

**Thunderstorm** cuts power, creates 'lakes'

ferocious thunderstorm left its mark Manchester Thursday, causing a power loss to 4,000 omes, flooding, and disrupted telephone service.

The heavy rains, coupled with high winds, also wreaked havoc at some local farms. Fields of corn plants were knocked down and summer squash wisted and uprooted. Henry Botticello of Hillstown toad described his melon field as "in knots," with the vines knit together by the high winds.

More than 4,100 homes lost power in Manchester, which sustained the greatest number of power outages of any town in central Connecticut, said Jose Chavez, regional community relations manager for Northeast Utilities.

Most people lost their power at about 5 p.m. because of lightning, Chavez said. Most had their power restored between 9 and 10 p.m., he said. Loss of power was evenly distributed throughout town as 13 circuits were knocked out, Chavez said. There are about 23,000 customers in town. The National Weather Service issued a "severe weather watch" from 3 to 6:30 p.m., but the main storm hit Manchester at around 4: 30 p.m. The storm

downed tree limbs, caused streets and basements to lood, and caused the UA Theatre at the Manchester Parkade to shut down temporarily because water was entering its electrical box, said Jack Hughes, spokesman for the Town of Manchester Fire There were no fires caused by lightning, he said There were no fires reported in the Eighth

Utilities District, either, spokesman Thomas O'Marra said. The district fire department die pump water out of nine locations including th Whiton Memorial Library at 100 N. Main St., the Purdy Corp. at 586 Hilliard St. and Harpo's nightclub at 432 Oakland St., he said. The main district firehouse on Main Street los power and switched to generator power for 21/2

The storm knocked out 11 of 14 phone lines to the police department, said Gary Wood, police spokesman. The storm also caused computer problems for the police, he said "Three phone lines were coming in," Wood said.

"We got hit by lightning." Total phone service was restored at about 3 a.m., he said. Anderson Bros. service station, at 770 Main St. received six calls for towing cars stranded in water or mud, said Norman Sparrow, an employee. The worst, he said, was a car he described as "drowned" on Birch Street. Employees of Charlie's Service Station at 260

Tolland Turnpike spent the early evening jumpstarting automobiles that had stalled after driving through roadway "lakes," said dispatcher Debbi Not everyone was troubled by these temporary ponds, however. Carl Silver, assistant director of the town's Recreation Department, saw youngsters

enjoying a swim in the "lake" behind the Mahoney Recreation Center on Cedar Street. The water was several feet deep, he said, coming halfway up the outfield fence. The next threat of rain will come Sunday, but until then, sunny weather will prevail, the weather

service reported. Temperatures will reach into the 00s throughout Sunday. That was good news to Pat Hurst of East Street in Andover, who said farmers cannot cultivate their

fields because the mud is so deep. Taken together, the drought and storm have dealt a one-two punch to farmers, ensuring that this will be the worst season in recent years, said Botticello and Hurst. The Hursts have lost approximately 30 percent of their normal yield to drought and storms. she said. "No doubt about it, the weather is really conspiring against us," she said.





## Road study simple but frustrating

The study of traffic problems in the southwest section of Manchester, with its premininary suggestions for what appear to be relatively simple and mundane corrective measures, somehow produces a sense of

The study illustrates, as if any illustration were necessary, that the town has in many places a number of infrastructure problems that should be solved - problems that probably will not get the attention they deserve as soon as they deserve it because town officials, elected and appointed, are totally preoccupied with crisis matters. There are the recent dispute over the sewage plant and the age-old disputes between the town and the Eighth Utilities District, at the same time that there is pressure to provide sewer service for vast commercial expansion in the Buckland area.

The traffic study commands headlines now because it is new. The shelves and racks in the town's engineering and public works offices are no doubt loaded with similar studies. forgotten by the press and the public, that call for other corrective measures that would be within grasp if everyone were not wrapped up in sewerage problems.

There is probably no solution. The town government is in the same position that private industries and private individuals face regularly. The big problems that thrust themselves on you have to be handled before the smaller ones over which you feel you have

But that is little consolation to a citizen who would like to see some progress toward correcting the road intersection problem that bothers him the most or the recreation field he most wants to see improved.

In contrast, a half-dozen men on the ground can launch hundreds of Seek Spinners. On Air Force source close to the program told us

that Tacit Rainbow should not be abandoned altogether. He said the Seek Spinner program should be revived, too. If both were pursued, he added, "The enemy

## Safeguards for program

WASHINGTON (AP) - A Pentagon official tried to assure Congress of the safety of its chemical weapons program and a related biological weapons research effort as the United States disclosed for the first time where it produces chemical arms.

The Pentagon takes "stringent and necessary safety precautions" in its chemical weapons program, Thomas J. Welch, assistant secretary of defense for chemical weapons, said Thursday.

He told a Senate subcommittee that has raised questions about safety standards that the Pentagon "applies stringent safety, storage, maintenance, use and accounting requirements for all internal and contractor facilities that use chemical agents.

#### Less car tampering

WASHINGTON (AP) - Slightly fewer car owners tampered with pollution control devices on their vehicles last year than in the previous year, according to the Environmental Protection Agency. Annual EPA surveys released Thursday,

which covered 7,388 cars in 15 cities last year, turned up 19 percent that had showed evidence of tampering, 1 percentage point lower than the 20 percent reported in the 1986 results. Fewer motorists also used the wrong fuel

for their vehicles last year. Seven percent used leaded gasoline when they weren't supposed to in 1987 compared with a 9 percent misfueling rate in 1986. The surveys are designed to monitor the effectiveness of programs to check exhaust pollution levels and equipment tampering. A different group of cities is checked each year





WASHINGTON (AP) - Researchers have long known that the AIDS virus can kill the disease-fighting T-cells in the body, but research published today shows that the virus can also destroy the immune system simply by disrupting the inner mechanism of these cells. In a study published today in Science, a group of researchers said they have found that the AIDS virus is able to block a function of a key molecule in

T-cells and prevent the immune response from taking place. Robert J. Hartzman of the Naval Medical Research Institute in Bethesda, Md., said he and his co-researchers made the finding by comparing the re-sponse of T-cells that were infected with the AIDS virus with

T-cells that were uninfected. Normally, T-cells respond to an antigen by binding to it and then starting a process that leads to the production of antibodies. Part of this process is a signal by a molecule called the CD3 receptor which is on the outside of the T-cell. This signal crosses the cell wall and triggers production of calcium within the cell. This calcium then leads to the next

step in producing an antibody against the disease. Hartzman said the study showed that in T-cells infected with HIV-1, which is an AIDS virus, the ability of the CD3 receptor to release calcium is blocked or retarded. "This is a mechanism that can

disrupt the immune response," said Hartzman. "We knew that HIV can kill T-cells. Now this shows that it can also reduce the qualitative response of those The study was conducted using T-cells from healthy donors. Part of the cells were infected with

HIV and the rest were not. The

cells were cultured for 60 days and then exposed to a antibody that would mimic the early response to an antigen. In the uninfected cells, the CD3 took the normal next step by releasing calcium into the interior of the cell. The T-cells infected with HIV. however, did not release the calcium, which stopped the immune response
