"They're probably helpful for an individual with particular problems. They're much less useful for people with more general problems," Penny said. The turnout for the sessions can be unpredictable Not one person showed up at the last comment sessi Penny conducted. But when Director Geoffrey Naab headed a session during the controversy over the proposed laser entertainment center, Naab didn't leave the Municipal Building until 9:30 p.m., an hour

after the sessions usually end. A woman at Thursday's session, who did not want to be identified, asked Penny about the proposed Laserquest entertainment center on East Middle Turnpike and about bonding for improvements around the proposed Mall at Buckland Hills. 

MCC's staff has 'wait-and-see' view on new president

Corwin's backers are still resentful

The hiring of Dr. Jonathan M. Daube as Manchester Community College president has brought a mixed reaction from college staff. Daube was hired last week to replace William E. Vincent as president of MCC. Some faculty members are disappointed that Dr. Luene H. Corwin, dean of academic affairs, was passed over for the post. Vincent left MCC in June to take the presidency of Bucks County Community College in Newton, Pa.

Corwin was away this week and unavailable for comment. Some staff members who are disappointed say Corwin wasn't hired because of her sex.

"I'm one of the persons who felt we should have had a woman president," said Mary Ann Blanchi, lirector of Women in Transition, an office that helps women returning to college. "She has done more for this college than anyone else since she came here. She's already a proven leader ' She said she had nothing against

Daube, but felt Corwin's sex was at "I'm sure they had reservations about having a woman as president," she said. "The good old-boy system keeps going on and on. I'll il you, some of the faculty is

Bianchi said she was impressed when she met MCC's new president during the Aug. 14 press conference announcing his hiring. Disclosures that Daube received two votes of no

confidence in October 1988 while president of Berkshire Community College have not changed her first "It's only hearsay," she said. "It

makes me nervous when someone has a vote of no confidence. But whether he'll be affective needs to be seen. I don't really know what to do but give him a try."

Daube received votes on no confidence last summer from fastaff after the suspensions of two professors accused of grade falsification. He stated last week he was only acting on the advice of lawyers from the state college board of regents. The charges were later

Other MCC officials said it was unfair to judge Daube before he had a chance to begin work at the college. Daube has stated that he will not begin work at MCC until

"People are kind of jumping the gun," said Judy Geis, head of media relations at MCC. "They're making an assessment on hearsay. I like to wait and see. I think he has a lot of charisma. I have a real positive feeling about him." Rory Q. Bruce, president of the student senate, said it's too early to tell how students will react to



"Condoning smoking would be tantamount to ignoring the law," School Superintendent Richard E. Packman said in his recommenda tion to the board Thursday

The board accepted Packman's recommendation and voted to ban smoking in Bolton schools effective

Oct. 1 for all students under the age The new law takes effect the same day as the Bolton ban.

Packman said Thursday that there will still be young people who are going to smoke in school.

"There will be some who want to test the situation," he said. He added that enforcement of the ban is necessary. "If we're going to make a decision like this, I think we

have to enforce it." A monthly "smokeout," in which students and educators were en-couraged to kick the habit, had been held at Bolton High School since the beginning of this year. The cam-paign was supposed to have lasted until January 1988, when school officials were to present an evaluation of the campaign to the board. The new ban replaces that policy. Under Packman's recomm tion, staff in all three schools would be allowed to smoke in designated areas only. This presents a problem to smokers in the elementary school, where there is no area for smokers. Elementary school staffers who wish to smoke will have the option of going to the Center School building to smoke or

Sales tax revenues look promising

m A}$ top state budget official says state sales tax revenues, which had shown a decline in recent months, were back on the increase, boosting optimism for the budget year that has

"The sales tax in June did better than we anticipated," Edward C. Balda, chief of economic and revenue forecasting in the governor's budget office, said Thursday, "There had been a weakening trend in April and May. Now, we feel much more confident about forecasting for 1987-88."

The 1987-88 budget year began July 1. Balda's office is also beginning to draw together figures for the 1988-89 budget, which the General Assembly will be voting on next spring.

Balda said the increase for June would likely mean a modest increase in the surplus estimate for 1986-87, estimated earlier this

month at \$347.4 million "It'll be nothing spectacular, probably a few million more."

Gas hearing attracts little attention

NEW HAVEN — A state hearing on a proposal to raise natural gas rates to consumers in the New Haven area attracted only two speakers and lasted just 15 minutes Thursday night. "I think it's ridiculous. The whole thing is a farce," one woman

said of the hearing after her husband testified before two commissioners of the Department of Public Utility Control. People don't attend because they don't feel they'll be listened to, said Chester Waselewski, who spoke for the Connecticut Citizen Action Group and the New Haven Senior Council.

The state also is looking for public land for the project - part of an effort to keep the prison population from exceeding legal

Earlier this month, the officials of Suffield and Newtown said they would contest a state decision to locate new lockups in their

Connecticut faces three federal lawsuits on overcrowding. If the population of men exceeds 6,455 and women 398 for 30 consecutive days, the state is required to begin releasing inmates

Thursday, the male population exceeded the statutory cap of 6,455 for the third day, reaching 6,479 inmates; the female population was 398.

Prague wants tougher DWI law

HARTFORD - Denouncing the state's pre-trial alcohol education program as ineffective, a legislator has proposed automatic suspension of drivers licenses for refusal to take or failure to pass police breath tests. "It's been proven that swift license suspension is one of the

biggest deterrents to drunk driving," Rep. Edith Prague, D-Columbia, said Thursday.

Backing the call for automatic 45-day suspensions, Steven Blackstone, coordinator for the National Transportation Safety Board, said 21 other states have adopted similar measures to make certain that peopoe arrested for drunken driving do not go on driving indefinitely

Blackstone said Connecticut's current laws only encourage guilty pleas by people facing drunken driving charges for the first time. A guilty plea makes such people eligible for the pre-trial alcohol education program. If accepted into the program, they do

Unlicensed workers off the job

BRIDGEPORT — More than 100 pipe fitters — nearly 20 percent of the total workforce at the Bridgeport garbage-toenergy plant — were ordered off their jobs because they weren't licensed to work in Connecticut.

Unspolled island for sale in sound

NEW HAVEN — A 435-acre island off eastern Long Island that is unoccupied except for caretaker and about 100 deer will soon be up for sale for \$16.5 million

New Haven businessman Mike Belfonti and August Lenhart of Stamford are under contract to purchee Robins Island from a German businessman for \$12 million, said Bill Norris, a Stamford real estate agent.

After the sale is completed in about four months, Belfonti and Lenhart plan to resell the island, located in Great Peconic Bay. Norris said among those who have expressed an interest in the island are developers who want to build million-dollar homes on it and corporations that want to establish a rest and recreation area

He said the president of a foreign nation, whom he refused to name, also has expressed an interest.

Whoever buys the island will have privacy because it is about a mile off the Eastern Long Island, N.Y., community of New Suffolk and the only way onto the island is by boat or helicopter.

East Lyme residents oppose mall

EAST LYME - More than 100 people crammed into a Town Hall meeting room Thursday to oppose a proposed \$100 million mall only to learn that plans for the mall had been dropped. Attorney Ronald F. Stevens, one of the developers of an 80-acre parcel off Interstate 95, told stunned residents at a Zoning Commission public hearing: "We've abandoned the mall concept. It won't work."

The major stumbling blocks to the mall were the large amount of traffic a mall would generate and a lack of good roads leading to the site, the developers said.

New Haven tries to recruit cops

NEW HAVEN - In a bid to solve a shortage of police officers, the city plans to raise the starting pay for patrol officers and shorten the time it takes to be admitted to the training academy,

New Haven locks out minorities

Twenty years after race riots, there's more understanding but little else

NEW HAVEN (AP) — There is a broader understanding of problems that led to race riots in the city 20 years ago, but blacks and other minorities continue to be locked out of

opportunities in business and government, a black community leader says. Experts agreed that disparities in salary. education and employment opportunities for the city's minorities were at the root of the riots that began Aug. 19. 1967, after a white restaurant

owner shot a Puerto Rican man Riots in other cities left 43 dead in Detroit, 26 dead in Newark. N.J., and thousands injured and arrested. More than 100 cities were hit with riots by September that year. "We know a little more about what it was we

were struggling for." former state Treasurer Henry Parker said Thursday in discussing the lessons of the past two decades. Parker, a New Haven resident, was a school teacher at the time of the riots. He went on to run for mayor, become the state's highest elected

A month later, federal investigators came to the city to determine the cause of the riots in a city where the federal government had spent millions of dollars trying to improve housing and sponsor anti-poverty programs under the Model City

President Lyndon Johnson later said the only solution to preventing future riots was "an attack upon the conditions that breed despair and

Today, New Haven is considered one of the nation's poorest cities. It has a high infant mortality rate compared to the national average, and unemployment is higher than the statewide average, according to state and federal figures. Don Ogilvie, a Yale undergraduate at the time of the riots, said Thursday he recalled being

First Selectman John E. Julian had considered blocking the rodeo after receiving telephone calls from 20 to 25 residents who were worried that it would attract an unruly crowd

Organizers of the rodeo have estimated that 4,000 to 8,000 people will attend the event. billed as a "two-day party" and charity benefit in a recent issue of Easyriders magazine, a national publication for

A Biker's Ball is scheduled for Saturday night in a clubhouse adjacent to the speedway, and afterwards those in attendance may camp on the grounds overnight. Two selectmen who are running for first selectman, Democrat Brian W. Prucker and Republican Bruce Ekenbarger, passed a motion Monday recommending that Julian withhold the town permit.

They cited state statutes calling for a permit for any gathering of more than 3,000 State law mandates that sponsors of a mass gathering meet standards that include providing adequate numbers of toilets, shower facilities, doctors and nurses and

supplies of drinking water. The speedway filed a letter with Julian outlining how it would meet the require-

ments, but Health Officer Edward Regan said in a letter to selectmen Monday that many of the requirements were not

However, Julian decided a town permit was not required because the state statute exempts events whose audiences number less than the arena seating capacity plus 250. The speedway seats 12,000

Speedway officials noted they never had been asked to apply for permits for weekly car races, which draw more than 3,000 pectators every weekend.

Further, the Planning and Zoning Com-mission decided last week that races and "related uses" are permitted at the speedway because it existed before zoning. But Prucker said he still believes the statute governing mass gatherings should apply to the rodeo

"I disagree with the legal theory that the town permit is not necessary. I disagree with Sellers said that he did not believe the public was against the rodeo. He said he received only one call from a resident

against the event, and many calls in favor of it after town officials threatened to block it. "We have some confusion because there are two sets of rules, but the borough has always issued the permits in the past." Sellers said. "The police chief has been talking ot our attorney today and they say

The Commerce Department said the gross national product the broadest measure of economic health, grew at about half the 4.4 percent rate turned in during the first three months of the

The new estimate of GNP growth was revised down from an initial report a month ago which put GNP growth at a 2.6 percent

The new report said inflation, as measured by a price index tied to the GNP, was rising at an annual rate of 4.3 percent in the spring quarter, unchanged from the estimate a month ago. The 4.3 percent rate of inflation was down slightly from a 4.5 percent increase in the first quarter. Inflation so far this year is rising much faster than the 2.7 percent increase in prices for all of

Nicaragua picks peace-plan monitors

MANAGUA, Nicaragua - The archbishop of Managua and other leading Sandinista critics have been nominated to a four-member national commission to ensure the government abides by a new Central American peace plan.

Nicaragua's Roman Catholic bishops, in a four-hour meeting Thursday, proposed three candidates: Cardinal Miguel Obando y Bravo, archbishop of Managua; Monsignor Bosco Vivas, auxiliary archbishop; and Monsignor Salvador Scheaffler, archbishop of Bluefields on the Atlantic coast.

Also Thursday, the 11 registered opposition political parties announced their three nominees. Considered among the strongest Sandinista opponents in the opposition parties, they are Virgilio Godoy, president of the Liberal Independent Party; Erick Ramirez, president of the Social Christian Party: and Manuel Matus of the Social Democrat Party.

Caucus urges Schroeder to run

PORTLAND, Ore. - Rep. Pat Schroeder, appearing before the National Women's Political Caucus, appears to have struck a nerve among women activists from both parties with her self-described "exploratory adventure" into male-dominated presidential politics.

"I would re-register Democrat to vote for her," said Mary Stanley, a lifelong California Republican. Stanley was among some 400 caucus members Thursday who urged the Colorado Democrat to make her candidacy official,

chanting "run, Pat, run." Schroeder, the feminist group's sentimental favorite, was to be followed today by Democratic presidential hopefuls Jesse Jackson and Sen. Albert Gore of Tennessee.

Networks bicker over Glass story

NEW YORK - The story of Charles Glass's escape from his Lebanese captors triggered bickering among the networks over ABC's exclusive first interview with Glass and CBS anchor Dan Rather's suggestion of doubt the former ABC News correspondent was really a hostage.

In his "CBS Evening News" broadcast Tuesday night, Rather described Glass as "a young American who says he was a "I actually jumped when I heard that and looked around the

room to see if anybody else heard," said Jeanee von Essen, CNN vice president of foreign news. "Several other people were staring at the monitor. They had the same reaction I did." ABC's Ted Koppel, who conducted the lengthy interview with Glass for ABC's "World News Tonight" and "Nightline," called Rather's remark "beneath contempt."

Glass said he escaped, though some officials thought his captors might have allowed him to go free. But no one had questioned that he was kidnapped, along with the son of the Lebanese defense minister, who was later released.

India races Pakistan to build nuke

WASHINGTON - India may develop nuclear weapons to counter a nuclear threat from Pakistan unless the United States and other superpowers can intervene to halt such an arms race on the Asian subcontinent, a study says. "It looks very bad for stopping the nuclear arms contest between those countries unless the nuclear supplier nations can

get together," said Gary Milhollin, a law professor at the University of Wisconsin Milhollin's analysis of the effect of U.S. restraints on the Indian nuclear program was published Thursday in the American Journal of International Law.

Sometime in the next decade, India could be ready to export a number of nuclear items such as plutonium, a key component of weapons, Milhollin says. India and Pakistan have been in three wars in the 40 years since



Unfortunately, the B-1's humongous price tag has been no guarantee against mechanical roblems: its critics have dubbed it the "Flying

Now we've learned of yet another problem with the problem-prone B-1: Its manufacturer, Rockwell International, has violated its own quality-control standards for vital electrical wiring on the controversial bomber

A Rockwell spokesman admitted that certain procedures "may have been omitted." In fact. Rockwell's own investigators found that senior maintenance mechanics at the company's B-1 assembly plant in Palmdale, Calif., regularly failed to conduct one of two tests designed to ensure the quality of electrical wiring for the bomber. According to Rockwell, the supposed lapses occurred between November 1983 and April 1984.

According to an earlier Rockwell "quality engineering report" the automated machines that crimp the B-1's wiring are supposed to be calibrated regularly by mechanics, using "go/no-go gauges." But Rockwell's mechanics apparently ignored instructions and didn't use the gauges during five-month period.

A senior Rockwell maintenance mechanic Robert Semans, discovered the lack of quality control on the B-1's wiring - which is critical to the nber's performance. On April 11, 1984, Semans submitted an employee suggestion that gauges be used to calibrate the automated machines. Incredibly, this reasonable suggestion was rejected a month later - after Rockwell said the lapses had ended. Semans then took his suggestion to the Air Force
