

Libraries are given good marks

Manchester residents want an expanded book and video collecion, air conditioning and better parking for their town libraries, a survey released this week said.

The survey, which examined the quality of service provided at the Mary Cheney Library and Whiton Memorial Library, was mailed to 1,000 Manchester residents in March. Participants were randomly selected from town voterregistration list.

The results, though, are only the first half of a two-part survey, said John F. Jackson, the town's library director. People visiting the library also filled out the questionnaire, he said. Those results should be tabulated by mid-November, he



Autopsy shows reporter strangled

HARTFORD - An autopsy has determined that a newspaper reporter found dead in her apartment was strangled to death. Kara Laczynski, 24, a reporter for the Journal Inquirer, was

found Monday afternoon by a co-worker, police said. An autopsy was completed Tuesday. Laczynski, from Union, N.J., had worked for the Manchesterbased newspaper since March 2, Managing Editor Chris Powell aid. She covered the towns of Tolland and Stafford. Police said Laczynski was killed late Sunday or early Monday

Her body was discovered when the co-worker went to her apartment at lunchtime after Laczynski failed to report for work. Powell said. When the co-worker got no response, she got a maintenance man to assist her. They entered the apartment and Police had no new leads in the slaying, Sgt. Richard Brocki said

#### Full utility service being restored

HARTFORD - Telephone and electricity outages were significantly reduced in Connecticut, and officials said they expected full service to be restored to customers by today. Thousands of telephone and electricity customers had their services interrupted Sunday when a snowstorm left as much as a foot of snow in some areas. The heavy snow toppled trees onto utility lines.

William Seekamp, spokesman for Southern New England Telecommunications Corp. said about 1,200 customers remained without telephone service Tuesday afternoon, with most outages in the Danbury area. SNET had about 3,400 outages on Monday. Northeast Utilities spokesman Emmanuel Forde said about 320 electricity customers, mainly in the Danbury area, remained without power early this morning. NU had about 85,000 customers without power immediately after the storm.

#### Trial opens in ballot-fraud case

WATERBURY - A witness has given conflicting testimony on whether Anthony M. "Ace" Guzzardi illegally took an absentee ballot from his home in the days before the hotly contested May 1986 Democratic gubernatorial primary. The trial for Guzzardi, charged with two counts of illegal

possession of absentee ballots, began Tuesday in Superior Court before a six-member jury. Guzzardi, a free-lance writer, former sportswriter and former Democratic candidate for state representative, was working on behalf of a delegate slate supporting former U.S. Rep. Toby

# Why build new road to sewer plant?

There may be some good reason why there should be an access road from Love Lane to the town's sewage treatment plant, but it is not immediately apparent.

The Planning and Zoning Commission learned to its surprise Monday night that such a road has not only been planned, but that work on it got under way by mistake before a permit was issued for it. The miscue on getting needed permits for the road is, in itself, no big matter. The town stopped the contractor when the mistake was discovered. No permanent damage was done.

But the larger question remains: What is the point in having access to the plant from Love Lane? Few people have reason to go to the plant. While sewage disposal plants, euphemized now to "wastewater treatment plants," are not quite as unpleasant as most people suppose them to be, they don't exactly attract hordes of visitors.

One concern is second access and a quicker access for emergency vehicles. That seems to have some merit, but a rudimentary road for use only in emergencies would serve that

The argument that a new access road would prevent congestion at the town's sanitary landfill, which now provides access to the plant, is not very persuasive on its face.

Love Lane is a residential street that is heavily traveled because of its strategic location with respect to Interstate 84 and Manchester Community College, among other

An access road from there to the sewage plant simply does not seem like a good idea. The PZC was right to question the road plan and should not approve it unless town officials present more convincing evidence than has been made public so far.

## **Motorists** try to beat no-lead gas

~WASHINGTON (AP) - Studies by the Environmental Protection Agency appear to show as many motorists as ever - one in five are trying to beat the anti-pollution controls on their cars.

But an agency expert says the figures don't tell the whole story and he insists he's not discouraged 'If you study the data you'll see specialist Richard Kozlowski said after the agency released its annual tampering report Tuesday.

The agency's report covers 7,541 cars and light trucks that were between April and September 1986

· Twenty percent of the cars had their equipment tampered with, the same proportion as last year. The year before that, it was 22 · Of cars requiring unleaded fuel

About 65 areas have those programs, either analyzing tailpipe gases or visually making sure the equipment is in

A visual inspection could deter mine whether someone had removed the catalytic converter, for in the fill pipe that keeps out the large nozzles of leaded gasoline pumps had been removed. In areas where inspections are undertaken, results are often much

better, Kozlowski said. For instance, the highest misfuel ing rates were found in two of the four cities without an inspection Orlando, Fla., and Covington, Ky. "There are going to be more inspection areas and this wil reduce misfueling and tampering further." Kozlowski said.

Many areas are expected to have to adopt emissions inspections as part of their efforts to comply with federal clean air standards. Despite Kozlowski's optimism EPA Administrator Lee M. Tho mas said in a statement it was "troubling that tampering rates remain at an unacceptably high level" and hinder the agency's



#### Refugee boat overturns, killing 50

SANTO DOMINGO. Dominican Republic - A wooden boat filled with refugees capsized in shark-infested waters off the Dominican Republic, killing at least 50 and leaving scores missing, officials said. Rescue workers picked up 32 survivors, many suffering from

sun exposure and injuries, and took them to two hospitals. Eugenio Cabral, head of this Caribbean nation's civil defense, estimated that between 100 and 150 Dominicans were on the launch when it overturned Tuesday morning in rough seas off the northern coast of the Dominican Republic. The craft had been headed for Puerto Rico, where the passengers were apparently headed to seek jobs.

#### Falwell: PTL scandal a 'Watergate'

WASHINGTON - Calling the PTL sex-and-payoff scandal "a major Watergate," the Rev. Jerry Falwell says all television evangelists will find it more difficult to raise money until the over \$31,000 in back wages. public is assured that corruption is not rife in the ministry. The wages are retroactive to July

"The general public today is demanding accountability" in the wake of the scandal, Falwell told the House Ways and Means oversight subcommittee. "There is a donor paralysis this year toward TV ministries, and it won't go away in a year or two. Being a TV preacher after PTL is tough." Congress, too, is demanding accountability, although lawmak-

ers seem unsure how to get it. At a hearing before the subcommittee Tuesday, several members expressed fear that ministries other than PTL might have problems but stopped short of threatening any government action that might run afoul of the Constitution's religious guarantees.

#### New coup plot reported in Manila

MANILA, Philippines - President Corazon Aquino today ordered several radio stations closed, and the government said the president's cousin and opposition politicians were plotting a new coup attempt this month.

Presidential spokesman Teodoro Benigno said three or four stations would be closed, but refused to identify them. He said the order, effective immediately, was issued because the stations had been "openly defying the government of President Aquino by continuously transmitting the propaganda of right-wing rebel groups and other enemies of the state." A few hours after Benigno's report, Communications Secretary Reinero Reyes announced suspension of the broadcast license of DWBC, a small station that sold air time to rightists for political statements. A station employee, who spoke on condition

## Lawmaker raps book on AIDS

WASHINGTON (AP) - A New York congressman says Education Secretary William J. Bennett's new AIDS education handbook is too long on moral prescriptions and too short on the facts teen-agers need to know to avoid contracting the

"I have no problem sending message of morality," Rep. Ted Weiss, D.N.Y., said Tuesday, But 'to pretend that this problem really is being addressed by taking this dealing with the real world."

Weiss, who is chairman of the House Government Operations subcommittee on intergovernmental 'tremendous amount" of sexua activity among teen-agers, the Education Department booklet should have offered extensive information "about the use of condoms, about sanitary needles and so on. The Bennett booklet, in contrast

to U.S. Surgeon General C. Everett Koop's own report on AIDS, frowns on condoms and says that if teachers discuss them, they should point out condoms "can and do Bennett, said parents and

teachers should teach youngsters that sexual restraint is a virtue and "This is not moralizing: it is realism." Bennett told a news conference Tuesday while introducing the booklet. His 28-page booklet, "AIDS and

the Education of Our Children.' suggests that schools ordinarily can wait until sex education courses at the junior high level to teach youngsters the facts about AIDS and how it is spread. Koop has said frank instruction about AIDS should start in early

elementary school. And he has urged men who engage in any high-risk sexual activity to wear condoms from start to finish during intercourse. Without mentioning Koop by name, Bennett said, "People who

The studies follow findings reported in June at an international AIDS conference in Washington, D.C., that found that the herpes virus may act directly on the genes of the AIDS virus, which can lie dormant in the body for five years r longer, to trigger an active

The new reports were presented at the Interscience Conference on Antimicrobial Agents and Chemotherapy, a meeting devoted research on infectious diseases. Also at the meeting, researchers said that uncircumcised men face an increased risk of catching AIDS

from an infected woman. "There is a very strong association between lack of circumcision and susceptibility to AIDS infec tion," Dr. William Cameron of the Iniversity of Manitoba in Winnipeg said Tuesday.

That conclusion comes from study of 357 men in Nairobi, Kenya who visited clinics for treatment of sexually transmitted diseases, Cameron reported.

His colleagues included two authorities on AIDS in Africa: Francis Plummer of the University of

lairobi and Peter Piot of th Institute of Tropical Medicine i Antwerp, Belgium. Cameron also reported that dis-

eases such as syphilis, genital herpes and genital warts that cause ulcers, or open sores, on the genitals can increase a man's risk catching AIDS from sexua contact with an infected woman. Such ulcers can allow easie passage of the virus into a man's bloodstream, Cameron said.
