GROTON — The Navy's proposal to restrict portions of the Thames River may be in limbo for weeks as a result of public criticism, an Army Corps of Engineers spokeswoman said. The Navy has proposed restricting approximately 200 acres of

the Thames from use in fishing, anchoring boats and photography. The Navy says the zone would act as a buffer for the existing security zone adjacent to the Groton Submarine Base, and is needed to improve security at the base. Opponents of the proposal, who spoke up at a June 10 public hearing, complained that the restricted area would obstruct

marina development along the shore in Waterford and would limit recreation in the river. The Army Corp of Engineers is now evaluating public criticism and making a decision on the proposal, Army Corp spokeswoman Sue Douglas said earlier this week.



Some of those celebration committee people are worried about politicizing the patriotic observance. But politics, after all, is patriotic. The real concern is not politicization, but unipartisanship.

To get a good balance, the Democratic Town Committee should also recruit T-shirted volunteers of its own with the number of volunteers from each party proportionate to the number of Manchester voters enrolled in each

That way there would be enough workers to guarantee success this year and still have a pool of volunteer workers for the future.

Carter planned attack on Iran before election

WASHINGTON - A missing key has been found to a story that won't go away - a story that we wrote during the 1980 presidential campaign but that then-President Jimmy Carter swore never happened, a story nevertheless that won't give up the ghost. We reported, and Carter angrily denied, that he was planning a military attack on Iran as

an "October surprise" on the eve of the election.

The missing evidence has been uncovered by the distinguished journalist John Barron, a former intelligence officer specializing in Soviet affairs, who is now a senior editor for Reader's Digest. He revealed the evidence as part of his investigation of the John Walker spy case. After digging through exhaustive files and interviewing Walker at length Barron wrote a book about the Walker espionage

From Barron's book, "Breaking the Ring," and other sources now available, here are the bare bones of the Carter caper:

THE STORY BEGAN in April 1980, with the bollixed attempt to rescue American hostages from Iran. "Humiliated and seemingly impotent, the Carter administration laid plans to redeem itself in the eyes of the electorate by mounting a much larger attack upon Iran," relates Barron.

This has been confirmed by no less than Carter's national security adviser, Zbigniew Brzezinski. The day after the disaster in the desert, Brzezinski states, "I convened a meeting in my office, on the instruction of the president, to plan another rescue

Brzezinski argued not only for a rescue raid but for a larger, punitive military assault. "The actions that made the most sense to me." he recalls, "involved seizing Kharg Island, Iran's main oil-export facility, and imposing a naval blockade, possibly combined with air strikes.

Barron reports that "preparations proceeded in unprecedented secrecy." Yet the Soviets were fully aware of Carter's moves. Our National Security Agency intercepted some secret Soviet intelligence cables; it was clear from these intercepted messages that the Kremlin knew what was happening. They even had knowledge of the timing; some cables referred to the impending U.S. action in Iran as an "October coup."

HOW IN THE WORLD did the Kremlin know about Carter's super-secret preparations? Barron has learned the answer; he reports that the Walker spy ring delivered the Pentagon's secret codes to he Soviet Union. So in 1980, the Soviets were able to decipher the Pentagon's most secret messages. This provided them, in advance, with the details of Carter's October surprise

The National Security Agency had the ability, in turn, to intercept Soviet messages. With its high-speed computers, NSA could also crack most of their codes. So we reported on Sept. 22, 1980: "Heavily coded cables from Russia to its

Warsaw Pact allies have warned them to be prepared for a military confrontation in Iran in October. The KGB's 'best estimates,' according to the cables, was that the United States was getting ready for military action, and the Soviets would to edit letters in the interests of have to meet force with force." Barron reports that the Soviet Union rushed 22

full divisions to the Iranian border. He concludes tersely: "American reconnaissance detected the poised Soviet formations. With their discovery, a horrendous specter immediately became apparent:

"THE MOMENT the U.S. raiders land ... Soviet airborne troops quickly surround the Americans while Soviet armored divisions hurtle across the border. President Carter now must choose. He can let the vastly outnumbered American force surrender or be annihilated. Or he can resort to nuclear weapons and risk precipitating World War

"Prudently, Carter canceled the raid."

Turke vs. Syrians The plan we disclosed recently to divert fresh

water from Turkey to its parched southern neighbors by pipeline has already run into trouble with the fractious Syrians. Though they would be the first beneficiary of the ambitious pipeline scheme, the Syrians have been complaining to the Turks about the reduced flow of Euphrates River water crossing the border while Turkey fills up a -reservoir behind a new dam. The Turks' response. to the Syrian carping was to complain about the Armenian terrorists who get their training in Syrta and then go forth to murder Turkish diplomate; around the world.

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador — The unsolved 1980 assassination of Archbishop Oscar Romero has re-emerged as a political issue, with the church saying it has new evidence and the extreme right calling for a fresh investigation to clear its name. The suxiliary archbishop of San Salvador, Monsignor Gregorio Rosa Chavez, said this week the Roman Catholic Church has some new information about Romero's murder, for which no one has been brought to trial has been brought to trial.

Rosa Chavez declined to elaborate on the new evidence, saying, "For the moment it is confidential."

Romero was killed when a lone gunman fired a single shot into his heart while he was offering Mass on March 24, 1980, at a

West German film angers Swiss

GENEVA — The Swiss are up in arms over what they view as a broadside against their militia from neighboring West Germany Three years before neutral Switzerland is to vote on a proposa to disband the 650,000-man force, a West German TV film supporting the proposal has caused widespread popular protest and a government condemnation.
The film, "The Dream of the Slaughtering of the Holiest Cow,"

was broadcast early this month on a channel that can be viewed in most of Switzerland

It describes the anti-army "people's initiative" campaign, which collected 113,000 signatures on a petition given to the Swiss Federal Chancellory. Under the system of direct democracy in this nation of 614 million, that number of signatures is enough to force a national referendum. The proposal would replace all references to Swiss defense

needs in the federal constitution by the sentence "Switzerland has no army" and a clause prohibiting all military training.

Lawmakers have worked on the issue on and off for 21/4 years, spurred by the state's Sunset Law, which puts agencies through a periodic legislative review before they can continue in business. No one side of the debate could build enough support for a solution and lawmakers kept pushing back the deadline. But a operated retail liquor stores and the state Liquor Control Board must go out of business June 30 unless the Legislature acts.

Democrats aim at Reagan on budget

WASHINGTON — Democrats pressing for final congressional approval of a \$1 trillion federal budget for 1988 already are raining their fire on the spending plan's most formidable obstacle: President Reagan. By a 215-201 vote Tuesday, the Democratic-led House approved the budget, which includes \$19.3 billion in new taxes, along with

military spending cuts and domestic program increases - all opposed by the president.

The Senate was expected to follow suit today, although Democrats hold a slim 54-46 majority there and the tally was

predicted to be close. Reagan repeatedly has denigrated the Democratic package. Democratic leaders concede that if his opposition continues, they would be unlikely to find the two-thirds majority needed to override future vetoes. Many congressional Democrats hurled verbal brickbats at the

Arms sales paid for home security

Oliver L. North created bogus documents to cover up the potentially illegal gift of a \$14,000 security system for his home, a former CIA employee says.

North's effort, complete with the apparent defacing of typewriter keys to make the documents appear of typewriter keys to make the documents appear authentic, came just days after the cover was blown on the Iran-contra affair last November, with the documents backdated by as much as six months.

Glenn Robinette, the former CIA employee, testified Tuesday that North's effort was intended to make it appear that North's effort was intended to make it appear that North, rather than retired Maj. Gen. Richard V. Secord, was paying for the system.

In fact, Secord took at least part of the money for the system from proceeds from the Iran arms sales, which he managed on North's behalf.

The House and Senate committees investigating the

The House and Senate committees investigating the Iran-Contra affair were hearing today from former CIA counsel Stanley Sporkin, a close associate of the late CIA Director William J. Casey and the author of a presidential intelligence finding that authorized the arms-for-hostages deal with Iran.

Sporkin was to be followed to the witness table by Assistant Attorney General Charles Cooper, who participated in the early stages of the Justice Department investigation of the Iran affair.



BOSTON - Bookle Ellis Burks says he's having a lot of fun as the Boston Red Sox' center fielder. There's just one little disadvantage: it's costing him money for more long distance calls home to report on his continuing heroics.
"I'm calling my parents in Fort Worth at least twice a week now." Burks said with a laugh Tuesday night after his three-run, two-out homer keyed a six-run sixth inning that railled the Red Sox to a 9-5 victory over the Milwaukee

Burks homer, tying the score 5-5, was his 12th in 44 games since the Red Sox called him up after he spent less than one month in Triple-A ball. In 124 games at New Britain of the Class AA Eastern League in 1986, the lanky outfielder led his team with 14 homers, a career high in

four years in the minors. Installed as Boston's leadoff hitter because of his speed, the 6-foot-2 Burks also has 32 runs batted in. And, as a right-handed swinger with quick hands, he's not surprised by his "new" power.
