



The toy was promoted with a line that said "Sabotage the rocket booster." It invited customers to build a rocket pad and detonate the accompanying rocket upon launch.

Not funny. Not particularly constructive, either. The conception of the toy and its promotion is an obvious reference to the Challenger explosion, which blew up just after take-off.

Anyone who witnessed the explosion and experienced the anguish the nation went through when the seven astronauts aboard perished has to be appalled.

The fact that the toy was promoted for sale around Christmas, close to the anniversary of the terrorist bombing of Pan Am Flight 103, makes the item even less appealing, if it is possible. Fortunately, Sears decided that it wasn't a good

Chrysler makes Imperial again

Return with us now to the days of yesteryear. Not a mere six years ago when Chrysler last used the Imperial nameplate, but as far back as the 1970s, when a Chrysler nperial was considered less a car than a boat. That same nostalgic sense of roominess is found today under the vinyl roof of the 1990 Chrysler Imperial luxury

That's not to say this is merely the same old Imperial, venerable name last used in 1984, but on a much smaller car. The 1990 version, Chrysler's biggest car with a length of 203 inches, a weight of 3,570 pounds and 121 cubic feet of interior room, is loaded with today's technology: antilock brakes, driver air bag and

On the outside, the squarish Imperial looks a lot like the 1990 Chrysler New Yorker Fifth Avenue, which made its debut in September, two months earlier, and shares the same powertrain and Illinois production plant as the Imperial. But the Imperial is 4.4 inches longer than the Fifth Avenue, offers more features and costs about \$4,000 more.

The \$25,000 Imperial leads Chrysler into the top-ofthe-line market for traditional luxury cars, where the competition includes the Cadillac DeVille and Lincoln

The Imperial is base priced below both the DeVille and Town Car, which start at more than \$27,000. But both competitors have V-8 engines, and the DeVille's interior room is more than 130 cubic feet. And the Town Car retains its rear-wheel drive system. Chrysler says about 15,000 Imperials will be produced

in the 1990 model year. It expects buyers to be at least in their 50s, with median household income of \$60,000. About 33 percent will be retired and about 25 percent will be women, with most buyers having a college educaon and working in professional, managerial or technical obs. Jakobowski said.




