Palme verdict dismissed

STOCKHOLM, Sweden (AP) -An appeals court today threw out the conviction of a 42-year-old career criminal accused of fatally shooting Prime Minister Olof Palme three years ago, the national TT news agency reported.

The Svea Court of Appeals ruled that there was not enough evidence to show that Christer Pettersson stalked and killed Palme as the popular Swedish leader walked out of a movie theater with his wife Feb. The decision is the culmination of a sensational case that authorities

have been accused of bungling since its inception. Police for a year pursued a series of vastly different conspiracy theories before prosecuting Pettersson, a drug and alcohol abuser with a long and varied criminal record. Pettersson was convicted in July even though no motive was ever es-

ablished, no weapon was found and

no witnesses testified to seeing the Swede fire five shots at the dynamic eader on a darkened street. Pettersson has been jailed since December and was to be freed immediately, Erik Hansson, an administrative official of the Svea Court of Appeals, was quoted by the news agency as saying.

Pettersson's three-week appeal hearing was presided over by a jury of three laymen and four professional jurors. The hearing ended The court had set Nov. 2 for an

nouncing its verdict, but TT said the jury concluded in only three days that "the investigation into the case was insufficient for a conviction." It quoted Hansson as saying th decision was unanimous. The written verdict will be released Nov. 2. The conviction by a tribunal of six laymen and two professional judges was based largely on the identification of Pettersson by Palme's widow, Lisbeth Palme, who was walking home with her husband when he was shot from behind at

It seemed simple enough. A firefighter tells a reporter about his involvement in an effort to help a woman deliver a baby.

It's the kind of stuff that makes for what we in the media would call great copy. For Joseph Carilli, a Coventry firefighter, it was a costly tale.

Carilli was suspended Oct. 3 for 45 days for violating a department rule that prohibits anyone but the fire chief or the president of the fire association from communicating to the press.

On Tuesday night, the Board of Appeals for the South Coventry Volunteer Fire Department revoked the suspension, voting instead to put a letter of reprimand in Carilli's file. The board made a

Carilli may have violated a departmental rule, but a 45-day suspension seemed too high a price to pay for sharing a little bit of good news.

The question still remains as to whether the departmental rule is an abrogation of the firefighter's constitutional right to free speech.

It is small wonder that the case has attracted the attention of the Connecticut Civil Liberties Union. By Robert Wagman It would be easy for us to derogate any regulation which interferes with the right to freedom of speech. After all, freedom of speech is the foundation of a free press.

Estimates are not prepared for every state because "Hispanies are not well spread out throughout the United States," Del Pinal said.



The titles have been divided fairly evenly - seven NBA titles, six Super Bowl victories and, counting this year, seven World Series cham-





#### **Heist victims** get counseling

Employees at a Main Street credit union robbed at gunpoint by two masked men Wednesday will get counseling to help deal with the trauma, the credit union president said today.

Meanwhile, police said Thursday they recovered on Spruce street the 1986 Toyota Corolla believed used by the robbers. The FBI has linked the robbery of the Northeast School Employees Federal Credit Union at 233 Main St. to a series of similar heists that have taken place in the greater Hartford area. Patrick Kelly, the president of the credit union, said that a counselor from Child and Family Services met with employees Thursday afternoon. He said the employees, who were forced to lie down on the floor during the crime, may need help coping. "Just the fear of a repeat is the worst part about

it," Kelly said. There were eight employees in the bank at the time of the robbery and one customer, police said. The robbers got away with more than \$100,000. Although police first reported the take at \$107,000, Kelly has said that figure was inaccurate. However, without disclosing the correct figure, he said Thursday that the \$107,000 amount was close. He was not in the building when the robbery oc-
