Kennedy to the Supreme Court as he bid for the third time t fill a high court vacancy and end a Reagan praised Kennedy as a "tough judge who respects the law" as he made the appointment in a nationally televised appearance in





Michael Chernovitz, the warden, was reacting to a published report earlier this week that said 11 men have died at the prison over the last 10 years, including four in the past 21 months.

"It is an appropriate time to begin providing women who served during Vietnam the long-overdue recognition they deserve," Rep. Sam Gejdenson, D-Conn., said Ruesday on the eve of Veterans Plans to add a woman's statue to

Today, Americans will pause to give thought to the contribution made by military veterans to preservation of this nation and the values it embraces.

The observance this year of Veterans Day takes on added significance in light of the 200th anniversary of the Constitution.

In proclaiming today Veterans Day. President Reagan observes that "Our fundamental charter lives on because through the years countless brave Americans have gladly willed to 'provide for the common defence.' That is why, this Nov. 11 and always, we let veterans know that their service is not forgotten, that their sacrifices are appreciated, and that America salutes its defenders.

Restore party lever? Forget it, Julie

Legislative leaders at the State Capitol Democrats and Republicans alike, have this simple message for Julie Tashjian if she expects their help in putting the party lever back on Connecticut's voting machines:

Forget it, Julie. "The people have spoken," says John Larson of East Hartford, president pro tem of the State Senate, about a 1986 referendum which stripped the machines of the lever but which led to none of the chaos which Democrats almost hoped would result in last week's local elections from loss of their old tool of the political trade.

"No need for it now," says House Speaker Irving Stolberg of New Haven when he is asked about going along with a move to restore the lever. "It should have at least a couple statewide tests first.

Stolberg adds, referring to the lever-less machine. But as secretary of the state, Tashjian is its chief election official. "I thought our job was to make voting as easy as possible," she said in announcing she will include a bill in her package for the Legislature in February which would set up a new referendum in November on the lever question.

As a loyal Democrat, she'd love to see the lever restored - as an optional convenience, of course. Her ally in this traditional Democratic position is the state party chairman, John Droney of West Hartford, who sometimes meditates on the political angles in such matters.

If Democrats differ over the move to restore the lever, Republicans have no such problem. They've been trying for decades to pry it loose. Bring it back? "I don't see it happening," says Reggie Smith of New Hartford, GOP leader in the state Senate as he typifies his side's sigh of relief over its disappearance.

Voters demonstrated last week, as they have many times in the past, that they can play any tune

The goal is to design a fully integrated chemical laser weapon to be tested in space at the earliest possible moment.

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) - Astronomers say they have found the most direct evidence yet of a planet-like object that orbits a star other than the sun and may help prove that the universe will eventuilly collapse in a "Big Bang." The gaseous object, twice as ho s Venus and bigger than Jupiter, is believed to orbit the white dwar star Giclas 29-38, considered a nearby star at 270 trillion miles from Earth, said Ben Zuckerman of the University of California, Los

Angeles.
The object, with a diameter about 15 percent that of our sun, could be the first discovery of a brown dwarf, a hypothesized body that is midway between a planet and star. However, Zuckerman said he was being cautious because earlier false alarms. "It's very much the boy that

Moderate Baptists gain power

Four Southern Baptist state conventions have turned away leadership bids by fundamentalists, who have enjoyed nearly a decade of control of the nation's largest Protestant denomination Delegates in Georgia, North Carolina, Texas and Louisiana elected moderate or unaligned presidents Tuesday in what one moderate described as "a turning point day" in the 14.2-million member Southern Baptist

The most dramatic swing in the balance of power occurred i Georgia, where delegates meeting Savannah refused to re-elect at eligible president for the first time in 166 years.

They also passed several resolu tions restating support for Baptist-affiliated Mercer University, which had come under attack from fundamentalists since Playboy magazine depicted it as a part school. And the delegates abolished in editorial board appointed by undamentalists to oversee t state Baptist newspaper.

Those victories prompted the moderates to put up a last-minute andidate, the Rev. Jim Pitts o Valdosta, who was elected to lead Georgia's Southern Baptists over the Rev. Clark Hutchinson, pastor of Eastside Baptist Church in Marietta.

"The presidential vote in Georgia (a close 2,109 to 2,058) really masks what a monumental victory was," said Nancy Ammerman, professor at Emory University's Candler School of Theology Atlanta who has followed the figh between moderates and undamentalists.

Technological gap is narrowing

LONDON - The technological gap between Soviet and Western military forces is narrowing, and the West should be worried about a treaty to eliminate intermediate-range nuclear missiles from Europe, a research group said today.
