Filipino rebels won't quit

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — President Corazon Aquino urged Filipinos at a rally Friday to unite against those who would "destroy our democracy," while 350 miles away, the last army mutineers still held a major air base.

To a crowd of more than 100,000 people, Mrs. Aquino said she would not relinquish her office to Vice President Salvador Laurel, who was elected on her ticket but has become a political rival. He has suggested they both resign and call new elec-

Mrs. Aquino also pleged to investigate whether opposition Sen, Juan Ponce Enrile was involved in the military coup attempt that began "He cannot wait to be president,"

Mrs. she said of Laurel. "I will never give up this position to him." In Cebu City, 350 miles south of Manila, 400 rebels refused to surrender Mactan Air Base, the last garrison known to be in rebel hands. At least 83 people were killed and more than 580 wounded in the coup attempt. It was the sixth and bloodiest since Mrs. Aquino was swept into office in February 1986 by a "people power" revolution that forced Ferdinand E. Marcos, who had ruled the Philippines for 20 years, into exile.

The president spoke to a rally on the site where hundreds of thousands of Filipinos filled the streets in 1986 so tanks could not

Day-care death nets probation

WEST HARTFORD (AP) - A Bloomfield daycare center operator where a 3-year-old child died this August was granted two years probation Friday on charges stemming from the child's death. Carrie Allison, 57, had been charged with risk of injury to a minor in the death of Ebony Skinner, who died of hyperthermia Aug. 4 after being left alone in

Allison's car in sweltering heat. Superior Court Judge Allen W. Smith also ordered Allison to pay \$5,000 in restitution to the child's family, but the child's mother was still angry. The mother, Melanie Hughes, said Friday's decision was "a mockery of justice."
"I liken it to Jim Bakker," she said. "Jim Bakker

has gotten 45 years in jail and he didn't even cause anybody to die. She caused somebody to die and gets a slap on the hand and gets let go." Allison had faced up to 10 years and a fine of

\$500. But the judge ruled that she is not likely to commit additional crimes and granted her a special form of probation available only to first-time of-"I'll never get over it," Allison, who pleaded inocent to the charge, said in court Friday. "We don't

know why tragedies happen." The judge told Hughes, "I can't bring your child back," but said some form of retribution was called for, and ordered Allison to pay \$5,000 to the family. Ebony's death was the first fatality recorded in the 38 years the state has been regulating family day care, said Donna Jolly, spokeswoman for the Depart-

ment of Human Resources. The day after the girl died, the department revoked Allison's registration as a "family day care home." There are 4,900 such homes in the state, each limited to caring for no more than six children.

Vote invalid on Bolton moratorium

BOLTON - The Zoning Commission violated the state's open meeting law when it voted to approve a building moratorium Thursday and will have to vote again on the matter, Chairman Mark Johnson says. Johnson said Friday that the commission should have posted the meeting Thursday as a public meeting before taking the vote. The commission had held the meeting in private, saying its purpose was to negotiate with several firms interested in reviewing

the town's zoning bylaws. The state's open meeting law allows private meetings for personnel search committees and for full ommissions under several circumstances. The meeting Thursday does not appear to meet any of those circumstances for which a public board can meet in

Johnson said he still expects the moratorium to go into effect on Jan. 1. He said the delay in the vote approval will not affect the starting date because the moratorium will officially be voted upon at the commission's regularly scheduled meeting on Dec. 20 in the Community Hall.

He blamed the violation of the law on himself. He said that in his haste to enact the moratorium, he did

The commission on Thursday also selected Design Professionals of South Windsor to do the revisions. The other firms that were interviewed Thursday were IEP of New Fairfield and the Vernon law firm

of Kahan, Kerensky, Capossela, Levine & Breslau. Another firm, Clough, Harbour and Associates of Rocky Hill was eliminated from consideration at the Nov. 21 meeting of the commission. At recent commission meetings, there had been

concern over the length of the moratorium. First Selectman Robert Morra said recently that a ninemonth moratorium would effectively stop new development without approved plans for a year and a half because construction stops during the winter. At the Nov. 21 meeting, the commission decided not to enact the moratorium, or specify its length, until speaking with the selected firm to see how much time would be needed to review the regula-

Johnson said Friday that all three firms interviewed on Thursday said they would need a minimum of six months just to review and partially revise the regulations. After the revisions are done, Johnson said the commission must send a copy to the Capitol Region Council of Governments for comments and also hold a public hearing. The public hearing must be no sooner than 35 days after the copy of revisions is sent to CRCOG.

Johnson said that if no further revisions to the regulations are necessary after the public hearing, the commission could vote to enact them immediately, and then the moratorium would be ended early. However, he said that if many people have similar concerns over certain regulations, then subsequent revisions would require a second public hearing.

Johnson said the moratorium "is not to exceed nine months." He said that during the process, the commission will work closely with Design Professionals, as well as with the town selectmen, Planning Commission, and the Zoning Board of Appeals, to be certain that the revisions are in keeping with the Town







European leaders agree on economic and monetary union

STRASBOURG, France (AP) - Leaders of the 12-nation European Community, closing ranks amid upheaval in Eastern Europe, agreed Friday to press ahead with an economic and monetary union despite British opposition.

The decision, on the opening day of a two-day summit, means the EC will convene a special conference in December 1990 to start negotiations for the adoption of a single currency and to set up a system of central banks.

The agreement came after France and West Germany overrode objections by British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher that radical monetary integration will rob member countries of sovereign rights to decide national economic policy. In another blow to Mrs. Thatcher, the leaders agreed — with her alone dissenting — to adopt a non-binding "social charter" setting out com-

munity-wide rights for labor unions, wages and welfare. Over dinner, the leaders considered a draft political declaration that called for "intensified" political dialogue and cooperation with the Soviet Union and other reform-minded nations of Eastern Europe. West German Chancellor Helmut Kohl, West German sources said, also hoped to insert a clause expressing support for German reunification.

Sitting ducks can fight back

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) - Earth is wracked by quakes, floods, slides, storms and volcanoes - not to mention an occasional 100,000-megaton whack from an asteroid. But sitting ducks can fight back, geophysicists

As the American Geophysical Union ended its fiveday fall meeting, suggestions for reducing death and destruction from natural hazards included requiring tornado shelters in mobile home parks, planning land use to avoid quake and slide damage, and steering incoming asteroids away from Earth.

An asteroid two-thirds of a mile wide hits Earth about every 300,000 years, and today it could kill more than half Earth's population because of climate and direct effects of a blast equal to 7.7 million Hiroshima-sized atomic bombs, said Clark Chapman of the Planetary Science Institute in Tucson, Ariz., and David Morrison,

of NASA's Ames Research Center in Mountain View. Conservatively assuming a 50-year human lifespan that means any person has about a one-in-6,000 chance of being killed by an asteroid during their lifetime, compared with an American's one-in-20,000 chance of dying on a plane crash or one-in-50,000 chance of being killed by a tornado, said the pair, who wrote the book "Cosmic

"This is, in fact, a real hazard," Chapman said. "We're in a shooting gallery." Even a small asteroid impact "could be mistaken for a nuclear attack," he said. "It might trigger a nuclear at-

jolly old St. Nicholas and she's going to stay home from school for the rest of the year to protest her right to that belief, her mother said Friday. Cherish's teacher violated the girl's rights when the teacher took the student aside this week and asked her to keep her skepticism about Santa Claus to herself, said

"I'm going to home-school her," the mother said. "The children were discovering that not everybody thinks alike. That is a fact of life." Mrs. Stutts said Cherish told other students that Santa

Claus wasn't real, the teacher overheard it and asked the girl not to say such things. But Principal Graydon Axtell said the teacher talked to the girl only after several crying classmates told her about Cherish's opinions. Axtell said he stands by the teacher's actions. Parents

should decide whether their children believe in Santa Claus or not, he said. "I even believe in Santa, for crying out loud," Axtell said. "Here (students) are all exicted about St. Nicholas and here is a little girl coming along and saying there is Mrs. Stutts said her daughter has never believed in

Cherish came home hurt and confused when those beliefs were questioned, the mother said. "Her feelings were like, 'What did I do wrong?' 



Jobless rate hints economy near recession

WASHINGTON (AP) - Unemployment climbed to a 10-month high of 5.4 percent in November and manufacturing payrolls shrunk for the eighth consecutive month, the government said Friday in a report many analysts said showed the economy was flirting with recession.

The increase in the civilian jobless rate from 5.3 percent to 5.4 percent came despite the addition of 210,000 non-farm jobs last month because of a big jump in the number of Americans looking for work. The stock market reacted favorably to the data, taking evidence of sluggishness as an indication the Federal Reserve would seek to spur the economy by easing its hold on credit before the end of the year, thus lowering interest rates.

The 210,000 new non-farm jobs reported by the Labor Department was in itself a moderately strong number, but the government also sharply cut its job growth figures for October from 233,000 to 93,000. That brought the average month-to-month job gain for the second half of the year to about 160,000 - well off the average monthly gain of 270,000 for the previous 21/2 years. All of the new jobs have been in the service side of the economy; manufacturing employment is down 165,000 since

"What it means is the economy is weaker than we had previously thought," said Elliott Platt, a senior vice president at Donaldson, Lufkin & Jenrette Securities Corp. "We're not in a recession yet but we're perilously close in this quarter and probably going to be perilously close in the first quarter next year."

Indeed, chief economist Allen Sinai at Boston Co. Economic Advisers said the economy might already be in recession and at best was "near and certainly headed" for one.

They and others predicted the Fed would relax its credit policy, but not all analysts shared that view. "The economy is kind of moving along in second gear," said Michael Evans, head of a Washington forecasting firm. "It's not very weak and it's not very strong. I don't think these numbers suggest

The unemployment rate has not been 5.4 percent since January. The increase came despite the job growth because the civilian labor force - those looking for work and those with jobs - grew b 410,000 to 124.5 million, with 117.7 million of them holding jobs.

The Labor Department said the huge revision of the October job-growth figure stemmed from overestimating the number of teaching and other school jobs added this fall. That revision contributed to the reported decline in the number of local governmen jobs last month.

Elsewhere in the service sector, which has been carrying the economy, wholesale and retail trade posted gains of 18,000 and 33,000 jobs, respectively, health services added 40,000 positions and business services added 13,000 positions. Employment in business services dipped in October and many analysts interpreted the only modest rebound in November as evidence that

demand for temporary workers, janitorial and other services might be slipping because of the manufacturing slump. The department said manufacturing employment was down 27,000 in November - with all but 3,000 of the decline coming in the durable-goods sector. The biggest problem area there is in automobile manufacturing, which lost 15,000 jobs last month after losing 10,000 in October.

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Army is planning to stop buying M-1 tanks after 1992, a move that threatens the 4,500 workers at Textron Lycoming in Stratford, Conn.

The plan, outlined in this week's issue of Defense Week, a military industry journal, is part of Defense Secretary Richard Cheney's program of military spending reductions. Textron spokesman Lou Savenelli said Friday the engine manufacturer is trying to shift to civilian sectors of the industry but is bracing for the possibility of layoffs. "Loss of the M-1 would certainly have a major impact on the division. It is something that we're all

concerned about," Savenelli said. Between 60 percent and 65 percent of the production at the Stratford plant is defense-related, according to Savenelli. And while the company is taking a wait-and-see posture on the defense budget, layoffs would almost certainly be part of the response by Textron management to a severe cut in M-1 orders, he said.

"They're looking at our entire employment picture," Savenelli said. "I think it's something all of us in defense are going to have to face." An Army spokesman said last week that the M-1's future was under review but that 603 tanks

Focus/Movies 'Steel Magnolias' is a rare movie By Bob Thomas

"Steel Magnolias" deserves applause if only for the enterprise of producer Ray Stark in assembling the biggest all-star cast since "The Towering Inferno." The film can be admired for other reasons. It is that rare achievement: a comedy and tear-jerker that

The secret is in the lead characters, all six of them beautifully written and superbly played. The movie adds new meaning to the term "ensemble

Robert Harling's play, "Steel Magnolias," which takes place in a small-town beauty salon, has been a hit across the nation. His movie script allows the women to escape the rinsing sinks and hair dryers. We see their homes and husbands and partake in the rituals of a Southern hamlet.

The salon remains the focus of the story, That's where Dolly Parton presides, applying her folk wisdom to her customers' troubles. She is assisted by Darryl Hannah, a mysterious newcomer who be comes a born-again Christian.

The patrons of Dolly's place include: Sally Field, a strong-willed wife and mother; Julia Roberts, her lovely, headstrong daughter; Shirley MacLaine, the town's battle-ax; Olympia Dukakis, the wise and witty widow of the mayor.

ALBANY, N.Y. - The tinsel is on the tree, the egg nog is poured and the yule log aglow. All you need is something on the stereo to complete that

holiday mood. There's always Bing Crosby's time-honored croon of "White Christmas." Nat King Cole's voice remains forever strong on "The Christmas Song." Elvis Presley's "Blue Christmas" still tugs at hearts. If you're thinking they don't make them like they

used to, you're right. "It's been a long time since something's come along that's become a classic," said Joel Whitburn, whose Milwaukee-based Record Research Inc monitors what's hot and what's not in the music

Money pressures and the daunting prospect of competing with still-popular standards from decades, even centuries, ago mean that few artists even try to write new holiday standards today. "If you're going to write a whole bunch of new Christmas carols, who cares?" said Nebraska-based

composer Chip Davis. Davis, who records as a one-man band under the name Mannheim Steamroller, is responsible for one of the few holiday music success stories of the 1980s. He records instrumental "New Age" versions of Christmas classics specifically designed for compact disc players.

With record companies re-releasing classics b Crosby, the Carpenters, Johnny Mathis and Ph Spector every year, it may be a surprise to learn that Davis' 1984 release, "Mannheim Steamrolle Christmas," and his 1988 recording, "A Fresh Aire Christmas," were the top two selling holiday albums last year.

It was for Davis. "I didn't really expect it to do anything because it was sort of a known thing that this sort of junk just croaks," said Davis, who was advised against recording holiday songs, of how Christmas music fares in the marketplace.

"Christmas albums were pretty much considered death in the industry," Davis said. "If you did a Christmas album, it was like signing off." The Mannheim Steamroller records wed the old and new in a combination perfect for listeners too old for rock 'n' roll novelty records and too young for Lawrence Welk. Orchestras, synthesizers and electric guitars are used in instrumental versions of classics and a few new compositions. Davis' records, along with George Winston's

"December" album on Windham Hill Records, are expected to be hot sellers again this year. "It has a broad appeal," said Geoff Mayfield, associate research director for Billboard magazine. "If you like traditional Christmas music, that's what it's about, but it's presented in a new way. People with gray hair can like it. And if you're a kid you can sit through it, and it doesn't have to sound like Mitch Miller.

Holiday records have always been a strange stepchild of the music industry. Artists compete during a compressed time period to sell music to be heard in the background at a few parties then tossed into closets for 11 months. This kind of high-risk, low-return work makes

many songwriters run in the other direction, Davis said. "Your ego gets stepped on," he said. "They're prohably some of the most difficult types of songs to write and have catch on because there's such an established litany of old material that people are fond of," said David McLees, artists and repertoire coordinator for Rhino Records.

Jenkins' book for sports fans

HARTFORD - It has been said there are only two sports in Texas: football and spring football But sportswriter Dan Jenkins, who is a Texan of considerable authority, assures us there is a third game people care about in the Lone Star State: golf. And Jenkins makes clear in his latest book, a collection of essays titled "You Call It Sports, But 1 Say It's a Jungle Out There," that no other sport

Not baseball, which he describes as "a game that's played by a bunch of guys in leotards and helmets on wall-to-wall carpet, with Tommy Lasorda discussing pasta and cavorting with movie

And not basketball, of which he writes: "With two seconds left in a game, I have personally seen

six time-outs called and the lead change hands 12 And certainly not tennis: "Slobodan Zivojinovic s. Miloslav Mecir, and so what? That's the state of tennis nowadays." That having been said, it's a good thing that "You

Call It Sports" is weighted heavily toward college football and golf, games that Jenkins enjoys and knows well. Forty of the book's 93 essays are about college football or golf, and these essays show Jenkins at his best - entertaining, insightful, homespun and

authoritative He lists the 200 best college football games ever played, and revisits four of them, including the memorable 10-10 tie between Notre Dame and Michigan State in 1966.

His description of the 1971 Oklahoma-Nebraska game, "The Cream Gravy Game," is sportswriting as good as it gets, full of vivid detail, memorable quotes and well-turned phrases. The game, he writes, was played "for all those guys with big stomachs and bigger Stetsons, their

faces cracked and burned and aged by the harsh

land, and for all of the luscious coeds who danced through the doors of bars near the campus drinking daiquiris out of paper cups, their golden hair flowing down to their waists." Jenkins also rises to the occasion in his descriptions of great golf showdowns: Jack Nicklaus vs. Arnold Palmer vs. Ben Hogan at the U.S. Open in

1960; and Nicklaus vs. himself at the British Open in 1972. In "Whoo-ha, Arnie!" he chronicles the 1960 U.S. Open, which marked "the arrival of Nicklaus, the coronation of Palmer, and the end of Hogan." While the whole golfing world watched the duel between seasoned pros — the 47-year-old Hogan and the 30-year-old Palmer - a chubby, 20-year-

old amateur was leading the tournament. "It was absolutely unreal to look up at the scoreboard out on the course and learn that Arnold Palmer still wasn't leading the Open. Some kid named Jack Nicklaus was." Unfortunately for fans of good sportswriting most of "You Call It Sports" consists of writings by

Dan Jenkins the humorist. Readers who enjoyed his sports novels, "Sem Tough" and "Life Its Ownself," or his Playboy magazine columns will be right at home as h meanders through the sports world, trashing baseball, basketball, the NCAA, North Carolina barbecue and all other things un-Texan.

But sports fans who wandered in looking for the Texas answer to Red Smith may be disappointed by these quick sketches and short stories populated by walking cliches: the cussing, corrupt college football coach; the dumb, skirt-chasing halfback; and the disinterested, skirt-chasing golf pro.

Creation to the Death of the Universe - and And that precisely sums up David Darling's 'Deep Time." It's the story of how everything in xistence got to be the way it is and what lies in its

Scientists have tracked things back to the instant when a mere pinpoint of untold energy exploded creating thereafter all the ingredients necessary to form everything from man to the universe. The story focuses on a single proton moving through cons of time to show what happened, This book is not light reading. But you don' have to be a scientist to understand it, and if you're one who enjoys contemplating the mysteries of creation, you should find it deeply rewarding.

Isotope scanning is considered safer today

DEAR DR. GOTT: On a "20/20" segment shown last June they talked about radioactive dye injected into patients for X-ray purposes that cause liver cancer and resulted in death. Would a myelogram use that kind of dye and would a radioactive capsule used for taking picture of a thyroid use the same dye? DEAR READER: I did not see the "20/20" seg-

ment you refer to, but I am aware that certain isotopes (radioactive materials) that were popular many years ago for liver scanning have been suspected of causing liver tumors that show up much later. Isotope scanning is considered safer today because newer, less hazardous materials are used.

Isotope produce a "reverse" X-ray. When tiny amounts are injected or drunk in a beverage, the radioactive material is temporarily concentrated in an organ - such as bone, liver or thyroid gland. By measuring the concentration and distribution of the isotope, technicians can determine if the organ absorbs a uniform amount. This produces a silhouette of the organ on an X-ray film and is a useful way of assessing whether the organ is functioning normally. The

body in a matter of hours; hence, the lisk of damage is markedly reduced. A myelogram is an X-ray test of the spinal canal. During the examination, a non-radioactive liquid com-

pound — not an isotope — is injected into the spine. This material shows up as a shadow when X-rayed. thus, pinched nerves can be highlighted because the "dye" fills the spaces around the nerves and provides a contrast enabling doctors to identify the location and extent of the ailment. Once the myelogram has been completed, the "dye" is withrawn; any residual usually causes no consequences.



Weeders Guide Insects live in Christmas trees

It may be an unpleasant subject, but let's face it bugs get into Christmas trees. Remember, the trees grow outdoors, so you shouldn't be surprised if insects arrive at your home along with the holiday decorations.

An Agricultural Extension entomologist reminds us that insects found on the trees are quite specific to various species, so it's unlikely that they would get into house plants or otherwise do damage in the

The insect most likely to be found traveling indoors on Christmas trees, says the entomologist, is the white-pine aphid. The white pine is a very popular Christmas tree. The aphids come indoors as eggs on the tree's needles and may hatch as the tree becomes warm. These tiny insects don't live long in the warm, dry atmosphere of the home, and those that do survive are likely to depart with the tree after the holidays. Jumping plantlice, which spend the winter as

adults, are slightly larger relatives of the pine aphid. They live on blackberries in summer, sucking plant juices. When the weather gets cold, they move into pines and will do some flying in the living room. According to the entomologist, jumping plantlice are about one-eighth of an inch long and tan in color, and have two light stripes on their wings. Other pests that might hitchhike into your home

on a Christmas tree are several types of sawflies, lacewings and spiders. Sawflies generally prefer the types of pines not usually used as Christmas trees, but they might lay eggs on white or Scotch pines. When they hatch, the caterpillarlike larvae feed on the tree's needles. Like aphids, they don't thrive in warm, dry houses, so they probably would not last long enough to

cause much damage. "If you just can't stand the thought of having bugs in your house, an insect spray that contains pyrethrum would take care of most of the things that might come in on your trees," the expert advises. "These insects probably won't survive long in the house, however; they won't do any damage and they'll leave when the tree does. It's certainly nothing to get excited about."

TREE SAFETY - Here's some advice from the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission on how to minimize the risk of fire from your Christmas tree:

 A dry tree is a fire hazard. Before buying a tree, strike the butt sharply against the ground. A shower of needles means the tree has dried out. Before placing the tree in water, make a fresh cut at the trunk to expose new wood for better water

· Keep the tree stand's water reservoir full. A fresh tree can drink several gallons of water during its first few days indoors. · Never place a tree near a fireplace, radiator or other heat source. Keep the room cool to minimize

 Check each set of lights, new and old, for broken or cracked sockets, frayed or bare wires, and loose connections. Discard damaged lights or repair them before using.



Photography Luck needed for carnival shots

Photographing a carnival midway takes a steady arm, a bit of luck and a strong stomach. For the past 11 years, I have been the photographer for Amusements of Rochester, a traveling

carnival based in Corfu, N.Y. My job of capturing the midway on film has taken me to the top of fire department aerial ladders, up in helicopters, and spinning at over 60 mph inside the Gravitron spaceship. In most respects, my job would fall into the

category of photojournalist. The pictures we use are those of our wild-looking rides and facial expressions that reflect what the carnival is - family fun. Years of photographing dozens of different rides have taught me where to look for the best shots. At times, that means getting aboard the high-speed Gravitron or Casino rides or swinging on the gigantic Sea Ray ship. It's not unusual to shoot 60 to 80 shots of one ride with the hope of getting a few outstanding photos for company use.

When I am shooting the midway at night, it takes steady arm at slow speeds (down to 1-15th of a second) to get the results I want. Forget the tripod on a busy midway - you're open game when there's a crowd on hand. I've found a new friend in Kodak's Ektar films

because of their fine grain and solid color-saturation. I wouldn't suggest Ektar for the novice, though, as its exposure is more critical than that of Kodak's Gold and VRG films, My cameras are two Pentax 35mm's and a

Yashica 120. The lens I use most frequently is a 24mm for the Pentax bodies. The wide-angle lens is essential, since I am looking for pictures of the entire carnival layout. It also enables me to work in cramped areas, which is often the case on the busy

For carnival visitors with camera in hand, would recommend using ASA 200 film for daylight shots. One of the biggest errors I see when watching amateurs take pictures is their neglecting to adjust for backlighting. If you want to photograph youngsters riding the merry-go-round, remember that there will be less light under the canvas top than your automatic camera is indicating, because its meter reads the light conditions where you are standing. If you can't make an adjustment on your

camera, turn on the flash. Another crucial mistake novices make is with their flash. For some reason, people think the strobe light will carry for infinity. Not so. Most flash units built into today's lightweight automatics are geared to shoot up to only 15 to 20 feet. I would also recommend that you take time to set

up some good shots of the children. For example,

get a picture of them on the horses before the merry-go-round goes into motion. When taking action shots, shoot several. My experience with action photos of amusement rides has taught me that it's definitely a hit-or-miss situation. I am generally satisfied if I come out with only one or two real good action pictures from a roll of film. And, don't think that the carnival season is over once fall has arrived. Many winter carnivals are cropping up across the nation at large convention

One thing is for certain — capturing the carnival midway on film certainly has its ups and downs.



NFL says charges against Ryan groundless

NEW YORK (AP) — The NFL said Friday it had no proof that bounties were placed on Dallas Cowboys players by the Philadelphia Eagles during a game last month, nor did it have any evidence there was intent to cause deliberate injuries. However, the league warned that severe penalties would be issued against any team engaging in such ac-

The NFL, in a two-paragraph statement, said its findings were based on an investigation by Commissioner Paul Tagliabue following charges that surfaced after the Eagles played the Cowboys on Thanksgiving Day. "Under no circumstances does the league condone placing 'bounties' on an opposing player," the league said. "Nor does the league condone any deliberate action taken to injure another player. If any such conduct is

The controversy has simmered since Dallas coach Jimmy Johnson charged that Eagles coach Buddy Ryan offered bounties to some Eagles players to knock Dallas kicker Luis Zendejas and quarterback Troy Aikman out of the Nov. 23 game, which Philadelphia won 27-0. World Cup sets its draw for today

ROME — Soccer's world governing body said Friday that South American teams would not play each other in the first round of the 1990 World Cup tournament but insisted all other pairings will be strictly the luck of the

Saturday's draw at the Rome Sports Palace will be held at the end of a lavish ceremony broadcast live to an expected audience of more than 1.5 billion in 80 countries. The show will include performances by Italian tenor Luciano Pavarotti, popular singers Gianna Nannini and Eduardo Bennato, and an appearance by Sophia

FIFA officials outlined the mechanics of the draw at a news conference, where they also announced stiff sanctions against the Chilean team, players and officials including a ban on participation in the 1994 World Cup. "There is no possibility for any doubtful procedures," said Joseph Blatter, the secretary-general of FIFA, soccer's world governing body. "The draw will be limpid and clear with glass bowls and innocent hands drawing Blatter said the procedures for the draw had been

designed to keep the four South American teams - Argentina, Brazil, Uruguay and Colombia — from meeting There are 14 European teams in the tournament, which



LAUSANNE, Switzerland (AP) - Anti-doping measures are likely to have a more dramatic impact than the political changes sweeping Eastern Europe on the results of the 1992 Olympics, the head of the International Olympic Committee said Friday. While some athletes may leave their Socialist homelands under liberalized travel laws, the countries in the East bloc have an underlying tradition of sporting excellence that should keep them near the top of the medal standings, IOC president

Juan Antonio Samaranch said. "Maybe the organization (of Eastern European sports) will be different, but I think the results will be the same," he said. At the same time, Samaranch said, the anti-drug

drive being conducted by the IOC and other sports bodies may have an impact on the times and medal tables at Barcelona in '92. "I think the results in Barcelona will show it to be a good Games, but with the fight against doping

that we are conducting, maybe the results will not

be so good as before," he said. Samaranch spoke at the end of a three-day meeting of the IOC's executive board, where tentative approval was given to the committee's latest antidrug step - a million-dollar flying laboratory that will be available to test for drugs anywhere, at any





Boyd insists arm is sound

MONTREAL (AP) — Oil Can Boyd insists that his arm is "100 percent healthy," and that "when I'm on, I'll be the best pitcher that ever lived."

But the Montreal Expos, who are taking a chance that e former Boston Red Sox right-hander can bolster their depleted pitching staff, will submit Boyd to a series of nedical examinations next week before officially extendig a free-agent contract.

The contract, if signed, would pay Boyd a reported \$550,000 base salary and another \$650,000 if he meets certain bonus requirements. The Expos also would have the option of extending the contract through the 1991

Dr. Bob Brodrick, the Expos' physician who will examine Boyd, agreed with General Manager David Dombrowski that Boyd presents a risk.

Boyd, 30, has been bothered by blood clots in his shoulder, forcing him to the disabled list each of the past two seasons. However, medication appeared to have the disorder under control when Boyd returned for five starts with Boston in September.

"The Boston doctors gave him an anti-clotting drug after each game he pitched," Brodrick said. "It's an injection of heparin, which stays in the body for about 48

"So far, it has not clotted. If it starts clotting in spring probably should have had the surgery already in Boston." The Expos need a healthy Boyd after losing three pitchers from their starting rotation to free agency -Mark Langston, Bryn Smith and Pascual Perez.

Boyd, 3-2 with a 4.42 earned-run average in 1989 but a 16-game winner in 1986, thinks he's had to spend his entire career proving himself, and that this is simply another challenge. "The Expos told me, 'We want you to pitch for us,' " he said in a telephone interview from his home at


