### Covering for Crafts

## Support needed for housing

The chairman of Giastonbury's planning and zoning commission this week got to the heart of the problem of providing affordable housing in his town, or for that matter in any town. B.W. Erk III was one of more than 100 people who attended a forum called by the Glastonbury Town

Council to discuss ways to provide afforable housing. That meeting followed one last month in Manchester, where state Sen. Marie A. Herbst, D-Vernon, urged about 50 people to get behind the affordable housing effort in their communities.
At the Glastonbury meeting, speakers talked about such things as state-backed housing

programs and low-interest mortgage programs. But mechanics aside, Erk, like Herbst, saw public support for affordable housing as the key. "I would be thrilled to see a crowd like this at a town planning and zoning commission meeting supporting an application for affordable housing," he said.

The reasonable inference from his remarks is that when a majority of the people in any community actively support moves to provide housing that is within the reach of most buyers or renters, means will be found to provide that

That applies not only to Glastonbury and Manchester, but also to communities throughout the state, where it is estimated that 160,000 affordable housing units are needed. In Manchester, a subcommittee of the Board of Directors is already working to identify the scope of the affordable housing problem.

Members of that committee have already learned that the elderly, often on fixed incomes, are among those who may suffer if the affordable housing problem is not addressed. Young families and single persons also are finding it increasingly difficult to find affordable housing in Manchester, where the vacancy rate is I percent, far less than the 4 percent vacancy rate described by the Connecticut Business and Industry Association as

Affordable housing is normally the higher density housing that many suburbanites feel is undesirable. Like the town dump, it is regarded as a good thing so long as it is somewhere else. Before people who are comfortably established in a community can give active support to affordable housing, they will have to sacrifice

WASHINGTON - "Infrastructure" first became a fashionable buzzword more than 20 years ago. following the 1967 collapse of the Silver Bridge spanning the Ohio River between West Virginia

When a corroded suspension chain collapsed, 31 vehicles plunged into the river. In one of the worst bridge disasters in the nation's history, 46 people died and nine others were injured. Congress responded in 1971 by enacting a law that required states to inspect their bridges every two years or lose their eligibility for federal financial assistance for highway and bridge

construction. That didn't work. Governing magazine's May issue discloses that in three states - South Carolina, Missouri and Massachusetts - 20 percent or more of all bridges have not been nspected during the past two years.

In another seven states — Texas, Utah Oklahoma, Rhode Island, Hawaii, Michigan and Illinois — Department of Transportation statistics show that 10 to 20 percent of all bridges have not met the federally mandated inspection

Only Georgia and New Hampshire are in full compliance with the law, although in 14 of other states fewer than 1 percent of all bridges have not been inspected in a timely manner.

But prompt inspections don't ensure safety. According to the Center for Auto Safety, a public interest group. 19 states have no written lists of

criteria for their inspectors to check and 12 states maintain no lists of which bridges require

The subject again became a chic topic of conversation in Washington in 1981, when the Council of State Planning Agencies published a titled "America in Ruins: The Decaying Infrastructure."

Again, Congress responded, this time by enacting a 1982 law that increased the federal tax on gasoline by 5 cents per gallon and earmarked the proceeds for the repair of deteriorating roads, bridges and other public structures. That didn't work either. Of the country's 575,807

highway bridges, 131,562 are structurally deficient and 112,084 are functionally obsolete. More than 4,100 are closed because they are in danger of collapsing.

Now the subject is back in vogue again, for two reasons: The heavily used Williamsburg Bridge in New York has been ordered shut because of serious structural flaws and a new report — "Fragile Foundations" by the National Council on Public Works Improvement — has been published. "America's infrastructure is not in ruins," the council's report concludes — but it is "barely adequate to fulfill current requirements and sufficient to meet the demands of future

economic growth and development. One major deterrent to proper upkeep noted by the council: "Maintenance spending does not generate the excitement associated with new Indeed, highly publicized ceremonies often mark the opening of new bridges or additional sections of

highway — but no similar events are held in honor completed maintenance projects. The council notes that the problem of decaying infrastructure also extends to water supply facilities, local roads and intercity highways, airports and mass transit systems, and facilities for the disposal of solid, liquid and hazardous

Studies commissioned by the Congressional

Budget Office, the Joint Economic Committee of Congress and other organizations estimate that an investment of \$50 billion to \$60 billion will be required to properly rehabilitate the country's infrastructure by the end of this century. ## Yes, welfare really could be reformed

WASHINGTON - Welfare really will be reformed if Congress passes a bill like that which emerged from the House in December and the Senate Finance Committee last week. At present, the assumption is that a single

woman with children needs governmental support Why, when 70 percent of women with children aged 6-17 are working plus 54 percent of mothers with children under age 6? It is simply unfair that only 5 percent of welfare mothers are working. And work is a key path to dignity, self-respect and out of poverty.

What's been lacking is help for poor single nothers to make it - day care for the children, job training plus a requirement to go to work. Massachusetts helped 46,000 welfare mothers to a self-sufficient life, via the E.T. (Employment Training) program. California called it GAIN (Greater Avenues for Independence), and pioneered with a written contract between the recipient and welfare agency. Thus, there was a mutual obligation.

This is one core idea of welfare reform. The bills in the House and the Senate give the states funds to expand day care and skill upgrading to help welfare mothers. But they also authorize states to require mothers of children aged 3 or older to get job or training. And states may push the requirement down to mothers of children who are

cases), Washington will pay 90 percent of the \$600 cost for blood tests to prove/disprove it. 3. Child support payments would be reviewed to see if they meet state guidelines for adequacy. Few do, thanks to mindless leniency by judges. Result: average payments would increase from \$2,500 a year for two kids now. Judges will lose much current discretion in setting rates.

4. Payments will be reviewed every two years for adequacy - now a rare event. Criteria: Child needs and ability to pay.

5. Birth certificates of children must contain the Social Security numbers of both parents — making it easier to trace any absent parent. These changes are long overdue. In 1984, Congress passed a law to improve child support

enforcement. Its results are unimpressive. First, the basic numbers haven't changed. Of the 8.8 million children being brought up by single women, only 4.4 million have child support orders. And only 2.2 million got full payment, and 1.1 million, partial. True, the amount collected from absent parents

has increased from \$2.7 billion in 1985 to \$4 billion in 1987. But that is only 9 percent of what is paid in welfare. Child support collects 25 percent of public assistance in Indiana and Idaho - but only 5 percent in New York or Illinois. There are difference between the House-passed

bill and Moynihan's version - mainly in cost. The Moynihan bill will cost only \$3.1 billion over five years while the House bill would be \$7.1 billion because it provides more federal aid to states who increase benefit levels.

Some increases are warranted. Alabama gives only \$118 a month for a mother and two children to live on. The average state payment is only \$359 a month - or \$4,308 a year, half the poverty level of

But even if there were no increase in cash benefits, the bill deserves support for one more reason. Every state will be required to aid two-parent families where the breadwinner is unemployed. At present, the system is optional and only 26 states help intact families.

## Inherited disease causes concern

DEAR DR. GOTT: My wife and I recently lost our 26-year-old daughter who was, we thought, in excellent health. She did have pseudoxanthoma elasticum, which we thought was a skin disease. The medical examiner said the cause of death was producing arrythmia. Could we have prevented he passing? We also have an older daughter with "pseudo" and are very concerned about her and her

DEAR READER: Pseudoxanthoma elasticum (PXE) is a rare, inherited disorder of connective tissue, marked by a degeneration of elastic fibers in certain organs. The skin is primarily affected and shows exaggerated folds, inelasticity, grooving and laxity. However, the disease can also attack the retinas, causing blindness, and the walls of the

Nearly all patients show the vascular complications of PXE. This results in virtual collapse of arteries, as they weaken from loss of elastic fibers. emorrhages may occur; also angina and hype tension are common consequences

In view of the genetic basis of your daughter's disease, you and your husband were powerless to prevent her death. The prognosis of PXE depends on the severity and location of the arterial disease. At present, no treatment - other than supportive care - is available. I share your concern about your older daughter's future - and her child's. I think that you should ask for a conference with her doctor so that, perhaps, complications can be avoided and your family can be given a detailed explaination of

DEAR DR. GOTT: I have developed hoarseness and weakness of my voice that, oddly, improves the more I talk. Do you know what could cause this?

DEAR READER: Voice weakness that is due to disease of the vocal cords or the nerves supplying them usually becomes more pronounced as the voice is used. I do not know why you have the reverse pattern, unless your vocal cords are being gummed up by mucus, from allergies or irritation




