Penicillin-resistant gonorrhea sweeps Denver

By Robert Byrd The Associated Press ATLANTA — Penicillin-resistant gonorrhea, mushrooming in recent years and already widespread in New York, California and Florida, has now caused an outbreak in Denver, federal researchers say. The national Centers for Disease Control warned earlier this year that gonorrhea resistant to penicillin treatment rose 90 percent in the United States last year, with more than 10,000 cases reported in New York, Florida and Los Angeles.

"Although the incidence of (penicillin-resistant gonorrhea) has been concentrated in New York, California and Florida, outbreaks in other parts of the country are occurring frequently," the CDC said in its weekly report. Denver's 40 cases occurred in 39 people, one of whom apparently contracted the disease in Los Angeles. Thirty-two patients were interviewed and identified a total of 76 sexual partners. Forty-nine of those partners then were tested, and 14 of them also had signs of penicillin-resistant gonorrhea.

New implants can be adjusted after surgery

BOCA RATON, Fla. (AP) — After Regina Gordon's first pregnancy, her breasts shrank. After her second childbirth, she was nearly flat. "It was a bad trick nature played on me," Gordon pressed to round out "my figure," said Gordon, who decided modest breast-enhancement surgery would best suit her slender frame. But after the plastic surgeon changed her mind, as many women do, "With traditional fixed-size breast implants, she would have been stuck with the breasts she ordered the first time." But Gordon's plastic surgeon had used his newly patented adjustable

like any other implant. Its outer shell is silicone. When empty, it looks like a deflated balloon with a thin tail, which leads to a tiny ball. For use, the implant is folded up and inserted under breast tissue and chest muscles through a 1 1/2-inch incision beneath the breast. The tail, a feeder tube, runs from behind the implant around to the side of the breast so that the ball on its end is just below the skin. The ball is an injection dome. A syringe filled with saline is poked into the dome and squirts the saline through the tube into the implant. Saline can be added to or drawn out via the dome.

Sue Kendall, with the sales department at Holiday Inn of Saginaw, said that hotel has accommodated bus loads of polka guests, some from Canada. But while the tourist industry is happy, Mitas fest founder Harold Mitas is not. "I knew all along we would end up splitting the crowd," Mitas said. "And that is exactly what we have done. I knew it all along."
