Judge gets supreme nomination

HARTFORD - Superior Court Judge Alfred V. Covello of West Hartford was nominated Monday as a state Supreme Court ustice by Gov. William A. O'Neill. If confirmed by the General Assembly, Covello would succeed

Joseph F. Dannehy of Willimantic, who reaches the mandatory retirement age of 70 on May 28. Covello, 54, became a Common Pleas Court judge in 1974 and, after the court system was reorganized, became a Superior Court judge in 1978. He is a graduate of Harvard and the University of

"It is clear upon review of Judge Covello's credentials that he has earned this nomination to our highest court," O'Neill said. "I am fully confident Judge Covello will continue the excellence on the bench that the people of this state have grown to expect."

Murder investigation turns to cash

NAUGATUCK - Police were investigating whether an envelope containing eight new \$100 bills in the briefcase of an alcohol and drug counselor found dead may have a connection with his murder

The body of Harold Sanders, 56, of Waterbury, was found Saturday buried under leaves and branches off a local road after a passer-by found his briefcase nearby the night before. Judging from the nature of wounds on one side of his face, Sanders was pistol-whipped before he was shot six times, Capt. William Long said Monday.

Two bullets hit Sanders in the hand and arm, as though he raised his arms in self-defense, before he took four killing bullets in the chest and stomach, Long said.

The eight crisp bills were still in the briefcase and a gold chain and rings still on the body, making robbery an improbable motive in the slaying, police said.

Red Cross chapters to merge

DANBURY - Red Cross chapters in Danbury, New Milford and Washington have announced they will merge effective July 1 to become the Western Connecticut Chapter of the American Red

"By pooling our resources, our staff and volunteer support, we will not only be able to provide a higher quality of service, but we will also be eliminating a lot of duplication of efforts," Frank Mariano, chairman of the new chapter, said Monday.

The new chapter, approved Sunday by a vote of the Red Cross National Board of Governors in Denver, Colo., will cover 14-town area, including the area now served by the New Milford and Washington chapters, which merged six years ago. The New Milford-Washington offices will be maintained as a branch of the

Medicare bill wins House approval

HARTFORD - A bill aimed at requiring doctors to accept Medicare reimbursement as full payment for treating low-income elderly patients has won easy approval in the House of Representatives.

The measure was approved 135-7 Monday and sent to the "This is an attempt to provide adequate, affordable health care to the elderly in their localities," said Rep. Stephen J. Duffy,

Rep. Adele L. Kusnitz, R-Monroe, opposed the bill, saying it was unfair to doctors. Currently, Medicare, the federal health insurance program for those over 65, pays 80 percent of what it deems a reasonable fee

for doctors' services. The patient pays the rest, plus an annual Under the bill, participation would be voluntary on the doctors part. But if fewer than 85 percent of them are participating by July 1988, the program would become mandatory.

House backs boost in minimum wage

HARTFORD - A bill boosting Connecticut's minimum wage from \$3.37 and hour to \$3.75 on Oct. 1 and to \$4.25 on Oct. 1, 1988, has been overwhelmingly approved by the House of Representatives.

"I think you're going to have less summer jobs for those kids," Rep. Linda Emmons, R-Branford said Monday night after the bill was approved.

But Rep. Joseph Adamo, D-West Haven, co-chairman of the Labor Committee, said raising the minimum wage was a way of "protecting the workers of our state."

Adamo said that if the bill becomes law, Connecticut, which now has the highest per-capita income in the nation, would also have the highest minimum wage in the nation. He said about 220,000 Connecticut workers now receive the minimum wage. The minimum wage was last boosted in 1981. If the minimum wage had been increased to reflect cost-of-living increases, it would now be \$4.36, he said. The bill, approved 109-30, now goes to the state Senate.

House passes anti-discrimination bill

HARTFORD - A bill banning discrimination against AIDS victims in housing, employment and other areas has been easily approved by the state House of Representatives.

"There is a great deal of fear and misinformation about AIDS," said Rep. Paul Gionfriddo, D-Middletown, co-chairman of the Public Health Committee. "This bill would protect from discrimination those who have AIDS or are perceived to have

The measure, passed 104-42 Monday and sent to the Senate, also outlaws discrimination against AIDS victims in places of public accommodation, such as stores and restaurants, and in areas such as extension of credit.

Rep. Edward C. Krawiecki Jr., R-Bristol, successfully amended the bill to allow those judging discrimination complaints to consider whether the AIDS sufferer allegedly wronged poses a threat to public health, safety or welfare.

Religion plays greater role

HARTFORD (AP) - Connecticut people say religion is important to them and say it is playing a larger and growing role, but they are not happy about that, according to a Hartford Courant Connecticut

About half of the 500 people polled believe religious leaders have the same responsibility as other citizens to speak out on public issues leaders should keep quiet.
However, about a third of those surveyed believe the influence of

religion on politics is growing and believe religious leaders should keep their views on important public issues to themselves.

"The public sees religion as playing a large and growing role and is not totally happy with this," poll director G. Donald Ferree Jr. said Monday.



Doc hints Ross knows no remorse

BRIDGEPORT (AP) — Michael B. Ross, charged with the murders of four teen-age girls, may be incapable of feeling guilty for crimes he committed, a psycholo-

"Mr. Ross is a man who has shown compassion to creatures who are weak, to creatures who are not a threat to him," said John A. Cegalis, a clinical psychologist from New Hampsire who was hired by the defense in Ross' trial. "But as far as feeling sorry ... I'm not really sure whether the man is capable of feeling sorry for any-

The trial was scheduled to resume today at Bridgeport Superior Court.

Cegalis testified last week that Ross suffers from a combination of four mental illnesses that compel him to act out aggressive, hostile, sexual fantasies against women. Cegalis, who has been on the stand for four days, testified that women were "victims to fulfill his

He said Ross told him: "Their mistake was to come along at the wrong time ... I got off (on) being Cegalis testfied that Ross said he

For most Americans, it means no dramatic change in how they file their returns. But there are enough differences between the old and new forms to affect every taxpayer to some extent. Even the simplest tax form, the single-page 1040EZ, had to be reworked to reflect increases in the standard deduction and personal exemptions and

a new requirement affecting mainly students with part-time There is some complication, for example, for taxpayers with losses from rental operations and for children under 14 with significant interest and dividends. And there is some simplification for perhaps 10 million couples and individuals who, because of the loss of some deductions, will find it unprofitable to continue itemizing.

Meaner flies, fatter roaches, bolder rats

A federal food inspector testifying before a Senate subcommittee last week revealed some unappetizing information: Inspections at the nation's beef and poultry processing plants are failing miserably at preventing dirty and contaminated products from reaching the tables of consumers.

The problem is so severe, the inspector told senators, that the government label on beef and poultry products should be changed from "USDA Inspected and Approved" to "Eat At

Your Own Risk." Inspector Vernie Gee told the Senate Governmental Affairs subcommittee Friday that part of the problem stems from poor training of new inspectors, corruption among department supervisors and harassment of conscientious inspectors. As a result of the mismanagement, more dirty or diseased products are reaching unsuspecting

consumers, he said. The state of affairs described by Gee is inexcusable. Unlike many problems the government faces, the troubles at beef and poultry processing plants would cost little to

As Gee told the Senate panel, the government must "inspect smarter." The solution he offered is simple: Inspections of beef and poultry for cosmetic defects such as bruises should be turned over to the processing plants, freeing some of the 7,000 federal inspectors to look for contamination by salmonella and other microorganisms that

cause disease. The government had better get moving on the problem because, as Gee warned senators, "... the flies have been getting meaner, the roaches fatter and the rats bolder." Conditions at some of the nation's

beef and poultry plants are appalling, he said. As it is now, microorganisms such as salmonella cause an estimated 4 million cases of food poisoning each year, and the number is growing, according to the National Academy of Sciences.

If the government is going to lull consumers into a false sense of security by stamping its seal of approval on beef and poultry, it has an obligation to make sure that it does a better

PHOENIX, Aris - "Good morning, Best Western," chirps the young woman in her cheeriest voice as she answers a telephone call from a traveler seeking lodging at one of the chain's 3,300 properties in almost 40 countries. In the same room, more than a dozen other reservation agents perform similar tasks, speaking with potential customers through telephone headsets and using computer terminals to check on the price and availability of motel

Scores of airlines, rental car companies and other lodging chains operate similar reservation centers, but the Best Western facility here is fferent: It is located inside the Arisona Center for Women, a state prison, and all of the agents are

Establishing businesses inside prison walls is hardly new. For decades, many states have relied upon prison industries to manufacture not only license plates but also furniture, highway signs and other products.

The federal government's prison industries

program, more than 50 years old and known as UNICOR, makes and sells in excess of 100 products, including sofas, chairs, aprons, bed eets, shoes and work gloves.

IN ALL OF those cases, however, the goods are sold to other government agencies. In most cases, transactions with non-government corporations or other institutions are prohibited by law. In mid-1981, however, Arizona launched an program, under the banner of ARCOR

(for Arizona Correctional) Enterprises, that encouraged private sector cooperation to develop marketable skills for its inmates.

"The enlightened prison program in Arisona" was praised by then-Chief Justice Warren Burger of the U.S. Supreme Court, who argued that "we need to transform America's prisons from warehouses into factories with fences around

Such initiatives, Burger and other proponents suggested, would enhance the inmates' dignity and self-esteem, help rehabilitate them and reduce the financial burden imposed upon taxpayers by the country's prison systems. No state was as fully committed to the concept as

Arizona, although Minnesota, Kansas and others experimented with joint business ventures with private firms. (In one of California's few programs, prisoners in Los Angeles serve as reservation agents for Trans World Airlines.) The ARCOR effort, however, has been plagued

by political, managerial and financial problems.

THE GOAL OF providing jobs for 20 percent of all inmates in Arizona's prisons has never been met. Growth has been unplanned and uncontrolled

Diesel tax collected but rarely paid

WASHINGTON — Crooked diesel-fuel retailers have pocketed billions of dollars in excise taxes hey should have given to Uncle Sam, according to deral officials' estimates. The money was

collected 15 cents per gallon, from truckers and others who use diesel fuel in their motor vehicles. Federal Highway Administration officials estimate that the filling-station tax cheaters keep 1500 million or more each year that should be turned over to the Internal Revenue Service. The oney would have gone into the Highway Trust Fund, which is the sole support of the federal

overnment's highway-paid program. The main reason for this gigantic rip-off is the huge number of diesel-fuel retailers in the country; according to Tony McMahon, the highway agency's chief counsel. There are upward of 109,600 service-station owners selling diesel fuel, and McMahon estimated that 40,000 of them don't pass along to the government the excise taxes they collect from their customers.

THE IRS DOESN'T have the staff to police 100,000 outlets for compliance and must rely instead on an honor system. An internal highway agency memo obtained by our reporter Karen Talley explains how easy it is for dishonorable diesel fuel sellers to keep the taxes they collect: "The primary source of information for the IRS oversight of compliance is the list of those who file-

and the IRS doesn't know he exists." Evasion is widespread because the incentives for cheating "are practically irresistible," the memo states, adding: "The payoff is large, the risk small, and your competitor is doing it." As one frustrated highway agency official said in disgust, retailers "would have to be crazy to file" when anonymity is so simple and the chances of

getting caught are so slim. The Highway Trust Fund received \$2.6 billion last year in diesel fuel taxes from law-abiding retailers. McMahon and Federal Highway Administrator Ray Barnhart believe the solution to the tax-evasion problem would be to shift accountability for turning in the excise tax from the 100,000-plus service station operators to the ideas and more efficient manage- 8,000 distributors who supply them.

> MOVING TAX collection "away from the fue pump and over to the distributor is logical and more practical," Barnhart said, and the IRS has not opposed this suggestion Barnhart emphasized that he does not fault the

IRS for failing to collect the diesel excise tax. "With upward of 100,000 businesses throughout the nation collecting diesel taxes from truckers and motorists," he said, "the IRS simply hasn't a fighting chance to collect the monles due." Anvestigations by both federal and state authorities have turned up some astounding examples of chicanery. One retailer, for example, had pocketed the federal excise tax on 20 million gallons of diesel fuel before he was caught. A common method of evasion is to claim that the diesel fuel is being sold for home heating. Some oil burners use diesel fuel, but home heating fuel is

"The impossibility of identifying the fuel with the purpose for which it is sold creates a potential for videspread bootlegging of what is alleged to be home heating fuel to truck stops, trucking companies and other retail stations, where it is sold or used as motor vehicle fuel," a highway agency

Another technique is to falsify invoices to claim the diesel fuel was sold to boat owners, farmers, industry uses and other tax-exempt customers, and to dummy distributors, the agency document

Dangerous seafood Pollution of the nation's waterways poses a

serious threat to seafood consumers, according to a recent congressional report. Rep. Walter Jones, D-N.C., called the findings "frightening," and told our reporter Karen Talley that his Marine and Fisheries Committee wants "to move in with legislation to further the protection of our coastlines and estuaries." Hearings are scheduled to begin next week

The risks of disease from contaminated seafood are growing, the report warned. It noted the first outbreak of cholera in 60 years in this country, as a result of shellfish harvested in southwestern Louisiana marshlands. The report also blamed contaminated shellfish for more than 100 outbreaks of viral gastroenteritis in New York City in 1982. Each outbreak made more than 1,000 people sick the report said.

Jones said corrective measures should include stricter sanitation laws and enforcement along the

'80s band, '60s tunes

Manchester musicians play Jimi Hendrix

Jon Weinbaum has been practicing more than two hours a day with his band since February for the band's first major concert at the Jimi Hendrix Festival on Friday in Northampton, Mass. He believes it will pay off.

The Manchester-based band, Three Stones From The Sun, is young, like its members. Lead guitarist Weinbaum, 18, Marco Ferraro, 17, and drummer Glen Raymond, 20, formed the band only a year ago. Band members admire the '60s blues guitarist

Jimi Hendrix. "He puts more into music than anyone I've ever

heard," said Weinbaum. "Of all major musicians, he is the most underrated for what he has done." Preparing for the festival has consumed most of

"I played in front of 200 people once, but this is the biggest thing so far," he said, sounding a bit overwhelmed. "But we're psyched." The festival was conceived by Nona Hatay, a Northampton photographer who photographed Hendrix at Madison Square Garden, New York

City, in 1969. Jon Weinbaum, and his brother, Dan, who serves as the group's manager, heard of the festival and contacted Hatay. After hearing Weinbaum's band on tape, she arranged to have the group perform at the festival.

Weinbaum and other group members say they want to perform the music of Jim! Hendrix because they believe his legacy should continue Weinbaum said he wants to bring the style of electric blues closer to the forefront of pop music today. Leading the renaissance of a generation of music is not an easy task, however.

Reaching people who believe in blues-oriented music is a major hurdle, he said. Today's rock is strong competition but Weinbaum perseveres. He said there's little imagination in today's music. "We want to achieve a feeling that people can get into," Weinbaum said. "We put our energies into the music instead of using

Not surprisingly, the band's '60s style provides a fresh sound to those whose rap-saturated ears have had enough of today's top-40 tunes. When the group performed at a party of "funk" devotees, he recalled, the party-goers danced to their music with as much enthusiasm as they had shown before the band started.


