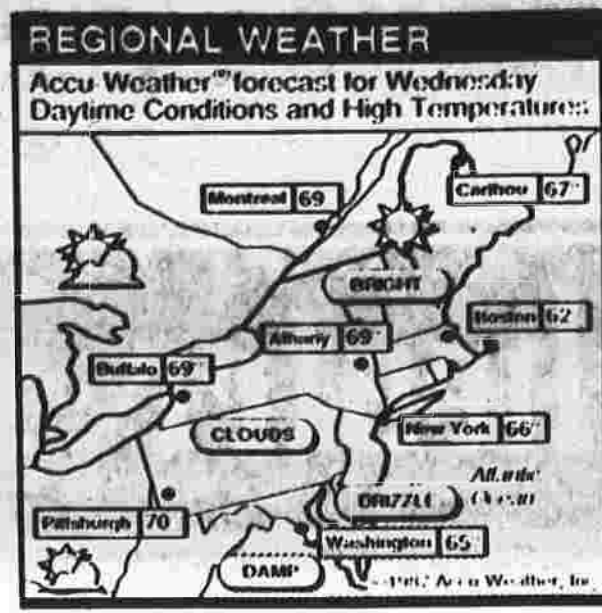
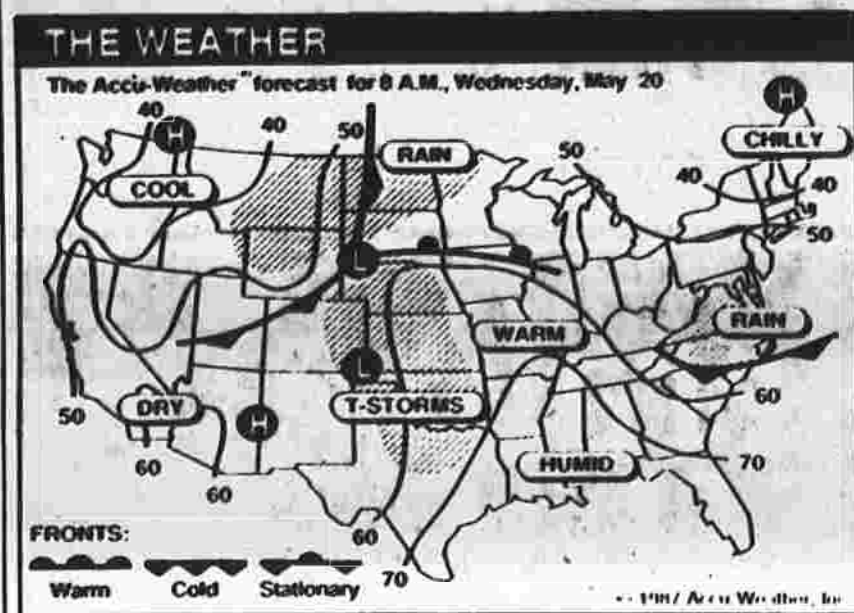

Rain wets midsection; cold moves into North

Rain was widespread across the nation's midsection today while temperatures were on the dip side across the North and dipped to freezing in northern New England.

Thunderstorms ranged from northern Illinois across central Missouri and into southeast Kansas early today.

Rain was scattered from Nevada across the central Rockies and into western sections of Nebraska and Kansas.

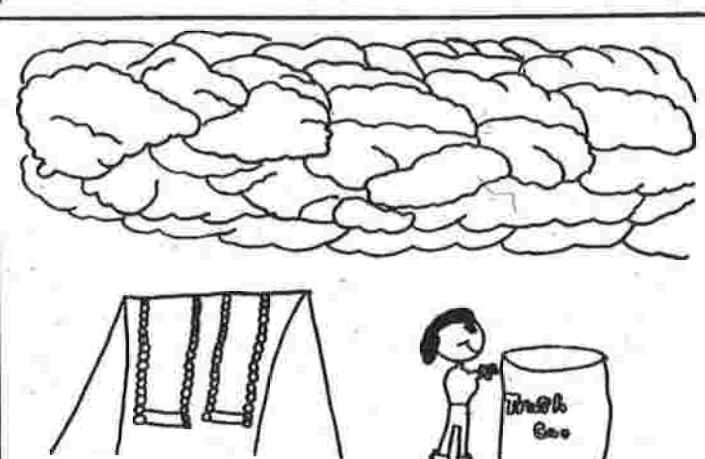
Thunderstorms also were scattered across south Texas while showers spread across across west Texas.

Showers and thunderstorms ranged from the middle Atlantic Coast states across the northern Ohio Valley and light rain was widespread across southeastern New York, southern New England and from North Dakota to the upper Great Lakes region.

Temperatures early this morning were in the 30s to 40s in Washington, Oregon, the northern Rockies, from North Dakota to the upper Great Lakes and in much of New England.

Today's forecast called for thunderstorms across the central Plains; showers and thunderstorms from the middle Atlantic Coast across the Ohio Valley into southern Michigan and Wisconsin; thunderstorms likely from Colorado across eastern New Mexico and west Texas; showers and thunderstorms scattered across the Northwest, southern Plains, middle Mississippi Valley and southern Atlantic Coast; and rain from northern Minnesota into northern Michigan.

Highs will be around 50 near Lake Superior.

Out of hospital

Johnny Cash is back home near Nashville after nearly two days of treatment for stress and exhaustion in Council Bluffs, Iowa.

Publisher Hugh Waddell said Cash flew back to Nashville in a private plane after being released from the hospital Monday, and plans to rest after cancelling two concerts in Ohio and Illinois, on advice of doctors.

The country music star plans to resume his concert schedule in Memphis on May 30, Waddell said.

Cash was taken to Mercy Hospital in Council Bluffs by ambulance Saturday night after becoming ill during a concert.

"Cash had a stress-related condition," Dr. Raben Altman of Council Bluffs said. "He just needed some rest and he got that over the weekend."

Cash's manager, Lew Robbins, said the singer was tired from criss-crossing the country for concerts and promoting his new book, "Man In White," as well as recording a movie soundtrack.

Cash's Iowa concert will be rescheduled for September and tickets for Saturday's performance will be honored, said Dick Miller, chairman of Council Bluffs' Pride Week committee.

Joyner declares he'll seek 4th term as 8th president

Eighth Utilities District President Walter Joyner, defending his practice of taking vacations out of town, Monday announced he will seek re-election to a fourth one-year term.

"When the chips are down ... I'm there. I will continue to be there," Joyner said in a booming voice during a meeting of the Eighth District's Board of Directors in the Main Street firehouse.

Joyner has been criticized by Director Thomas Landers, also a presidential candidate, for being out of town for a couple of months earlier this year while negotiating between the town of Manchester and the Eighth District over a bargaining session. Joyner explained that it was because of the negotiations that he decided to seek re-election.

"I still feel we're close to a resolution, and for that reason I want to seek the job," said Joyner, who is a former state representative. He said that the two sides are the closest they have been in years to reaching an agreement.

The Eighth District provides fire protection and sewer service to most of northern Manchester. Its leaders and supporters successfully defeated a townwide referendum last November that would have stripped the political subdivision of its power to veto a merger.

While Democratic town officials, who hold a majority, supported the change, they agreed to enter into talks with the Eighth District after voters defeated the referendum.

Landers said after the meeting that Joyner's announcement was not a surprise. But reiterating a point made last week when he announced his candidacy, Landers said it was time for a change.

Gerber Products, a maker of computer goods and a subsidiary of Gerber Scientific, needed the zone change before it could submit a subdivision plan for the site, which is located between Interstate 84 and the East Hartford town line.

They have said they are not sure whether the work to close the Batson Drive building when the new one opens.

In other action, the commission changed the zone of a 32-acre parcel off Chapel Road and Burnham Street from Residential to Industrial. The request was made by developer Darrell Chalout.

The town's Comprehensive Plan of Development designates the land for industrial use. The land abuts the Buckland Industrial Park.

Meaner flies, fatter roaches, bolder rats

A federal food inspector testifying before a Senate subcommittee last week revealed some unappetizing information: Inspections at the nation's beef and poultry processing plants are falling miserably at preventing dirty and contaminated products from reaching the tables of consumers.

The problem is so severe, the inspector told senators, that the government label on beef and poultry products should be changed from "USDA Inspected and Approved" to "Eat At Your Own Risk."

Inspector Vermie Gee told the Senate Governmental Affairs subcommittee Friday that part of the problem stems from poor training of new inspectors, corruption among department supervisors and harassment of conscientious inspectors. As a result of the mismanagement, more dirty or diseased products are reaching unsuspecting consumers, he said.

The state of affairs described by Gee is inexcusable. Unlike many problems the government faces, the troubles at beef and poultry processing plants would cost little to correct.

As Gee told the Senate panel, the government must "inspect smarter." The solution he offered is simple: Inspections of beef and poultry for cosmetic defects such as bruises should be turned over to the processing plants, freeing some of the 7,000 federal inspectors to look for contamination by salmonella and other microorganisms that cause disease.

The government had better get moving on the problem because, as Gee warned senators, "... the flies have been getting meaner, the roaches fatter and the rats bolder." Conditions at some of the nation's beef and poultry plants are appalling, he said.

As it is now, microorganisms such as salmonella cause an estimated 4 million cases of food poisoning each year, and the number is growing, according to the National Academy of Science.

If the government is going to lull consumers into a false sense of security by stamping its seal of approval on beef and poultry, it has an obligation to make sure that it does a better job of inspecting the products.

Diesel tax collected but rarely paid

WASHINGTON — Crooked diesel-fuel retailers have pocketed billions of dollars in excise taxes they should have given to Uncle Sam, according to federal officials' estimates. The money was collected 15 cents per gallon, from truckers and others who use diesel fuel in their motor vehicles. Federal Highway Administration officials estimate that the filling-station tax cheaters keep \$500 million or more each year that should be turned over to the Internal Revenue Service. The money would have gone into the Highway Trust Fund, which is the sole support of the federal government's highway-paid program.

The main reason for this gigantic rip-off is the huge number of diesel-fuel retailers in the country, according to Tony McMahon, the highway agency's chief counsel. There are upward of 100,000 service-station owners selling diesel fuel, and McMahon estimated that 40,000 of them don't pass along to the government the excise taxes they collect from their customers.

THE IRS DOESN'T have the staff to police 100,000 outlets for compliance and must rely instead on an honor system. An internal highway agency memo obtained by our reporter Karen Talley explains how easy it is for dishonest diesel fuel sellers to keep the taxes they collect.

"The primary source of information for the IRS oversight of compliance is the list of those who file. If a taxpayer (sic) does not file, he isn't on the list and the IRS doesn't know he exists."

Evasion is widespread because the incentives for cheating "are practically irresistible," the memo states, adding: "The payoff is large, the risk small, and your competitor is doing it."

As one frustrated highway agency official said in disgust, retailers "would have to be crazy to file" when anonymity is so simple and the chances of getting caught are so slim.

The Highway Trust Fund received \$2.5 billion last year in diesel fuel taxes from law-abiding retailers. McMahon and Federal Highway Administrator Ray Barnhart believe the solution to the tax-evasion problem would be to shift accountability for turning in the excise tax from the 100,000-plus service station operators to the 8,000 distributors who supply them.

MOVING TAX collection "away from the fuel pump and over to the distributor is logical and more practical," Barnhart said, and the IRS has not opposed this suggestion.

Barnhart emphasized that he does not fault the IRS for failing to collect the diesel excise tax. "With upward of 100,000 businesses throughout the nation collecting diesel taxes from truckers and motorists," he said, "the IRS simply hasn't a fighting chance to collect the monies due."

Investigations by both federal and state authorities have turned up some astounding examples of chicanery. One retailer, for example, had pocketed the federal excise tax on 20 million gallons of diesel fuel before he was caught.

A common method of evasion is to claim that the diesel fuel is being sold for home heating. Some oil burners use diesel fuel, but home heating fuel is tax-exempt.

"The impossibility of identifying the fuel with the purpose for which it is sold creates a potential for widespread bootlegging of what is alleged to be home heating fuel to truck stops, trucking companies and other retail stations, where it is sold or used as motor vehicle fuel," a highway agency memo states.

Another technique is to falsify invoices to claim the diesel fuel was sold to boat owners, farmers, industry users and other tax-exempt customers, and to dummy distributors, the agency document states.

Dangerous seafood
Pollution of the nation's waterways poses a serious threat to seafood consumers, according to a recent congressional report. Rep. Walter Jones, D-N.C., called the findings "frightening," and told our reporter Karen Talley that his Marine and Fisheries Committee wants "to move in with legislation to further the protection of our coastlines and estuaries." Hearings are scheduled to begin next week.

The risks of disease from contaminated seafood are growing, the report warned. It noted the first outbreak of cholera in 60 years in this country, as a result of shellfish harvested in southwestern Louisiana marshlands. The report also blamed contaminated shellfish for more than 100 outbreaks of viral gastroenteritis in New York City in 1982. Each outbreak made more than 1,000 people sick, the report said.

Jones said corrective measures should include stricter sanitation laws and enforcement along the shorelines.

Venture gives Arizona prisoners real jobs

PHOENIX, Ariz. — "Good morning, Best Western," chirped the young woman in her cheeriest voice as she answers a telephone call from a traveler seeking lodging at one of the chain's 3,300 properties in almost 40 countries.

In the same room, more than a dozen other reservation agents perform similar tasks, speaking with potential customers through telephone headsets and using computer terminals to check on the price and availability of motel space.

Scores of airlines, rental car companies and other lodging chains operate similar reservation centers, but the Best Western facility here is different. It is located inside the Arizona Center for Women, a state prison, and all of the agents are inmates.

Establishing businesses inside prison walls is hardly new. For decades, many states have relied upon prison industries to manufacture not only license plates but also furniture, highway signs and other products.

The federal government's prison industries program, more than 80 years old and known as UNICOR, makes and sells in excess of 100 products, including sofas, chairs, aprons, bed sheets, shoes and work gloves.

IN ALL OF these cases, however, the goods are sold to other government agencies. In most cases, transactions with non-government corporations or other institutions are prohibited by law.

In mid-1981, however, Arizona launched an ambitious program, under the banner of ARCOR

(for Arizona Correctional Enterprises, that encouraged the state sector cooperation to develop marketable skills for its inmates.

"The enlightened prison program in Arizona" was praised by then-Chief Justice Warren Burger of the U.S. Supreme Court, who argued that "we need to transform America's prisons from warehouses into factories with fences around them."

Such initiatives, Burger and other proponents suggested, would enhance the inmates' dignity and financial burden imposed upon taxpayers by the country's prison systems.

No state was as fully committed to the concept as Arizona, although Minnesota, Kansas and others have experimented with joint business ventures with private firms. (In one of California's few programs, prisoners in Los Angeles serve as reservation agents for Trans World Airlines.)

The ARCOR effort, however, has been plagued by political, managerial and financial problems.

Although supposedly a profit-making venture, it has been a chronic money-loser with a deficit that has recently exceeded \$2 million annually and now totals more than \$1 million.

THE GOAL OF providing jobs for 20 percent of all inmates in Arizona's prisons has never been met. Growth has been unplanned and uncontrolled. State employees assigned to run the program have been accused of fraud and embezzlement.

A cooperative venture with a slaughterhouse collapsed when the company went bankrupt. A planned joint venture with a water bed producer never materialized.

A cooperative effort with a sheet metal firm to manufacture office partitions was abandoned after leaders of local unions complained that their members were unfairly "competing with convicted felons for jobs."

But there has been one outstanding success — the ARCOR partnership with Best Western International that has employed 175 prisoners since its inception almost six years ago.

Best Western provides the telephone and computer equipment, trains and supervises the women and pays them the same \$4.50 per hour that employees in its other reservation centers receive. Indeed, the company has hired 50 ex-convicts after their release.

The ARCOR experiment has illustrated the special difficulties posed by public-private prison partnership — but the Best Western success has demonstrated the value of carefully structured joint ventures.

Better safe than sorry

The defense was razor-sharp against today's five-diamond contract. Declarer won the opening lead with dummy's ace and immediately led a diamond back to his king and West's ace. Instead of continuing hearts, West led the spade jack. Declarer now correctly decided to combine all his chances. He played dummy's spade queen. If West had the king, this would be all right even if he lost a trick to the diamond jack. When that lost, he ruffed the heart return and played a diamond to dummy's queen. When the jack did not fall, he was done one. That was bad luck, certainly, but declarer had a much safer play. Do you see it?
Father than play a diamond to the king at the second trick, he should ruff a heart to his hand. He can then play toward the Q-10-5-2 in dummy. When West follows with the nine, declarer should insert dummy's 10. The key is that declarer can afford to lose two trump tricks, as long as West is kept off lead so that he cannot shift to a spade through dummy's A-Q. If dummy's diamond 10 loses to the jack with East, that defender cannot attack spades. South will be able to ruff an over heart return, knock out the diamond ace, draw trumps and run his long club suit. And that will be a relatively safe 11 tricks, even if the first diamond loses to the jack with East. Of course, as the cards lie, this approach results in declarer taking 12 tricks. That's a fair reward for taking pains to play as safely as possible.

Don't hem a dress before its time

Some special deals are just too good to be true

It looks too good to be true. It probably is.
Yet year after year, thousands of Americans are taken by fraudulent or accidental promises from companies that offer extravagant vacations and gifts, but deliver nothing but enormous bills and empty promises.
If it looks too good to be true, then stay away.
For example, Tracey said, the Better Business Bureau is tracking down an Illinois company that recently sent postcards to Connecticut residents offering a trip to Hawaii for \$91 - including air fare and seven days on the islands.
When many customers don't show at first glance, however, is that two people must go on the trip. Costs for the second person are much higher, Tracey said, and can range anywhere from \$600 to \$1,000.
If someone spends the \$91, you do get the trip, Tracey said. But then you have to book the flight through that company.
Tracey said that when someone tries to sell you something on the telephone, a lot of questions. A reputable company will be happy to send you additional information.
If you make calls to every scam you can think of, Tracey said. They all want your credit card number over the phone. Tell the caller you want him to send you more information. I can guarantee you, 99 percent of them will say, 'We can do that.'
The best advice we can give is to hold your credit card number. Tracey said, 'If you don't give your credit card number to anyone, you're safe.'
Once you've done that, it may be hard to get your money back. However, there is something you can do if you are taken in.
Credit card companies have safeguards against such practices. Visa customers can notify the bank in writing that there is a charge for goods either not received or not wanted, said Richard Dennis, spokesman for Connecticut Bank & Trust Co. The bank will credit the Visa customer and charge the amount back to the merchant's bank.
Dennis said that when a Visa customer is scammed, the first thing you should do is go straight to the company that sold the package. Most legitimate companies, they said, will settle the dispute.
If this does not work, go to the bank. Federal law, they said, requires you notify the bank in writing.
The key point here is, it only works when you have not yet paid the transaction, Brigham said.
However, Brigham pointed out, each case is different and you are not always going to get your money back.
Tracey said some offers are not what they seem to be. Most refer to the customer as being part of an elite group or having won a special gift.
Once on the phone, operators will try to pressure customers into giving out their credit card numbers. Customers are often told that the offer is only good for a short time and if they refuse the offer now, they will lose their chance forever.

The dollar strengthened on expectations that the U.S. Federal Reserve will raise interest rates to stave off inflation, the dealers said. Higher interest rates make the dollar a more attractive investment.
Markets have detected signs of increased U.S. inflation in recent weeks, and these were heightened Friday by the announcement of unexpectedly high U.S. wholesale prices in April.
In Tokyo, where trading ends before Europe's business day begins, the dollar edged past the 146-yen mark for only the third time this month, rising 0.53 yen to close at 146.05. Later, in London, it was unchanged.

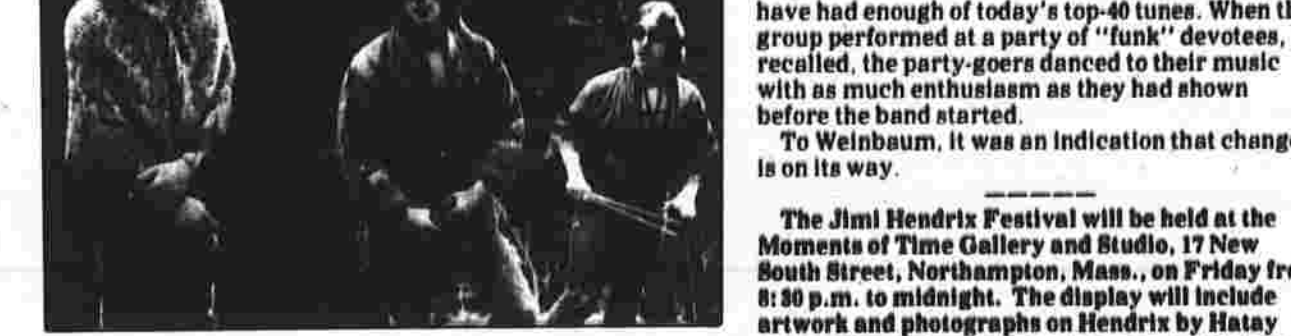

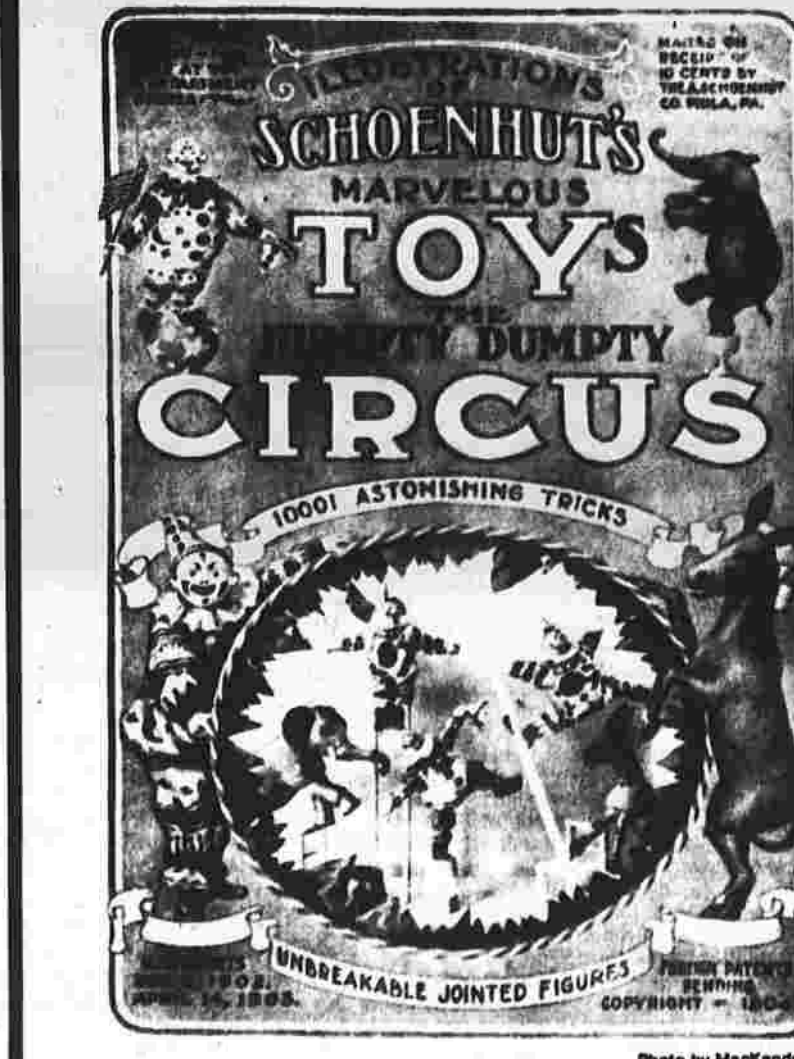

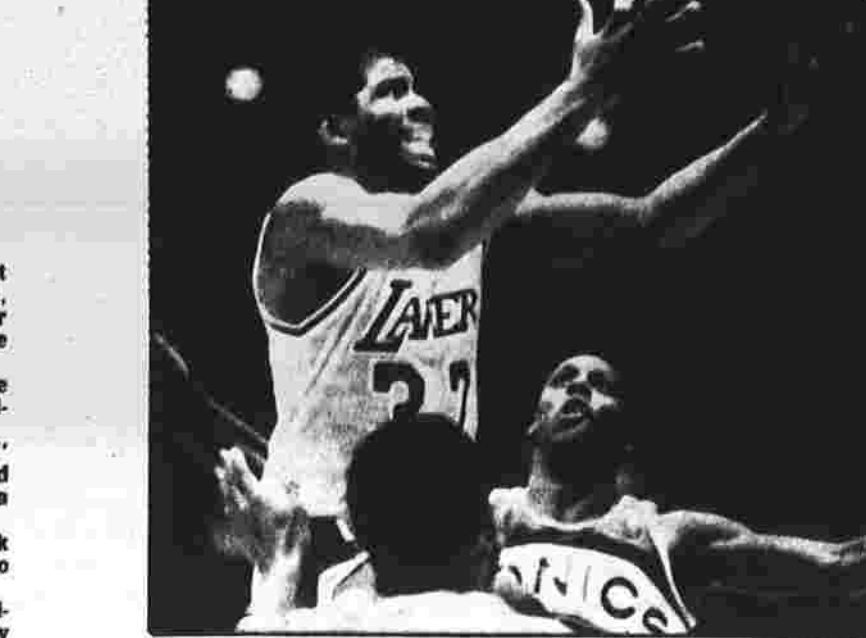
