WASHINGTON — President Reagan, breaking a long silence, addresses the nation tonight with his "personal impressions" of the Iran-contra hearings that documented discord, deceit and possible illegal actions by top White

In his third major speech on the subject, Reagan will speak from the Oval Office at 8 p.m. EDT, talking for about 18 minutes. ABC, CBS and NBC will interrupt regular programming for it, and Cable News Network also will

carry it live. White House officials said Reagan's idress would include not only his views of the hearings on arms sales to Iran and the diversion of arms-sales profits to the Nicaraguan contra rebels, but also his agenda and priorities for the remaining 7 months of his presidency

Presidential spokesman Marlin Fitzwater said Reagan would not discuss the subject of pardons for two former aides — John Poindexter and Oliver North who have acknowledged being targets of

Administration officials, speaking privately, said Reagan would say he accepts responsibility for the affair and that it's time to move on. Poindexter, who resigned as the president's national security adviser, had testified he shielded Reagan from information and that "the buck stops here with me." After his speech, Reagan will fly Thursday to North Platte, Neb., to give a speech and then will continue California for vacation, dropping out of







Hot days turn shelter into a quiet place

Winter is months away, too distant to even think about. It is then that the the Samaritan Shelter runs at peak capacity, providing temporary beds for up to 40

In the summer, it is a different story. Only half its beds are occupied, and in a season where temperaturer often climb into the 90s and sweat is more common than mow, the shelter becomes a skeleton of what it is in the

According to Nancy Carr, director of the Manchester Area Conference of Churches, which runs the shelter, attendance drops considerably at the shelter for homeless people at 466 Main St. "Attendance is down now." she said. "It usually drops in the summer.

Last winter, the shelter averaged about 20 people a night, with a peak of 37 people during one heavy snowstorm, she said. As the weather grew warmer, though, attendance declined steadily. In April, the shelter averaged 12 people a night, while in May, an average of 15 people walked through the shelter's

THE NUMBERS DO not bother Carr. She is aware that the shelter is used primarily by people wanting to escape the cold. people who would rather be outside if

the weather cooperates.

"Some people find it real hard to be close to people,"
she said. "They only use us when it gets real cold outside. Once it gets warm, they bolt outside." During the summer, the faces of the people using the shelter also change. Carr said. In the winter, the place is occupied mainly by people who continuously do not have a place to stay; the summer brings in people who have been evicted, and are only temporarily out of a

"Landlords are more apt in the winter not to put somebody out," she said. "Not in the summer, when they know they won't freeze to death."

WHILE ATTENDANCE declines at the shelter. Shepherd's Place, MACC's soup kitchen, sees its attendance rise, said Skip Bowman, who oversees the kitchen at 11 Center St. Bowman oversaw the cooking of 1,385 meals in December, while in June the number prepared meals rose to 1,517.

The increase, he said, happens because transients are more likely to travel in the summer. He said in the summer he will prepare meals for people from East Hartford, Hartford, Glastonbury, and from states as far away as California and Alaska. "In the winter, they have trouble getting here," he said. "If it's bad outside, they don't want to come out."

BOWMAN HAS BEEN at Shepherd's Place for about two years, providing it with steady leadership. That is not true at the shelter. While 13 area churches provide 275 to 300 volunteers a year to work at the shelter, its

full-time staff is in disarray.

Shelter director Connie Scott recently handed in her resignation, and was replaced on a temporary basis by Pat Burt of Manchester. MACC also is looking for a director of its Project Re-Entry, which helps ex-prisoners readjust. It has

been without a director since the resignation in June of Johnson Omokeye, who worked only months.

Carr said she hopes to alleviate her staffing problems now while the workload is light. She knows the shelter staff will have its hands full once the

temperatures drop.
"We just keep right on going," she said.



Connecticut In Brief

Troopers can take private jobs

HARTFORD - State police officers may work as private security consultants but must take care not to use confidential information they obtained from their state jobs, the Connecticut Ethics Commission has conclude

"State police assignments ... (can be) fraught with opportunity to use state position, or confidential information acquired in it for the financial benefit of oneself or one's private security business," which would be prohibited under state law, the commission's opinion states.



FAA probes two more near-misses

A jetliner with 83 people aboard made a hard turn to avoid hitting a small plane, a single-engine plane came within a few feet of a corporate jet, and five tires blew out on a Concorde in a bumpy landing, officials said.

No one was injured in Tuesday's incidents, which occurred respectively in Los Angeles, Chicago and New York City. The two near-collisions were under investigation by the Federal Aviation Administration.

Five of the Concorde's 10 tires blew out as the supersonic jet touched down at New York's Kennedy Airport. The blowouts occurred on both sides of the plane.

At Los Angeles International Airport, an American Airlines Boeing 737 on landing approach made a "violent turn" to avoid an unidentified aircraft that came within 100 feet, said Dick Hallen, an FAA duty officer.

Over Chicago's Midway Airport, the pilot of the Learjet owned by a Green Bay, Wis., paper company "told the tower that he had to dive, he had to go down, quick down" to avoid hitting a Piper Cherokee, said FAA spokesman Mort Edelstein

SEOUL, South Korea - South Korea's automotive industry was crippled today as three manufacturers, including the giant Hyundai Motor Co., halted production in the face of escalating

In the first sign that the government was hardening its position on strikers, prosecutors today indicted three workers who organized a protest at an auto parts plant last week in which company property was destroyed.

Despite repeated government warnings against further unrest, new disputes broke out at at least 90 workplaces Tuesday and today, news reports said. Strikers are demanding higher wages, better bonuses and the

Voters rate women's chances

WASHINGTON - American voters are still more willing to accept women on the school board than they are in the White House, according to a study released today.

The survey of 1,500 registered voters indicated 57 percent

believed a woman president would do a better job or the same job as a man but 31 percent thought a woman would do a worse job in the White House. The remaining 12 percent were undecided. At the other end of the scale, 86 percent said a woman would do a better job or the same job on the school board as a man, and only 5 percent thought a woman would be worse.

Irene Natividad, chair of the National Women's Political Caucus, which sponsored the survey, said the attitude barriers will fall as more women run for higher office.

New York friendly to corruption

NEW YORK - A bribe-dangling undercover FBI agent's payoffs were accepted 105 times in 106 offers, a prosecutor said in announcing the arrests of 58 people, including 44 past and present officials in 15 upstate counties.

The sole refusal, U.S. Attorney Rudolph Giuliani said Tuesday came from an official who said the offer wasn't enough. That official, who was not identified, was being charged with accepting other bribes, Giuliani said.

"It is not an overstatement to say, compared to other states, New York is a much friendlier place to corrupt politicians, crooked businessmen and organized criminals," Giuliani said. The charges included conspiracy, mail fraud, perjury and bribe promotion. Involved in the investigation were 48 cities, towns and villages in 15 counties from suburban Westchester

Typhoon slams into Philippines

MANILA, Philippines - The strongest typhoon to hit the Philippines in three years slammed into the main island of Luzon today, lashing several provinces with heavy rain and winds up to 135 mph, officials said.

There were no immediate reports of damage or casualties. Relief officials in Manila said they expected the first reports to come in Thursday because of poor communications. Typhoon Betty is the most powerful to hit the country since Typhoon Ike, which leveled Surigao City on Mindanao Island and killed hundreds of people in 1984. It also had winds of up to about

WASHINGTON - A potentially significant safety problem exists at nuclear power plants involving electric motors that power safety-related equipment, the Nuclear Regulatory Commission says.

Steel brackets designed to secure wiring inside the motors were found to be broken at Pennsylvania's Peach Bottom plant in 1985 and at the Cooper plant in Nebraska last November, the NRC said in an information letter sent to utilities July 2. "This notice is provided to alert recipients to a potentiall significant safety problem that could result in the loss of safety-related equipment such as residual heat removal, core spray and high-pressure pumps...," the NRC letter said.

Junk cars, shop carts blight town

Junk cars make a big ugly blotch on the town's landscape; abandoned shopping carts dot the town with unpleasant blemishes.

A concerted effort will have to made to get rid of both if we are going to be spared an ungainly metallic vista.

Manchester and other towns have made efforts to cure the junk-car blight without notable success. The problem of removing junk cars is complicated by legal considerations. It's not easy to find out who abandoned a car on public land, and you can't assume the owner of private land property is responsible for leaving a junk on his own property.

Moreover, the town can't get rid of most junk cars without storing them for a period while it goes through the tedious business of trying to find the owner, who may not have the money to pay for disposal when he or she is located.

Ironically it is an environmental concern that has created the junk-car environmental blight. Getting rid of junks is much more expensive than it used to be because regulations require elaborate measures in disposing of the cars to protect the

A junk car, it seems, is a hazardous waste. The problem is not a simple one, and it seems clear that towns or some governmental agency will have to be given more authority to get rid of the junks more quickly. And it seems inevitable that more public money will have to be spent to solve it.

The pesky little shopping carts that end up in brooks or stuck between trees at the edges of wooded areas do not present any complicated legal problems or impose any ecomomic burdens

Some of the stores that own the carts make an attempt to reclaim them when they have been stolen, but even though the carts can cost up to \$80 each it does not pay the owners to send out safaris for errant carts. It might be helpful to make the penalty for

stealing carts stiffer.

Another course might be to encourage people who can do so to retrieve the carts when they see them and return them to their stores, or at least notify the stores about the location of the carts.

WASHINGTON — In a highly sensitive report seen by only a few U.S. leaders, the CIA three years ago identified five Japanese companies it spected of engaging in illegal sales of Western

Among the five was C. Itoh & Co., the giant trading firm that helped arrange the illegal sale by Toshiba of sophisticated propeller-manufacturing machinery to Moscow. This enabled Soviet submarines to run more quietly and thus be more difficult to detect. If the CIA's 1984 warning had brought a crackdown on C. Itoh, the sale of some of . the high-tech machinery might have been

The CIA report was produced by the Technology Transfer Committee, a special CIA bureau created ring the Reagan administration to monitor the legal and illegal flow of Western technology to the loviet bloc. The report on Japan was one of a series ocusing on various countries that sell to the Soviets. It is still classified "Secret/Noforn," meaning "no foreign dissemination," even to U.S.

We reviewed the secret report as part of a lengthy investigation in Tokyo and Washington by. Dale Van Atta and our associate Michael Binstein

"IN PRACTICE, some Japanese trading companies will resort to illegal practices and some will not," the CIA report observed. It then went on to identify five Japanese companies, large and small, that the CIA had reason to believe were making at least questionable - if not outright illegal - sales of high technology to Soviets.

In addition to C. Itoh, the Japanese companies named by the CIA were Mitsubishi, Mitsui. Marubeni and Tairiku. These and other Japanese firms have used a variety of stratagems to sell high-tech items to the Soviets without incurring the rutiny of the Japanese National Police. ording to the report. This is similar to what Toshiba tried to do, pinning all blame on an "independent" subsidiary. But Congress didn't buy this transparent effort to avoid responsibility, since Toshiba owned 51 percent of the subsidiary. Toshiba had to accept the blame, and both its chairman and president resigned as a result.

A surprising aspect of the Toshiba scandal is that C. Itoh has escaped with a slap on the wrist. The Japanese government banned C. Itoh from exporting machine tools to communist countries for - incredibly - three months.

Meanwhile, Japanese authorities plan to prosecute Toshiba, and the U.S. Congress has been irafting punitive measures against the company. The \$17 million transaction may eventually cost American taxpayers billions of dollars as the Pentagon tries to overcome the advantage the Soviets gained in evading U.S. undersea detection.

in an attempt to get a higher interest rate. You couldn't a few years ago when federal regulations set limits on the interest S&Ls and banks could pay on CDs and other deposits. But those federally man-dated interest caps have been removed and depository institutions can pay any rates they choose. S&Ls and banks normally pos the interest rates they will pay on deposits of various sizes and maturities. But that doesn't stop you from haggling for a better rate. You needn't have a so-called 'iumbo" \$100,000 CD in order to try

for higher than the posted rate. You can ask for a higher rate, no matter the size of your CD. Be forewarned, however, that the S&L might very well counter your request with a firm "no." If that happens, it will be up to you to decide if you want to renew the CD at that S&L's posted rate or take

your money elsewhere. You can shop around to learn what interest is available on CDs at other federally insured depository stitutions. A quick way to do that is by phoning a couple of big securities brokerage firms, most of which conduct "deposit broker age" business and offer CDs from ederally insured S&Ls and banks. You would be wise to obtain that information before bargaining with your S&L for a higher rate. If you find that brokers are offering federally insured CDs with interest rates, say, two percentage points higher than your S&L's posted rate.






