A \$15,000 grant that could help the town develop ar affordable housing strategy has received prelimi nary approval in the Legislature.

Meanwhile, Mayor Peter P. DiRosa Jr. Tuesda appointed a committee of directors that will help levelop such a strategy. The appointment drew DiRosa, citing the town's I percent vacancy rate for rental units, appointed Directors Mary Ann Handley, Theunis "Terry" Werkhoven and Kenneth Tedford to the subcommittee. He said he wanted







On Jan. 22. Daniel Foster visited his old Hunters Point neighborhood, stepping off a bus just after midnight into a crowd of men and women, many high on crack.

"They asked him if he was a cop," said police Inspector Earl Sanders, "He told them, 'No,' and kept walking. Then they asked him if he was from Sunnydale (turf of a rival gang), but when he said, 'No,' someone in the crowd said he was lying. Then they began to chase him. Police said someone fired a

pistol at least four times, hitting Foster once in the back. He died less than an hour later. On Jan. 29, police broke up a battle between two competing gangs in a Mission District housing project. There were 32 shots fired from weapons such as an M-16 rifle, 12-gauge shotgun



The easy answer is government regulation of the facilities that provide the care. But so far, Connecticut's effort to establish budgets for the operation of the state's hospitals has to be judged a failure.

The Connecticut Hospital Association has been so strident in its criticism of the state Commission on Hospitals and Health Care that one is tempted to discount it as the ordinary overstatement of a pressure group trying to protect the selfish interest of its

But Manchester area health service consumers who try to follow the process of rate setting for Manchester Memorial Hospital cannot help but come to the

conclusion that something is very wrong. Admittedly, the budget-setting process is not simple. It has to be complicated and it has to be refined as experience reveals flaws. But it does not seem possible even to set the

system in motion. The Commission on Hospitals and Health Care originally ordered the hospital to cut its inpatient costs by 45 percent. Like many other hospitals, Manchester appealed the order for reduction. In the process of negotiation, the commission reversed its position and allowed an annual 7.5 percent increase in inpatient revenue. Because the annualized increase will be in effect for only half a year, it is really an immediate increase of double that amount

No doubt it is an oversimplication to compare a decrease of 45 percent with an increase of 7.5 percent, or of 15 percent. But the great spread between the two figures leads to the conclusion that there is something basically wrong with the budgeting system. There must be a better way to regulate hospital budgets.



find out how people get bags under their eyes. I told him I didn't

DEAR READER: People usually get bags under their eyes during the aging process, as the skin becomes less elastic and sags. In addition, the accumulation of fluid, called edema, in the tissues around the eyes can cause bagginess. Bags under the eyes usually appear concomitantly with wrinkling. However, fatigue, fluid retention and disruption of blood flow from the head (as from certain tumors and inflammation) can produce swelling of the lower lids. Wealthiest pay more U.S. tax

WASHINGTON - The number of high-income Americans has risen sharply during the Reagan administration, and so has their share of the total federal tax

The 1 million or so couples and individuals whose incomes put them among the nation's wealthiest I percent of taxpayers paid 26.1 percent of all personal income taxes collected in 1986. the Treasury Department says. That share is up from 18.1 percent in 1981, when President Reagan

In its study issued Tuesday, the department did not say what income level would place taxpayers into that highest I percent. But it issued a parallel set of statistics showing that during the same period, the share borne by those making over \$100,000 rose

from 15.2 percent of the total to Meanwhile, the portion of taxes paid by those with incomes under \$50,000 - the majority of Americans - dropped from 66.8 percent in 1981, before enactment of across-the-board tax cuts, to 45.7 percent in 1986, the department

Those in between, making \$50,000 to \$100,000, paid the rest, with their share rising from 18 percent to 23.7 percent. The Treasury attributed part of the higher tax payments by the

I will be describing my job as a "private. stock analyst and consultant to family members and myself." I have no qualifiself-taught.

ANSWER: You can't take brokerage commissions as a tax deduction. The commission you pay when you buy stocks adds to your cost. The purchase price plus commission is your "basis" - cost for tax purposes. The commission you pay when you sell reduces your proceeds from the sale. The difference between the basis and the sales proceeds is your capital gain or

This rule applies to you, your brother-inlaw and all other investors. Doing what you outline, you'll run afoul of a federal government regulation of which you seem to be unaware. Anyone charging for investment advice. which you would be doing, is required to register with the Securities and Exchange mission as an investment adviser. That's no big deal. You simply fill out an application, pay the SEC \$150 and wait about a month for your application to be

Many states also require investmen advisers to register. Check that out at your QUESTION: On Dec. 24, 1986,

instructed a broker to sell some stock owned. The confirmation statement received listed the "trade date" as Dec. 4, 1986, and the "settlement date" as Jan 2. 1987. I elected to use the trade date and I reported the profit from the sale on my 1986 income tax return.

using the trade date and reporting the capital gain on my 1986 return - that I should have reported it on my 1987 return. I was under the impression that a 1982 tax ruling allowed one to choose either the trade date or the settlement date to report a profit from the sale of stock, through the year 1986. Am I right or wrong?

ANSWER: You are absolutely correct. You had that choice from 1982 through 1986 on profits in transactions taking place within the last five business days of a year. As a result, for those years, you could report your capital gain either on the ncome tax return filed for the year in which the trade date fell or on the return for the year of the settlement date - five business days later. But you were required to report losses for the year in which the trade date fell

That discombobulated situation was finlly squared away by the Tax Reform Act of 1986. One provision of that federal law says that all capital gains and losses must be reported on the return filed for the year in which the transaction took place —

Unfortunately for many investors, some brokerage firms' computers spewed out 1099-Bs showing year-end transactions as







"There is just no way you can function in a bustling metropolis without using subways, buses and elevators and going to places like crowded malls, concerts and movie theaters (where darkness adds another component of fear)," observes Robert Handly, Regional Governor of The Phobia Society of America and author of Beyond Fear (Rawson Associates). For this reason he labels claustrophobia a life-limiting. "urban" fear. Some psychologists believe that being confined arouses a

universal uneasiness which, like the fear of heights, may be part of a primitive survival instinct. previously felt no discomfort. During experiments, when animals are penned in small spaces. they frantically run about, apparently seeking an exit. An outright phobia about "tight spots" may result from some forgotten childhood experience that occurred before a youngster was mentally or emotionally developed enough to put it in the proper context. 

NEW YORK - Be thankful for the low spots and the dull narration in "Family Reunion — A Gospel Music Celebration.

Without the low points, the voltage from this musical blowout might leave viewers writhing on the floor. Television sets might explode and fires break out across the land. 




