



What's good for GM isn't good for us

Back in the '50s, before people thought much about air pollution and conservation of natural resources, "Engine Charlie" Wilson proclaimed that what's good for General Motors is good for the country.

Apparently Robert Stempel, the current GM president, still believes that. While scientists, business officials and industrial leaders all around the world are looking for ways to stop the degradation of the atmosphere by manmade pollutants, Stempel is concerned about something more down-to-earth: how to build bigger automobiles more cheaply.

In remarks prepared for the opening session of the Automotive News World Congress, Stempel tossed conservation to the winds by calling for the repeal of automobile fuel economy standards and the defeat of a Clean Air Bill that would tighten regulations on tailpipe emissions from cars.

Mileage standards (which the Japanese seem to have no trouble meeting) conserve petroleum so that our children might actually have some and, along with emission standards, reduce the amount of carbon dioxide being pumped into the air. Congress and the administration must recognize that rescuing the atmosphere is more important than resurrecting the American gas hog.

southeastern Angola there is a military camp called Jamba. It doesn't appear on any map of the region, partly because it is only a few years old and partly because its builders prefer to keep its exact location somewhat imprecise. It's a big place, with a total population that may reach five digits - the actual figure is likewise unavailable. The thatched-roof huts of the camp (which I visited in February last year) sprawl over a

number of square miles, and the facilities include a hospital, a machine shop, and a school for orphans. Almost every hut is decorated with cheap color reprints of a photograph of President Reagan sitting in the Oval Office with a burly black man in camouflage fatigues. Jamba is the headquarters of that man: Jonas Savimbi, leader of UNITA, the anti-Communist army that is battling the Communist puppet government of Angola.

Recently, apparently as a result of an agreement reached (but not announced) between President Reagan and Secretary Gorbachev at the Moscow summit, the governments of the United States. South Africa, Cuba and Angola - with a Soviet diplomat hovering nearby — have at least begun to make real progress on the interlocked questions of independence for Namibia (formerly South West Africa), which South Africa now occupies, and the withdrawal of upwards of 50,000 Cuban troops from Angola, which borders Namibia on the north.

South Africa, which has had troops of its own inside Angola, aiding Savimbi in his struggle

against the Communist government and its Cuban protectors, has declared a "de facto cessation of hostilities" there and commenced the withdrawal of its forces. It has also accepted Nov. 1 as the date of beginning the implementation of a plan for free elections in Namibia. supervised by the United Nations, in 1989.

For their part, to quote the joint statement of the parties, "Angola and Cuba reiterate their decision to subscribe to a bilateral accord which will include a timetable acceptable to all parties for the staged and total withdrawal of Cuban troops from Angola. The parties have undertaken to reach agreement on this timetable by Sept. 1, 1988."

What should serious anti-Communists think of these developments? Their most worrisome aspect is the fact that those "free" elections in Namibia will be held under the watchful eyes of the blue-helmeted troops of the U.N.

Land reform below border affects U.S.

WASHINGTON - Issues of unrest south of the order are bound to crop up time and again in this presidential campaign, George Bush, the entrepreneur, once did business with Mexican oilmen and feels a close affinity with that country o does Michael Dukakis, who uses his fluent Spanish to punctuate his interest in Hispanic

But Hispanic issues, particularly in the border states, go much deeper than promising Cabinet posts, speaking the language or courting Latin

The greatest threat to Mexican stability is also a threat to the border states. That threat is a revolt by the masses of underprivileged peasants in Mexico. At worst, the violence could spill over into the United States. At the very least, unrest among Monday through Friday, 9 to 5 the underclass in Mexico increases the flow of illegal aliens into this country.

That makes Mexican efforts at agrarian reform crucial to U.S. interests. If the Mexican government is not successful in redistributing the wealth of its land from large landowners to peasants, guerrilla forces in the rural areas will ise the resultant hard feelings to rally the unhappy

We have seen a classified Central Intelligence Agency report on the progress of Mexican agrarian reform that is surprisingly optimistic. CIA operatives in southern Mexico report that the reform policies, in spite of the corruption that pervades the Mexican bureaucracy, are doing a fair job of promoting stability and discouraging rural guerrilla activity.

The Mexican government has convinced the peasants, in most cases, that the bureaucracy is on

Critics of the agrarian reform program say it will never give the peasants a decent livelihood, and that breaking up the land into smaller ownerships will decrease the nation's agricultural output, and profits. But productivity and profits don't seem to be the point, according to the CIA. "We believe that the granting of inalienable land titles to peasants provides important psychological and political props for maintaining stability." the report says. 

Solidarity warns of more strikes

WARSAW, Poland (AP) - Solidarity leader Lech Walesa today said workers at the Lenin Shipyard in Gdansk will join striking coal miners and dockworkers unless the government legalizes the trade union, a spokesman said.

The union's national executive commission later called on its members to support the strikers, who have closed six mines in southwestern Poland and shut down docks and public transportation in Szczecin, according to a labor leader. "They (the strikers) are fighting for our common cause," said the commission statement, read by

Jacek Kuron, a senior union adviser in Warsaw "Experience teaches us that only wise social pressure can lead the authorities to the road of economic and social reconstruction." The strikes, which began Tuesday, are demandng Solidarity's legalization, higher pay and mproved working conditions.

Workers at a coal mine in the Silesia region today joined the strike. Solidarity spokesman Adam Kowalczyk said about 1,000 miners were occupying the 30th Anniversary of the People's Poland Mine Other strikers occupied mines in Andaluzja, Moszczenica, Morcinek and two plants near Walesa told a rally in Gdansk that shipyard

workers there are prepared to stop work Monday if the strikers' demands are not met, a union pokesman said. A strike by workers at the shipyard eight year

ago led to nationwide labor unrest that spawned Solidarity. The union existed legally for 15 months before being suppressed in a military crackdown in 1981 and outlawed the next year. The Gdansk shipyard workers also went on strike

in May in support of steel workers who had shut down operations at a huge steel mill near Krakow. Slawomir Majewski, a Solidarity activist in Gdansk, said by telephone from Gdansk that Walesa's call for a sympathy strike was met with applause from about 500 workers attending the rally. Majewski said they chanted, "There is no reedom without Solidarity!

Regional differences in wealth grow larger as coasts boom

WASHINGTON - Regional disparities in personal incomes widened last year as strong economic growth continued for coastal states while states in America's heartland did not fare as well, the government reports. The Commerce Department said Thursday that the current economic expansion is the first in 28 years in which regional differences in incomes have grown larger rather than

The department said all 10 of the states with the highest average personal incomes last year were on the nation's coasts: eight along the Atlantic and two, California and Alaska, on the Pacific. Connecticut ranked No. 1 with residents

earning \$21,266 for every man, woman and child last year, an increase of 8.8 percent over For the entire nation, incomes rose 6 percent to an average of \$15,481 last year, the

est showing since a similar 6 percent

increase in 1985. Incomes had risen 5.1

The gain last year kept Americans ahead of inflation, which climbed 4.4 percent. Seven of the 10 states with the lowest

incomes were in the South. Mississippi remained in last place with a per capita income of \$10,292, an increase of 6.5 percent over the previous year.

In contrast to most recovery periods, regional economic differences have widened since the 1981-82 recession, the report said. The Southwest and Rocky Mountain regions were farther behind the national income average in 1987 than they were in 1982. at the depths of the recession, while New England and the Mid-Atlantic regions were

farther shead

"This has been a somewhat unusual economic expansion," said Rudolph DePass, a Commerce Department analyst. "Regions like New England have benefited from rapid growth in high-tech industries and relatively slow increases in population, while the Southwest and Rocky Mountain states have been hit by a slump in the oil industry." New England was the top-earning region in 1982, with incomes 9 percent above the national average. It increased that lead last year with incomes 20 percent above the national average. The Mid-Atlantic region, which had incomes 10 percent above the national average in 1982, had incomes 14

higher in 1982. By contrast, the Southwest and Rocky

Mountain regions saw their incomes fall to 12 percent below the national average in 1987, compared with 4 percent or less in 1982. This drop put these two regions close to the Southeast, which still came in last with incomes 13 percent below the national average. The Southeast had been 14 percent

The Great Lakes region was unchanged, with incomes still 2 percent below the national

The new figures are likely to supply ammunition for Democratic charges that the Reagan economic program, while benefiting some sectors of the economy, have left other areas far behind.

The Democrats charge that the country has been turned into a "bicoastal economy" divided between healthy sections on both coasts and a problem-plagued heartland afflicted by hard times in agriculture, oil and declining smokestack industries.

New Jersey, with an average income of \$20,352, ranked second behind Connecticut. Massachusetts was No. 3, with an average percent higher last year. And the West had income of \$19,142, followed by Alaska, \$18,230, incomes 11 percent higher than the national and Maryland, \$18,124.



Chronic fatigue is serious CHICAGO (AP) - Chronic fatigue can be as

disabling as a heart attack, but it may stem more from depression and anxiety than from any physical cause, a new study indicates. In a report in today's Journal of the American Medical Association, Dr. Kurt Kroenke, assistant chief of medicine at Brooke Army Medical Center at Fort Sam Houston, Texas, said many doctors don't take chronic fatigue seriously enough.

Such fatigue, which he compared to lower back pain, can result in impairment in day-to-day activities resembling that in people recovering from a heart attack or suffering from other serious diseases.

"Fatigue tends to be underestimated many times in the physician's mind as a minor complaint," Kroenke said Thursday. "Fatigue is a symptom that doesn't affect the patients' lifespan, but it causes a lot of disability."

Kroenke and his colleagues said 24 percent of 1,159 adults who answered questionnaires at base clinics in 1986 identified fatigue as a major
