Sirhan parole bid is rejected again

SOLEDA, Calif. (AP) - Sen. Robert F. Kennedy's assassin, Sirhan B. Sirhan, has an unpredictable chance for violence remains a threat to society, a state prison board ruled in denying him parole for the 10th time. Sirhan, 45, who is serving a life sentence for the 1968 shooting of the Democratic presidential candidate, is not eligible for parole again until next year. Board chairman David Brown on Tuesday called the shooting "one of the most shocking criminal assassinations in the history of the United States." It was "an attack not merely on an individual's life but on the political life of the country," he said. In his arguments to the panel, Sirhan argued that he has done everything officials have asked of him, has been a model prisoner, and is serving more time than most prisoners with first-degree murder convictions. Sirhan's older brother, Adel, watched the hearing along with reporters via closed circuit television at the State Correctional Training Facility in this small community 180 miles south of San Francisco.

Social Security mixup: Women share number

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) - The odds of two unrelated women sharing the same birthdate and similar names are high enough. But they are partners to another quirk: they share Social Security numbers. Elizabeth Carroll and Betty Gibson learned three weeks ago that the Social Security Administration made a freakish mistake years ago and assigned them the same number. Ms. Carroll, whose maiden name was Elizabeth Ann Smith, was the first to learn about the mixup. When she was considering buying a house, a mortgage company's printout of her credit history also contained Ms. Gibson's, who was born Betty Ann Smith. Ms. Carroll took the question to the Social Security Administration, which told her it stemmed from a clerical error in the early 1970s. Ms. Carroll called Ms. Gibson to explain.

500 British youths riot after raids for drugs

WOLVERHAMPTON, England (AP) - About 500 youths hurled gasoline bombs at police in a racially mixed district of the central English town of Wolverhampton following a drug raid in a tavern, police said. The rioters Tuesday night also threw up a makeshift barricade across a street, looted at least one store and set a local council office on fire, said Deputy Chief Constable Paul Leopold of the West Midlands police. In 1985, predominantly black and racially mixed areas of British towns and cities including Wolverhampton were swept by a wave of protests of police harassment.

Texas executes killer

HUNTSVILLE, Texas (AP) - A man was executed by injection early today for helping to rape and strangle a woman who was abducted as she awaited help in her disabled car following a New Year's Eve party in 1981. Stephen McCoy gave no final statement, although he smiled briefly to four friends he had invited as witnesses. He coughed and his chest heaved five times as the drugs began to take effect, and stopped breathing at 12:25 a.m. The 40-year-old Houston electrician was the 31st Texas convict and the 10th in the nation executed since the 1976 U.S. Supreme Court ruling allowing states to resume capital punishment. McCoy lost a final appeal late Tuesday when the court voted 5-4 against a stay. The action, which came without comment, was unusual since the appeal was McCoy's first to reach the high court. It has been routine for initial appeals to merit at least one reprieve. "The significance of this is the courts

Two murderers hanged

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) - Two white men convicted of murder were hanged today. In a separate case, two black men, including a member of the outlawed African National Congress, received reprieves to apply for a new trial. Lawyers for Human Rights, which appealed to President P.W. Botha for stays of execution, said Minister of Justice Kobie Coetsee issued stays late Tuesday for the blacks. They were convicted of killing a black policeman in February, 1986 by placing a burning tire around his neck. The lawyers' group asked for a retrial for one of the men, ANC member Sibiso Senole Masuku, 22, because, they said, new evidence had been found that state witnesses may have been forced to give false evidence against him. The other defendant given a reprieve was Oupa Josias Mbonane, 20. The two white men who were hanged at Pretoria Central Prison were convicted in separate cases of murder and robbery of white victims. One of them had not filed any appeals and had asked for his execution date to be moved up, lawyers said.

Marcos not improving

HONOLULU (AP) - Former Philippine President Ferdinand Marcos' condition is not improving and his doctors say it's a miracle he's still alive. "He's the sickest I've ever seen him," Dr. Steven Berman, an infectious disease specialist, told a news conference Tuesday. Doctors said Marcos is dependent on life-support equipment and the prospects for his survival are slim. Marcos is unable to breathe on his own and is undergoing constant kidney dialysis, they said.

Accords are threatened

WARSAW, Poland (AP) - Solidarity leader Lech Walesa today accused communist authorities of breaking a promise made in historic accords by refusing to legalize the country's independent student union. Just hours after a Warsaw court refused on Tuesday to register the Independent Students' Association, the government struck a further blow by banning a scheduled broadcast of Solidarity's election show from state television. Registration of the student union, known as NZS, and opposition access to television were both agreed to by communist authorities in the broad "round-table" agreements reached April 5 with the Solidarity-led opposition.

Researchers unite

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Massachusetts Institute of Technology has joined forces with IBM and AT&T to try to beat Japan in development of commercial uses for superconductors. The announcement by the American Telephone & Telegraph Corp., International Business Machines and MIT on Tuesday said the consortium's goal is to develop applications for the new technology. Superconductors are ceramic materials cooled to beyond minus 200 degrees Fahrenheit, at which point they can let electricity pass through them without resistance.

Cave woman is OK

CARLSBAD, N.M. (AP) - A human guinea pig says she made friends with mice and learned some English during her 130 days in an underground cave to help researchers study the effects of isolation. Stefania Pollini of Ancona, Italy, smiled and waved at reporters and well-wishers as she emerged Tuesday afternoon from Lost Cave, ending an experiment that began on Jan. 13. "Would she do it again?" "Sure," said the 27-year-old interior decorator, who volunteered for the experiment.

Most Americans are overweight

WASHINGTON (AP) - Nearly two-thirds of Americans are too fat, and more than a third are at least 10 percent over the recommended weights for their height, body build and sex, a nationwide health survey shows. The study, done for Prevention Magazine, determined that 64 percent of adults age 25 and over could stand to lose at least a few pounds. But fewer than half of those people were trying to shed the extra pounds when polled in November, the study by Louis Harris and Associates says. The percentage of overweight

Radioactive antibodies kill cancer

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) - Nuclear-tipped antibodies that seek and destroy cancer inside the body show promise of giving doctors a new way to attack tumors, researchers say. The goal is to hit cancer cells with huge doses of killer radiation. Doctors launch the attack with protein probes that hunt down the cancer deep within the body. In initial experimental use, researchers found that the strategy wiped out all detectable cancer in people who were not helped by ordinary treatment. However, far more study will be necessary before researchers know for sure whether this approach will cure cancer. The findings were presented Tuesday by Dr. Oliver W. Press of the University of Washington to the annual meeting of the American Society of Clinical Oncology. Press is one of several researchers around the country who are working with radioactive antibodies to combat cancer. However, he said, his group is using the highest doses of radiation yet tried. Antibodies are natural hunters produced by the body to find germs, cancer and other dangerous invaders.

8th voters facing more than 1 item

When voters of the Eighth Utilities District meet tonight at Waddell School for their annual meeting, the focus will be on the election of a district president.

The decision is obviously an important one that deserves the attention of as many district voters as possible. The key to the success of the town meeting form of government is wide participation. District voters should go the meeting. Furthermore, they should stay there until all the business of the meeting is completed.

Besides electing a president, the voters will elect two directors. Only the incumbents have announced their candidacies, but that does not guarantee their election. Opposing candidates can be nominated from the floor. The result of the presidential election may determine whether there will be other director candidates and who they will be.

It is possible, but unlikely, that the results of the first scheduled elections will also generate contests for the elective posts of treasurer, tax collector and clerk.

If voters leave the meeting after they feel the main business is done, they will be partially disenfranchising themselves.

There is a budget and a tax rate to be set. There are decisions to be made on construction and financing of a sewer.

And perhaps the most far-reaching decision is one that is listed at the very end of the official call to the meeting.

It involves a change in the district's future election procedures. A district committee studied those procedures, rejected obviously drastic changes and proposed what appears to be only a modest change.

But the modification proposed, if approved, would alter future election strategies. It would require candidates to declare their candidacies in advance of the meeting.

The decision to make that change, or not to make it, should not be left to a small number of voters.

Warning label wouldn't help

If you drink too much alcohol, it's bad for you. It can damage your liver and cause many other medical problems.

None of this is new — it has been known for decades. For centuries, drunkenness has not been linked with good health habits.

However, in Washington state one couple, both admitted alcoholics, are suing the James Beam company claiming their child was born mentally retarded because the wife drank one-half a fifth of Jim Beam bourbon every day.

According to the couple, Beam should pay heavily for the child's handicap because the company did not print a warning label on the bottle.

Sorry, folks, but the American passion for blaming others for misdeeds must stop somewhere. Any person drinking that much alcohol every day is not known for self-restraint. One respect of alcoholism is the loss of control over actions.

A warning label would not have stopped this woman from drinking, merely because she was pregnant. The medical dangers of alcoholism have long been known.

It is a tragedy that the child was born with the handicap. There are people to blame for that fact. Those people are the parents who drank without regard for their unborn child.

Balducci faces new challenge

Five days before he was to take the gavel for the first time as speaker of the House in Hartford, Richard Balducci of Newton stood before an empty chamber for an hour-long drill in the basics of the job.

"I just don't want to look bad," Balducci told Penn Ritter, the 10-year veteran House clerk who guided him through the precise language and parliamentary procedure he would have to master.

Balducci needsn't have worried. Although it's occurred up front from the desks he occupied during 16 years in the trenches, Balducci has not looked bad in the weeks since that day in January. In fact, he has looked very good in the job he won on opening day of the 1989 General Assembly in an unprecedented political coup.

He's looked even better off the podium and in the endless series of Democratic caucuses where his willingness to talk with colleagues and his characteristic honesty without pretense have won him high marks.

But Balducci, a former high school football coach more accustomed to winning than losing, faces a new challenge now. With only a few days left in this session, he must try to save the majority Democrats from looking bad — very bad — in the eyes of a disenchanted, angry public.

The fact is, O'Neill has been in constant touch with Democratic leaders that appear to be in the work through aides who shuttle from his office to the power pulpit there. Last week he stepped up the pace. He summoned Balducci and Senate President Pro Tem John Larson of East Hartford to his office on Tuesday.

"Much of the hostile reaction splashes over onto Democratic Gov. Bill O'Neill, who many believe will seek re-election next year. Party loyalists, Balducci knows this and is concerned about it. He realizes that the Legislature's performance can affect the governor's chances."

But that is not a unanimous concern among, primarily, House Democrats. Some have the gut feeling that he will run, and they hope they are right. Some just want him out of there and they don't care if the public blames him for the Democratic problems at the Capitol.

So if the complaint among leaders at the Capitol is that too many Democratic colleagues have their backs to the wall in the way of progress, it's probably more than that. The hidden agenda up there this year is one to grease the skids for Bill O'Neill.

Drug war daily risk for narcs

WASHINGTON — In a land crippled by drugs and terrorized by dealers, Americans have only the police standing between them and armed street punks. Narcotics officers risk their lives daily in Beirut-like neighborhoods where crack is the biggest cash product and human life is the down payment.

The enemy is without compassion. It is no exaggeration to say that many would just as soon kill a person as swat a fly.

Some of the drug fighters operate undercover and must remain nameless due to the constant danger of discovery. Many have been killed in action and their stories can be told only by their survivors. They can be recognized only like Officer Robert Yaquero.

Because the drug scourge has spread from the big cities to the smaller towns of America, Yaquero went underground in Redlands, Calif. He grew his disguise — long black hair with a moustache and beard to match. He even pierced his ears for the right effect.

Yaquero left his wife and two young boys safely in Texas while he posed 24 hours a day as a drug-dealing outlaw biker on the prowl in and around Redlands. He took on the look, the lingo and the swagger of the biker.

A methamphetamine dealer, high on his own product, aimed a rifle at Yaquero and threatened to pull the trigger during a drug buy in a Yucapita motel. Everyone in the room scrambled for safety except the target, Yaquero, who stood his ground and coolly talked the addict into putting the gun down.

Another time, Yaquero was riding with a dangerous drug dealer in a desolate area outside Mentone when the war dealer suddenly drew a 38 revolver and accused Yaquero of being a narc. Again, the officer talked his way out of a fix.

A heroin dealer tried to make Yaquero inject drugs as proof that he wasn't a cop. The officer put on another convincing performance and satisfied the dealer without injecting the drug.

In his undercover role, Yaquero put his life on the line without the usual support of backup officers. Only 10 people knew his true identity, and he was repeatedly routed by local police.

All told, Yaquero spent nine harrowing months living by his wits and courage before he was arrested and shaved his beard and put on a police uniform. He had made more than 200 narcotics buys which led to the arrest of 75 dealers.

His experience was typical of the thousands of anonymous drugbusters who are fighting a guerrilla war against drug gangs.

They are quick to identify their No. 1 enemy — not the street dealer with a gun, but the drug user whose money finances the killing.

The drugbusters have another enemy — bureaucrats who squander the money that Congress has appropriated to combat drugs. That money is desperately needed by the combatants — a mix of people and firepower to battle the multimillion-dollar cocaine cartels. But the bureaucrats keep much of the money to "study" the drug problem. Ask the officers on the street. They will tell you they don't need another survey. They need weapons and numbers to match the drug dealers.

Footnote: The National Association of Police Chiefs has established a drug task force which is helping us single out the heroes of the drug war. We will occasionally tell their stories.

Pioneer labors with 1 unit left

Pioneer Systems Inc. is struggling to maintain its commercial products subsidiary, the only remaining business of the financially troubled company that sold the operating assets of its aerospace defense group last year.

Without additional capital, Pioneer should have adequate resources to carry it through 1989, the report said.

But the company's fate "largely depends on its subsidiary being able to obtain successful operations," the report said.

Pioneer hopes to restructure the subsidiary and is seeking additional working capital to cover materials needed for shipments of the subsidiary's backlog but has not gotten a commitment from its principal lender, the report said.

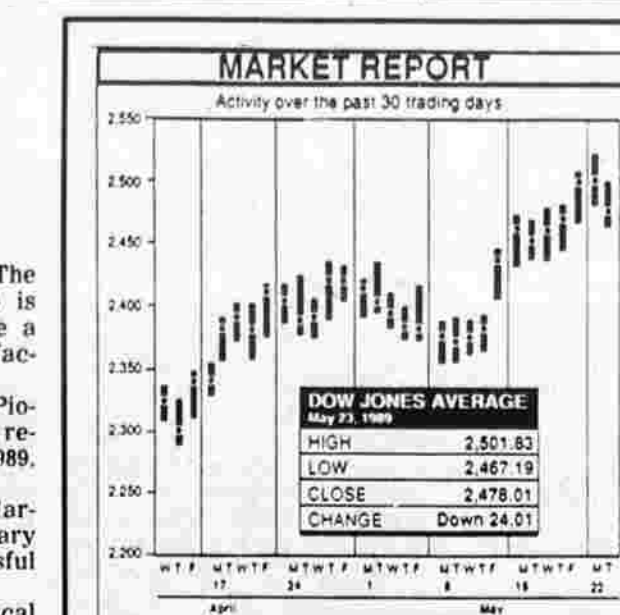

The companies were banned from discussing the case in public by an order from U.S. Bankruptcy Court in New York last month, said Barry Alperin, executive vice president of Hasbro Inc.

The deal, expected to be announced today, would strengthen Hasbro's position. It would add such well-known Coleco items as Cabbage Patch Kids and Scrabble and Parcheesi board games to its product lines.

While many details are unknown, sources told The Courant that the deal would provide that: ■ Much of Coleco would be sold to Hasbro, the world's largest toy company. It could not be determined whether Pawtucket, R.I.-based Hasbro would buy all of Coleco, or just most of the company's assets. If Coleco is sold, it would end 57 years as an independent company.

■ Coleco's committee of unsecured creditors would drop its \$71 million lawsuit against the company's largest creditors, New York businessmen Isaac Perlmutter and Bernard Marden.

■ Perlmutter and Marden, in turn, would reduce their \$80 million claim against Coleco. The amount of the reduction could not be determined Monday.

The lawsuit contends that Perlmutter and Marden, who are secured creditors, cheated Coleco out of millions of dollars through a complex scheme of trading television advertising time for products.

The deal would be a victory for Coleco's unsecured creditors, because a reduced claim by Perlmutter and Marden means more money would be available to repay them. Coleco had debts of \$540 million when it filed for bankruptcy in July.

Coleco grew to be one of the nation's largest toy companies during the past decade, propelled in large part by its Cabbage Patch Kids dolls.

But demand for the dolls dropped beginning in 1986 and Coleco was not successful at introducing new products to make up for the lost sales. The company sought Bankruptcy Court protection last year.

Coleco filed its first reorganization plan in late January, detailing how it planned to repay creditors. But that proposal immediately was rejected by the creditors' committee, which said it provided inadequate payment and appeared to favor Perlmutter and Marden's interests over the committee's.

The plan would have given Perlmutter and Marden 55 percent of the stock of a reorganized Coleco and a note for \$40 million in cash. Creditors would have received about 36 percent of Coleco stock and no cash, a plan they voted against 5 cents for every \$1 they are owed.

In March, Coleco said it was considering selling the company outright to resolve its financial problems.

A few weeks later, however, the company reversed itself and said it would instead propose a new reorganization plan offering a larger repayment to creditors, consisting of about 10 cents for every \$1 of debt, plus 37 percent of Coleco's stock.

Ethan Allen in local hands after months of negotiations

DANBURY (AP) — The Ethan Allen furniture company has been purchased by local managers and Smith Barney Inc., the St. Louis-based company which bought the nationwide chain in 1980.

The buyers, calling themselves the Green Mountain Holding Corp. — after the Green Mountain Boys, the Vermont soldiers led by the original Ethan Allen in the American Revolution — bought the company from Interco late Monday for \$357 million in cash and other considerations.

Patrick Kathwari, chairman of both the old and new Ethan Allen Inc., said he was relieved the months of negotiations have ended.

"The uncertainty is over, so we can concentrate on continuing to strengthen and build our business," Kathwari said Tuesday.

To finance the transaction, the institution Lee DeForest was born in Council Bluffs, Iowa.

Old newspaper glut is costly to towns

High landfill dumping fees and a glut of old newspapers have forced some towns to actually pay haulers to take old newspapers away for recycling.

But Manchester is one of the lucky towns that's getting money for its old papers.

Local recycling firms agree that the market for old newspapers is not a good one. That could mean less money in the future for Manchester, which instituted a pilot curbside recycling program last year.

The price paid depends on whether the papers are hauled away by Lydall & Foulds or the town delivers them to the company, he said.

"We got the contracts approved before the (paper) markets turned over. Now when we go out to bid, we'll probably see a subtle change," O'Connor said.

O'Connor would not speculate on whether the town would end up paying rather than getting paid, to have the paper hauled away.

He thinks the current contract with Lydall & Foulds ends in October.

Coventry has a committee studying recycling, said Joan Lewis, chairman of the Coventry Town Council. She said she thinks that the possibility of paying for removal of recyclables has been one of the questions raised.

Officials in Bolton and Andover could not be reached for comment this morning. Two Manchester recyclers confirmed that lack of markets for old papers is a problem. They said that the market for higher grade, office paper is better.

Stanley Ostrinsky, president of Ostrinsky Inc., 731 Parker St., said that his company is charging towns \$20 per ton to take newspapers. In addition, the company charges \$175 per month for use of a container and \$100 for every time the container is taken away, he said.

He said high landfill fees make it worthwhile for many communities to take newspapers to paper mills, even if they have to pay for it.

"They're willing to pay to get rid of it because they have no place to dump it," he said.

Ostrinsky said that recyclers like himself are the middle men, and the paper mills are the ones that are benefiting. He said mills used to pay \$50 per ton for newspapers and are now paying \$8 to \$15 per ton.

David J. Squillante, general manager of Recycled Fibers of Connecticut, 260 Tolland Turnpike, said his company really doesn't deal in newspapers because it's not profitable. He said buyers of newspapers are now paying less than \$15 per ton.

Poliner calls Hickey a hack

HARTFORD (AP) — State Republican Chairman Robert S. Poliner says Democratic Gov. William A. O'Neill is putting the Lottery Chief J. Blaine Lewis "on the fast track to dismissal" for no valid reason.

Lewis, lottery director for the past eight years, faces a disciplinary hearing today for refusing to implement changes in the state's Lotto game as ordered by William V. Hickey, the new executive director of the Division of Special Revenue.

"Governor O'Neill would rather listen to a political appointee who has been on the job for 16 days rather than the professional who has successfully run the Connecticut lottery for... years," Poliner said at a state Capitol news conference.

Poliner maintains that Hickey is following orders from the state treasury. Lewis maintains that the state's current structure is best for a state the size of Connecticut and says it is the most successful game per capita in the world.

Lewis' troubles began a year ago when the state switched computer companies running the lottery. Lewis opposed the move and didn't hesitate to say so publicly. The changeover resulted in widespread malfunctions that shut down the entire system for hours at a time and Lewis had a field day with it.

He was slapped with a media gag order by then-Director Orlando P. Ragazzi that wasn't lifted until January.

He was also held responsible for sagging Lotto sales through 1988.

MIDDLETOWN — If past history holds to form, then East Catholic is in position to capture its first All Connecticut Conference baseball championship. The Eagles were relegated to the third spot in the ACC Tuesday afternoon as it dropped a 3-1 verdict to Xavier High at Fat Kidney Field.

Notre Dame, a 7-6 winner over Fairfield Prep, earned the No. 1 spot in the ACC and will sit back and wait for its opponent in Friday's championship game. East, 6-4 in the ACC, and Prep, 7-3, are scheduled to meet tonight at 7 at Palmer Field in Middletown. If it's washed out, the game will be played Thursday at Palmer at 2:30 p.m.

Notre Dame, 7-3, earned the top spot on the basis of sweeping Prep in the regular season. "The last two years the team that has come out of the third seed has won it all, and that was Notre Dame," East Coach Jim Penders said. "I'm just happy to be in a position to play for the championship."

East and Prep split during the regular season. East was the first of a split doubleheader for Xavier Tuesday. The Falcons later beat Middletown, 5-2. The first one, though, was the big one for the Falcons as the win qualified them for the state tournament. "I know they (Xavier) didn't want to wait until the second game to qualify for the tournament," Penders said.

Each club scored a run in the second. East, 1-0, scored as Marc Mangialico singled, stole second and scored on Jimmy Robinson's RBI single. Those were two of East's four safeties. "We didn't hit the ball. We're back to one-run production," Penders said.

Xavier won it in the fifth. Joe Arecco drew a one-out walk and Mike Kiefer singled him to third. Eagle third baseman Paul Spelman made a fantastic stop of a shot by Chris Thomas, and pegged to catcher Jimmy Penders for the second out of the inning. But a Todd Anderson grounder that was scooped and a runner scored for a 2-1 reading. And a second miscue at third made it the 3-1 final.

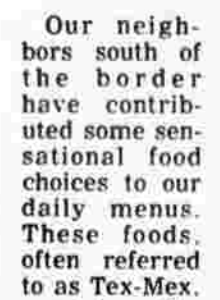
"If we hit, we wouldn't be under so much pressure (defensively)," Penders said. "We did make some real nice plays in the field."

Taco salad
1 pound ground beef, crumbled
1 medium onion, chopped
1 can (15 ounces) kidney beans, drained
1/2 cup water
1 package (1 1/2 ounces) taco seasoning mix
1/2 medium head of lettuce, torn into bite-size pieces
2 medium tomatoes, cut into chunks
1/2 cup shredded Cheddar cheese
1/2 cup shredded Monterey Jack cheese
1 cup broken corn chips
Place the ground beef and onion in a microwave-safe plastic or rubber collander. Place collander in a 2-quart casserole; cover the collander. Newsletter lists top food wineries
NEW YORK (AP) — The Wine & Food Companion has named Maddalena Vineyard, Domaine Laurier, Dupe and several other relatively unknown wineries to its list of top 10 California "food wineries."
Publishers David Rosengarten and Joshua Wesson tasted wines from hundreds of California wineries. Their goal, they said, was to identify wineries that consumers could rely on to produce "food friendly" wines regardless of vintage, varietal content or other variables.

Bottle taco sauce
