

Britain withdrew all its diplomats from Iran after Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini, in a religious edict issued Feb. 14, called on Moslems to seek out and kill Rushdie for insulting Islam. Iranian clerics subsequently offered bounty of \$5.2 million for the author, a British



But the proposal to establish an early curfew on parking in municipal parking lots as a means of discouraging patronage of the club — which will feature male "exotic dancers" one night a week - is open to legal

question. At the very least, it is premature. The Parking Authority, which controls the lots owned by the town or leased by the town from private owners, is prepared to ask the town attorney and the police if it would be feasible to set the parking curfew at 10 p.m. or midnight, instead of 2 a.m., the present deadline.

Phil Pavone, who plans to operate the club, has threatened to sue the town if he is deprived of the use of any of the parking spaces he feels he was given reason to believe would be available when a liquor permit was issued for the club.

There are a couple of problems with an early curfew.

For one thing, setting it too early might have an adverse effect on some downtown restaurants.

More important, if the curfew is set even before Payone's club goes into operation, the town would probably be in a bad legal position if it is sued. The town would have to defend the argument that it is a foregone conclusion that the existence of the club constitutes a public

If the town waits until after the club is in operation and finds that a problem has arisen, it will be in a better legal position to defend the imposition of a parking curfew.

But the most important consideration is whether it is legitimate at all to use regulation of public parking as a means of determining what kinds of businesses can and cannot locate downtown.

Wetlands permit approved The Planning and Zoning Commission

manimously approved a wetlands permit Monday allowing the developer of 932 apartment units off Slater Street to build a road connecting two sections of the project. The developer, the Trammell Crow Co. of Dallas, has proposed disturbing about 15,000 square feet of wetlands just south of the South Windsor town line to build a 24-foot-wide road, recommended by the Town of Manchester Fire

Department and town staff for fire safety. The road would connect 504 apartments on the west side of a wetlands area with 428 apartments on the east side. On Feb. 6, the commission unanimously approved final plans for the apartments on the west side, but the developer has been awaiting approval of the road before seeking approval of final plans. The 55-acre development is located northeast of the \$70 million Pavilions at Buckland

To build the road and utilities, Trammell Crow must remove about 700 cubic yards of native soil and put about 2,600 cubic yards of fill for the roadway on the wetlands, Senior Planner Stuart B. Popper said.




