"We shall move forward in spite of the sacrifices that we have had to take," declared Colombian President Virgilio Barco, who welcomed Bush and the presidents of Peru and Bolivia to the summit site at a heavily guarded

"No, we will not weaken, we will not let the deaths of thousands of Colombians be in vain," said Barco, whose and other violence from drug lords and leftist guerrillas. 



WASHINGTON (AP) — College students are taking six to 10 years to earn a degree, according to a study that says only 15 percent complete a bachelor's degree four years after

"The picture of the average American college student today is not the picture that many of us have in our minds, based upon our own experiences 15, 20 and 25 years ago," said Oscar F. Porter, author of he study released Wednesday. "It's clear that completing an undergraduate college degree in four years is not the norm in either the public or independent sector," he

The National Institute of Independent Colleges and Universities said the survey showed that six years after high school graduation, 46 percent of the students had earned a degree.

Counting both those who went straight to college and those who took some time off after high school, 55 percent had either earned a degree or were still working on one six years after high school

"While students in the independent sector are more likely to have completed their degrees in the traditional four years than students in the public sector, the overall degree completion rate offers little solace for either sector," Porter added. Among private colleges, 54 per-cent of students who enrolled straight out of high school completed the degree in six years; for

James P. Garbo, president of Garbo Enterprises Inc. in Stonington, and Capt. Ronald Pont were arrested Wednesday and charged with conspiracy and other charges in the sinking of the Sophie G., a 55-foot lobster boat that went down Dec. 30, 1988, in Hudson's Canyon in the Atlantic, 80 miles south of Long Island.

The Coast Guard and Air National Guard saved the crew of four using helicopters, an airplane and a Coast Guard cutter. Garbo was not aboard when the boat went down.



The indictment, which was unsealed Wednesday, alleges Garbo persuaded Pont to deliberately sink the boat so that Garbo could collect the

He said investigators allege the Sophie G. was sunk when its seacocks were opened and lower parts of the boat were flooded. The indictment charges Garbo Enterprises with two counts of conspiracy, two counts of wire fraud and destruction of a vessel by its owner. The charges are punishable by a maximum fine of \$1.25 mil-

Garbo, 35, is charged with two counts of conspiracy, two of mail fraud and one of destruction of a vessel. If convicted, he would face 35 years in prison and a \$1.25 million fine, Twardy said. Pont, 26, is charged with two

The Department of Revenue Services is reminding filers of Capital Gains, Dividends and Interest Income Tax returns that the deadline for estimated returns and payments is today. As in previous years, individuals who do not need to file estimated returns must file Capital Gains, Dividends and Interest Income Tax returns by April 15, 1990. Any taxpayer who expects to owe more than \$2,000 in taxes to the state of Connecticut must file the February estimated return (Form 394ESB) and pay

HARTFORD (AP) - Actna Life & Casualty Co. reported a 28 percent drop in fourth-quarter net income and a 5 percent drop for the year, which the Hartfordbased insurance company attributed to higher catastrophe costs and rising costs in automobile losses. The company Wednesday reported net income of \$151 million or \$1.35 per share in the fourth quarter, compared to \$209 million or \$1.85 per share in the same quarter last year.

Revenues were \$5.2 billion, up from \$4.35 billion in

the fourth quarter of 1988. For the year, Aetna reported net income of \$676 million or \$6.02 per share, compared with \$713 million or \$6.25 per share in 1988. Revenues for 1989 were \$19.6 billion, compared to \$17.8 billion the previous year. Aetna said its losses from catastrophes reduced fourth-quarter income by \$66 million and 1989 results by \$170 million, after taxes. The fourth-quarter losses came principally from freezing weather in December and the October earthquake in California.

Aetna Chairman James T. Lynn said losses were offset by stronger earnings in employee benefits businesses and increased capital gains.

PORTLAND, Maine (AP) - Great Northern Nekoosa Corp. said its investment banker has received more than one inquiry from companies that might want to buy it in a friendly merger, but it would not say how many or identify any of the companies.

"It's clear there are interested people," spokesman Stephen M. Hill said late Wednesday from his office in Norwalk, Conn. Hill would not say whether any of the potential buyers were foreign companies, but he said some interested parties had already signed letters of confidentiality with Goldman, Sachs & Co., and were receiving information on Great Northern. The night before, Great Northern indicated it had

directed Goldman, Sachs to seek out bids higher than Georgia-Pacific's tender offer of \$63 a share. On Wednesday, Great Northern stock rose \$2 to \$64 a share on the New York Stock Exchange. Atlanta-based Georgia-Pacific fell 371/2 cents to \$44.50 a share. "It indicates that the market, at least today, agreed with us that the company is worth more than \$63 a

share," Hill said. Meanwhile, Georgia-Pacific went back to federal court in Portland to make sure it gets in on the bidding as it also tries to stop Great Northern from extending a proxy fight. In a separate development, the Maine attorney general's office announced that the latest moves by Great Northern created an uncertain future for its antitrust suit

that seeks to block Georgia-Pacific's takeover attempt.

Easy approval forecast for banking bill

HARTFORD (AP) - State Rep. Thomas D. Ritter o-chairman of the Banks Committee, predicts easy approval by his committee today of a bill allowing full inerstate banking in Connecticut.

The Hartford Democrat also agrees with the top two louse Democrats that the measure will win approval in the House when it reaches the lower chamber at the end of the month. Current state law allows interstate banking only among New England-based banks.

Also today, the Public Safety committee is expected to vote to hold a public hearing on a series of gun-related bills, including one requiring a two-week waiting period before any gun could be purchased. Another bill would require that all gun buyers complete a gun-safety course. On Wednesday, the House and Senate approved and sent to the governor the first bill of the week-old 1990

The bill corrected a law passed last year creating a commission to study the need for universal health insurance. Some Republicans objected, saying the measure was after-the-fact fixing of a flawed law. It effectively validated the way commission members were chosen after the 1989 legislative session had adjourned. The House voted 99-42 in favor of the bill after spending 45 minutes debating Republican objections. The Senate approved it 29-3 after a 15-minute debate. Gov. William A. O'Neill signed it into law late in the day. As the Appropriations Committee slogged through another day of hearings on O'Neill's proposed \$7.24 bil-

"Please again evaluate your publications program and eliminate as many as possible for this fiscal year and the next."

It is the second time in two years Negri's department has made the request. About \$3.8 million went to commercial printers, while the rest of the work was done by the in-house presses in Negri's department.

The \$4.5 million does not include costs for additional publications by agencies with their own printing operations. They include the University of Connecticut and the Department of Transportation.

Firms ordered to clean dumps

HARTFORD (AP) - The federal government and state of Connecticut would recover \$5.4 million in cleanup costs at two state landfills from two brothers and their businesses, under a consent decree entered in

If approved by a federal judge, the consent decree would require Harold Murtha, his brother Terrance and several of his corporations to help clean up the Beacon Heights landfill in Beacon Falls and the Laurel Park andfill in Naugatuck.

The Murthas disposed of hazardous substances at the sites over many years, incurring liability under the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation and Liability Act, according to a statement released Wednesday from the Justice Department in Washington and the Connecticut attorney general's office.

"This consent decree is a continuation of our efforts to recover cleanup costs incurred by the Environmental Protection Agency at these sites," said George Van Cleve, a U.S. assistant attorney general. The decree must be approved by a federal judge in

The Beacon Heights Landfill stopped most operations in 1979 and closed completely in 1985 after the EPA found hazardous substances were being released from the landfill into both surface water and groundwater. The substances included benzene, chlorobenzene and toluene.

The district, which has grown in size and responsibilities, does not have a complete staff of officials with various areas of expertise. The structure of its government calls on the directors, particularly those among them who are commissioners, to do the load of administrative work.

In two recent budget workshops, a good deal of the talk was about salaries and wages of district employees and how to make them equitable.

In the budget of a little more than \$1.6 million approved by the district voters for the current year, about \$241,000 represented the allocation for salaries and wages. The item is hardly the largest part of the budget, but it seemed to occupy a good deal of the directors' attention.

At the latest budget meeting, it was suggested that a salary schedule be developed with ranges of high and low that can be used as a guide.

Some time ago the directors also decided that the district needs to develop up-to-date job descriptions so that it will be clear who has what duties and so that work will not be duplicated or allowed to slip by.

The two ideas are linked and both should be carried out. But most of the directors are busy people and

the process will take considerable time and effort. The district relies heavily on the volunteer effort which has characterized it over the years. Obviously, however, it does use professional legal services and engineering services among

The character of the district would not be damaged if it also sought professional help in establishing job descriptions and pay schedules.



Keep Your

Car Alive

By Peter Bohr

Roll up your sleeves, because it's time once again to take a tour of your car's mechanicals. I wrote this column back in 1988, and folks found it so useful that I'm doing it again. It just may help you thwart a costly, irritating and possibly dangerous breakdown in the

making. First, pop open the hood. Do you see the engine? Good. Actually that's quite an accomplishment, what with engine mounted sideways and all the complicated paraphernalia automakers hang on them these days. Now find the engine's dipstick: It's sticking up somewhere alongside the engine. (If you can't find it, look in your car's owner's manual for the location.) Pull it out, wipe it off, stick it back in all the way, and pull it out again. Does the oil level reach somewhere between the hatch marks on the dipstick? If not, add some. If it needs more than a quart, take the car to your mechanic and find out why it's losing oil.

Now look for the radiator or the radiator overflow tank. Take off the cap and look inside. Do you see some greenish liquid that looks like lime Kool-Aid? If not, add water. Again, if it takes more than a quart, you'd better have your mechanic take a look. And if it's not green, you'll need to have the radiator drained and refilled with

50/50 mixture of coolant and water. While you're at the radiator, examine all the rubber hoses running from the radiator to the engine - and look at any other hoses in the engine compartment. Are they cracked, or do they look so brittle than they should be Are there any bulges, or are they squishy soft? If so, have them replaced. Chances are you won't find the right size n a provincial gas station when a hose bursts in your

ext trip out of town. Look for the distributor - it's a round thing with thick wires running out of the top. Follow each of the wires to the engine. Are they firmly attached to the distributor at one end, and to the spark plugs at the other? Are the little rubber booties that cover the ends in place? Next, find the fan belt or alternator belt. Make sure it

isn't frayed or cracked. Find a spot where it's suspended between two pulleys and push down with your finger; if the belt gives more than a half inch, it needs tightening. Now, on the battery. If it's refillable type, take off the caps and check all six cells to see that there's water. Make sure the cables are firmly attached to the terminals And if the terminals look like they've grown fungus, scrub them with a little baking soda and water. If you see signs of battery acid on the pan where the battery resides, wash it thoroughly and check the battery case for leaks. Acid will eventually eat right through metal.

Now start the engine. Look back under the hood. Does the engine settle into a small idle, or does it jerk around while it runs? Do you see any leaks from any hoses? Do you hear any ominous sounds? Once the fun of all this has wom off, stop the engine and shut the hood. Get up, turn on all the lights and a walk around the car to see that they work. Don't forget to check the turn sig-
