



Yarn Mill developer unprepared

When Brophy Ahern of West Haven emerged as the developer of the Yarn Mill in the Cheney Historic District, the firm got a warm welcome from the Cheney Historic District Commission. The company has a good reputation in historic renovation work. It came forward with a concept for conversion that fits in well with the rest of the district and with the original concept for use of the building.

But the developer has not received the universal support its executives would like. They have themselves to blame.

Unquestionably, the conversion is a difficult project because of the lack of adequate parking space on the site and because of site development problems.

The developer does not have enought on-site parking to satisfy regulations and has made an effort to solve that problem.

But Brophy Ahern has gone before the Planning and Zoning Commission without having resolved all the problems that must be resolved before the PZC, which has very specific responsibilities to discharge, can put its official stamp of approval on the conversion.

On Monday, the developer was before the PZC and asked that the group approve a style of window which has already won the support of the Cheney Historic District Commission. The PZC declined to do so and quite

The look of the window sashes may seem like a small matter, particularly when that look has already been endorsed by the historic But it is generally not a good practice for

the PZC to approve development piecemeal. By doing so, it can put itself in a prejudicial osition if it finds later it must reject the evelopment on some other ground.

Brophy Ahern should board up the spaces where windows have been taken out or broken and get all its ducks in line before it approaches the PZC again.

FBI spok-san Susan Schnitzer declined to comment on the defense allegations. "We will comment on it in a proper forum, which will be through our own filing." she said.

The Nicaraguan leader, addressing the General Assembly of the Organization of American States, pledged that his government will comply fully with the peace accord. Among the key provisions are an end to U.S. aid to the Contras and steps toward democracy in Nicaragua.

TAIPEI, TAIWAN - No journalist could possibly visit the Republic of China (Taiwan) today without wanting to write about it. But I owe it to my readers to warn them that I hardly represent that reportorial ideal, the wholly objective observer. For one thing, I am here at the invitation and expense of the government, to address the students of the School of Journalism of National Chengchi University, and to receive the government's 1987 International Communication Service Award, For another thing, and more to the point, I am a ongstanding friend of Free China, having visited this lovely island repeatedly over the past quarter

That said, let's begin by noting that major changes are under way simultaneously on both sides of the Straits of Formosa. In Beijing. Deng Xiaoping appears to have effected a transition to a younger generation of communist leaders cast in his mold - "pragmatists," who are determined to try to revivify Communist China by substituting large dollops of free-market economics for the failed nostrums of Karl Marx.

On Taiwan meanwhile, President Chiang Ching-kuo has displayed astonishing flexibility for an elderly and ailing leader. He needs no lessons from Deng Xiaoping on the merits of a free economy; Taiwan's is one of the freest in the world, and has prospered accordingly: Today this country has the highest foreign reserves per capita of any

Former FBI agent Jerry McKinney remembers an incident when having his .38-caliber Smith & Wesson handgun probably saved his life.

The Federal Bureau of Investigation was pursuing a fugitive who was involved in organized crime. Agents surprised him as he was meeting another member of the organization. "There was a shoot-out in the Bronx. The guy was hit, but it was

never determined whose bullet hit him," McKinney said. Although he didn't often use the gun, "if you needed it, you better have it." said McKinney, who is teaching a class on organized **Crime at Manchester Community**

In his 14 years with the FBI, McKinney, 46, performed what he describes as "every type of investigative function." For his last five years with the Bureau he specialized in investigating organized crime. After being away from the FBI

for 10 years, McKinney, now a private investigator, has taken nis first teaching assignment. He's doing this, he said, so students will understand the structure of organized crime, its history and the current picture.
