#### Mass molasses mess creates oozing chaos

LOVELAND, Colo. (AP) - A mass of molasses oozed through two blocks of Colorado's "Sweetheart City" on Friday after a storage tank ruptured, forcing a kindergarten to close and blocking several busi-

No one was injured, but before the syrupy mess was identified, authorities took precautions against what they thought was a potentially dangerous chemical spill.

Word of the spill reached authorities early Friday after a car spun out of control on a slippery substance and ran into a ditch.

City Manager Mike Rock said two young males were in the vehicle and "one of them told me it was like hitting glare ice. His windshield was so splattered with the stuff he couldn't see." The molasses was steaming when it escaped but it

thickened in the 5 degrees below zero temperature. It flowed down a busy street, into an industrial park and on into an irrigation ditch where it ran for another half-mile, said police Cpl. Al Sharon, "It gives a whole new meaning to the

Sweetheart City," Sharon said. Sharon estimated the ruptured tank was stories high and 30 to 50 feet in diameter. Jack Fulton, director of government relations for Western Sugar Co., owner of the molasses, said 3,400 tons or about 618,000 gallons were in the tank leased from Great Western Salvage Co.

"We have engineers on the scene trying to determine the best way to clean up the spill," Fulton said. The molasses is used as an animal-feed supple-

ment, often added to barley or other grains. Traffic was directed away from Madison Avenue, which was covered with 1 to 7 inches of sticky,

brownish-black goo. Rock said of the cleanup effort, "maybe we need to bring in a big bunch of pancakes." This city of approximately 30,000 people, 53 miles

## Couple conceives in hope of marrow match

LOS ANGELES - A couple conceived a child in

hopes the baby's bone marrow cells could save the life of a teen-age daughter who is dying of cancer, but ethics experts said Friday the decision is outrageous and troubling. Such criticism means little to Abe Ayala and his

wife, Mary. They found out this week that despite one-in-four odds, their unborn baby girl will be a compatible bone marrow "stem cell" donor for their 17-year-old daughter, Anissa, who was diagnosed with leukemia two years ago. "We've been searching for a donor for almost two

years and we haven't been able to find anybody, so this is the only other alternative," Ayala said in a telephone interview Friday. "We can't just stand idly by and do nothing about it and wait for Anissa to

The Ayalas live in the Los Angeles suburb of Walnut with Anissa and a 19-year-old son, Airon. They were told that Anissa has a 70 percent to 80 percent chance of surviving if she receives a transplant of stem cells - bone marrow cells that help produce various blood cells - but no chance if she doesn't, her father said. None of the Alayas have compatible marrow.

So against the advice of Anissa's doctor and after years of resisting his wife's wish to have another child, the 45-year-old Ayala had his vasectomy reversed last year. Mrs. Alaya, 43, is due to deliver a baby girl in April.

If not for Anissa's leukemia, "it's true we would have never had another baby this late," Ayala said. "It is troublesome to say the least," medical ethics expert Philip Boyle said from The Hastings Center think tank in Briarcliff Manor, N.Y. "It's outrageous that people would go to this length."

"The ideal reason for having a child is associated with that child's own welfare - to bring a child into being and to nurture it," said Alexander Morgan Capron, a professor of law and medicine at the University of Southern California. "One of the fundamental precepts of ethics ... is

never to be used solely as a means to another person's ends without the agreement of the person being used," he said. The baby can't consent to the transplant, and the

The Ayalas' baby "is not seen as an end in itself, but as a means to another end. The fact that the other end is laudable doesn't change that," Capron said. Ayala said his daughter's leukemia is now stable, and doctors expect she will be alive even if they have to wait until her baby sister is 6 months old, the youngest age at which marrow can be transplanted.

However, Anissa's doctors at City of Hope National Medical Center in suburban Duarte hope to make the marrow transplant unnecessary by obtaining stem cells from the baby's umbilical cord blood at the time of birth, a painless procedure, hospital spokesman Charles Mathews said.



# Gasoline spill puts Stonington wells at risk

WESTERLY, R.I. - Residents of Westerly and nearby Stonington, Conn., were conserving water Friday - and taking very few baths as a result - while officials searched for alternative water supplies to three well fields in danger of contamination from an underground gasoline

Crews from the Connecticut Department of Environmental Protection tried to determine the location of an estimated 1,500 gallons of leaded gasoline that leaked. Meanwhile Rhode Island's Department of Environmental Management and the federal Environmental Protection Agency joined the Connecticut personnel in testing wells that supply drinking water to roughly 35,000 people in Westerly and the Pawcatuck section of

Compounds commonly found in gasoline were discovered at one monitoring well but additional tests were required, officials said at an afternoon news conference at Westerly Public Works Department offices. "We're seeing precursors of different things in the wells now," said Michael Annuramo, deputy director of

Rhode Island's DEM. Julie Belaga, regional administrator of the EPA. traveled to Westerly from Boston with testing crews. Samples of water from the well fields were being analyzed in regional offices in Lexington, Mass., but results were not expected until late Friday night at the earliest, said lab chief Ed Conley.

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

Berry claimed during his trial that the toddler's parents shared the blame for his death because they allowed him to wander near the dog. The victim's father, Arthur, said he and his wife

had left the boy on their back patio while they went shopping at garage sales and found him being "torn apart" when they came home. Deputy District Attorney Dale Sanderson acknowledged there was no evidence of malice or intent

to kill but that their case was based on the theory of implied malice, which allows a murder conviction for someone whose actions show wanton disregard for human life. Willy, since the attack, has been kept alive as evidence at the Santa Clara County Humane Society.

#### Phone bills drop 5% nationwide

WASHINGTON (AP) - Average residential phone costs dropped nearly 5 percent nationwide in 1989 as declining long-distance prices continued to offset increases for local phone service, the Federal Communications Commission said Friday.

The commission said that based on the Labor Department's Consumer Price Index, the cost of telephone service for an average residential subscriber fell 0.3 percent

The CPI showed that local service charges increased 0.6 percent, while toll charges for in-state calls dropped 2.8 percent and interstate long-distance charges fell 1.3 The FCC noted that the overall inflation rate was 4.6

percent for 1989. "Thus, in real terms, the cost of telephone service dropped about 5 percent during the year," the FCC said. The 0.6 percent increase in local phone service charges

was a sharp change from 1988, when such costs rose an average of 4.5 percent. The FCC also released the results of a semi-annual, 95-city survey of phone costs that showed the average monthly charge for one-party residential local service

with unlimited calling was \$12.28 in October 1989, compared with \$12.32 a year earlier. When taxes and federal and state subscriber line charges were added in, the total local service bill averaged \$17.54 in October, compared with \$16.57 in October 1988. The total does not include additional charges for

touch-tone service. Total local charges for unlimited, private-line service ranged from \$8.14 in Anchorage, Alaska, to \$27.03 in Huntington, W.Va., the FCC said. The federal subscriber line charge, which helps defray the costs of connecting the local phone system with

long-distance circuits, was \$3.50 per month for most residential customers in October 1989. As the subscriber line charge goes up, long-distance rates tend to go down. That is because as long-distance companies pay less for the connection charge, the FCC requires them to pass the savings along to long-distance

The average household spent \$499 on phone bills in 1987, the most recent year for which such statistics are available, the FCC said. That compared with an average

He has run the parish since coming to Colombia in 1987. Amico was abducted by armed men while heading to a nearby church to celebrate Mass. Witnesses said the group forced him into a jeep that sped away. Amico, from Rochester N.Y., is the founder of the Basilian

Priests' branch in the San Andres zone, one of Cali's poorest neighborhoods. "Nobody has contacted us. We only pray for our superior and Masses and processions are being held in the

percent trade-balance improvement in December allowed the nation to close out 1989 with a \$108.6 billion deficit, the smallest in five years, the government said Friday.

While conceding that most of the December in provement was dependent on special factors, the Bush administration hailed the 8.4 percent narrowing in the deficit for the year as evidence that the ad ministration's effort to open foreign markets was suc-

However, private economists were not as en thusiastic, pointing out that while U.S. exports hit an all-time high last year, so did imports, driven upward by America's growing dependence on foreign oil. Some economists forecast that the deficit this year will resume worsening as consumers continue their love affair with imported products and the foreign oil

But other economists were not as pessimistic, believing that 1990 would show another slight improvement in the deficit, although probably not enough to dampen protectionist cries in Congress. "The trade deficit is coming out of a six-month period of deterioration but what happened in December overstates whatever improvement is occurring, said Allen Sinai, chief economist of the Boston Co. In other economic news, the government said that industrial production fell 1.2 percent in January,

pushing the operating rate at the country's factories, mines and utilities down to 81.9 percent, almost 2.5 percentage points below where it was a year ago. unseasonably warm weather reducing the need for utility production, analysts said much of American industry, particularly auto manufacturing, remains in

industry, particularly auto manufacturing, remains in The 1989 trade deficit followed a \$118.5 billion deficit in 1988 and was the smallest since a \$106.7 billion deficit in 1984. However, it still represented the sixth consecutive year that the difference between imports and exports remained above \$100 billion. Many economists believe the huge trade deficits

are symbolic of America's inability to compete internationally. But the Bush administration maintains that after hitting a record high of \$152.1 billion in Levy in Chappaqua, N.Y. increased fall into two categories. #### Seat belts in buses commonsense idea

If you rock your crying baby in your lap while in a moving car, instead of letting him squall his lungs out in

his car seat, you can get a stiff fine. Ditto, if you let your 4-year-old stand on the hump in the back seat and look out the windshield like he wants to. Recognizing the danger auto accidents pose to unrestrained children, we've enacted laws to protect them from other cars and parents too stupid to belt them in un-

But put that kid in a school bus where he can roll around like a pea in a boxcar, and suddenly he doesn't need a seat belt. Does that strike you as odd?

It certainly does Dorothy Dunn, In a 1987 Kansas bus accident, her daughter Lori, then in kindergarten, was thrown over the bus driver and into the dashboard. Doctors used 200 stitches to close her facial wounds and reattach her nose. And she may need more plastic surgery

In a recent school bus crash in Mehlville, Mo., 21 elementary-school students were hurt when their bus overturned. One child lost an arm when, after having been thrown across the bus, her arm went through a window and was crushed by the weight of the vehicle. Doctors say virtually all the children's injuries could have been prevented if they'd been wearing seat belts.



# Artist has melting medium

By Mark Seavy The Associated Press

ost artists try to achieve a measure of immortality through their work, but sculptor Robert McClellan has chosen medium as fleeting as time itself: Instead of granite or marble, he chips away at massive blocks of ice. His traceful swans, mermaids and other creations melt away within hours, leaving a pool of water as the only tes-tament to McClellan's steady hand.

"You can do just about anything — it all depends on how diverse people want to be," McClellan said during a recent interview at the Burnside Ice Co. in East Hartford, The family business, where he is president, also serves as McClellan's quarry. Most of the 300-pound blocks of ice made there are destined to be chopped up, bagged and sold commercially. But McClellan saves some of them for the dozens of pieces he turns out every year.

His ocuvre include wine racks that were used at the recent opening of J.P. Morgan Hotel in Hartford, a small sailboat under full sail, a miniature dump truck that was used as a shrimp bowl at a construction company party, plus the usual assortment of dragons, reindeer and Christmas trees. McClellan started ice carving as a 14 year old when he

was getting started in the ice business. He is one of the growing legion of ice sculptors nationwide whose transitory works adorn hotel and restaurant banquet tables, as well as shopping malls and city streets, where passersby watch with delight as the glistening, crystalline sculptures take shape before them. A recent ice-carving competition at the Old State House in downtown Hartford reflects the growing popularity of this 1,000-year-old art form, which has its roots in China's mountainous Habin Province, said Charles J. Wagner, executive director of the National Ice





LOS ANGELES - When Doris Kearns Goodwin was writing her history of the Fitzgeralds and he Kennedys, she was often only a few chapters ahead of the screenwriter for the miniseries "The Kennedys of Massachusetts."

Goodwin's book, "The Fitzgeralds and the Ken nedys," traces the personal and political histories of he two families from their Irish roots to Boston to the election of John F. Kennedy as president. The six-hour miniseries will be broadcast b ABC on Sunday, Monday and Tuesday, starring William Peterson as Joe Kennedy Annette O'Toole is Rose Fitzgerald Kennedy; Pai Hingle as Joe's ather, PJ Kennedy Charles Durning as Rose's ather, John "Honey Fitz" Fitzgerald; Steven Weber is John F. Kennedy and Madolyn Smith-Osborne as etress Gloria Swanson, Joe Kennedy's long-time

"Doing the research was the best part," said Goodwin, a former Harvard professor who's now working on a book about the American homefront n World War II with Franklin and Eleanor Roosevelt as the focus. It also has been sold as miniseries.

"It was wonderful to find things that give you the feel and texture of the era," she said. "When I learn something. I become very excited to get it out to the reader. It took on a new dimension when she began her research. One of the great treasures she found were 150 cartons of papers saved by Joe and Rose Kennedy. They were at the Kennedy Library, but no one had looked at them and they had not yet been deeded to the library. She obtained permission from Sen. Edward M. Kennedy to go through the

"That took a year and a half," Goodwin said. "They had saved every letter, every report card, every piece of paper, even Gloria Swanson's in-come tax statements. Those letters told me the internal dynamics of the family and enabled Hanley to write their dialogue. The papers fell into the boxes as they would fall in life. You could see how each event related to another."

Asked what set the Fitzgeralds and the Kennedys apart from millions of other Irish Catholics, Goodwin said: "The Fitzgeralds, and particularly Joe Kennedy, instilled into their kids that above all else they were a family. They presented themselves to the world like a clan. They had traditions and loyalties and rituals. The kids knew they had to be there for dinner every night. They knew they went to Hyannisport on a certain day.

"Second, part of the family ethos was that they lived on the edge. You create your own success, and if the family backs you it doesn't matter what the world thinks." Joe Kennedy, despite his failings, gave the family a center, she said. He drove himself and his fami-

ly relentlessly to succeed, partly because of the ex-

#### Focus/Movies Movie survives quirky blend

MEN DON'T LEAVE - Beth Macauley wanders catatonically through the basement web of a Maryland hospital, trying to find the morgue so she can check the remains of her dead husband. She throws open a door and happens upon a bevy of chefs chopping up raw chickens, and collapses into uncontrollable sobs.

It is this quirky blend of the ordinary, the extraordinary, the absurd and the surreal that makes Paul Brickman's "Men Don't Leave" more than just

another soapy look at a family tragedy.

Jessica Lange continues to fascinate with her range of emotions and faces. As Beth, she reverts to an unexceptional housewife and mother, whose entire existence is focused on her family. When left with a bundle of bills after her husband dies in an explosion, an enraged teen-age son and a younger, more introverted son, she copes by leaving comfort able suburbia for the rough and crowded confines

of Baltimore's inner city. She finds work as an "assistant manager" (a gofer, really) for a shrill neurotic who runs a gourmet food store, and meets the understanding "sensitive man." Her youngest son, Matt (Charlie Korsmo), takes up with a middle-class juvenile aquent, and her oldest son, Chris (Chris O'Don nell), finds love in the arms of an all-knowing, allseeing, amazon of an older woman, Jody (Joan

Cusack). Brickman takes us, in fits and starts, through the inevitable mother-son fights and confrontations, bouts of depression, lessons in friendship, loyalty and trust. In the end, it all works out: Beth learns acceptance and believes in herself. But the package is not as neat as it sounds Beth's journey is all too episodic, like a made-for-

television movie. MOUNTAINS OF THE MOON - When "Lawrence of Arabia" was re-released last year in all its big-screen, uncut glory, the cry went up:

"Why don't they make movies like this anymore?" Answer: They do. "Mountains of the Moon" has all the excitement, adventure and human conflict of "Lawrence of Arabia." While the Carolco production may lack the polish that perfectionist David Lean gave to his 1962 classic, "Mountains" is still first-rate movie storytelling.

The discovery of the source of the Nile in the mid-19th century was as clouded in controversy as the journey to the North Pole a half-century later. The contenders: Richard Burton, the larger-than-life Irish adventurer-author-scientist; and John Speke, an English army officer from an aristocratic family. Director Bob Rafelson and William Harrison based the script on Harrison's biographical novel about the two explorers as well as their original journals. What emerges is a complex tale of two men of widely divergent backgrounds who become brothers on their perilous journey.

The African adventure is magnificently portrayed, and it is bookended by episodes in England that are less engaging. The first part delineates the characters of Burton (Patrick Bergin), a dashing, adventurous figure who wins the heart of a strong-willed English lady (Fiona Shaw); and Speke (lain Glen), a blond, blue-blooded young man who comes under the sinister influence of a homosexual publisher (Richard E. Grant). The final part of the film concerns the aftermath

of the exploration, as the two comrades are torn apart by misunderstanding and dispute over which one should be honored by the National Geographic

#### Focus/Music Collins serious on new record

NEW YORK - Phil Collins writes his album titles last, to reflect the mood of the music on the

His new album is "... But Seriously." The first single, "Another Day in Paradise," is about the homeless. There also are songs about famine and apartheid.

In a recent interview, Collins recalled his last solo album, "No Jacket Required" in 1985. "Apart from the little story of a Chicago hotel that wouldn't let me into the bar because I wasn't wearing a jacket, I thought the album was hotter, more danceable material than my previous two," he said. "I wanted to do something now that had a little bit more depth to it, for a variety of reasons." One is that it follows Collins' acting and songs in the movie "Buster," a film about the Great Train

"Not a light subject, but the way the film treated that subject it was kind of a romantic comedy," he said. "That was fine because it was an acting role, When I got involved with the music, I think the results to the casual person in the street were maybe

"I was working with Lamont Dozier, a hero of mine, and it was a film project. It didn't bother me 'A Groovy Kind of Love' was a '60s song. I think a lot of people thought it was a Phil Collins solo project and felt I was getting very, very light. That wasn't where I was coming from. "I thought, 'Let me put that right with my next

album.' That was one of the reasons the content of some songs was a little different for me." Most of the album reflects romantic and other individual concerns. "I think they're my best collection of songs since 'Face Value,'" he said. That was his first solo album, in 1981, followed a year later by "Hello I Must Be Going!"

"After all I've done, it is nice to know the best is still yet to come, really," Collins said. "The album was great fun to write. Not having done it for five years, many of them came easily. There was a lot to He'll tour until September. "I'd like to do another film the end of 1990. We've got to do a

Genesis album the beginning of 1991. I don't want to get involved with a big tour again so soon after the solo tour. "By that time I'll be almost 40. I'd like to do another album, maybe; I'd like to concentrate or films. I think we'll tour with Genesis, because it's

part of what we do. It won't be, if I can help it, anywhere near as long as Genesis' last tour, which was 10 months. "The gigs become the most important part of the day; everything else tends to be very boring, one hotel after another, one plane after another. I never get bored with the gigs. They're always different. I an hea people say, 'He's bored with first-class

hotels?' It does get boring. I'd rather be at home

doing the shopping." Speaking of boredom, Collins said, "There is always a risk that people get bored with Phil Collins. That reached a peak in 1985-86 when we had five Top 5 singles with 'No Jacket Required,' and Genesis' 'Invisible Touch' had five Top 5. The voice was constantly on the radio. There was a severe danger of overkill, which is why I took a year away from music and did 'Buster.' "People still played the records on the radio," he said. #### **Author's books** rediscovered

NEW YORK - Suddenly, moviemakers are discovering mystery writer Jim Thompson at the same furious pace as are readers of mystery fiction. In New York, Maggie Greenwald has made an excellent version of Thompson's "The Kill Off" and intends to follow it up with "Savage Night." And in Los Angeles, director Steven Friars is filming "Recoil," with Martin Scorsese as producer.

Of course, this is not a mass phenomenon. More than a decade after his death, and more than three decades after he produced some of his best novels — 10 between 1952 and 1954 — Thompson is still a cult writer whose stories are filmed by cult moviemakers. And, it is difficult to imagine that someday he will become a best-selling author.

As time goes by, however, Thompson's influence may become greater than that of the more famous practitioners of the genre. And, in the near future, a prestigious critic may discover that placing Thompson's works in the mystery genre is like putting Celine's "Journey to the End of the Night" in

the travel section of a bookstore. An exaggerated affirmation? Maybe. But when the topic is Thompson, it is difficult to remain calm. Stephen King says that Thompson wrote good stories, but that good stories "are not literature ... What makes Thompson's books literature is his unflinching, flatly lighted examination of the alienated mind, the psyche wired up like a nitro bomb, of people living like diseased cells in the bowels of

American society." Novelist and critic R.V. Cassill affirmed that neither Dashiell Hammett, Horace McCoy nor Raymond Chandler "ever wrote a book within miles of Thompson's," and critic Geoffrey'O'Brien detects in Thompson "the kind of radical self-questioning that one finds in Dostoyevsky's 'Notes

From Underground." Critic Barry Gifford, who is largely responsible for Thompson's literary resurrection, says that when his novels were first published, they "were geared to the male, 25-cent paperback audience." But Greenwald is a good example that the gender gap is narrowing. She recalls an occasion on which she asked the clerk in a mystery bookstore to recommend an author to her. "He handed me 'The Killer Inside Me' and said, 'You've got to read this book. It's incredible.' And I went home and stayed up all that night reading the book. I was just overwhelmed by the man's work."

So why was such a writer almost forgotten by an entire generation? Otto Penzlerl owner of the Mysterious Bookshop Manhattan, says that Thompson "was ignored during his lifetime by reviewers, and by critics, because he is one of the few really important writers who almost never had a hardcover book. All of his books came out as paperback originals. And the

truth is, frankly, most paperback fiction is not very In 1984, Black Lizard Books, a small printing house in Berkeley, Calif., decided to bring Thompson back. Gifford recalls: "We created a series in the format of pulp fiction and decided to start with Jim Thompson because, among all those writers of pulp ... he was the most visionary. "A book like "The Getaway," for example, has a

really surrealistic setting. There aren't many writers who do these kind of things, that take these kind of

Lisa Sense is a young photographer with the driving ambition to be the best in any situation.

Her picture of young boys watching cows grazing in a rural North Carolina pasture was chosen to appear on the cover of the book "The Big Click," a collection of photos depicting a day in the life of the state. Her shot was selected from among scores of others made by several photographers around the

Lisa was up against pros with long experience in the field. By contrast, she is only four years out of the University of Akron, where she studied fine arts photography. So far, she has no experience working for a daily newspaper and works only part time. She may be short on experience, but she is long

When her father was transferred from Ohio to weekly newspapers, in Benson and Four Oakes, and found herself shooting the sort of thing commonly seen in small papers - pictures of local committee

However, Lisa wanted to use her training to find a different picture, one that would stand out in the paper. She has carried that philosophy to her current part-time job with the Cary News, which publishes only twice a week but has won a number of awards for its pictures and photo displays.

To keep things going, Lisa works three days a week in a photo lab in nearby Raleigh, processing and printing black-and-white films. The job not only provides income, but it gives her a chance to see the work of many others, many of them profes-

The rest of the time, she is on call for the Cary News, handling the jobs that regular staffers cannot fit into their schedules. She has learned to focus on sports, ranging from basketball to wrestling. In the process, she has learned to like the more static action in wrestling.

"It gives me a chance to focus on the facial expressions, to show the competition," she says. Lisa is honing her skill at something that separates the top photographers from the snap-shooters: She is learning to see the picture before she hits the shutter release. This developing skill helped her score her cover photo victory. When Lisa discovered that no one had signed up

to cover a rural area of North Carolina, she staked it out as her territory for the day. She got brochures of the area and decided she wanted to shoot a farm. On shooting day, she was up at dawn and out to the farm, where she had scouted the cows and the young boys. It took 10 or 15 frames to get the boys and the cows lined up as she had visualized for the picture. She used ISO 100 color transparency film, Needless to say, she was thrilled when she learned her picture was to be used in the book. But, she says, nothing could compare with the way she

Unfortunately, there was no big reward. She and the other photographers had to settle for a T-shirt and a few rolls of film. But those chosen had the pleasure of seeing their shots nicely displayed in the





#### Petty says luck involved in winning Daytona 500

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. - Seven visits to Victory Lane in the Daytona 500 has taught Richard Petty that winning the big race is based more on luck than anything

"The word I'd use is circumstances," Petty said as he prepared to do battle for the 30th time in stock car racing's most prestigious event. "They're more important than anything you can do with the car." Petty, also a seven-time Winston Cup champion, is optimistic about his chances in Sunday's \$2 million race.


The last two years - in 1988 he wound up barrel-rolling his car - Petty has run far back in a field of 42, hardly a position from which to seriously contend. "We're not up front, but we're not way in the back, either," Petty said early this week. "You can't win the race from the back end."








