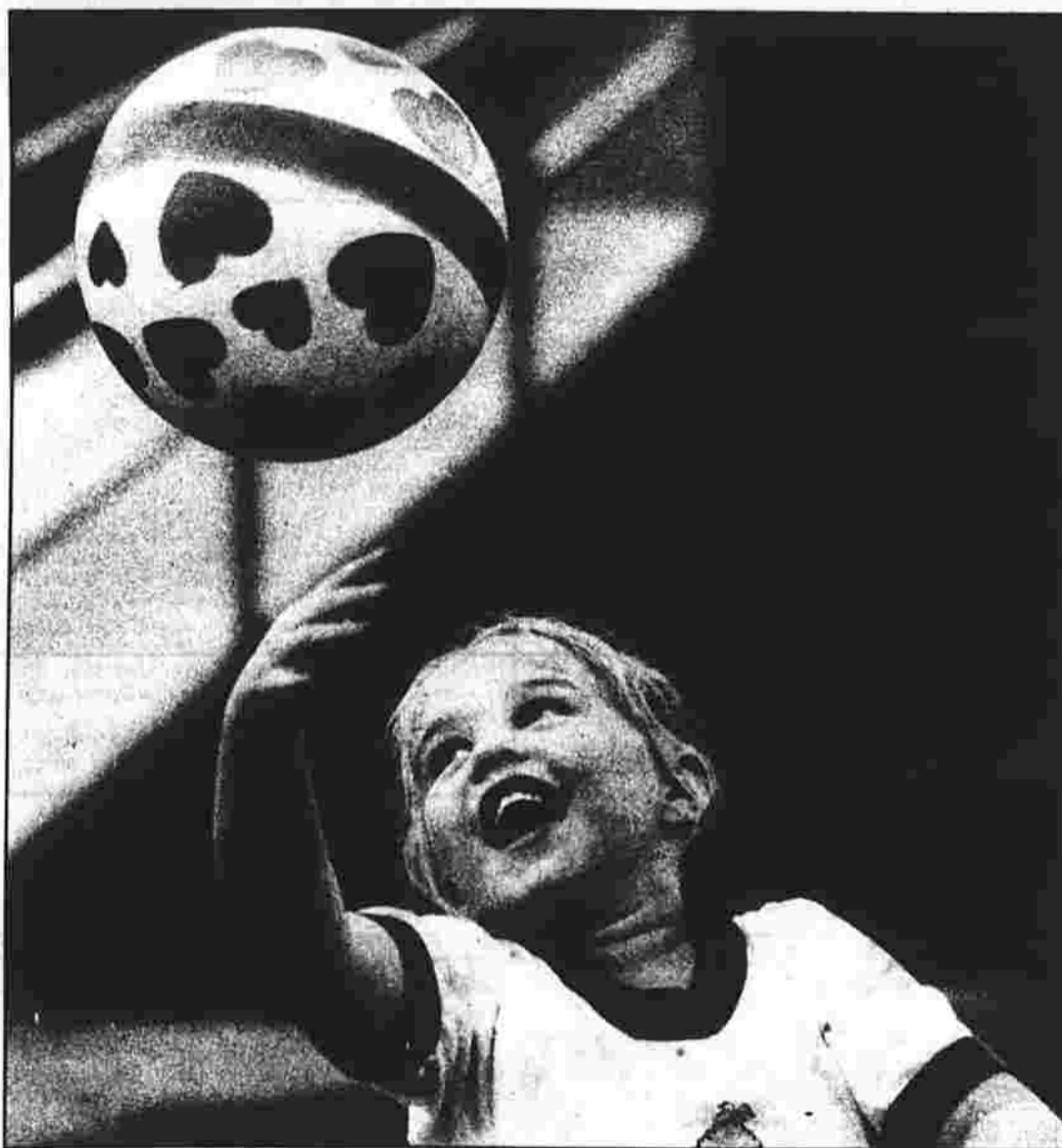

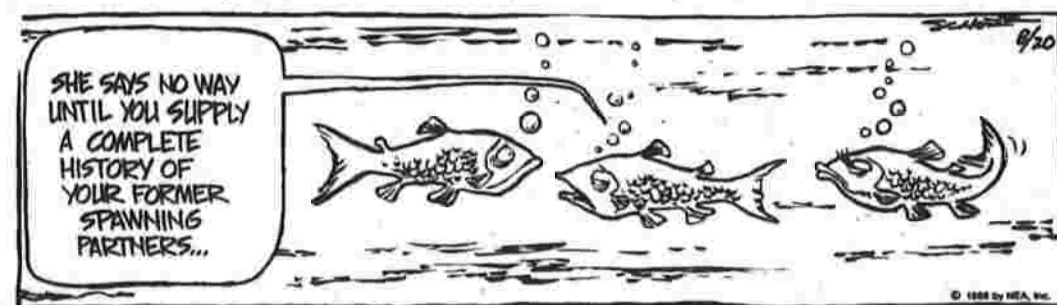

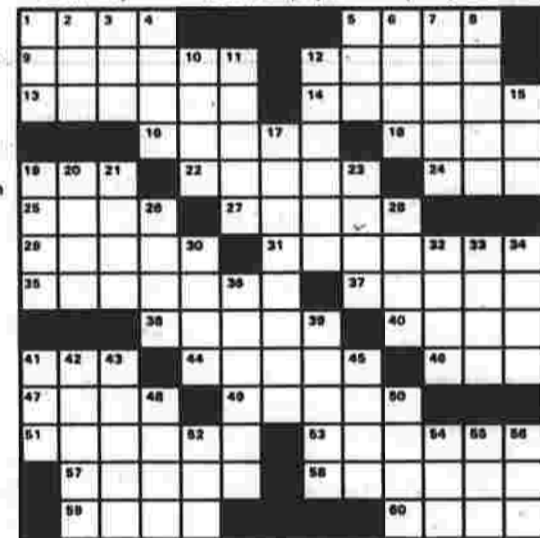

More tips for better photos

Let's quickly review last week's suggestions for improving your picture-taking indoors.

Learn to gently squeeze the shutter button, rather than punch it, in order to avoid blurry pictures caused by camera movement.

When shooting pictures of people, move in as close as the camera will allow and take head-and-shoulder shots rather than full-length photos.

Try to avoid placing your subject in the center of the picture. You'll find the picture is more pleasing if the subject is off-center, looking into the picture.

When shooting scenes, avoid placing the horizon line across the center of the picture and make sure this line is level, not tilted.

And finally, perhaps the most coveted of all automotive collectibles — the Duesenberg. The 1935 Model SJ was the Rambo of its time.

FOCUS / Computers

Ignore the ads, not all machines do all things well

Those brand-centered computer folk who preach the Way, Truth and Light according to (check one) Tandy, Apple, IBM, Commodore, Atari or plain old Etcetera should talk to R. D. Carey of Sabula, Iowa.

Carey has considered the competing claims of Apple and other partisans in this space and writes to make an interesting point:

"I view some of the lists of recommended equipment from your Apple readers with awe. I wonder if their equipment lineups

are for use or for 'show and brag.'

"I happen to own the Tandy 1000EX with the second external 3.5-inch disk drive. No printer as yet — I'm just learning (70 and retired). It would be considered to be compared favorably to the system you had recommended for budding authors. The key here would be did they plan to use to computer for much other than the writing effort. My only recommendation would be the storage disk drive should be the 3.5-inch floppy for 720,000 characters of storage, rather than another 5.25-inch floppy (limited to 360,000 characters). I would cer-

tainly not recommend a megabyte (hard disk) storage unit. Although a tremendous amount of memory can be made available quickly, the disk is prone to many inadvertent-type accidents which pretty much dictate back-up storage record-keeping (for safety reasons) and this means a library of 5.25 or 3.5-inch floppies anyhow so why bother with a hard disk?"

"I will admit that the very simple Apple keyboard (same goes for Commodore) makes for a much more friendly computer to a user who cares little for all the multi-faceted uses it can

handle. For example my son, who happens to be blind, but is a budding author and does resumes, medical transcriptions and term paper typing, uses an Apple IIe equipped with the Echo voice feature and a very simple Document program from Computer Aids Corp., of Franklin, Ind..

"Note the IIe is equipped with a dual 5.25-inch disk drive. Most importantly, he has a Transtar daisy-wheel printer, which is relatively slow but gives letter-perfect printing. Most publishers will just automatically refuse any manuscript typed with a dot-matrix printer.

"Just for the record, my son-in-law has a Commodore 128 setup and my No. 2 son is a trouble shooter for IBM, so you know who he pulls for."

Carey's family experience — covering Tandy, Apple, Commodore and IBM — is worth remembering when someone tells you there is one computer suited for all uses and applications. While it's true all computers are, by nature, "universal machines" and can do any computing task (given enough time), some machines are designed more for some tasks than for others.

Has author plucked from his famous family tree?

WASHINGTON — You would think he'd be used to it by now, as a scion of the rich and famous Buckley clan, but John Buckley squirmed and blushed as his picture was taken.

"I'm not used to this," he insisted, as the photographer gently ordered Buckley to look out a window, then focus on the corner of a cardboard box.

Buckley seemed uncomfortable in the role of media-courting novelist with his new book, "Family Politics." But publicity-seeking was his bread and butter

for years, and scrutiny is something with which he is more than familiar.

The nephew of conservative columnist-publisher-TV talk show host William F. Buckley Jr. and former New York Republican Sen. James L. Buckley, who is now a federal judge, John Buckley has earned a measure of fame all his own.

Most recently, his wit spiced up the lackluster presidential campaign of Rep. Jack Kemp, R-N.Y. As campaign press secretary, Buckley earned the respect of Washington reporters by being accessible, truthful and quotable. Before that, he was a spokes-

man for President Reagan's 1984 re-election campaign and for conservative drugstore magnate Lew Lehrman, who challenged Mario Cuomo in 1982 for the governorship of New York.

Currently, the 31-year-old Buckley is working for CBS News as a political analyst and on-camera commentator for the national political campaigns. The job is ideal: It gives him time to promote his book.

The novel, a farce about a Senate race within a large, once-rich-but-now-down-at-the-heels family, capitalizes on Buckley's experiences as a member of a wealthy, prominent, extended,

Irish-American clan — some of whose members are quite politically involved.

"I worked from the premise that if all primaries are essentially family squabbles, think how nasty and mean it could be if you had a real family squabble fought out over the course of a primary campaign," Buckley said.

The book's narrator, Charles Daley, is a rock critic-cum-political reporter for a mythical paper, the Downtown News. (Buckley had a similar arrangement with the now-defunct SoHo News.) Charles ends up running his brother Edward's campaign

to win a Senate seat from their uncle after the Downtown News devotes an entire issue to savaging the Daley family.

But the key to the book has their basis in reality — from the Daley family estate in Connecticut to traveling on the campaign plane.

Buckley readily admits some settings in the book have their basis in reality — from the Daley family estate in Connecticut to traveling on the campaign plane. However, he said he will deny to his "dying breath" that any of the characters were modeled after New York politicians.

Grand Slam is an obsession for Steffi Graf

MAHWAH, N.J. — The Grand Slam has become the grand obsession in tennis.

"It's hard to put out of my mind," said Steffi Graf, who can pull off the first major tournament sweep in 18 years with a victory in the U.S. Open. "Everybody's thinking and talking about it, so it's hard to forget."

Graf, who is playing a warmup tournament here next week, held a news conference Friday to talk about the Grand Slam and her life as the world's No. 1 female player.

If she wins the U.S. Open, which begins Aug. 29 at the National Tennis Center in New York, Graf will become the first player since Margaret Court in 1970 to sweep the Australian, French, Wimbledon and U.S. championships in the same year.

Only three other players have accomplished the feat — Don Budge in 1938, Maureen Connolly in 1953 and Rod Laver in 1962 and 1969.

Martina Navratilova won the major four championships in a row, but the sweep didn't occur in the same calendar year and is therefore not recognized as a Slam by tennis traditionalists.

When Budge, Laver and Court won the Slam, the French was played on clay and the other three majors were grass-court tournaments. Today, the French is still on clay and Wimbledon remains on grass but the Australian and U.S. Opens have switched to hardcourts.

"I think it's harder now to win the Grand Slam," said Graf, who was given a Mets jersey with her name.

One world record left from '68 Olympics

And then there was one.

On Aug. 17 Butch Reynolds reminded everybody that there are few constants in the universe of track and field by breaking Lee Evans' 20-year-old record in the 400-meter run.

That left standing only one record from the Mexico City Olympics — Bob Beamon's 29 foot, 2 1/2 inch skywalk.

Evans and Beamon set their records on the same day, Oct. 18, 1968, and although both were considered astounding at the time, Beamon is convinced his mark will also fall.

"Somewhere, sometime the record will be broken. There are two or three athletes around now with the form and talent to eventually erase 29 feet, 2 1/2 inches," Beamon said.

Carl Lewis, who won four gold medals in the 1984 Olympics and will compete again in Seoul, has leaped 28-10 1/4; Larry Myricks has made it to 28-8 1/4. A Soviet jumper, Robert Emmiyan, made it to 29-1 at altitude last year.

Reynolds had looked like he was ready to break through Evans' 43.86 for a year and finally did it in Zurich, lowering the mark by more than half a second to 43.29.

Although the 7,350-foot altitude in Mexico City helped, Beamon's record was not an illusion. Experts in physical motion have analyzed Beamon's approach and lift-off and called it the technically perfect jump.

Even if the record is broken at the Olympics in

the No. 1 and Grand Slam written on the back. "You have to be a more complete player."

The 19-year-old West German used to be considered a one-dimensional player, overpowering opponents with her blazing forehand. But her serve, volley and backhand have improved greatly over the last year and she now excels on all surfaces, as shown by her victory over eight-time champion Martina Navratilova at Wimbledon in early July.

Graf has played only two events since then, winning in Japan and Germany. But she feels confident heading into the U.S. Open, where she lost to Navratilova in last year's final.

"I have been practicing in Florida and I feel good," Graf said.

Her coach, Pavel Slozil, said Graf has a good chance to win the Open if she stays healthy. She was bothered by the flu at last year's tournament.

"She's a better player than she was last year and she's more experienced," Slozil said. "She's improving all the time."

In addition to beating her opponents, Graf will have to overcome a lot of off-court distractions to win her first U.S. Open. The closer she gets to the Slam, the more attention she gets from fans and the media.

"It's difficult," she said. "When you go on the court, you must concentrate on the match and forget about everything else."

Graf said she expects her toughest competition at the U.S. Open to come from Navratilova, six-time champion Chris Evert and teen-age rival Gabriela Sabatini. However, all three are skipping next week's tournament in New Jersey, where Graf and

defending champion Manuela Maleeva are the top seeds.

Following the U.S. Open, Graf will travel to Seoul to compete in the Olympics, where tennis will be a medal sport for the first time since 1924. She won the women's competi-

tion at the 1984 Games in Los Angeles when tennis was a demonstration sport.

"I'm very excited about playing in the Olympics," she said. "It will be tough going over there right after the Open, but I'm looking forward to it."

Beamon also feels the 1968 track and field team was the best U.S. Olympic squad until this year, and that helped him break the record on his first try.

"Part of it is being part of the team. That 1968 team, we were very close with each other. Every chance I get I like to see those guys," he said.

Beamon believes that the preparation of the team is likely to be better this year than it was in 1968 because of such things as corporate sponsorship, which has allowed full time training in track and field.

"It's much better for the athletes," he said, recalling the way some team members had to struggle to make a living as they tried to lift themselves to a world standard of excellence.

Since those Olympics, Beamon has traveled, working as a coach, and lived in Spain for two years. "I was interested in something different than competing," he said.

Evans has spent the last several years coaching in Africa, most recently as a Fulbright professor of sports in Cameroon, according to Valerie Kreutzer, a program development officer at the U.S. Information Agency. He has coached in as many as 15 countries, she said.

"He is a hero in track all over Africa. You drop that name and they clamor for him," Kreutzer said. Evans, who could not be located by telephone in Nigeria or Cameroon, may indirectly have helped Reynolds break the record by coaching Nigerian Innocent Egbunike. Reynolds credited Egbunike for setting a world record pace over the first 200 meters in Zurich, although Egbunike eventually faded to sixth.

Diaz, 28, was batting .320 with no home runs and 5 RBIs in 47 games with the Pirates.

Redus began his major league career in 1982 with Cincinnati and stayed with the Reds until going to the Philadelphia Phillies in 1986. He was acquired by the White Sox in March 1987.

Diaz had been with Pittsburgh since the start of the 1986 season. His only other major league experience was playing in six games with the Chicago Cubs in 1983.

Diaz was used primarily as a pinch hitter this season after tearing ligaments in his left thumb March 1 in a spring training intrasquad game.

He underwent surgery March 23 and was placed on the disabled list until May 7. He started games this season in left field, right field, at first base and as catcher.

Diaz's home run ratio of one every 15.1 at-bats last season was eighth-best in the National League.

Piggott's wife hospitalized

CAMBRIDGE, England (AP) — The wife of jailed jockey Lester Piggott was hospitalized with head and chest injuries Friday after a riding accident at her husband's stables.

Susan Piggott, 47, had a concussion and 10 broken ribs. She was in "serious but stable" condition, said a spokesman for Addenbrooke Hospital.

The accident occurred during her routine solo morning ride across heathland close to the Eves Lodge bloodstock stables, which she has been running since her husband was jailed in October 1987.

Her 52-year-old husband, who is serving three years for tax fraud, was said to be "very distressed," according to the British news agency, Press Association.

The Piggotts' family attorney, Jeremy Richardson, said he believed the jockey's wife of 28 years had fallen from her horse, which then rolled on to her.

Lester Piggott dominated British racing for 30 years, winning the prestigious Epsom Derby nine times before his retirement in 1985.

East to meet West in Seoul

East meets West in the Summer Olympics for the first time since 1976, a battle of athletic skills on one of history's real-life battlegrounds: Korea.

Kept apart by politics, the world's two superpowers will meet Sept. 17 to Oct. 2 in a nation they themselves divided for politics' sake.

This U.S.-Soviet reunion in Seoul will be held in an uneasy political climate sharpened by threats of terrorism and student riots, a 650,000-strong South Korean army on full battle alert, and growing anti-American sentiment.

And while worldwide attention will be on the American-Soviet confrontation, many suspect the big winner will be from another nation divided in the aftermath of World War II: East Germany. In the past four Summer Olympics, the East Germans' per capita gold medal rate is about 10 times greater than that of the Soviet Union or United States.

"The world had probably best take a long look at the East Germans," the U.S. Olympic Committee's Mike Moran said. "They're a nation of 17 million, and they're dominating several sports. ... They're putting some distance between themselves and the Russians."

In many other ways, too, this is a unique Olympics, from television to tennis to Thompson. NBC bought the TV rights for \$300 million, the first time the Summer Games have been shown by anyone besides ABC since Tokyo in 1964. Tennis is a full-fledged medal sport. Britain's Daley Thompson goes for an unprecedented third straight gold medal in the decathlon.

Eight years ago, NBC paid \$87 million for the Moscow Games but never got to show them because the United States boycotted over the Soviets' military presence in Afghanistan.

With 19 days and 179 1/2 hours of coverage planned this time, NBC will be able to train its cameras on U.S. stars like Carl Lewis, Edwin Moses, Jackie Joyner-Kersey, Florence Griffith Joyner, Mary Decker Slaney, Matt Biondi, Greg Louganis and David Robinson.

And hope the real action isn't with East Germans like track stars Heike Drechsler and Thomas Schoenlebe, swimmer Kristin Otto or shot putter Ulf Timmermann.

"Our top athletes take part in competition to show what our country is capable of," said Timmermann, the world record-holder.

In 1976, the United States won 34 gold medals and 94 total, compared with 49 gold and 125 total for the Soviets. The East Germans were third in total medals with 90 but ranked ahead of the United States with 40 gold.

The United States won 174 medals, including 83 gold, at the 1984 Los Angeles Olympics, but the Soviets boycotted those Games, as did the East Germans and most of the Soviet bloc, citing inadequate security.

"There's no question we have better athletes than in '76," Moran said, but expectations of a 1984 repeat would be "out of whack" with reality.

In fact, USOC president Robert Helmick says the United States might have trouble even matching its 1976 total, since restrictions on team sizes in some sports like swimming mean fewer medals available per country.

On the bright side, the U.S. track team will include proven winners and veterans such as 1976 hurdles gold medalist Moses; Slaney, a hard-luck Olympian yet the world record-holder in the women's mile; Griffith Joyner, world record-holder in the women's 100 meters; and Joyner-Kersey, the world's best heptathlete.

"We're predicting the oldest Olympic team we've ever had," Helmick said, "mature athletes, finally."

Lewis believes a repeat of his own Los Angeles performance is within grasp. Four years ago, Lewis joined Jesse Owens (1936) and Alvin Krantzlein (1900) as the only men to win four gold medals in an Olympics.

Lewis may not run on U.S. 400-meter relay

BRUSSELS, Belgium — Carl Lewis cast doubts Friday on whether he will

run the 400-meter relay at next month's Olympics while Steve Cram, Britain's 1,500-meter ace, swept away any doubts on his ability to win in Seoul.

Lewis, who easily dominated the 100 meters in 10.04 seconds, said Friday he was barred by U.S. relay coach Russ Rogers from competing in the 400-meter relay at the Van Damme Memorial track meet because "he had not proven himself."

Asked if he would still run the anchor leg in the Olympics after Friday's dispute, Lewis said: "At this point, no. At this point, I am just going to focus on the three individual events, and not the relay."

On Wednesday, Lewis beat arch-rival Ben Johnson of Canada in 9.93 seconds, the best time of the season. He said that was proof enough he should be on the team.

Lewis said Rogers also told Joe De Loach he could not run in Friday's relays despite the assurances of U.S. head coach Stan Huntsman.

"Rogers was acting like a junior high school coach," said Lewis. He also had a conversation with his personal coach Tom Tellez, who told him "not to focus on the relay anymore."

Bypassing the relays would deny Lewis the opportunity to become the first man to win four gold medals in successive Olympics.

The U.S. relay team, without Lewis and De Loach, won in a mediocre 38.66 seconds.

Cram overcame a disappointing third place in an 800-meter race Wednesday to run the best 1,500-meter time of the season, 3:30.95 — just over a second off Said Aouita's world record.

Cram beat compatriot Peter Elliot, who still set a personal best of 3:32.94. Cram, who had stomach problems in Zurich Wednesday, was still within striking distance of the record coming

out of the final bend. But despite the cheering of the 30,000-strong crowd at Heysel Stadium, he visibly weakened in the final stages.

"There is still work to do, but there is still a lot to come," he said.

Aouita, of Morocco, was pushed to the limit in the 800 meters by American Johnny Gray. Aouita had to chase Gray most of the way but kicked strongly and won by inches, handing Gray his first defeat of the season.

Aouita finished in 1:44.36, beating his personal best by .02 seconds. Gray was timed in 1:44.43.

American Butch Reynolds, not yet fully recovered from beating the 20-year-old 400-meter world record Wednesday, stayed out of the event.

The 400 had promised the same star-studded field that powered Reynolds to the world record on Wednesday. Instead, Reynolds strained until the end of the rarely-run 300 meters, fending off fellow American Walter McCoy.

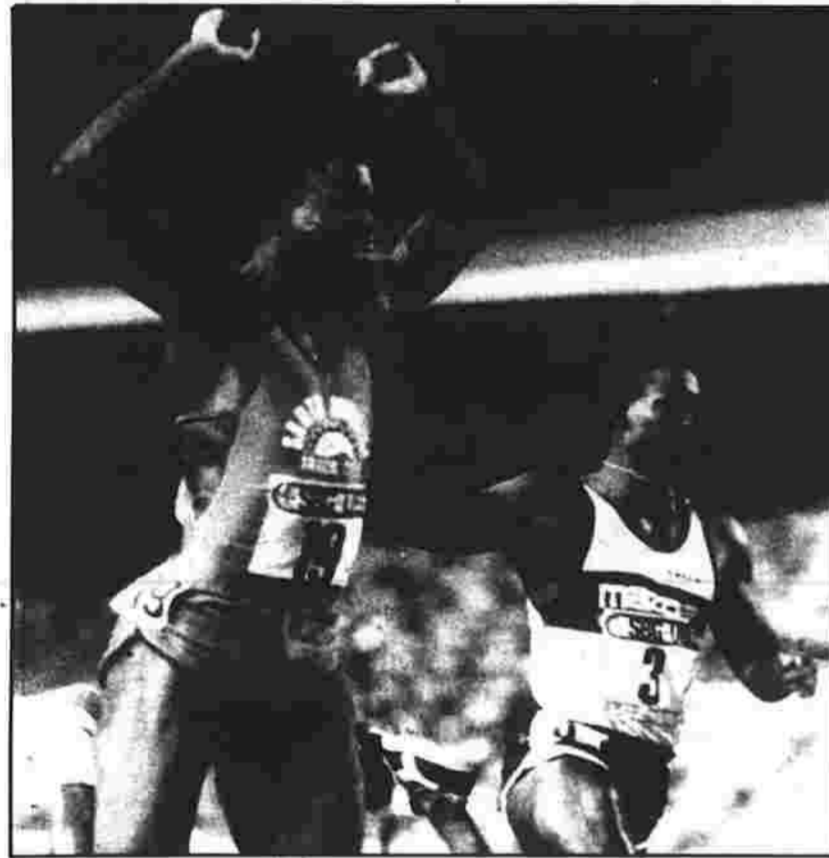
Thus, a race that was to have given Reynolds a second record in three days turned into something of an anti-climax.

Reynolds won in 32.22 — .52 outside the 1984 mark of American Kirk Baptiste — and looked uncomfortable throughout the race.

The 400 meters went to American Danny Everett, who easily led the field with a time of 44.61.

American Andre Phillips won the 400-meter hurdles in 47.90, one of the better times this season, with Danny Harris second.

In the long jump, U.S. Olympic hopeful Larry Myricks suffered a surprise defeat at the hands of compatriot Mike Powell, who leaped 27 feet, 4 1/4 inches, an inch longer than Myricks.

Carotene to face 13 in 'Million'

TORONTO (AP) — The 1988 thoroughbred racing campaign could be termed a little disappointing for Kinghaven Farms and trainer Roger Attfield after setting a Canadian money-winning record last year.

However, it could turn rosier for owners Bud and David Willmot of King City, Ontario, if Carotene beats 13 rivals in the Arlington Million at Woodbine race track Saturday.

A win in the 1 1/4-mile turf race would be worth \$600,000 and make the 5-year-old mare the leading money-winner in Canada. Sunny's Halo, the 1983 Kentucky Derby winner, now leads with \$1,247,791.

The Arlington, for 3-year-olds and up, carries a total purse of \$1.23 million Canadian and is being held at Woodbine for 1988 only because Arlington Park in Chicago is being rebuilt after a fire.

There are two Canadian horses in the race — Regal Classic is the other — while the United States will be represented by seven, France three and Britain two.

Regal Classic, owned by Ernie Samuel and Windfields Farm, drew the No. 1 post. The others, starting with the No. 2 post, are Equalize, Mill Native, Great Communicator, Triptych, Yankee Affair, Carotene, Sunshine Forever, Most Welcome, Anka Germana, Media Starguest, Deputy Governor, Roi Normand and Something True.

Stephens after Travers win

SARATOGA SPRINGS, N.Y. — Woody Stephens, a trainer who has won just about everything thoroughbred racing has to offer, shoots for his first Travers Stakes victory Saturday at Saratoga Race Course.

Stephens will send out Forty Niner against five other 3-year-olds in the 119th running of the 1 1/4-mile Travers. If all six start, the Travers will have a purse of \$1,088,500, with \$653,100 going to the winner.

Challenging Claiborne Farm's Forty Niner and jockey Chris McCarron will be early favorite Brian's Time and Angel Cordero Jr., Evening Kris and Jerry Bailey, Kingpost and Jacinto Vasquez, Seeking the Gold and Patrick Day, and Dynaforner, with no rider named yet.

All entries will carry 126 pounds.

For Stephens, who has been coming to Saratoga for 60 years, a win in the Travers would be another feather in an already crowded cap. He has won more than 200 stakes races, including two Kentucky Derbys and five

straight Belmont Stakes from 1982-86.

"It doesn't bother me any more," said Stephens, who turns 75 on Sept. 1. "They're all nice to win. I just hope my horse has a nice smooth trip, that's all I can ask. I think he'll be awful hard to beat."

Three of Stephens' horses have finished second in the Travers: Traffic Judge in 1955, Smarten in 1979 and Danzig Connection in 1986.

McCarron, who rode Danzig Connection to a win in the Belmont two years ago, was brought in from California to ride Forty Niner after Lafit Pincay was injured during a race.

"McCarron's a very smooth rider and that's what I wanted for this horse," the Hall of Fame trainer said.

Brian's Time, owned by James W. Phillips and trained by John Vellich, will have the services of Saratoga's hottest jockey, Cordero, 45, leads the meet with 25 wins, including six in stakes races.

Coming off a victory in the Jim Dandy, Brian's Time joins tough company in Forty Niner and Seeking the Gold.

"My only instructions going in to the (Jim Dandy) was to keep him clear and when he makes his run, be in a position where he's not going to be stopped. At the head of the stretch he was neither," Vellich said.

Seeking the Gold's trainer, Shug McGaughey, is conceding nothing to his rivals, especially after Ogdon Phipps' colt lost by a nose to Forty Niner in the Haskell Invitational July 30.

"If we don't run our race anybody can win, but I think the three top horses will be the ones to worry about," McGaughey said.

"I'm a big Travers man," he added. "There's only one other race I'd rather win and that's the Derby."

Though Kingpost turned in a good performance in the Belmont, finishing second to the since-retired Risen Star, he and trainer Dianne Carpenter have for the most part escaped the spotlight.

Post time is 5:44 p.m., with ABC-TV beginning its racing coverage at 4 with the running of the Arlington Million at Woodbine.

BC's request for alcohol license is denied

BOSTON (AP) — The city has gone along with the objections of neighbors and denied Boston College's request for a license to serve alcohol at its sports facilities.

The three-member Boston Licensing Board Thursday rejected Boston College's petition for a license to serve alcohol at its Alumni Stadium football field and new indoor Silvio O. Conte Arena.

A day earlier, at a hearing on the petition, residents of Newton and the Brighton section of Boston, as well as their elected representatives, asked that the license be denied because of past problems.

The school, in a petition revised after Wednesday's hearing, had

sought the right to serve alcohol to up to 728 persons in VIP boxes and one function room during sporting events and at special events for alumni and donors. The original petition stated that 19,000 people could fill the arena and stadium. In the revision, the school noted that only up to 900 people would be offered alcohol at any one event.

"I personally don't see the public need for this license in terms of the effect on neighborhoods and in terms of liability on the university's part," board Chairman Andrea Gargiulo said in voting against the license.

"There is not enough here for approval by the City of Boston to outweigh the negative effects of

granting the petition."

While turning down the license bid, the board indicated it also was unlikely to grant a license to sell alcohol in the VIP boxes but recommended that the school continue its practice of obtaining one-day licenses for special events in that area.

VIP box users also can bring their own alcoholic beverages, a suggestion Boston College is legally permitted to make.

But Jane Pitt, an attorney for Boston College trustees, argued a license would allow the school to control the amount of liquor served in the boxes.

In a letter to Mrs. Gargiulo written in the wake of complaints aired

Wednesday, Ms. Pitt said, "Boston College is and will continue to be committed to working with the community to address these concerns."

Mary Talty, a member of the Brighton-Allston Improvement Association who appeared at the hearing, said she was gratified by the decision. "People should be going to games to enjoy the games, not to drink," she said.

And said state Rep. William F. Galvin, D-Brighton, a Boston College alumnus: "I think it reflects a victory for the community, not just the Boston community but the Newton community as well."

Astros 5, Pirates 1

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Danny Darwin pitched a three-hitter and Buddy Bell, taken off the disabled list earlier in the day, went 3-for-4 with a homer and two runs batted in Friday night as the Houston Astros beat the Pittsburgh Pirates 5-1.

Glenn Davis and Bell hit consecutive home runs in Houston's three-run fourth inning off Mike Dunne, 6-10, who lost his third in a row despite a career-high eight strikeouts in 6 1-3 innings.

Darwin, 6-9, won for the first time as a starter since June 7, allowing only an RBI grounder to Andy Van Slyke in the third. Darwin, who had lost his last four starts, struck out five and walked one.

Darwin made 12 relief appearances since his last start July 10. He did not allow a hit after Dunne's third-inning single.

With the Pirates leading 1-0, Davis led off the fourth with his 24th homer of the season. Bell, who has been on the disabled list since Aug. 4 with a strained muscle in his left rib cage, followed by hitting a 2-0 pitch over the left field wall for his fifth homer.

Dunne then hit Kevin Bass in the right knee with a pitch and Rafael Ramirez doubled down the left field line, sending Bass to third. Alex Trevino's run-scoring groundout made it 3-1 before Dunne struck out Darwin and Gerald Young.

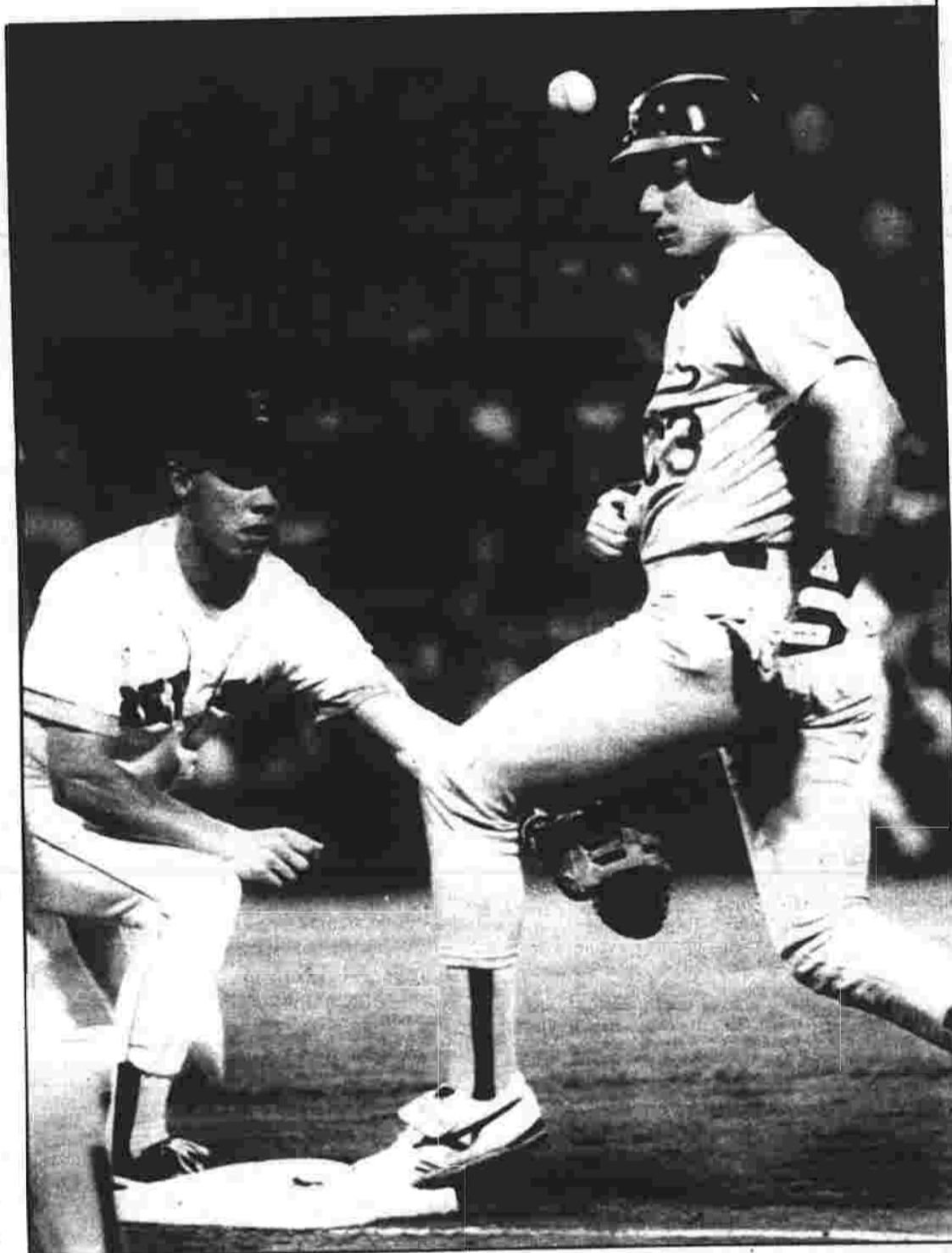
Phelps' home run was an opposite field drive to left field and broke off the glove of Mickey Brantley who tried to make a leaping catch over the fence.
