

O'Nelli sticks with position on tax

NARTFORD — Gov. William A. O'Nelli says he will stick with the position he took on business taxes before the General Assembly adjourned without acting on the issue.

O'Nelli on Thursday reiterated his opposition to the so-called classification aspect, that of allowing towns to tax commercial property at a higher rate than residential property.

The governor also said he favored the other aspect that would exempt parent companies from the sales tax on services they provide to subsidiaries.

Some Democrats in the logislature had crafted a bill that included both proposals, but attempts to reach a compromise failed and it is likely O'Nelli will call lawmakers back to Hartford for a special session next month to resolve at least the sales tax exemption issue.

He said he would be willing, as he did before the session ended, to go along with some additional property tax relief for towns going through revaluation to help ease the burden on residential

property owners.
O'Neill's budget chief is to meet Monday with legislative leaders to discuss the issue and the need for a special session.

Psychiatrist says Ross is sexual sadist

BRIDGEPORT (AP) - Michael Ross, who could be put to death for the slayings of four girls, is a sexual sadist who is confused because he doesn't feel guilty about his crimes. according to a psychiatrist.
"Mr. Ross was distressed because feelings of

guilt and remorse did not well up when he would think about the rapes, but he wished they would." said Dr. Fred Berlin, director of Johns Hopkins University's sexual disorder clinic. "Instead he would become erotically aroused when thinking about rapes and murder." Berlin said on Thursday.

Berlin, who specializes in sexual deviant disorders, testified for the defense in the sixth day of the penalty phase of Ross' trial. The defense is trying to save Ross from the death penalty for his conviction June 5 on six counts of capital felony in the rape or kidnap murders of four eastern Connecticut girls.
Testimony is scheduled to resume at 10 a.m.

Ross is currently serving a 120-year prison term for the murders of two other Windham

County women.



Born and raised on Chicago's tough west side, Townsend grew up in a close-knit family and spent a lot of time running from street gangs and develop-ing "magic tricks" to hide his money from thieves.

He eventually worked with the Second City improvisation troupe and the Experimental Black Actors' Guild before landing his first screen role in 1974's "Cooley High." He moved to New York soon after and acted off Broadway and in commercials. But it was his

Townsend wants what every actor wants — a shot at playing a wide variety

of roles. "That's what acume and about I want to play a doctor, a lawyer, a judge or be in a film like 'Kramer vs. Kramer or 'On Golden Pond," he said. Although he thinks blacks should refuse to continue playing pimps and ghetto idiots, he would not deny any actor an opportunity to work.

Morgan Freeman's recent perfor-

mance as a pimp in "Street Smart" was cheered by critics. He has even been mentioned as a possible candidate for an Academy Award nomination. "The problem is balance. I'm not

going to put down someone that takes on that kind of role," Townsend said. "I look at a role as a challenge. I'd take the role of a pimp if it were a challenge. But I'd want to be a doctor after that, be a lawyer the next week." Yet, in Hollywood, if an actor is

successful in a certain role, he or she is Townsend illustrates Hollywood's biroted misconceptions in a scene involving a black acting school for TV ommercials in which whites teach blacks how to walk hip and talk jive. During auditions for "Jivetime Jimmie's Revenge." the actors read such

lines as: "I ain't be gotten no weapon"

talk like this," Townsend said in a clear baritone vastly different from Jivetime Jimmle's idiotic whine. Some of Townsend's humor in "Hollywood Shuffle" eludes his white audiences. Black audiences, for instance, find a detective sketch called "Death of a Breakdances to be hilarious. But whites don't quite understand how the gumshoe gets a thug and ballet dancer named Jheri Curl to confess to murder by stealing his bottle

"I am who I am. I talk the way I talk.

"I think it's a cross-cultural experience," Townsend said. "If whites don't get Jheri curl jokes, they can ask. When I first saw a Woody Allen movie, I heard a joke about a bar mitsvah and everyone laughed. I didn't know what a bar mitzvah was. "It becomes an education. I don't

think it's a crime to include jokes that some of the audience might not get."
What the audience does get in the film is a view of blacks not often seen in Hollywood: A man who loves his girlfriend and receives the heart-felt support of a relative is rare in films only when that man is black. Taylor pictures himself playing such

heroes as Superman or a character he calls "Rambro." But is the public ready for a black

"The public doesn't ask for things You give it to them," Townsend said. "The public didn't ask for Christopher Reeve. (Hollywood) gave Reeve to then and he caught on. That's why I'm going to make movies, be the superhero as save America.

Study shows reducing fats opens clogged blood vessels

WASHINGTON - A study showing that reducing blood fats opens up some clogged blood vessels offers hope that drugs and a low-fat diet can decrease the risk of heart ease in millions of people with high cholesterol, researchers say. A major study of heart bypass patients published today in the Journal of the American Medical ssociation contains the first definlowering drugs and low-fat diets can reverse blood vessel narrowing, the scientists said.

The two-year study by University of Southern California Medical School scientists found that in 162 bypass patients, 16.2 percent of ment showed regression in their restricted vessels, versus only 2.4 percent of control patients. In the treated group, total choles-

terol levels fell 26 percent and other blood fats called triglycerides were down 22 percent. Cholesterol is a waxy substance in the blood that, depending upon the fatty proteins attached to it, can contribute to So-called low-density lipoprotein holesterol, a major component of the fibrous plaques that clog blood vessels, decreased by 43 percent, researchers reported. High-density ipoprotein cholesterol, the "good holesterol that protects against heart disease, was up 37 percent.






