A FISH CALLED WANDA (R) The ingredients of this determinedly wild London-set comedy are so promising that it's all the more disappointing when the movie fails to come together. For every successful bit, there are many more sort-of-funny and trying-too-hard-to-be-funny



TULSA, Okla. - They stood on their heads and yodeled. They smushed marshmallows in their mouths and chanted, "Chubby bunny, chubby bunny, chubby bunny." They dressed as Uncle Sam and tapped danced on stilts.

His real name is Al Yankovic, a 27-year-old Southern California native who hit the big time in 1983 with a song called "Another One

It was his way of laughing at pop culture — the song is a parody of the rock group Queen's hit song, "Another One Bites the Dust." He's been laughing his way to the bank ever since.

Five albums later, Weird Al is on the radio and video music stations again laughing at pop culture, this time with "I'm Fat" The song and LP is a takeoff on Michael Jackson's "I'm Bad" from the "Bad" album.

'Most of the songs I do are things that have shaped my life most," Yankovic said.

# Another week traders would like to forget

NEW YORK (AP) - A late burst of computer-driven selling wiped out measly gains in blue-chip stocks Friday and contributed to another mixed finish on Wall Street, capping a sluggish week that traders would just as soon forget.

"Nobody's committing any mo-ney," said Robert O'Toole, manager of over-the-counter trading at Shear son Lehman Hutton Inc. in New York. 'We're going to be in the doldrums for a while.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrials, up slightly through most of the day, weakened rapidly in the final minutes and ended with an 11.03-point loss to 2,016.00, putting the index's decline for the week at 21.52.

Traders blamed the late reversal largely on computer-generated sel-ling programs linked to expiring stock options, which contributed about 20 million shares to an otherwise dreary day on the New York Stock Exchange

Despite the loss in the Dow average. the broader market was mixed. In composite NYSE trading, gaining issues held about a 4-to-3 edge over declines, with 794 up, 624 down and 522 unchanged.

The fundamental reason for stockmarket apathy is concern about rising interest rates and the direction of the economy, in the opinion of many market strategists. With Treasury bonds offering increasingly attractive returns, investors aren't eager to risk their money on Wall Street.

"If and when the market believes



interest rates have peaked, then we'll see renewed interest in stocks." said Robert Meyer, director of research at the New York investment firm Fahnestock & Co. "When you can get fairly decent yields in short-term bonds, it's pretty tough to compete. Volume on the floor of the NYSE totaled 122.37 million shares, down from 139.82 million the previous session and the lowest level in more

Goodyear rose 2 to 60 after the company confirmed reports it will sell the 1,750-mile All-American Pipeline to help pay debts. Armtek rose 1 to 461/2 on word that it was talking with possible acquirers.

The Wilshire Associates Equity Index, the market value of NYSE, American and OTC issues, fell by \$3.26 billion.

The NYSE composite index of all listed issues fell 0.27 to 147.54. Standard & Poor's industrial index fell 1.46 to 298.44, and S&P's 500-stock composite index fell 0.79 to 260.24.

## Sears is charged in toy complaint

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Consumer Product Safety Commission charged Friday that the giant retailer Sears, Roebuck and Co. has continued to sell lawn darts, violating its official promise to stop marketing the hazardous game.

The Safety Commission filed suit in federal district court in Washington, asking that Sears be found in contempt and be ordered to halt lawn dart sales, to survey all its stores to make sure sales have been stopped, and to compensate the commission for its costs in policing the agreement

"I'm disappointed at Sears for this new violation but expect this contempt action will send a strong message to Sears and other retailers that the CPSC will enforce its regulations on lawn darts," said Commission Chairman Terrence M. Scanlon.

Sears spokesman Gordon Jones in Chicago said officials there had not yet seen the complaint and thus could not comment on it.

Sears and the Safety Commission announced a consent agreement in March in which the retailer said it was halting all lawn dart sales. However, Commission investigators report they later found the darts being sold by Sears in Puerto

The March agreement settled Commission charges that Sears had violated federal rules that ban sales of the long, metal darts in or near toy sections of stores. The darts, thrown at targets on the ground in a

sort of horseshoes-like game, have been blamed on several injuries in recent years and at least one death. Under federal rules they can be sold only in sporting goods departments and stores.

# Polaroid says it has suitors, urges voluntary retirements

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP) -Polaroid Corp. said Friday it has received "expressions of interest" from several corporate Holdings Inc. and Forstmann Little & Co., but it declined to name the potential bidders.

Girding for battle with the raiders. Polaroid said this week it would offer early retirement to hundreds more employees, including a quarter of its top executives. The Cambridgebased film products firm also warned employees that layoffs may occur if the voluntary

incentives don't work. Wall Street analysts said they doubted the cost-cutting would dissuade potential buyers.

"I think the news that they're going to cut another bulk of their employees out is positive for the takeover? Absolutely not," said Bache Securities.

"But some part of it is taking hot water in the morning ... (with) a small bit of honey. I've been doing that since I retired and that's going on 38 years (ago)," the former miner told BBC radio in an interview at his home in Forest-Fach near Swansea

"Honey is great," said Evans. "I get plenty of that on my birthday." Singing helps, too

"I've been doing that since I was a little boy. Going to Sunday school, I'd sing, plenty of it," he said, breaking into a Welsh song.

Since their separation, the senator has been linked to actress Morgan Fairchild, among others. Kerry has said his relationship with Fairchild, who is active in Democratic politics, was casual. Kerry is serving his first term in the Senate.

The child is the first for Mrs. Cole, a partner in a public relations firm, and her husband, Kenneth, a shoe designer. They were married in October. The hospital where the baby was born was not disclosed, said Cuomo spokeswoman Anne Crowley.

# Landlord pays \$12,000 for barring children

ROSTON (AP) - A landlord who allegedly denied a rental apartment to a couple because they had children has agreed to pay them \$12,000 compensation, the Boston Fair Housing Commission said.

The commission's executive direcor, Ernest B.-Gutierrez Jr., said the settlement was the largest the commission had ever negotiated in a discrimination case.

'A settlement of this type sends out the message that children have fair housing rights - and that in the city of Boston, we're enforcing those rights,"

The couple, Gayle and Donald Guilford, both 34, had sought to rent a

three bedroom apartment in the Dorchester section of Boston for themselves and their four daughters, ages 1, 2, 12 and 14.

Under state sanitary codes, three bedrooms are adequate for a family of six, and a real estate agent told the Guilfords that the apartment was available However, Gutierrez said, landlord

Gary Gwozdzik rejected the Guilfords, allegedly violating a 1982 city ordnance prohibiting discrimination against families with children. The Guilford's attorney, Nadine

Cohen of the Lawyer's Committee for Civil Rights Under the Law, said Gwozdzik told the couple point blank because of their children." But the landlord's attorney, Ste-

phen A. Greenbaum, said his client vehemently denies ever discriminating" against the Guilfords.

"The Guilfords, who are far from ono basis by the Lawyer's Committee, which is part of the Boston Bar Association, and by Palmer & Dodge, one of the city's largest law firms," Greenbaum said.

While on the other hand, my client, who is an average working guy who owns a total of five apartment units in the whole world, has to pay his own legal fees, and he simply could not afford the cost of litigating this case out through the Fairing Housing Commission and the courts."

Greenbaum said Gwozdzik rejected the Guilfords as tenants because he thought six people were too many for the apartment, not because he did not want children in the building.

The settlement, reached Monday, came just days after Congress amended the Fair Housing Act to extend federal protection to families with children and the disabled.

Under the amended Fair Housing Act, he noted, administrative law judges will be able to impose fines of \$10,000 to \$50,000 for each violation.



## Grand Slam is an obsession for Steffi Graf

MAHWAH, N.J. - The Grand Slam has become the grand obsession in

"It's hard to put out of my mind said Steffi Graf, who can pull off the first major tournament sweep in 18 years with a victory in the U.S. Open. "Everybody's thinking and talking

about it, so it's hard to forget." Graf, who is playing a warmup tournament here next week, held a news conference Friday to talk about the Grand Slam and her life as the world's No. 1 female player.

If she wins the U.S. Open, which begins Aug. 29 at the National Tennis Center in New York, Graf will become the first player since Margaret Court in 1970 to sweep the Australian French, Wimbledon and U.S. championships in the same year.

Only three other players have lished the feat — Don Budge in 1938 Maureen Connolly in 1953 and Rod Laver in 1962 and 1969.

Martina Navratilova won the major four championships in a row, but the sweep didn't occur in the same calendar year and is therefore not recognized as a Slam by tennis

When Budge, Laver and Court won the Slam, the French was played on clay and the other three majors were grass-court tournaments. Today, the French is still on clay and Wimbledon remains on grass but the Australian and U.S. Opens have switched to hardcourts.

"I think it's harder now to win the Grand Slam." said Graf, who was given a Mets jersey with her name. the No. I and Grand Slam written on the back. "You have to be a more complete player.

The 19-year-old West German used to be considered a one-dimensional player, overpowering opponents with her blazing forehand. But her serve. volley and backhand have improved greatly over the last year and she now excels on all surfaces, as shown by her victory over eight-time champion Martina Navratilova at Wimbledon in

Graf has played only two events since then, winning in Japan and Germany. But she feels confident heading into the U.S. Open, where she lost to Navratilova in last year's final "I have been practicing in Florida

and I feel good," Eraf said. Her coach, Pavel Slozil, said Graf has a good chance to win the Open if she stays healthy. She was bothered by the flu at last year's tournament. "She's a better player than she was last year and she's more experienced." Slozil said. "She's improv-

ing all the time." In addition to beating her opponents. Graf will have to overcome a lot of off-court distractions to win her first U.S. Open. The closer she gets to the Slam, the more attention she gets from fans and the media.

"It's difficult," she said. "When you go on the court, you must concentrate on the match and forget about everything else.

Graf said she expects her toughest competition at the U.S. Open to come from Navratilova, six-time champion Chris Evert and teen-age rival Gabriela Sabatini. However, all three are skipping next week's tournament in New Jersey, where Graf and

defending champion Manuela Maleeva are the top seeds.

Following the U.S. Open, Graf will travel to Seoul to compete in the Olympics, where tennis will be a medal sport for the first time since

## One world record left from '68 Olympics

And then there was one On Aug. 17 Butch Reynolds reminded everybody that there are few constants in the universe of track and field by breaking Lee Evans 20-year-old record in the 400-meter run.

That left standing only one record from the Mexico City Olympics - Bob Beamon's 29 foot, 21/2 inch skywalk

Evans and Beamon set their records on the same day, Oct. 18, 1968, and although both were considered astounding at the time. Beamon is convinced his mark will also fall.

Somewhere, sometime the record will be broken. There are two or three athletes around now with the form and talent to eventually erase 29 feet, 21/2 inches." Beamon said. Carl Lewis, who won four gold medals in the 1984

Olympics and will compete again in Seoul, has leaped 28-1014; Larry Myricks has made it to 28-814. A Soviet jumper, Robert Emmiyan, made it to 29-1 at altitude last year. Reynolds had looked like he was ready to break

through Evans' 43.86 for a year and finally did it in Zurich, lowering the mark by more than half a second to 43.29. Although the 7,350-foot altitude in Mexico City

helped, Beamon's record was not an illusion. Experts in physical motion have analyzed Beamon's approach and liftoff and called it the technically perfect jump.

Even if the record is broken at the Olympics in

Seoul, however, the circumstances are not likely to be as dramatic and the mental pressures are not likely to be the same.

Beamon and Evans performed only 24 hours after sprinters Tommie Smith and John Carlos were disqualified by the U.S. Olympic Committee because of the black-gloved, clench-fisted salute they gave while accepting the gold and bronze medals in the 200-meter dash.

The world stage of the Olympics magnified the gesture, making it more effective than anyone had

'It was taken as an insult, maybe it could have been done better," Beamon says now. "It was saying in a nonviolent way that we were not being treated fairly. We were all seriously involved in civil

Evans had been a leader of the black athletes rotesting racial discrimination in the United States. He did not raise his fist during the national anthem, but wore black socks as a gesture of 'Nowadays holding up your fist is being used by

Beamon said during a recent interview in New The situation helped push Beamon, and so did the competition — Ralph Boston and Soviet jumper Igor Ter-Ovanesyan, who jointly held the former record,

Evans has spent the last several years coaching in Africa, most recently as a Fulbright professor of sports in Cameroon, according to Valerie Kreutzer, a program development officer at the U.S. Information Agency. He has coached in as many as 15 countries, she said.

East meets West in the Summer Olympics for the first time since 1976, a battle of athletic skills on one of history's real-life battlegrounds: Korea.

Kept apart by politics, the world's two superpowers will meet Sept. 17 to Oct. 2 in a nation they themselves divided for politics' sake.

This U.S.-Soviet reunion in Seoul will be held in an

uneasy political climate sharpened by threats of terrorism and student riots, a 650,000-strong South Korean army on full battle alert, and growing anti-American sentiment

And while worldwide attention will be on the American-Soviet confrontation, many suspect the big winner will be from another nation divided in the aftermath of World War II: East Germany. In the past four Summer Olympics, the East Germans' per capita gold medal rate is about 10 times greater than that of the Soviet Union or United States.

"The world had probably best take a long look at the East Germans," the U.S. Olympic Committee's Mike Moran said. "They're a nation of 17 million, and they're dominating several sports. ... They're putting some distance between themselves and the

In many other ways, too, this is a unique Olympics, from television to tennis to Thompson. NBC bought the TV rights for \$300 million, the first time the Summer Games have been shown by anyone besides ABC since Tokyo in 1964. Tennis is a full-fledged medal sport. Britain's Daley Thompson goes for an unprecedented third straight gold medal in the decathlon.

Eight years ago, NBC paid \$87 million for the Moscow Games but never got to show them because the United States boycotted over the Soviets' military presence in Afghanistan.

With 19 days and 1791/2 hours of coverage planned this time, NBC will be able to train its cameras on U.S. stars like Carl Lewis, Edwin Moses, Jackie Joyner-Kersee, Florence Griffith Joyner, Mary Decker Slaney, Matt Biondi, Greg Louganis and

And hope the real action isn't with East Germans like track stars Heike Drechsler and Thomas Schoenlebe, swimmer Kristin Otto or shot putter Ulf

"Our top athletes take part in competition to show what our country is capable of," said Timmermann, the world record-holder.

In 1976, the United States won 34 gold medals and 94 total, compared with 49 gold and 125 total for the Soviets. The East Germans were third in total medals with 90 but ranked ahead of the United States with 40 gold.

The United States won 174 medals, including 83 d, at the 1984 Los Angeles Olympics, but the Soviets boycotted those Games, as did the East Germans and most of the Soviet bloc, citing nadequate security.

"There's no question we have better athletes than in '76," Moran said, but expectations of a 1984 repeat would be "out of whack" with reality.

On the bright side, the U.S. track team will include proven winners and veterans such as 1976 hurdles gold medalist Moses; Slaney, a hard-luck Olympian yet the world record-holder in the women's mile; Griffith Joyner, world record-holder in the women's 100 meters; and Joyner-Kersee, the world's best

CASTLE ROCK, Colo. - Jack Nicklaus advanced through second-round play Friday at the International Golf Tournament; all but assuring that he will reach the \$5 million mark in career earnings this weekend

Nicklaus, 48, was among the 54 players who won their way into Saturday's third round of the unique tournament, which is being conducted under a modified Stableford scoring

Only 18 of the 54 players Saturday will advance to Sunday's final round. Nicklaus, however, needs to beat only three of those 54 to become the first player to reach \$5 million in career earnings.

Nicklaus now has \$4,997,550. The prize for 51st is \$2,460.

'Any milestone is nice," said Nicklaus, who also was the first to reach \$2 million, \$3 million and \$4 million.

"It would be nice to be first. But \$5 million, as relates to the purses we're playing for today, isn't going to mean much. In five years, there'll be five players with \$5 million," he said.

Nicklaus moved through second-round play with a total of eight points under the scoring system that awards five points for an eagle two for a birdie, zero for par, minus-1 for bogey and minus-3 for double bogey or higher.

Points are not carried forward, however, so Nicklaus and all other survivors will start again from scratch.

"I played pretty well," said Nicklaus, who played the back of the Castle Pines Golf Club, which he designed, in 32. "I wasn't playing well at all when I got here, and it's gotten a little better each day.

Fred Couples, Joey Sindelar and D.A. Weibring led the way with 11 points apiece to

win \$7,500. Paul Azinger, the runner-up in the PGA, did not make it. He was eliminated after finishing with zero points after a final-hole bogey.

Fuzzy Zoeller was another casualty. He was minus-2 playing the final hole and had to make birdie to have any chance of advancing.

SOMERS POINT, N.J. (AP) - Beth Daniel, seeking her first LPGA victory in three years shot a near flawless 5-under-par 66 Friday to take a one-stroke lead over Martha Nause after the opening round of the \$225,000 Atlantic City

He was first charged with two counts of vehicular homicide and released on \$10,000 bail. State prosecutors have since filed additional charges of two counts of manslaughter by intoxication and three counts of driving under the influence resulting in severe

In view of the additional charges, the state filed a motion in circuit court Thursday seeking a review of the conditions unde which Kimball was freed on bail. Prosecutors also called attention to Kimball's plans to travel to South Korea if he makes the

The motion, which does not ask for specific changes in the condi-tions of the bail, is scheduled to be considered by Judge Harry Lee Coe III on Aug. 29 when Kimball is to be arraigned on the criminal charges.

BOSTON (AP) — The city has gone along with the objections of neighbors and denied Boston College's request for a license to serve alcohol at its

sports facilities. The three-member Boston Licensing Board Thursday rejected Boston College's petition for a license to serve alcohol at its Alumni Stadium football field and new indoor Silvio O. Conte

A day earlier, at a hearing on the etition, residents of Newton and the Brighton section of Boston, as well as their elected representatives, asked that the license be denied because of

The school, in a petition revised after Wednesday's hearing, had

sought the right to serve alcohol to up to 728 persons in VIP boxes and one function room during sporting events and at special events for alumni and donors. The original petition stated that 19,000 people could fill the arena and stadium. In the revision, the school noted that only up to 900 people would be offered alcohol at any one

"I personally don't see the public need for this license in terms of the effect on neighborhoods and in terms of liability on the university's part,' board Chairman Andrea Gargiulo said in voting against the license.

"There is not enough here for approval by the City of Boston to outweigh the negative effects of

While turning down the license bid, the board indicated it also was unlikely to grant a license to sell alcohol in the VIP boxes but recommended that the school continue its practice of obtaining one-day licenses for special events in that area.

VIP box users also can bring their own alcoholic beverages, a suggestion Boston College is legally permitted to

But Jane Pitt, an attorney for Boston College trustees, argued a license would allow the school to control the amount of liquor served in

In a letter to Mrs. Gargiulo written in the wake of complaints aired

College is and will continue to be committed to working with the community to address these

Mary Talty, a member of the Brighton-Allston Improvement Assoclation who appeared at the hearing, said she was gratified by the decision. "People should be going to games to enjoy the games, not to drink," she

And said state Rep. William F. Galvin, D-Brighton, a Boston College alumnus: "I think it reflects a victory for the community, not just the Boston community but the Newton commun
