

MOSCOW (AP) — The Soviet Congress of People's Deputies today approved Mikhail S. Gorbachev's plan for a strong presidency, a post the Soviet leader says is essential to hold the country together as reforms go for-


The Congress, the country's top legislative body, also scrapped the clauses of the Soviet Constitution that guarantee the Communist Party's leading role in society, creating a multiparty system. It also legalized private ownership of factories. The lawmakers approved the measure on the presiden-

cy by a vote of 1,817 to 133, with 61 abstentions, the official Tass news agency said. A two-thirds majority of the 2,250-member Congress of People's Deputies was required for the motion to pass. "We are standing before the greatest, most meaningful

step in the history of our government," Gorbachev said. The measures on the presidency, private property and scrapping the leading role of the party had earlier been approved by the Supreme Soviet, the smaller parliament that handles day-to-day business.

Gorbachev had argued that the more powerful presidency was needed to keep the crumbling union in tact as he presses ahead with reforms. Opponents said it would give the president dangerous dictatorial powers. Lithuanians had been so dismayed by the presidency proposal that they rushed to declare independence before

Earlier today, Gorbachev said a legislative commission was studying the Lithuanian problem and that he would consider the status quo not to have changed "until Please see SOVIET, page 8

Parents wrong to break promise

DEAR ABBY: Re the 11-year-old boy who had been promised a weekend outing with this grandma, but because he swore at his mom, he was not permitted to go on the outing: You said the punishment was unfair because the grandma was also being punished. True, but you overlooked a far more important point: Once something is promised, it should be delivered - regardless. If the child does something for which he deserved to be punished, then find an alternative punishment. Many years ago, my daughter and her friend "Mary"

(both in high school) broke a rule that called for some kind of punishment. Mary's parents punished her by refusing to let her go to the homecoming dance - after they had previously granted her permission. Our daughter was also punished, but we kept our word about the homecoming dance and found an alternative punishment. We never regretted our decision. A MATTER OF PRINCIPLE DEAR MATTER: The principle is sound. We teach

children that one's word is a sacred trust by honoring the promises that we make to them. Once something is given, it is never to be taken back. Conversely, if a child bounces a basketball in the house and his mother says, "If you bounce that ball in the house one more time, I am going to take it away from you" - and the child continues to bounce the ball, the mother should make good her promise and take the ball away from the child.

DEAR ABBY: I've learned a great deal from reading your column. It also stirs up a lot of memories. Portables now a real option

Portable computers, once a series of compromises held together by a high price tag, are now real options for those who are convinced they can't function without a

thinker-thing always handy. The field of choices is large and expanding. The March 13 issue of PC Magazine reviews 73 IBM-PC compatible portables, some costing more than \$12,000 and some less than \$1,000. While the high-end machines are based on Intel's 386 chip and offer almost all the features of a well-equipped desktop model, the low-end machines based on the Intel 8086 chip - the original IBM PC brain — offer enough to keep most of us happy.

Issues to consider in selecting a traveling computer: Weight. Some of the portables, especially those featuring high-power chips, can support hard drives, external monitors, expansion slots. The question is, can you? Weight runs from 20 to 30 pounds. If dashing for the airplane hauling the equivalent of three one-gallon jugs of milk gives you pause, look lower down the

weight (and features) scale. · Display. If you were looking for crystal clear, bigscreen color displays, you wouldn't be looking at portables. Sure, some can connect a cable to an external monitor. But they're meant to be used on the road, and that means you'll see color depicted as shades of gray on

a screen that's 8-by-6 inches. · Keyboard. Something has to give to get a keyboard downsized enough for portability, but the shrunken keys should be those used for functions and cursor control. Trying to type on a keyboard with tighter-than-normal

letter-key spacing is a prescription for frustration. . Disk drives. The folks who say a portable must have a hard disk drive probably wouldn't consider running to the store in anything less powerful than a Maserati or a Corvette. For the rest of us, one 3.5-inch floppy drive,

maybe two, will do the job nicely. · Modem and expansion slots. You should have a modern so you can dial the office computer and pump through enough work to convince your boss that the trip isn't a junket. An expansion slot can mean added capabilities - and added weight and power consumption. There are also "home-base" units that allow you to bring the portable home and essentially turn it into a

· Power supply. It comes three ways - batteries, transformers, and ordinary wall current. Some of the batteries are rechargeable and can be brought back to life by the transformer unit. Others are disposable, Your choice on the road is lugging the transformer, typically at least another couple of pounds, hunting for new batteries or hunting for an outlet. If you're planning to use it in

flight, you have to have a battery. • Chip. Real power users - with real power wallets - will want Intel's 386 chip, with tremendous numbercrunching ability; others will use Intel 286 chip, yesterday's muscle machine. Anyone spending his own money and using the portable mostly for word processing and simple math will use the Intel 8086, which gets closer to the \$1,000 end of the scale.


