## After 104 years, she's a citizen

person that has been naturalized in the For Stevenson, who emigrated to Manches-ter from Ireland, the event marked the end of a 67-year wait.
"Well, I'm happy that I'm a citizen," she said in a soft Irish brogue. "I've always

The event yesterday was a welcome surprise for the centenarian, who had been told by immigration officials that they would not be able to send out a judge until after New Year's Day. Terri Glynn, deputy clerk in charge of immigration and naturalization in Hartford, had attributed the delay to a heavy

But as the luck of the Irish would have it, there was a break in a judge's schedule. familiar story of why it took so long for Stevenson to apply for citizenship. When Stevenson came to America in 1920.

she went with her husband, Harry, to the ship, Wicks said. Harry Stevenson proudly stated that he had fought for America in two world wars.

The clerk told him that it didn't matter that proudly. he had fought in the wars, meaning that one may apply for citizenship regardless of



### Permanent classrooms make sense

Both Bolton and Manchester seem to be moving toward the construction of permanent classrooms instead of temporary modular classrooms to meet the needs of a growing school population. Apparently, the increase in enrollment is

not illusory or temporary as Manchester School Superintendent James P. Kennedy once suspected, but real and probably permanent enough to warrant building added classrooms.

For Manchester, the increased cost of modulars is one key. Kennedy had been insisting, with some resistance from Board of Education members, that modular classrooms should be considered as one means of housing the expected increase in students. He has said he felt uncertain about whether the expected increase would be permanent or simply a temporary bulge in

But the Board of Education, convinced that expedience would be more costly in the long run, has decided unanimously to reopen Highland Park School as an elementary

Since then it the school administration has learned that the cost of modular classrooms would be about \$86,000 per unit, at least \$10,000 more than originally thought. Adding the cost of delivery and connecting the modules to schools would increase the price to more than \$136,000 a unit

As a result Kennedy has suggested that the Board of Education take a second look at the possibility of adding four to six rooms to the Martin School, which, like Highland Park School, is in the southwest section of town.

In Bolton, Board of Education members are in the process of trying to convince other town officials that a two-classroom addition should be built at the Bolton Elementary School to house an expected increase of 100 students in the next eight years. One of their arguments is that the addition

would be more cost effective than renting portable classrooms and that the added permanent classrooms would be useful even if enrollment levels off. It is interesting to note from Manchester's experience that when a town no longer needs a

### Many pilots lie about drinking

WASHINGTON - Pilots with chronic alcohol or drug problems who have lost their drivers' licenses can still climb into cockpit of an airliner full of passengers and take off. That is because the Federal Aviation Administration trusts the pilots to confess their drunken driving records. And a hefty share of those pilots with a record lie. An ongoing investigation by the Department of

looked for serious traffic violations in the driving records of the nation's 711,648 licensed pilots. The sample turned up 10,300 pilots who had lost their driving privileges in the past seven years for driving while intoxicated. Of those, 76 percent or 7 850 pilots lied about the convictions in their periodic medical reviews submitted to the FAA, in which they are required to report DWI convictions

Even if the pilots had told the truth, the FAA has no uniform policy for revoking flying licenses based on drunken offenses. And 10 states have no laws on the books that make it illegal to fly drunk The FAA is finally examining its "self-disclosure" policy after years of making

Our reporter Frank Byrt has been the inspector general's report and it lists several examples of airline pilots with serious DWI convictions. A Milwaukee man with seven DWI convictions died in the February 1986 crash of a cargo plane he was piloting. He had a blood alcohol level four times that which the FAA considers pilots impaired for flying. A local district attorney had complained to the FAA about the man's driving record, but the FAA took no action on his pilot's license. A pilot in Titusville, Fla., buzzed an airfield so

low that he took the top off a parked van. Witnesses said he was drinking before, during and after the flight. The man also had a prior drug arrest and the third-floor level. The FAA knew about the episodes and certified him in October 1985 to continue flying planes. The investigators found 262 first-class pilots with

at least one DWI conviction each. Thirty of them were working for major airlines. One had eight traffic convictions in six years, and his most recent DWI offense in 1986 cost him his driver's license for five years. Yet he is still licensed to fly. Among non-commercial pilots, the auditors found that 10.5 percent of toxicology tests on pilots who died in plane accidents turned up alcohol in

But the FAA continues to find reasons not to act. FAA officials say they don't have easy access to driving records; and that cumbersome regulations make it hard to revoke a pilot's license in less than

The inspector general's office has taken matters into its own hands, preparing a list of offenders gleaned from driving records. Sen. Frank Laautenberg, D-N.J., proposed legislation in October to allow the FAA access to the National Driver Register, a nationwide data bank that lists serious driving convictions.

The FAA reports that it will consider an objective standard for revoking a pilot's license and will look at the relation between drunken drivers and

Clerk vindicated

Marrillee Tompkins is a government supply clerk who likes to think of herself as a whistleblower. But Tompkins has learned it isn't easy to make a living when you do the right thing. She hasn't uncovered any huge government blunders, but she has found enough small ones to get herself fired - twice. In 1984 Tompkins' adherence to regulations got her fired from the Army and Air Force Exchange Service in Europe. This fall, she was fired from Womack Army Community Hospital in Fort Bragg, N.C., after she demanded an investigation into missing medical supplies. This time, Tompkins won. Her discharge was found to be "improper" and she was reinstated. The Army is investigating accounting procedures at the hospital.

### Former state congressman dead at 79

GREENWICH (AP) — Albert P. Morano, a Republican who repres-ented Connecticut's 4th Congres-sional District from 1951 to 1959, has Morano, a force in local Republi-

immigrants, Morano grew up in Greenwich. A biography of him prepared by an assistant while he was a congressman said that as a boy, Morano delivered milk before dawn for 50 cents a day and a quart of milk. He later worked as a pin boy in a





It is important to first determine the duration of the problem, if this has recently started. I would suspect that a bladder infection or nflammation may be the cause. A clinical examination and possible some laboratory work would be required to make a definite diagnosis. Most urinary bladder diseases respond well to treatment, how ever, they can develop into a very serious and life threatening prob em. Prompt veterinary attention is The cat should be observed to determine his water consumption.

If water or other fluid consumption

has increased, there may be a medical problem such as diabetes which is making the cat thirsty With an increased thirst there is more urine produced and the cat may not be able to retain his urine. Very frequently, a brake in litter training is observed when a new kitten or cat is brought into the house. Cats can get very finicky about using a litter container that another cat has used. One suggestion is to have a separate litter box for each cat in the house and make

If there is no medical reason for his accidents, the process or retraining a cat to use the litter pan can be tedious. The longer it is put more difficult it will be to correct

As a male cat reaches puberty his sense of territory becomes quite strong and he will begin to mark his territory with urine. If he is neutered before he starts his territorial marking," it is unlikely that he will ever begin this behavior. If, however, he is neutered after the "territorial marking"habit has begun. it can be a very difficult habit to correct. 





### 'Simon & Simon' back on air

LOS ANGELES — It's doubtful that any television series has had a more checkered career than CBS' "Simon & Simon." The show, starring Jameson Parker and Gerald McRaney as two San Diego private detectives, is back on the air after having been canceled once again.

1981-82, CBS didn't renew the show, then made an eleventh-hour decision to put it back on the air. It moved to Thursdays and became a Top 10 show the following season. that NBC put on Thursdays the next season. The ratings for "Simon & Simon" sagged. It was put

on hiatus at the end of last season and brought

Parker stars as A.J. Simon, the sophisticated. ollege-educated brother, and McRaney is Rick, a down-to-earth Vietnam veteran. Over the years, various cast members have come and gone. Last year, Tim Reid played a detective named Downtown Brown, but he has left to star n his own "Frank's Place."

"It's really set up as a two-man show," said executive producer John G. Stephens, who has been with the series since it first went on the air "People tune in to see these two guys. In the first couple of years we shot them almost exclusively two-shots. They worked so well together." Stephens calls "Simon & Simon" the "Rodney Dangerfield" of television because it "gets no

respect" despite good ratings. "It's an amusing, interesting show," he said. "We came on in a blaze of mediocrity."
What's the "Simon & Simon" appeal

viewers? Stephens answered, "These are real guys. They're not phonies. There are big-screen onalities and TV personalities. People want these guys in their living rooms. The television public can tell instantly if you're a real person and if they don't like you, you're out of there. The show, originally set in Florida, was first called "Pirates Key" when it was created by Philip DeGuere, who served as executive

liked the show but wanted some changes. It was moved to San Diego, and we made 12 shows. I think we were 42nd out of 43 shows. We stayed

"The next year they needed something after 'Magnum, P.I.' and they moved us to Thursday. We got great ratings. But they said it was a fluke and only ordered 12 shows. Our biggest break was a crossover show with 'Magnum.' We thought we'd be in the Top 20. We were first. It caused some ill will. We finished the year in the lop 10 just behind 'Magnum.' The next year we were ahead of 'Magnum.'

The series staved in the Top 10 until the fifth season, when it fell to 25th place.
