Erosion order called 'illegal'

The developers of the \$70 million mall in Buckland filed a lawsuit Friday against the state Department of Environmental Protection, asking the court to throw out or modify a DEP order requiring erosion

control measures at the mall site. The developers charge in the complaint that the DEP abused its power in requiring the erosion control measures in a Jan. 12 order. The complaint was filed at Hartford Superior Court and received at the Manchester Town Clerk's office Friday

Named as plaintiffs in the suit are the Mall at Buckland Hills Partnership, which includes the mall developer, the Homart Development Co. of

The defendants named are the DEP, DEP Commissioner Leslie Carothers and Deputy Commissioner John W. Anderson. They are asked to file a written statement of appearance by Feb. 14. A summons was also served on Manchester Town Clerk Edward Tomkiel and Planning and Zoning Commission Chairman Alfred W. Sieffert Sr., who

were not named in the complaint. The Jan. 12 DEP order requires the developers to stop erosion at the 150-acre mall site from polluting area ponds or face fines of up to \$1,000 per day Runoff resulting from inadequate installation and maintenance of erosion control devices polluted two area watersheds, the DEP said in the order. One of the watersheds is south of Buckland Hills Drive and drains into Buggie Stowe Pond, the other is south of Interstate 84 and flows into an unnamed pond near 852 Tolland Turnpike, according to the

The DEP ordered the developers to submit an engineering plan detailing measures to stop or control pollution. The company had to submit the plan within 21 days. If that plan is rejected by the commissioner. Homart would have 15 days to submit another plan.

Homart is also required to submit a report on the effects of the runoff within the same amount of time. Jayne R. Armstrong, Homart spokeswoman, said Friday the company is complying with the DEP order. She referred all other questions on the complaint to Hartford attorneys Elizabeth C. Barton and Thomas DeMille, who represent Homart. DeMille and Barton could not be reached

Heart administrator dies awaiting heart

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) - A man who helped develop New Mexico's only heart transplant program died Friday after his own heart was stricken suddenly by a viral infection and a donor organ could not be found, officials said. Robert Shafer, 46, assistant administrator for medical staff affairs at Presbyterian Hospital, suffered the attack last week, and his condition

rapidly deteriorated. "The feeling of helplessness has gripped us all." said hospital spokeswoman Lynn Villella. "The donor program has done everything humanly

Shafer left work Jan. 19 with flu-like symptoms and was admitted to the hospital Monday. He was put on a list of transplant candidates Tuesday and placed on a heart-lung machine Wednesday after On Friday morning, his family requested he be

taken off the machine after all his organs began to deteriorate, she said. Shafer, an administrator at the hospital for 20 years, oversaw its heart program when it began in 1969 and helped direct its development since then, Ms. Villella said.

The program began transplants in 1986 and since then has done 32, plus one heart-lung transplant.

HARTFORD (AP) - Six more farms totaling 549 acres will be permanently protected from development under the state's farmland preservation program this year, as a result of funding approved Friday by the state Bond Commission.

The commission set aside \$79,000 to pay for surveys for the farms, the first step for inclusion in the program. In all, the farms will cost the state \$2.7 million and that money is to be approved at a future commission meeting this year. Agriculture Commissioner Kenneth B. Andersen said. He said the two-step approach was best because of

LaRouche gets 15-year term

ALEXANDRIA, Va. (AP) — Defiantly declaring his innocence, political cult leader Lyndon H. LaRouche Jr. was sentenced to 15 years in prison Friday for scheming to defraud the Internal Revenue Service and deliberately defaulting on more than \$30 million in loans from his supporters. Chief U.S. District Judge Albert V. Bryan also imposed lesser prison terms and fines on six LaRouche aides who were convicted last month on 35 counts of mail fraud and conspiracy for their roles in the fund-raising effort.

While Bryan was handing down the sentences in Alexandria, government prosecutors dropped all charges in a related case against LaRouche, six associates and five political organizations in U.S. District Court in Boston.

That case, involving charges that LaRouche's 1984 presidential campaign had raised more than \$2 million through credit card and loan fraud, ended in a mistrial last May. A new trial had been slated to begin Feb. 23. In a petition filed in the Boston court Friday, the

U.S. attorney's office said the criminal convictions against LaRouche and others on Dec. 16 had served the government's interests "from the point of view of both deterrence and punishment," and that further prosecution was not warranted. While about 60 followers sang, chanted and picketed outside the Alexandria courthouse, La-Rouche told Bryan in a presentencing appeal that he was the victim of a government campaign to 'eliminate me from the political scene." But the judge scoffed at such claims by LaRouche, a three-time fringe candidate for president, and the other defendants. "I reject that

as errant nonsense," Bryan said. Undaunted, LaRouche said "the vital interests of the United States have been put in jeopardy" by his trial and conviction, and that "it is time for this evil and reckless prosecution to be brought to a halt before further damage is done."

Army grounds choppers

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Army on Friday ordered its fleet of CH-47D Chinook helicopters temporarily grounded for the one-time installation of safety equipment that service officials say will help protect flight control tubes against fire. The grounding is the third in the last two months for the Chinook.

The Army said the "safety of flight message" ordering the grounding stemmed from a continuing review of accidents involving the twin-rotor chopper over the past year.

In two of those accidents that resulted in loss of life, a fire was able to spread from the rear of the aircraft to the front along a hollow tunnel that runs the length of the fuselage carrying aluminum "control tubes."

The control tubes provide the linkage between the flight controls in the cockpit and the helicopter's two



Scared to death of death

By William A. Rusher

In an article in the Journal of the American Medical Association, doctors at the Medical College of Georgia argue that the warnings of the U.S. surgeon general, printed on every cigarette pack and in every cigarette advertisement, are ineffective in bringing home the dangers of smoking. Many smokers don't even notice the warnings; many who notice them don't read them; and even those who read them often can't remember what they say.

I find myself wondering, though, whether the tobacco industry's foes aren't making some highly gratuitous assumptions about human nature. Does it follow. as the night the day, that if everybody read and absorbed the surgeon general's warnings cigarette smoking in the United States would drop to zero, or something

However much Americans may disremany of us left to whom the fact that news. Yet even Surgeon General C. Everett Koop admits that, in the 24 years since government warnings began in 1965. the percentage of adults who smoke has only declined from 40 to 29, or slightly over a quarter - a substantial reduction, to be sure, but far from sensational.

It seems to me that there are at least two additional influences at work here that prevent the surgeon general's warnings from having the impact that many officious right-minded citizens want them

For one thing, the media discovered, even before the surgeon general got on tobacco's case, that it was possible to scare the daylights out of a fair percentage of the American people simply by yelling, 'Cancer!" Have too many dental or chest

Clearly it doesn't mean that if only they didn't smoke this 17 percent of the American people would live forever. No; they will all die anyhow they will just die of something else (quite possibly even cancer) not caused by smoking.

Ah, but they will live longer! Perhaps (though also perhaps not); but, assuming they do, what necessarily is the gain? Additional golden years in the bosom of their loving families, or in retirement at one of Red Skelton's sun-kissed resorts? Or years of loneliness, illness and poverty, crawling onward in agony through their 70s, 80s or even 90s?

Each of us must make these grim calculations for himself or herself. But. once the surgeon general has set forth the facts (and he certainly has), I simply don't have the gall to try to force my fellow citizens to do as he tells them.

Boats and trucks hiding places for drugs

WASHINGTON - Anything that sails or drives into the United States, particularly from Central America or the Caribbean, is potential carrier of

When drug enforcement agents look at a boat or a truck, they don't see chrome or sails or tires. They see marijuana and cocaine.

The El Paso Intelligence Center in Texas is a federal information-gathering agency that keeps tabs on the enemy in the war on drugs, the allies various federal law enforcement agencies - count on El Paso to tell them what strategy the other side

A confidential EPIC report, which we have seen, devotes many pages and pictures to the ways in which drugs are hidden on boats and trucks. Small sailboats might conceal drugs in their buoyancy compartments, as was the case with a boat named "Pam" that authorities stopped as it was being towed from Mexico into Arizona. Border agents tapped the sides of "Pam" and instead of hearing a hollow sound, they heard a dull thud. They drilled a hole and found marijuana where dead airspace was supposed to be.

Some sailors-traffickers use watertight boxes that they strap to the hulls of their boats below the waterline. The first to discover this method were authorities in Australia, who warned American drug enforcement agents to be on the lookout for the

When it comes to trucks, marijuana traffickers favor 18-wheelers with false compartments. Inspectors use two techniques to beat dealers at this game - measuring and tapping. They measure interior and exterior walls of the truck to see if they are the same. And one inspector will tap on the outside wall of the truck, while another inspector touches the inside wall feeling for the resulting vibration. If there is no vibration, it's a sure bet that something is hidden between the inner and outer walls.

Some drug couriers like using hot-liquid-asphalt tanker trucks to carry marijuana. The pot is in front and rear compartments, and the asphalt is in the middle. The easiest method is hands-on. If the compartment isn't hot, there is something inside other than asphalt.

More clever traffickers used a propane tanker truck entering El Paso from Mexico. They rigged it so propane gas would be released from al of its valves while the truck concealed 6,240 pounds of marijuana. They were clever, but not bright. They misspelled the name of the gas company on the side of the truck.

The truck doesn't have to be an 18-wheeler. Drug traffickers customize pickup trucks for their use, too. Canadian police confiscated three trucks that had been rigged at a cost of \$9,000 with hydraulic beds. The truck beds, when lifted by a secret switch, opened up to a drug compartment.

U.S. Customs agents found false roof compartments loaded with marijuana in two camperbacks on pickup trucks at the Tecate and San Ysidro, Calif., ports of entry, giving a whole new meaning to the term recreational vehicle.

EACH DEPENDENT IS WORTH \$1950

Each dependency exemption that you are able to claim on your 1988 tax return is equivalent to a \$1,950 deduction. You are able to claim a vidual that is related to you or is a member of your household and you have provided more than half of their support during the year. For tax purposes, pets do not qualify as

Every person is allowed only one exemption. This rule prevents your child or other dependents from claiming their exemption on their tax return and then being claimed as a dependent on your tax return. There are no limits on the number of dependents that you can claim as long as each dependent satisfies all

of the five dependency tests. Relationship - Your dependent can be a relative or a member of your household. The relative can be a linear descendent (father, son, grandson), relations by blood (brothers, cousins), relations by marriage (mother-in-law), and legally adopted children. If the person is not a relative, then that individual, for the entire year, must have made your home as his princi-

Citizenship or residency - Your dependent must be a U.S. Citizen or a resident of the U.S., Canada or Support - You must have furnished

over one half of the total support of Joint Return - If the dependent is married, he or she cannot file a joint return with his or her spouse. Gross Income - Your dependent's gross income must be less than \$1,950. This rule does not apply to any child under the age of 19 or if the child is a full-time student. If you are ever in doubt, consult your tax preparer.

In its earlier days, Second Congregational Church members worked closely with North United Methodist Church members, who then gathered in the building at 447 N. Main St., now occupied by First Church of Christ Scientist. Programs for youth groups and summer religious education classes were conducted together, said Taggart. Choir members from both churches seem to have attended the same singing schools. said Irvine.

Much of this early history is difficult to piece together, Irvine explained, because there are few records. Until 1950, church members presented annual reports orally. That was the year that the church established an office and hired a secretary, Irvine said.

Fortunately, there are good membership and pastoral records, she said. The leads she gets from these records help in putting together a complete history. If the work on the history and celebration are to pay off, said Milton, the church will need to step forward into the future with the same vigor which apparently characterized its early years.




OLD TIMES - A view of the old church sanctuary will be displayed at tonight's presentation. The church known widely as the Red Church was

Bull market coming back?

NEW YORK - To the surprise of almost everybody, and the consternation of more than a few, Wall Street is starting to look as though the great bull market of the mid-1980s is back. Over the past few trading days, stock prices have staged a runaway rise on heavy volume that evokes vivid images of January two years

In the heady atmosphere that prevailed then, the Dow Jones industrial average broke 2,000 for the first time and finished the month with a

net gain of 262 points. performance this month, it will have to get even hotter than it has been in the two January sessions that remain. Some analysts think it is overdue for a breather.

Still, it has been an impressive performance, especially when you consider the uncertainty and skepticism that predominated in the financial world as the new year began. To many investors, of course, the news is

exhilarating, helping to wipe out both the dollars-and-cents losses and the unpleasant memories created by the crash in the fall of To others who had been cautiously waiting

for "better" investment opportunities, however, it has been a nasty surprise. Consider the position in which many money

managers at investing institutions such as pension funds find themselves. In the chastened atmosphere that followed the crash, they carefully marshaled cash reserves as a cushion against further trouble ahead. Thus a lot of people were underrepresented in stocks when prices took off

When your clients have suffered a drubbing in the market collapse, how are they going to take it when you tell them they missed out on the recovery?

That kind of thinking, analysts say, has prompted a rush to get into the market, and helped keep the rally going.

There have been other favorable forces as

well, including recent talk in Washington of restoring a tax break for capital gains and giving dividends better tax treatment as well. But the stocks that would benefit most directly from tax changes, the smaller issues many individual investors like to buy, haven't been the standout gainers in recent weeks. Instead, the top performers have been the blue chips and big-name technology issues that are the common currency in which the

institutions deal. In the past week the Dow Jones average of 30 blue-chip industrials jumped 87.50 points to 2,322.86 for its best weekly showing so far in the




