Christians heed call for truce

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) - The leader of Lebanon's Christian forces immediate halt in fighting with Syrian and allied Moslem troops, a spokesman said today.

The Christian army commander, Gen. Michel Aoun, said he will accept the truce called for Tuesday by the U.N. Security Council. "The general welcomes without any conditions the U.N. Security Council resolution," said an Aoun spokesman, who de-

manded anonymity. Aoun's statement was issued one day after the Syrian army and allied Moslem factions vowed to join forces to defeat the Christians. Sources today reported a buildup of troops and ammunition around the embattled Christian heartland.

There was no reaction to the U.N. cease-fire demand from rival Syrian Council had called for the truce during an emergency meeting ordered by Secretary-General Javier Perez de

The 15-nation council unanimously passed a declaration that "urgently appeals to all the parties to put an immediate end to all operations and to all firing and all shelling on land and at sea," said Algerian Ambassador Hocine Djoudi, president of the body. Arab League ministers also renewed their call for an end to the fighting. Arab League committee members King Hassan II of Morocco. King Fahd Bin Abdul-Aziz Saud o Saudi Arabia and Algerian President Chadli Benjedid called in a statement for "an immediate and global"

Police said 19 people had been killed and 104 wounded in the fighting since Tuesday, when Christian forces fought Syrian troops with tanks and artillery along the southern, eastern and northern edges of the Christian enclave north of Beirut

Syrian gunners also pounded the 28-mile-long Christian coastline, the only escape route for the area's residents.

By police count, 760 people have been killed and 2,050 wounded since the latest round of fighting in Lebanon's civil war began March 8. Since then, shelling day and night has largely destroyed Beirut.





WATERTOWN (AP) - Local residents had to wring themselves out from a rainstorm that dumped up to four inches in a little more than hour inundating basements, roads and

Watertown officials said the town's drainage system was unable to handle the cloud burst at 4:45 p.m. Monday, which caused flooding at a local shopping center that forced town workers to erect a wall of sand bags near a bank to stem

The storm late Monday afternoon was the most recent in a series of downpours that soaked the state with between 4 and 8 inches over the weekend causing some minor flooding and numerous traffic accidents that snarled



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
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

Persuasion needed for town hall

Manchester voters will probably be asked in the November election to approve a large bond issue to finance long-overdue additions to the Municipal Building and to Lincoln

A \$16.5 million estimate has been put on what is apparently the least expensive of several alternatives to providing the spaces needed for municipal operations.

For many years, the town goverment shuffled its offices around from place to place and built and rebuilt somewhat awkward extensions to offices. In recent months, more drastic solutions have been explored, including the possibility of building a new town hall on the fringes of Center Springs Park and the possibility of abandoning the traditional civic center of town entirely and putting a new town hall elsewhere.

An architectural firm hired by the town to study various alternatives has concluded that additions to the two buildings that now house most town offices is the least expensive alternative, at a \$16.5 million estimate.

The cost is high, but it will not get any lower as time goes on. Voters will not jump at the chance to spend the money. Few citizens have enough direct

contact with town office operations to appreciate the inconvienience and lack of efficiency that springs from overcrowding and bad logistics. For most citizens, expanded town offices will not bring the kind of personal gratifications that come from improved

roads, parks, schools, and recreational facilities or the obvious economic benefits that come from industrial parks. If the project is to win public approval, the Republican and Democratic parties will have to agree on what needs to be done and support

People will have to be convinced that the neasures are well planned and will provide efficient and adequate space well into the

Most of all they will have to be persuaded that the expansions will not include luxuries such as those that have produced so much criticism of the state's new Legislative Office







WASHINGTON (AP) - Kitty Kelley, the biographer whose unauthorized life stories of Jackie Onassis and Frank Sinatra set their subjects seething, is a target of a \$50 million lawsuit from syndicated gossip columnist Karen Feld.

In the suit filed Tuesday in District of Columbia Superior Court, Feld alleged that Kelley and Time Inc. photographer Stanley Tretick tried to drive her out of business by threatening to file a lawsuit of their own. The action allegedly resulted in Feld losing her syndicated column at The Washington Times. In June, Feld wrote a column saying Kelley appeared at the funeral of the daughter of former Reagan aide Lyn Nofziger "disguised as one of the bereaved." The article speculated that Kelley, who is writing a biography of Nancy Reagan, attended only to get access to Reagan insiders. Kelley told Washingtonian Magazine she had been invited by the Nofzigers, who confirmed the invitation, and threatened to sue Feld. That

Jozwiak reported the decision after returning to parliament from a meeting at Belevedere Palace attended by Jaruzelski; Walesa, the leader of the Solidarity labor movement: and other members of a new opposition coalition.

Walesa said Prime Minister Czeslaw Kiszczak, the Communist leader who was unable to form a coalition government, had resigned. "There will be a communique on the radio about the resignation being presented," Walesa told reporters, who mobbed him after he left the meeting and returned

Asked how the meeting had gone, he replied, Good." Walesa said he would leave it to the state-run media to announce what Jaruzelski had

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. trade deficit improved dramatically in June to \$8.17 billion, the smallest imbalance since December 1984, government said today. The Commerce Department said the June deficit

represented a sharp 18.9 percent improvement ove a revised May deficit of \$10.08 billion. The improvement came from a 1.5 percent increase in U.S. exports, which pushed them to a record level of \$30.91 billion, and a 3.6 percent drop in imports, which fell to \$39.08 billion. The trade deficit is the difference between imports and

Economists had been looking for the deficit to narrow, but not by as large a margin as actually occurred. However, analysts said the figures did not change their overall prediction that the country's trade improvement is in danger of stalling out. Many economists are predicting that the deficits will begin rising in the second half of the year as American exports suffer from the rising value of the dollar. A higher dollar makes U.S. goods more expensive on overseas markets. "We are looking for a substantial widening in the
