



Yet there is evidence that even those who could be expected to be most alert to the signs of substance abuse can be taken by surprise by the per-

vasiveness of the problem. Last week, a group of about 50 educators, church leaders, sociai workers and law enforcement officers gathered to exchange information on drug use with a view toward combining their efforts to

Some of the statistics that emerged from the discussion are shocking even in a society bombarded by drug facts.

Lynne Gustafson, supervisor of health services for Manchester schools, said that by age 12 many children have been exposed to their first "gateway" drug - alcohol, nicotine, or marijuana.

It was also said that 36 percent of high school seniors have tried some drug other than the "gateway" drugs, which are those which usually lead to use of other drugs.

One of the most significant disclosures was not a statistic, but an anecdote about a single alumnus. Gustafson said the former student approached her and asked if she recognized him. When she said she did, he asked, "Did you know I was drinking during school in the fifth grade?" The confession shocked Gustafson despite the

fact that she is attuned to the situation. That episode illustrates the need for the concerted church-school anti-drug partnership being planned by those who attended the meeting ar-

Tell her you love her. She can't hear it too often. If you like the way she cooks, or the way she looks, dresses, smells - let her know it. You can't compliment a woman too much.






