# Baku buries dead

Strikers protest Soviet military role

MOSCOW (AP) - Hundreds of thousands of Azerbaijanis today marched through Baku and buried scores of people killed when Soviet troops put down a nationalist uprising, witnesses said. The republic's legislature threatened to consider sucession if Moscow did not withdraw its troops.

A general strike took effect in the Azerbaijani capital to protest the assault and demand an end to the Soviet occupation. The official Tass news agency

said 83 people, including 14 soldiers and members of their families, were killed Saturday in an assault by Soviet troops in the capital, Baku, or in skirmishes the previous day. The troops were brought in to try to contain ethnic violence that flared an. 13 with anti-Armenian riots in Baku, a oil-producing center of 1.7

million people on the Caspian Sea, and spread throughout Azerbaijan and Armenia. Tass reported 12 new deaths today when Armenian militants opened fire on an Azerbaijani village on the border between the two Soviet republics in the Volchy Vorota area. Internal security troops

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers has decided that it will not contribute federal money to the improvement of Union Pond in the town's North End, according to Mark Pellegrini, town planning

The decision came after the corps completed a study on the cost benefits of cleaning up the pond, Pellegrini said. The corps decided that the cost of dredging the pond, estimated at \$330,000, would not be returned in fees from the pond, he

Pellegrini said he was disappointed by the decision, but not surprised. The idea of dredging the pond will not be dropped, Pellegrini said, but the decision means that the town cannot count on any federal money for the project.

The pond, created by a dam on the Hockanum River, is located between North School Street and Tolland Tumpike and is currently used very little for recreation, he said. His own criteria for what would justify the dredging of the pond dif fers from that used by the corps, Pel legrini said. The corps based its analysis on how much money would be returned through fees the town charged for use of the pond. It did not take into account the benefits in terms of quality of life and enjoyment to the community by having the pond available for boat-

ing, fishing and other recreation, he "Because of development in the North End, we see it as very valuable," he said.







# Transit plan needs thought

The proposal to use railroad tracks (or at least the corridor for those tracks) between Manchester and Hartford as a means of providing transportation for commuters keeps surfacing. The latest proposal comes from state Rep. Paul Munns of Manchester.

But the idea is also being considered by the Greater Hartford Transit Authority. Several years ago it was proposed by a Vernon attorney, who wanted to establish a trial rail service with federal funds as a means of determining whether he would seek private financing for a permanent operation. The project did not materialize.

The Greater Hartford Transit Authority has put the Manchester to Hartford idea on the back burner for now, because it feels a proposal to use rails between Hartford and Bloomfield holds more promise as a pilot project. Munns is trying to find out how commuters feel

It is difficult to determine what commuter systems will and will not work and it is expensive to implement them. So far, the High Occupancy Lanes on the superhighways, designed to make commuting easier for those with three or more passengers in their cars, have not been a great suc-

Since the idea of using the rail corridor from here to Hartford keeps coming up, it is time to make a serious study of it and to determine, if possible, whether it will work.

# Jets appear set to name Perles

NEW YORK (AP) — George Perles, who has four Super Bowl rings and wants a fifth, is expected to become head coach of the New York Jets, who haven't even won a division title since the 1970 merger of the NFL and AFL.

Dick Steinberg, the Jets' new general manager, was quoted Sunday as saying he had completed the interview process and a new coach would be named soon. Published reports have said the 54-year-old Perles, who has been the head coach at Michigan State for the last seven years, is the Jets' choice.

"All I can say is that something is going to happen soon, real soon," Steinberg was quoted in Sunday's New York Newsday. However, Steinberg denied that an offer actually had been made as of Saturday. And today's New York Times said Perles was to fly to New York to finalize his contract. The Times quoted a source familiar with the negotiations as confirming that

Perles had accepted the job pending the contract discus-The Detroit News quoted a source close to the Michigan State program as saying the Jets have offered Perles \$6 million over five years. ### World markets open for investor

Not too long ago, the world's foreign currency markets were reserved strictly for giant institutional investors betting billions of dollars daily on the direction of currency rates. With an estimated \$675 billion changing hands every day, this type of trading represents, by far, the world's largest and most liquid financial market. But a little-publicized Federal Reserve Board ruling, effective Jan. 1, 1990, should intrigue smaller investors who would like also to be into these markets. For the first time in history, commercial banks here have been given the authority to open deposit accounts for their U.S. customers denominated in foreign currencies. Although most domestic banks are waiting to gauge demand before setting up such programs, some of the big money center banks, including Citibank, Security Pacific and Bank of

Buying only AAA- or AArated instruments, these funds, he adds, have little credit risk and their short maturities, averaging 30 to 60 days, protect principal from interest rate risk much better than




