In 1985, Tedone allegedly bought the land, on Daly Road, at a reduced price to settle a drug debt owed to him by it's owner, Thomas Olbrias, according to information stated by a key witness, Robert Watts, in a civil complaint filed in U.S. District Court in Hartford. Drug charges against Watts, of Mansfield, were dropped in exchange for his testimony against Tedone.

In a devastating decision for the DEA. a U.S. District Court judge recently ruled that the agency retaliated against agent Jesse Gallegos because he advocated the cause of Hispanic agents.

Now the DEA owes Gallegos, a 20year veteran, \$42,000 in back pay and a

In 1987 he was stripped of his bonus and demoted after he refused to answer questions during an extraordinary inspection that Gallegos called a "witch hunt." 

DEAR DR. GOTT: My 7-year-old daughter has a perspiration problem. Is this normal? My doctor seems

DEAR READER: Hyperhidrosis (excessive sweating) often occurs in response to psychological and emotional stress. Sweating is controlled by the nervous system and by circulating substances, called catacholamines, which stimulate sweat glands. The amount of sweating also depends on skin temperature, blood flow to the skin and humidity. It varies greatly from person to person and is related to sex, age, activity and (possibly) diet.

Young children rarely exhibit inappropriate, pathological sweating; therefore, if your doctor is unconcerned, I believe you can adopt a "wait and see" attitude. Ways to avoid an IRS audit

The widely reported conviction of Leona Helmsley, the hotel "queen," on tax charges must have chilled many who told themselves, "There but for the grace of God go

The government's case underscored the determination if the IRS to get all that's coming to it. Does it mean that you are in a high income bracket you are more vulnerable to an audit than those in lower brackets? Will the number or nature of your deductions cause a suspicious eye to be cast on your tax return?

The answer to both questions is yes. The odds that you will not be audited are in your favor - the IRS doesn't have that large a staff, But the Helmsley case suggests you won't get off easy if you are

The IRS has a standardized system for deciding which tax returns are automatic audit candidates, according to the tax experts at Matthew Bender & Co. The details of this process are a well-guarded secret. The IRS flatly refuses to say what specific income and deduction amounts or other patterns cause a taxpayer's return to be chosen for audit.

The only clues come from looking at what the IRS has one in the past. According to editors at Matthew Bender, publishers of tax manuals widely used by professional preparers, experience suggests that certain items are more likely than others to provoke an IRS examiner into delving deeper. Here, they suggest, are some "audit triggers" you, as an ordinary taxpayer, should try to

. Tax shelter activity. Real estate and other tax shelters (there aren't many left) with high write-offs are subject requently to intense IRS scrutiny. The IRS believes these shelters have a high potential for abuse. • Returns prepared by preparers on the "Program List." District IRS offices have "Return Preparer's

Programs" which are aimed at preparers who clearly vio-

late the law. Choose your professional preparer carefully. · Travel and entertainment expense deductions. Taxpayers should keep well-maintained, detailed diaries of these expenses to back up or supplement their receipts. For example, the IRS will expect entertainment records to include the name of the person entertained and the per-

son's business relationship to the taxpayer. Business use of automobile deduction. Expenses must be apportioned between personal and business use of the automobile. Detailed documentation — that is, a daily log book with trip and mileage information. receipts and the like - will help support the taxpayer's claim to deductions in this particularly audit-sensitive

· Home office expense deduction. The taxpayer must meet stringent requirements in order to be successful in claiming a deduction for home office expenses. Such deductions are disallowed frequently.

· Casualty losses. Only losses resulting from an event that is "sudden, unexpected and unusual in nature" are allowed as casualty losses. The IRS often disputes the meaning of these terms, so it is not always clear that a loss is due to casualty. In any event, the taxpayer should retain any documentation that will substantiate the claim of loss (such as insurance records, police or fire department reports, appraisals, and the like).
