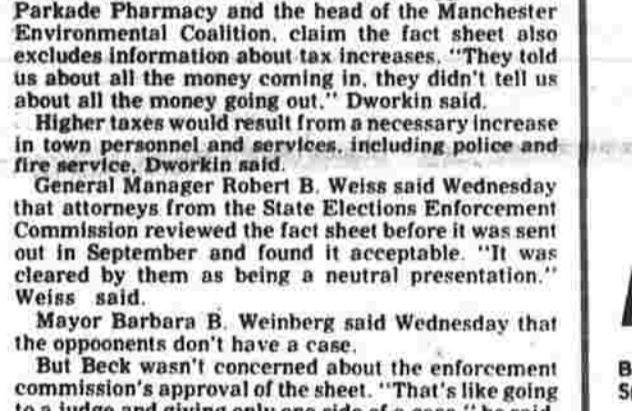

Store vs. manufacturer's coupons

DEAR MARTIN: A supermarket in my area runs newspaper advertisements with its own coupons for national brands. For instance, one of the store's recent coupons offered a can of Countrytime sugarfree drink mix for \$2.49, a savings of 50 cents.
At the bottom of the coupon were the words "Cannot be used with any other coupon for this product." Since the store's coupon does not get sent to the manufacturer, why would the store prohibit a shopper from also using a regular coupon for the same item?

DEAR ELIZABETH: National-brand manufacturers often give supermarkets special discounts, which the stores can pass along to their customers as advertised specials. When supermarkets pass along these discounts in the form of a second purchase, manufacturers aren't obligated to give consumers a second discount on the same purchase. That is the reason why the store placed the restriction on its advertised special for Countrytime.

You can usually tell when a supermarket's own coupon represents a discount offered by the national-brand manufacturer, because a notation will appear somewhere on the coupon. On the Countrytime coupon, at the upper left, was the designation "MFG-SABO)."
DEAR MARTIN: In order to receive a coupon worth \$2 on a meat or poultry purchase, I responded to an Adolph's offer and sent in a proof of purchase from a bottle of tenderizer. When I received the \$2

Market confidence crisis could last a long time

NEW YORK — When a pillar of U.S. economic might fractures like the stock market did, the shock can raise doubts among ordinary people about their financial security lasting months or even years, economists say.
To the millions of household providers who always thought of the stock market as a far-off but fundamental fact of life, mentioned briefly on the nightly news, the Wall Street massacre Monday evening brutally wrenched them into thinking about saving money, scrapping vacations and even stockpiling food.

Turmoil stalls big takeovers and triggers stock buybacks

NEW YORK — The financial market turmoil has wiped out immediate prospects for several multimillion-dollar mergers and has prompted some corporations to launch buybacks of their own suddenly cheaper stock.
Dart Group Corp. dropped its unweilded, \$6.62 billion offer to acquire Dayton Hudson Corp. on Tuesday and said it was taking a \$70 million after-tax loss on the sale of a chunk of its Dayton shares.
Dart, which also dropped plans to try to oust Dayton's board, made its decision in light of "chaotic market conditions" that have made it tougher to raise financing for such deals, said a source close to Dart who spoke on condition of anonymity.

Trans World Airlines Corp., object of a \$1.2 billion buyout proposal by its chairman, Carl C. Icahn, announced this plan had been withdrawn because the stock and bond market gyrations prompted a reassessment.
Also Tuesday, United Artists Communications Inc. and United Cable Television Corp. said they had indefinitely suspended negotiations toward a \$2 billion merger they had announced a few days ago. Gene Schneider, chairman of Denver-based United Cable, blamed the move on market conditions and unresolved terms of the agreement.
The sharp drops in the prices of stocks of the target companies have complicated many deals. At the same time, volatile movements in the bond markets have boosted the cost of financing the deals, espe-

"This is the kind of economic news that frightens people," said Sandra Shaber, a consumer economist at the Futures Group, a Wall Street forecasting firm in Washington.
"Whenever such a shock happens, consumers get worried about the future of the economy, their own companies and jobs, and sometimes tighten their belts," she said.
"Even if you don't have any stocks, you look at your pension fund and see it's down 25 percent. Even though the stock market recovered a bit Tuesday from its staggering losses, apprehension

kind of drastic and abrupt drop the stock market took will affect consumer sentiment."
Particularly affected, Curtin said, may be spending on large items such as cars, homes and household durables, most of which involve the use of credit or bank loans.
"Essentially you put your future income up against these purchases," he said. "When people become concerned about the course of the economy, they're less willing to incur this new debt."
E. Scott Maynes, a consumer economics professor at Cornell University, defined consumer confidence as the perception of both

personal and general economic well-being.
"You don't have to own stock to be concerned about what happened in the stock market," he said. "The perception is how the economy is going, and people have very rough perceptions. If the stock market goes to pot, it may be that consumer confidence will go to hell and trigger a recession."
Stephen Brobeck, executive director of the Consumer Federation of America, the nation's largest consumer advocacy organization, said he thinks that most consumers see no direct relationship between the stock crash and their own welfare, but that their general apprehension will increase.
"I think the stock market plunge brought home to consumers the fact that as a country we're living beyond our means and that they, as well as the federal government and business, must take responsibility for solving the problem," Brobeck said.
Some said the crash of 1987, coupled with the dangerously high levels of consumer debt that already existed, could be the catalyst that compels people to stop buying on credit.
"You could have a retrenchment, especially because consumer finances aren't very solid anyway," Shaber said.

about stocks and the economy could persist for some time, economists said.
"Such anxiety could result in sharp cutbacks in consumer spending and lead to a stark new perception that the economy is vulnerable, the budget and trade deficits are uncontrollable and the government appears weak."
"There is a strong relationship between changes in consumer confidence and changes in the real economy," said Richard Curtin, an economist at the University of Michigan's Survey Research Center, which pioneered the concept of consumer confidence 40 years ago.
"There's no question that the

The companies by and large had planned the buyback proposals weeks and months earlier, but the market's plunge made conditions ripe for them to begin their programs, companies and analysts said.
"We regard our stock as a good investment, especially at these prices," said Glenn Jubilee, a spokeswoman for Pacific Telesis Group, the San Francisco-based telecommunications company. Pacific Telesis said it plans to buy back up to 2.3 percent of its 432.1 million outstanding common shares.
Wall Street, struggling to rebound from Monday's 5.8-point collapse in the Dow Jones industrial average, generally reacted favorably to the buyback announcements.
On the New York Stock Exchange, USX rose \$3.50 a share Tuesday to \$23.00. Clorox climbed \$8.50 to \$44 and Merrill Lynch increased \$1.75 to \$36. RJR Nabisco, on the other hand, fell \$2.50 to \$51.

In addition to seeking investment bargains, some buyers likely wanted to keep corporate raiders from scooping up their suddenly cheaper shares.
By acquiring a big chunk of its own stock, a company can help target its price to what it wants to be by creating demand for it, while placing more of its shares into friendly hands.
The stock price of USX, for example, depressed by troubles in the steel and oil industries and by a lengthy strike, attracted an investor takeover speculation and received a short-lived \$7.19 billion buyout proposal from Incan early this year.

Corporate giants such as Merrill Lynch & Co., USX Corp., RJR Nabisco Inc. and Clorox announced buybacks, while others such as General Motors Corp., Ford Motor Co. and Chrysler Corp. said they were stepping up purchases under existing buyback plans.
A wave of smaller companies, including United Artists Communications, also announced buybacks.
A stock buyback plan is regarded as a vote of confidence in a company's management, Citicorp said. Its board of directors authorized the buyback of up to 5 million shares, about 3.2 percent of its outstanding shares, as a sign of confidence in the current and future value of Citicorp stock.

Buybacks also can raise the value of remaining shares, because each share represents a bigger piece of the corporation's earnings and dividends.
"The only way that could happen would be if the people of this country ignored the economic signs, and if you had people begin putting off purchases of automobiles, refrigerators, things that kind, because they feared hard times, yes, that could bring a recession," he said.
"You're going to see the consumer backing off now," said David Wyss, chief financial economist for Data Resources Inc. in Lexington, Mass. "The guy who thought he was going to buy a new car this week is going to put that off."

Jerry Jasinski, chief economist of the National Association of Manufacturers, put the chances for a recession in the first half of 1988 at 30 percent, but said, "The recession probability is not as likely as the slowdown."
One bright spot amid the stock plunges has been the decline in interest rates.
"If interest rates come down and hold at ranges that make some sense to the underlying economic fundamentals, that ought to be reassuring to Mr. and Mrs. America," said James W. Christian, chief economist of the U.S. League of Savings Institutions.
"We could see mortgage rates come down, not an enormous amount, but still more moderate than recent very high levels," he said.

John Tuccillo, chief economist of the National Association of Realtors, says perhaps a short-term revitalization of the housing market caused by the decline in interest rates.
In the next month or two there will be an interest rate window for housing, then rates will go back to their trend, which is up," he said.
Although a dampening of consumer spending leads to a slow economy, it can have other beneficial results if not too extreme.
"Even people who don't own stocks are going to be more leary of spending and buying, but they won't necessarily be a bad thing," said Paul Getman, senior financial economist for Wharton Economics, a Philadelphia forecasting firm.

Bridal headpieces a sideline to starting antique business

If you're looking for a sterling silver hat pin, take a walk down Bissell Street.
At 28 Bissell St., next to the Bissell Candy Co., you'll find the silver hat pin and more than 40 other hat pins at the Metal Kettle Antiques store, which opened Oct. 1. The store has no set hours, and will be closed Oct. 27 through Nov. 4 when Lynch goes on a buying trip to Europe.
"Hat pins are very collectible," said store owner Kimberly Lynch, a former Manchester resident who now lives in Tolland. She began moving into the store, formerly Antons Accessories, Sept. 1. In addition to selling antiques, Lynch plans to design bridal headpieces, which she'll make with antique laces, fabrics and other materials, like the 1860s pearl collar she plans to make into a

tiara. Though most of her headpieces will be sold wholesale to bridal shops, Lynch will also design custom-made pieces.
"Customers love it. They get exactly what they want," said Lynch, who began making antique headpieces this spring.
Lynch said she'll work on the headpieces behind the counter, in between antique customers. Her antiques, which take up most of the 400 square-foot store, will be her primary source of income. "I don't expect to do a large bridal business on a side street," she said.
Among her most unusual possessions is a matchbox cup made in the late 1800s that was "A present from Manchester," printed on it. Though she's not exactly sure how old the cup is, Lynch said the "made in Germany" on the bottom indicates that it was made before World War II, before Germany was divided. Lynch got involved in the antique business in my blood."

Gyrations of stock market have economic ripple effect

WASHINGTON — Any action in economics, like physics, usually has its equal and opposite reaction. Stock market developments are no exception.
Although economists saw plenty to fear from Monday's 508-point plunge of the Dow Jones average of 30 industrial stocks, they also pointed to the possibility of a few positive results.
The gyrating stock market, which on Tuesday recovered 102 points of the loss, is likely to dampen consumer spending almost immediately, analysts said.
But that could lead to a couple of favorable reactions, including a badly needed increase in personal saving and a narrowing of the trade deficit.
Also, as investors abandoned stocks, they turned to bonds, pushing prices up and interest rates down, in some cases by almost a full point. In the short term, that could breathe some life into the ailing housing industry.
The slightly rose-tinted scenario offered, economists hasten to add, is predicated on the stock market continuing to resist another precipitous fall and on Washington policy-makers tackling some of the

underlying factors fueling Wall Street's fear, namely the budget and trade deficits.
"Certainly there are risks of a recession, but there are other ways that things could turn out much more favorably," said Sandra Shaber, an economist with the Futures Group, a Washington consulting firm.
"We need to see serious attempts to address the budget and trade deficit issues in the United States, or at least steps that are perceived that way by foreign decision-makers," she said.
The most immediate danger to the economy, she said, is the threat to consumer spending, which was expected to be soft the rest of this year even before the stock panic.
Because consumer spending accounts for two-thirds of the gross national product, a blow by the stock market to consumer confidence would mean slower growth at best and a recession at worst. Lower spending can lead to a drop in manufacturing activity and ultimately to higher unemployment.
Reporters asked President Reagan about the possibility of a recession Tuesday as he left the White House to visit his wife, Nancy, who is hospitalized after surgery for breast cancer.

Dollar mixed; gold up

LONDON (AP) — The U.S. dollar turned in mixed performance in Europe early today as stock markets showed signs of recovery. Gold bullion edged up in Europe after falling in Hong Kong.

Currency traders said the dollar appeared to have returned to a stable region following Wall Street's rise on Tuesday and similar rises in Tokyo and London today.
They said the dollar also was being helped by news that U.S. Treasury Secretary James A. Baker III and West German Finance Minister Gerhard Stoltenberg had agreed to continue cooperation to stabilize exchange rates.
