## Hospital negotiates buy of ambulance company

Manchester Memorial Hospital is negotiating the purchase of the privately owned Ambulance Service of Manchester, the largest ambulance service in the area. hospital spokesman Andrew Beck said Friday.

Beck, quoting hospital President Michael R. Gallacher, said that acquisition of the ambulance service would strengthen the hospital's role in providing health care for communities east of the River. Gallacher could not be reached for comment

The announcement by the hospital comes two weeks after Kaiser Permanente, a Hartfordbased health-maintenance organization, disclosed that it planned to open an office next year on Hartford Road.

Kaiser Permanente currently refers patients to Hartford Hospital, though officials from the HMO have expressed a willingness to refer patients to Manchester Memorial Hospital. The organization would provide comprehensive medical coverage to members for a pre-paid

In a prepared statement, Gall-acher said, "MMH Corporation has been looking into the possibility of acquiring the Ambulance Service of Manchester. This possibility has been discussed by both parties over the years, and it seemed like an appropriate time to explore this matter further."

Roger Talbot, the owner and president of the ambulance service, said that hospital officials expressed an interest in acquiring the company about 11/2 years ago, when Warren L. Prelesnik was the hospital's president. He said that he had spoken to officials in past months but hadn't heard from them recently.

But Talbot said that he was still interested in selling the company.

'I'm not getting any older, and it probably makes sense," he said. He said he might be willing to continue working with the ambulance service if it were acquired by the hospital.

The service, located at 134 E. Center St., has been in business for about 30 years and is the largest east of the River, Talbot

Beck said that the Manchester Memorial Hospital Corp. would present the proposed acquisition to the hospital's full board of directors before proceeding with final negotiations. He would not say what issues remained to be

"It is important to get the full board's approval," Beck said.

Beck said that the ambulance service's place in the structure of the hospital had not been determined, but he said it would be a part of the holding company that owns the hospital. The hospital is owned by the Manchester Memorial Hospital Corporation, a private, non-profit corporation.

The announcement that the hospital was negotiating to purchase the ambulance service came after the hospital announced plans to construct an outpatient surgical facility at an undisclosed cost and upgrade its computer system at a cost of \$3 year were listed at \$2.9 million, according to the state Commission on Hospitals and Health



## New Dukakis ads turning up the heat

Democrat Michael Dukakis charged in a tough new TV ad Friday that George Bush is airing commercials that are "full of lies and he knows it." Bush, leading in the polls, turned to a condemnation of chemica

Trailing with just 17 days remaining until the election, the Dukakis campaign unveiled its most pointed ads of the year, accusing Bush of distorting

The Massachusetts governor set the stage earlier Friday when he said on network talk shows, "I've been subject to attacks and distortions" happy with this campaign" because it had been too negative.

He said Bush's attack on the Massachusetts prisoner-furlough program was "cynical and very hypocritical." The Bush camp has made much of the fact that Willie Horton, a convicted murderer, escaped while on furlough, raped a Maryland woman

## Bush campaign back in state on Monday

HARTFORD - Republican George Bush will bring his president campaign back to Connecticut Monday, hoping to solidify the lead he's apparently got in a state often described as one of his four home

Friday He'll also announce creation of a "Democrats For Bush" committee when he lands at Oxford Airport, according to an aide to U.S. Rep. John G. Rowland, R-Conn., before heading to Waterbury for a speech on

economic policy.

J. Brian Gaffney, Bush's Connecti-

dent probably wanted to hit Connecticut one more time because it is one of about 18 states targeted by Democrat Michael Dukakis as crucial to an

Election Day win.

Bush is scheduled to address a Waterbury Chamber of Commerce breakfast Monday morning. The The vice president campaigned

twice in Connecticut last month, stopping in Norwalk and Hartford. The son of a U.S. senator from Connecticut, Bush grew up in Greenwich and went to Yale.

"I think he wants to try and see if he can solidify the lead he's got," Gaffney said. "Whether he'll be back

## Compromise forecast on N. Elm lease

Housing Authority members are willing to negotiate with the town for a contract agreement which would allow them to manage the \$1.2 million housing for the elderly project being constructed on North Elm Street, Mayor Peter P. DiRosa Jr. said Friday.

DiRosa said an "issue of semantics" concerning the contract agreement was cleared up on Friday when representatives of the authority and their attorney Malcolm Barlow met with Town Attorney William Shea and Assistant Manager

The confusion began at a meeting Wednesday when Barlow presented authority members with an unsigned lease proposal drawn up by Shea. Members indicated then that they were opposed to signing a lease agreement and were only interested in managing the 20-unit project.

The problem arose because Barlow had termed the contract a "management agree-ment" while Shea had termed it a "lease," DiRosa said.

"I'm not sure (Barlow and Shea) were talking about two different things," DiRosa said. "As a community, we are not legally allowed to let the authority manage the project without contracting a lease. But the term lease is

Before Friday's negotiations, members said they were concerned with liability problems if they signed the lease.

The housing project, which has been under construction since May 1, has been the focus of complaints from neighbors. In June, about 40 residents blasted the project's architect, Alan Lamson, of Frazier Lamson Budlong Architects & Planners, complaining that construction problems there were affecting their quality of

Carol Shanley, the authority's executive director, said last week that the complaints had "no bearing" on the members' hesitance to sign a

DiRosa said that Werbner indicated to him that members of the authority have expressed a willingness to manage the project and are now willing to negotiate with the town for a

compromise to a lease.
"A legal document must be signed before the authority can legally manage the project," DiRosa said. "What form it takes is the issue here, not the end result.

## Autopsy results weeks away

It will probably be at least a couple of weeks before the state medical examiner's office completes an autopsy on the Hartford man who died as a result of an acid spill in a South Windsor factory Tuesday morning, a spokeswoman at the office said

But an official from the Hartford office of the federal Occupational Safety and Health Adminis tration said that inhalation of the fumes from hydrofluoric acid probably caused the death of 29-year-old Timothy

Cunningham. Cunningham died after he was exposed to the chemical at the Metals Testing Co., 570 Sullivan Ave. The accident also injured two other workers, who were treated and released from Manchester Memorial Hospital.

John Stanton, the area director in OSHA's Hartford office, said that his agency was still conducting an investigation of the incident and wouldn't know whether any safety violations occurred until the investigation was completed. He said it could be about

two weeks before the investiga-tion was concluded.

Robert Delisle, the company president, has said that Cuningham might have tripped into a 21/4-gallon container of hydrofluoric acid while mixing it. Delisle said it is the first time there has been such an accident

at the company Stanton said that a toxic gas was created when the acid came nto contact with the air, and that Cunningham was surrounded in a fog of gas when other workers

Thompson is seeking re-election in Manchester's 13th Assembly District. He is opposed by Republican Susan Buckno.



## Weicker campaign turns table, blasts Lieberman attendance

HARTFORD (AP) - Democratic senate challenger Joseph I. Lieberman is "at the bottom of the barrel" when it comes to attendance records, U.S. Sen. Lowell P. Weicker Jr.'s campaign manager said Friday.

"It's the height of hypocrisy for Mr. Lieberman to grandstand on the issue of voter attendance when he himself has been at the bottom of the barrel two years consecutively when he was a legislator," said Jay F. Malcynsky, Weicker's campaign

Malcynsky said Lieberman's attendance record in the state Senate in 1972 was 81 percent and was 71 percent in 1973.

Pointing out that Lieberman had been the majority leader at the time, Malcynsky noted: "they (the state Senate) don't conduct business unless he's there ... the train doesn't move without the engineer on board.

"Our question to Mr. Lieberman is that if you ought to be fired at 90 percent, what ought to happen to you at 71

Lieberman, now the state attorney general, has made a campaign issue of Weicker's attendance record, saying that anyone with a record of 90 percent doesn't deserve the job.

"Our question to Mr. Lieberman is that if you ought to be fired

at 90 percent, what ought to happen to you at 71 percent?" Malcynsky said.

Lieberman's campaign manager, Maria Romash, countered: On the issue of attendance, Joe Lieberman's attendance is better than Lowell Weicker's."

Lieberman missed votes in 1973 because he was hospitalized, Romash said

In 1972, she said, Lieberman, who is Jewish, missed a number of votes because of "religious

Lowell Weicker when he should have been on the Senate floor voting for us," she said.

## Youths face charges after drug arrest

Robert Oliver, an attorney representing the six towing companies that do work for the city, said his clients will not tow abandoned cars until the aldermen reconsider the increase on Nov. 1.

He would not say whether the boycott would continue if the board does not pass the proposal. For now, he said, the companies will tow abandoned vehicles only in emergency situations, such as when a car is blocking traffic.

"They're losing money, and now they're losing so much money it doesn't make any sense,'

Hartford's towing companies receive \$50 for each abandoned car and \$27 for each routine tow. Bridgeport's companies receive \$40 for an abandoned car and \$35 for a routine tow.

In recent months, officials have been working to remove hundreds of junk cars cluttering New Haven streets. Abandoned cars began piling up in mid-July, when North Haven scrap metal dealer Michael Schiavone & Sons Inc. closed the state's only autombile shredding operation.

Since Schiavone reopened in late September, more than 300 of the estimated 1,000 abandone cars in the city have been removed.

'This is not a protest, it is not a demonstration," Chuvala said. 'We believe that we are literally rescuing babies from death."

Chuvala declined to identify which of about a dozen abortion clinics in the state would be the target of the action because "we need an element of surprise." Today's protest is modeled on

the activities of Operation Rescue, a Binghamton, N.Y ..based organization staged its first action in Cherry Hill, N.J., in November 1987.

Since then, more than 6,000 Operation Rescue protesters have been arrested in about 30 cities, according to Juli Loesch of Erie, Pa.

The group maintains that its actions have persuaded nearly 400 women not to have abortions.

#### Lawn darts ban OK'd

WASHINGTON (AP) - The House passed legislation on Friday ordering the government to ban the sale of lawn darts, a game that is blamed for the deaths of three children and injuries to

On a 304-51 vote, the lawmakers approved a bill ordering the Consumer Product Safety Commission to prohibit sale of the darts within 60 days unless it determines that the game cannot cause puncture The darts currently must carry warning labels

stating that the game is not for children. They also can be sold only in sporting goods departments, and not in toy stores or toy departments.

Last year, however, the Consumer Product Safety Commission said that none of the 21 models of lawn darts complied with those regulations.

Three children have died from lawn dart injuries in the last eight years and several have been blinded. An estimated 6,100 people have been treated for injuries from the game, of which 81 percent were children under age 15.

## Women to get memorial

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congress voted final approval Friday of a memorial honoring women who served in Vietnam during the nation's longest

The measure, approved on voice votes and sent to President Reagan, expresses the "sense of Congress" that the memorial be built at the site of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial, one of the city's most popular memorials

The measure which passed Friday was a compromise of earlier bills, which has disagreed on whether the new monument should be at the site of the Vietnam memorial. Critics said addition of another statue would hurt the artistic integrity of the Vietnam memorial

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Labor Department issued regulations Friday barring most private employers from using polygraph or lie detector tests to screen job applicants and greatly restricting use of the devices to test present employees.

The regulations, which take effect Dec. 27. ent legislation passed by Congress and signed by President Reagan last June outlawing about 85 percent of the current use of polygraph examinations and voice stress analyzers.

The congressional Office of Technology Assessment had estimated that 2 million polygraph examinations were conducted last year - 90 percent of them by private employers.

was yanked Thursday. "NBC Entertainment President Brandon Tartikoff made the decision several weeks ago that the whole political approach of the promos should be toned down," said Michael O'Hara, vice president for media relations, West Coast.

## Justice has cancer surgery; 'total recovery' is expected

WASHINGTON (AP) - Supreme Court Justice Sandra Day O'Connor underwent surgery Friday for breast cancer and is expected to make a "total recovery" and be back on the bench by the end of the month, a court spokeswoman said.

Spokeswoman Toni House said the cancer was discovered "in a very early form."

The operation was performed at Georgetown University Hospital.

O'Connor, 58, was appointed to the court by President Reagan in 1981 as the first and only woman Supreme Court justice in the nation's history. She issued a brief statement

that said, "The prognosis is for total recovery. I do not anticipate missing any oral arguments."

The court is in a two-weel recess, due to return to the bench on Oct. 31.

"I underwent surgery for breast cancer. It was found to exist in a very early form and stage," O'Connor's statement

The statement did not say

recovery" and may be good news for her prognosis. Siegel, who is assistant profes-

sor of medicine and director of a cancer treatment unit at George Washington University Hospital. said that would be "a pretty quick return to work."

Siegel was not involved in Mrs. O'Connor's case, and he was commenting generally on conditions such as hers. But he said the speed with which she plans to return to work may indicate the cancer was caught at a very early time and that there is no indication it has spread to other organs

Siegel said lumpectomy patients usually are released from the hospital in three days to four days, but usually return in two weeks to start radiation therapy. Patients who have a breat removed do not require the radiation therapy and usually return to work within two weeks to three weeks, he said.

MANAGUA, Nicaragua (AP) Thousands of people clutching clothing, chickens and sacks of beans fled for higher ground Friday as Hurricane Joan stalked the Central American coast with 110 mph winds and torrential

While Nicaragua and Costa Rica were in the most immediate danger, flash floods and mudslides could hit throughout Central America, said Bob Sheets, director of the U.S. National Hurricane Center in Coral Gables, Fla.

He said the storm was heading west and picking up speed Friday evening. The center of the hurricane will likely cross somewhere on the central coast of Nicaragua Saturday morning, he said.

The storm already has left at least 26 dead and tens of thousands homeless in Colombia and Venezuela

A mudslide 15 feet high blocked the Pan-American Highway in Panama about 100 miles from the Costa Rican border, authorities

Residents were seeking shelter along a 250-mile arc of the coastline, and at least 52,000 people have been evacuated. In the Costa Rican town of Puerto Limon, a "red alert" was declared, meaning authorities could forcibly remove those reluctant to leave.

"It's mostly children, women and old people," said Julio Aragon in Juigalpa, Nicaragua, 100 miles west of the Caribbean coast. He said refugees were being placed in schools and other emergency shelters. 'They're carrying everything

they can - chickens, pigs, sacks of beans and other small belong-

ings," said Aragon. Nicaraguan President Daniel Ortega, accompanied by Cuban hurricane experts, traveled to the coastal city of Bluefields and in a radio broadcast urged the population of about 60,000 to remain

At 6 p.m. EDT Friday, Joan's center was in the Caribbean Colombian island of San Andres and about 110 miles east of Bluefields, near latitude 11.8 north and longitude 82.1 west. Bluefields is 180 miles east of Managua, the capital. Maximum sustained winds were 120 mph Both Nicaragua and Costa Rica

## 'Stoned' on wine coolers

The invitation operates on two levels. The first one is for middle-aged, middle-income

Middle America from those hick-town fugitives from a Grant Wood painting who "thank you for your support," when you buy their wine cooler. Their "Lake Woebegone" guile inspires avuncular trust. You'd buy a used car from them without even kicking the tires.

The second invitation is for the cool, fingerpoppin' young dudes and chicks from Mr. Cool who is ''down and ba-a-d.'' When he sings his offer in a blues growl, counterpointing it with a few funky riffs on his harmonica, you know your main man is hooking you up with a heavy epicurean trip.

Bruce Willis' pitch on behalf of Seagram's Cooler is a variation on a theme by soul brother Ray Charles. The rustic Bartles & Jaymes characters are culturally light years away. But both television ads send a subliminal message borrowed from an old Ray Charles blues number:

You know my baby, / She won't let me in. / Got a few pennies and gon' buy myself a bottle of gin / Then I'm gon' call my buddy on the telephone / And say, let's go get stoned.

At first blush, wine coolers are cool and harmless. They're rainbow-colored, taste like fruit juice and have exotically hip names: Seagram's Natural Peach, White Mountain Orange Cooler, Matilda Bay Original Fruit Cooler, La Crox's Strawberry and 20-20's Orange & Other.

But their consumption can be lethal. Cheap wine has an 18 percent alcohol content. Wine coolers have a 5 percent alcohol content. One bottle of wine and you're drunk. Three bottles of a similar size of wine

High school and college kids are not only messin' up the man's place, they're messing up their lives by getting drunk and, in some instances, driving drunk and killing themselves or innocent people.

High school authorities are starting to mobilize against the increased availability of alcohol for teen-agers, who, in some states, can buy wine coolers in groceries, drug stores and generallise stores. Wine coolers are even packaged to resemble sodas. And they're cheap.

Assisted by Pavlovian gimmicks from Frank, Ed and Bruce, advertisers can get an early jump with their marketing strategy. That may explain why school children become inured so easily to the dangers of drinking.

Last year, a survey of 500,000 elementary school children found that 26 percent of fourth-graders think their peers have tried wine coolers. By sixth grade, the percentage rose to 42 percent. Between seventh and 12th grades, the percentage jumped to

Several surveys on college campuses since 1983 found that serious alcohol use among students remains at high levels. As many as 90 percent of the students are serious drinkers. At two major universities, 17 percent of the students identified

Ain't no harm, take a li'l nip. / But don't fall down.

If a busted lip were the only injury, feen-age drinking wouldn't be a crisis. But heavy drinking can result in deaths and ruined lives.

Hey, I'm no supporter of the temperance movement. I dig the grape and enjoy getting loose with the juice. As comedian Dusty Fletcher once observed, "I'm gon' keep drinkin' to everybody else's health until ah ruins mah own."

But there's an enormous gap between an oldster like me occasionally "gettin' stoned" and a teen-ager who hasn't even gotten started in life turning into a problem drinker.

In this season of campaigns, of faux pas and misspeaks, I have temporarily suspended my role as critic for one of sympathetic sister-in-arms: I have just given a speech

I have faced an audience of 250 well-meaning people who would not be determining my political future in a few short weeks; would not hold my destiny in their punch-styluses; would not send me home to tell my wife and kids I'd just put us \$3 million in debt and now I don't even have a job. In fact, my audience hadn't even paid to get in. All they could do if they didn't like me was to punch their neighbor. It still made me too sick to eat for three

Suddenly, forgetting the date of the Pearl Harbor attack, the nationality of the owner of a factory one is using as an illustration, or that one is no reincarnation of a national hero of a totally different political party doesn't seem so bad.

I just had to give one speech, one time. These poor candidates have been shuttling from factories to nursing homes to VFW posts for months. They did all right, considering. I had to tape-record my talk and listen to it 15 times, and I still couldn't get it

So why do I do it, you ask, if I know I'm so rotten at it? It's a legitimate question; I must have asked it 1.000 times in the last few days, standing in front of my dresser mirror, establishing eye contact with myself in a sincere-yet-competent gaze.

Trouble was, as soon as I'd get the gaze just right. the words would leave me, and there I'd be looking nto my own eyes, sincere yet competent, with my

mouth hanging open.
So why do I do it? Because when someone asks you to give a speech, it's always two or three months ahead of the appointed time. You always think two or three months is a long time, when compared to one itsy, bitsy 30-minute speech. Surely, you imagine, words of wisdom will come to you during moments of leisure, or perhaps while commuting to work. You'll take a few notes as the thoughts rush in. and a couple of nights before the speech, you'll put

Well. why shouldn't you expect that to be the case? Everybody else you've ever known seems to be giving speeches. And they make it seem so

Me: "Where you going in such a hurry?"
Toastmaster: "Oh, I'm giving a little talk for the university alumni luncheon.

Me: "Really? How do you find time to write a speech and rehearse it, with your busy schedule?' Toastmaster: "Write? Rehearse? Are you crazy? just make a little outline. underline a few key words, and wing it. Nothin' to it."

I always believe them - that is, until I'm standing up there, eyes swimming, trying to establish sincere-yet-competent eye contact, searching for just one underlined word, any underlined word, while my heart pumps all my blood at once to my

And the person wanting the speech never levels with you. What he or she really wants is for you to start off with a few great jokes, tell a few anecdotes that'll make 'em cry and hit 'em with an ending that'll bring 'em up out of their seats. What they'll tell you is, "Oh, we just want a few candid remarks; we wouldn't want you to go to any trouble

Someday I will learn, before the hour when I am listening to my own tape-recorded voice drone through my tortured prose, that I don't make speeches. There are lots of things I do well, such as play the entire Mel Bay beginning banjo book without looking. It just so happens no one asks me to

do it before a luncheon crowd. Perhaps they should.

## Democrats are likely to control both houses

WASHINGTON - The polls show George Bush headed for victory on Nov. 8, but if he wins, his coattails will be light. The Bush momentum is not strong enough, nor is the Bush persona charismatic enough, to sweep a majority of Republi-

Look for the Democrats to pick up at least four seats in the Senate and more than 10 in the House, leaving that party solidly in the driver's seat in both houses. The current mix in the House is 255 Democrats to 177 Republicans and the

Democrats have no chance of losing that overwhelming majority.

The split in the Senate is narrower - 54 Democrats to 46 Republicans. The Senate has always operated as the more conservative of the two houses of Congress. But with a few more Democrats on the roles and another Republican in the White House, the Democrats will be able to wield more control over the president - move votes to override vetoes, cut off Republican filibusters, oppose adminsitration foreign policy, block Supreme Court appointments and in general set up a state of impasse between the executive and legislative branches.

The policies most likely to be manipulated by a stronger Democratic majority in the Senate include tax hikes, increased spending on social programs, more regulation of industry and financial institutions, a higher minimum wage and expanded health insurance requirements.

Here is what the experts and pollsters are predicting for the state-by-state Senate races: the Republicans have a lock on Indiana, Missouri, Pennsylvania, Utah and Wyoming. The GOP is not a shoo-in, but still has the advantage in California, Connecticut, Delaware, Rhode Island and

Virginia and Nebraska will turn Democratic. The Democrats also have a strong chance of taking Washington, Minnesota and Nevada. Those states showing a tilt toward the Democrats are Ohio, North Dakota, New Jersey, and Montana. States that are safely in the hands of Democrats are Arizona, Hawaii, Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts, Michigan, New Mexico, New York, Tennessee, Texas and West

Open seats in Florida, Mississippi and Wisconsin are too close to call.

Mitchell is young by Senate standards, 55, and more vigorous than the 64-year-old Inouye. Mitchell won many admirers and is owed many political favors from his term as the Senate Democratic Committee chairman in 1986. Inouye left a bad taste in the mouths of some senators with his handling of the Iran-Contra committee. He may not have the confidence of his peers to lead the Senate against another four years of a conservative agenda from the White

Inouye had a better chance when Michael Dukakis was leading in the polls. The Democrats were not as concerned about the leadership of the Senate when they thought they had the leadership of the country locked up.

#### No private fleet

If the United States were drawn into a full-scale war tomorrow, it wouldn't have the ships to carry troops and supplies to the front. The military traditionally has relied on the merchant marine to pitch in with transport duties during a war. At the end of World War II, America was the largest shipbuilding power in the world and had more than 2,000 ships in the merchant marine fleet. But today, there are less than 400 and by the year 2000, experts project there will be a mere 220 merchant ships.

No privately owned ship has been built in a U.S. yard in the past year and there are no new orders in sight. The only thing keeping the shipbuilding industry afloat in America is Navy contracts. Transport specialists at the Pentagon

say America's sealift capaicty is inadequate to supply even a single-theater conflict, let alone a world war. Last year, a congressional committee recommended a number of incentives to

encourage a more viable merchant ma-

rine, but Congress has largely ignored the

#### More yen yet

Moves to deregulate the Japanese financial system may result in even more Japanese investment in the United States. For one thing, Japanese insurance companies are now allowed to put up to 5 percent of their assets in foreign investments. The old limit was 3 percent. The Japanese central bank has been lowering interest rates as American banks raise their rates. That makes it more attractive for Japanese investors to put their money

There is also the matter of the \$2.4 trillion nest egg. That is the amount Japanese depositors have in a particular type of savings account that their government has recently decided to tax. The interest rate on those accounts has been tax free for a quarter of a century. The expectation is that some of those depo tors will shop around for a better return on their savings. Common sense says a portion of that nest egg will wind up in American investments

# Smart folks, not snobbish

mhen Ruthanne Flaum's acquaintances an organization for exceptionally intelligent people, they're either impressed or insulting.

"Some friends are really awed, which makes me very uncomfortable. I don't want people to think of me as some kind of genius. said Flaum, of 7 Tracy Drive.

"But some people have very negative reactions. A lot of people think, 'Oh, the snobbish group,' or 'Oh, you're that group of eggheads." said Flaum. "Some people will come right out and say. 'I wouldn't want to be part of any exclusive group like that."

The "exclusive group" was founded in England about 35 years ago by two men looking for companionship among their intellectual equals, Flaum explained. The word mensa is Latin for table, because the group tries to be a round-table society offering



Autumn is the time to start working on next year's outdoor living season and to reduce next season's potential garden-insect and disease problems

Some landscape maintenar chores to be done include: Apply wood chips or mulches

to areas around trees, evergreens to contain weed seeds, food for rodents or obnoxious odors. Add nitrogen fertilizer, but

apply early in the season to avoid late growth subject to winter kill. Remove extended growth of ground covers that have overlapped sidewalks, driveways or

## The best thing consumers can do now is wait

Years of personal computing peace are dissolving into chaos as MS-DOS, OS-2, MCA, Macintosh and now the EISA "standards" compete for your wallet.

In 1981, there was also computing chaos, but IBM and Microsoft said. "Let there be MS-DOS."

And there was order out of chaos - millions of purchase orders as the MS-DOS operating system quickly became the busifor manufacturers of peripher-als, particularly cards, modems desktop publishing and prese tion graphics become almo-corporate culture obsession.

and disk drives, the nicest part of the standard became the common "AT bus," a system for connecting components in a computer. Computing blossomed.

But by 1987, IBM was sorely orders were addressed to "clone" computer makers, who made MS-DOS machines at least as good and often better than IBM's and almost always at a lower price. And Apple, meanwhile, with its Macintosh, was moving that computer out of the cultist ranks and into business as desktop publishing and presentation graphics become almost a

So IBM came out with OS-2 (Operating System-2) and MCA (Microchannel Architecture) to win the game by changing the rules. OS-2 with Presentation Manager, is said to look and feel a lot like a Macintosh, support multi-tasking and be able to handle much more memory than

of MS-DOS. MCA is a different scheme for connecting peripherals. It has 32-bit data-handling power, but AT-compatible peripherals won't work with it. And if clone-makers want it, they must pay IBM a licensing fee. Now nine clone makers have

EISA (Extended Industry Standard Architecture), yet another way to connect peripherals. They say their system will allow users to keep their AT boards and peripherals, run OS-2 and still be able, if desired, to use 32-bit architecture. But it won't be ready for at least six months, the 640,000-character limitation maybe a year.

Dubbed the "Gang of Nine" by the trade press, the clone makers are heavyweights: AST Research, Compaq, Epson, Hewlett-Packard, NEC, Olivetti, Tandy, Wyse, Zenith, And cooperation on competitors isn't to be taken difference.

## Striving for perfection is not perfectly normal

Social Security

QUESTION: I'm 80 years old, and I get a Social Security check for a little from a company that said I might be able to get \$4,000 per month and for a \$7 fee they would check out the possibility.

ANSWER: Letters, like this one area great concern to Social Security. In fact, they are turned over to the Post Office for investigation. You should know that this firm is not a government agency and has no affiliation with the Social Security Administration. It is a private organization and has no access to your's or anyone else's Social Security records. And, of course, the lure of \$4,000 a month in benefits is completely out of line. You should also keep in mind, that the services companies like this advertise are the same services or very similar to ones offered by Social Security for free.

QUESTION: I recently applied for Social Security disability benefits, and

turned down. I don't think this was fair, and I went to my doctor who did some additional testing. He agrees with me What steps should I take.

ANSWER: Your first course of action is to ask for a reconsideration. If your claim is denied at this stage, there are several other levels of appeals. Ask your Social Security office for complete

QUESTION: Should I report the fact that I just started receiving a VA pension to Social Security? I'm currently getting monthly SSI checks.

ANSWER: Yes, you should. Any type of additional income that you receive should be reported to Social Security right away. Your eligibility for SSI payments depends, in part, on your total income. And, if you fail to report your VA checks, you may have to pay Social Security back for SSI checks you weren't eligible to receive. Check with

your local Social Security office for nformation about how your SSI check

QUESTION: My husband owns his business and I frequently work in the office to help out. Are my wages covered under Social Security?

ANSWER: A recent change affects your coverage. Before 1988, work that a nd and wife did as an employee o his or her spouse was not covered by Social Security. But the change which became effective January 1 of this year means that the work you do for your spouse is now covered by Socia Security. Of course, you'll also be paying Social Security taxes. And you'll earning protection on your own under Social Security.

The fans of these multibillion dollar deals say they are powerful medicine for a stock market still struggling to recover from the crash of 1987.

In the absence of buying by individuals and many institutional money managers, they ask, where would the stock leveraged-buyout specialists and the traders, known as arbitragers, who follow in their wake?

What's more, they say, takeovers and buyouts are a long-term plus for the market because they reduce the supply of stock in the marketplace, giving an upward that remain available.

But more skeptical observers while acknowledging some o those points, argue that all this wheeling and dealing is contribut ing huge new amounts to an already dangerous accumulation

the market, they say, represents unhealthy speculation rather than stable, long-term investment

The mergers and acquisitions binge is nothing new, of course. Takeovers and buyouts were a dominant force in the 1982-87 bull

A similar phen curred in the 1960s, when conglomerate-building was the financial rage.

Lately, however, the game has been played on an expanded scale. In the past week alone, Philip Morris proposed an \$11.4 billion offer for Kraft and RJR Nabsico said it was considering a \$17.6 billion management buyout

If such deals can be done, analysts say, there appears to be virtually no limit to what might be attempted in the future, no company too big to be ruled out as a takeover or buyout candidate.

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) - The first person convicted of using a "virus" to sabotage computer records was sentenced Friday to seven years' probation and ordered to pay \$11,800 in restitution to the company that had fired him.

The felony conviction and sentencing of Donald Gene Burleson, 40, on state charges of harmful access to a computer could pave the way for similar prosecutions of people who use viruses, rogue' computer programs that can destroy information before they're detected, a prosecutor said

"As far as I know, it's the first case of this type in the nation," Tarrant County Assistant District Attorney Davis McCown said earlier, adding that he spent most of three years attempting to get a

Burleson was convicted Sept. 19 of the third-degree felony.

Burleson had no comment. His lawyer, Jack Beech, said he would appeal. Beech had asked for five years' probation for his client, and restitution not to exceed \$2,500. The maximum sentence would have been 10 years in prison and a

John McAfee, chairman of the Computer Virus Industry Association in Santa, Clara, Calif., said the Texas case was precedent-setting and that it's rare that people who spread computer viruses are caught

McAfee said his organization had documented about 250,000 cases of sabotage by computer

In the latest sabotage, a virus was found in programs at Seattle software manufacturer Aldus Corp., the company said Thursday. Company officials said an entire computer network within Aldus' Seattle headquarters was

McCown said the the trial last month that Burleson planted the virus to avenge his firing from USPA, an insurance company. USPA already has been awarded \$12,000 by a jury in a civil suit against Burleson.

The virus, which officials said could have caused hundreds of thousands of dollars in damage to the system, was caught and erased after it destroyed a series of payroll records.

## Ship sinks, 3 feared dead

PIRAEUS, Greece (AP) - A Greek cruise ship carrying 475 British students and teachers collided with a freighter and sank near shore Friday, officials reported. They said two Greek seamen were killed and a 14-yearold girl was feared missing.

Small hoats picked up the high school students who jumped or fell into the water from the Jupiter, a 6,300-ton cruise ship, as it sank less than a mile from Piraeus harbor, said an official with the Merchant Marine

The official, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said 64 people, including 30 students, were hospitalized with slight injuries or for shock.

A British Embassy official said that after a passenger count, a 14-year-old girl was the only person missing.

He said officials were checking to see if "she just got missed in the count .... Some of the children are sleeping, some running around in a state of post-shock




