Northern Iowa shocks Missouri

NCAA Tournament

RICHMOND, Va. (AP) - Maurice Newby hit a 3pointer with one second left and Northern Iowa shocked No. 11 Missouri 74-71 in Friday's first round of the NCAA tournament's Southeast Regional. Troy Muilenburg and Brad Hill provided the outside shooting and Jason Reese added inside scoring and defensive rebounds as the 14th-seeded Panthers built a

12-point lead with 4:49 to play. But the Tigers, seeded No. 3, used an 8-0 run to get back in it and Nathan Buntin tied the game at 71-71 when he sank a layup with 29 seconds remaining, was fouled by Reese and made the free throw. It was the fifth personal for Reese, who finished with 18 points and 15 rebounds, 11 of them off the defensive

Northern Iowa brought the ball up the court and called time with 10 seconds left. Newby, who finished with nine points, worked himself free on the left wing and put up the winning 20-footer.

Missouri was unable to get the ball in play before time Northern Iowa (23-8) was playing in its first-ever NCAA tournament game after winning the Association of Mid-Continent Universities tournament.

Missouri (26-6), which was bounced from the first round of the Big Eight Conference tournament by Colorado last weekend, lost four of its final five games. Muilenburg scored seven points and Hill six in an 18-4 run that gave Northern Iowa a 25-11 lead. The Panthers made all six field-goal attempts in the surge, including five from 3-point range.

Northern Iowa made eight of 12 3-pointers en route to a 42-31 halftime lead. Minnesota 64, UTEP 61 OT: Melvin Newbern had three clutch baskets and sparked a stingy Minnesota defense as the 20th-ranked Gophers beat Texas-El Paso 64-61 in overtime Friday and moved on to the second round of the NCAA Southeast regional.

Newbern had a 3-pointer at the end of regulation and the first and last baskets of overtime and was also the point man on a defense that forced UTEP turnovers on three of their first five possessions in overtime. The Gophers (21-8) next play Northern Iowa on Sunday after the Panthers upset Missouri 74-71 earlier in the day.

The score was tied at 50-all when Newbern, whose ballhawking had helped erase a 47-42 deficit, hit a 3point jumper from the left corner to give Minnesota a 53-50 lead with 55 seconds left.

Henry Hall came back with 34 seconds left with a 3pointer from beyond the key to tie it at 53-all and Newbern's 23-footer at the buzzer fell off the front of the rim. Willie Burton hit a 3-pointer 40 seconds later to give the Gophers a five-point lead. UTEP (21-11) got as close as one point, but Minnesota hit four of five free throws in the final 1:08 to preserve the victory. Newbern clinched it with a layup after the UTEP's final basket.

During an early morning stroll in August 1986, Gisele Golding, then 64, tripped and fell over a defect in the sidewalk on the south side of East Middle Turnpike, just west of Summit Street. As a result, Golding fractured a

rib and sustained cuts and bruises over the right eye, right knee, and To compensate for medical expenses and other damages, including lost wages from missed work, she

filed a lawsuit against the town. Last November, a judge recommended the town pay her \$7,500 for her losses. Her attorney agreed the amount was fair. And so did the Town Attorney's office, citing Gold and the defect in the sidewalk — a metal sign pole protruding from the sidewalk — as demonstrable. This settlement plus two others were approved last month by the Board of Directors. The three, totalling more than \$11,850, are not un-

Town Attorney Maureen Chmielecki says that since 1984, the town has paid out about \$100,000 to victim's of what, for some at least, are mean streets. And the town is exposed to liability for approximately another \$215,000. "We have some very sizable suits

Future of Lithuania discussed

MOSCOW (AP) — A delegation of Lithuanian legis-lators arrived in Moscow today seeking talks on their declaration of independence, which Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev has demanded they renounce as il-

In the Lithuanian capital of Vilnius, President Vytautus Landsbergis said Soviet military maneuvers in the breakaway Baltic republic were increasing tensions

On Sunday, Soviet military jets buzzed Vilnius in what many Lithuanians considered an intimidation tactic, and Soviet troops held maneuvers in the countryside. "The military exercises of Soviet troops in Lithuania now underway are intensifying tensions," Landsbergis told Lithuania's legislature, according to Lithuanian television editor Eduardas Potashinkis, who monitored

The Lithuanian leader said he was fold in a meeting with high-ranking Soviet officers on Sunday that the maneuvers had been planned long in advance. Landsbergis asked if he would be notified in advance of future maneuvers, one of the officers replied that he

could not make any guarantees. The six-member delegation that arrived in Moscow was headed by Egidius Bickauskas, a lawyer who recenty resigned from Lithumnian Communist Party. It was empowered by Lithuania's parliament to meet with Gorbachev and propose a start of negotiations on independence, said a spokesman for the Lithuanian

nationalist movement Sajudis. The Soviet Congress of People's Deputies on Thursday declared Lithuania's Feb. 11 declaration of independence illegal and directed Gorbachev to defend Soviet interests and citizens in the Baltic republic of 3.8

Sartor cut \$22,000 that was earmarked for an audit that he said is included in the town's budget. He cut another \$100,000 from the budget, saying that the school would save money from a higher number of retirements than expected.





Rates reflect cost of clean environment

Town officials have known for the past five years that an increase in town sewer service rates would be needed in the 1990-1991 budget, so the fact that one is being proposed now should come as no surprise.

But the size of the proposed increase, 45 per cent, does comes as a bit of a shock.

The chief reason for the increase is the cost of the improvements to the town's sewage disposal plant, improvements mandated by the federal government to improve the quality of treated water discharged by the plant into the Hockanum River.

General Manager Richard Sartor, when he announced the proposed rate hike at a news conference Friday, observed that it was fortunate that Manchester undertook the sewage treatment plant improvements when federal money was still available for such improvements, which is no longer

As a matter of fact the town had to fight hard to get that money, and it took special arrangements with the state government to get it.


The need for the sewer rate increase illustrates that when we set out to protect the environment from ourselves, it costs us money.

Clean water, clean air, disposing of hazardous materials, and recycling to reduce the amount of solid refuse we have to accommodate all carry a price tag. Obviously the price tag for not taking steps to protect the environment is even higher.

WASHINGTON - Without working a day, former president Gerald R. Ford will pocket more money from the federal government next year than will President

While Ford lounges at his retreats in Vail and Palm Springs, he will collect a yearly federal pension of \$219,199 - the combined pension for his years as a congressman and president. Bush, who must show up at the office every day, will receive a salary of \$200,000.

Why should an ex-president cost the axpayers more than the current one? In ts self-serving wisdom, Congress has devised a retirement program that may be the most generous in the land. If Congress were a private business, the IRS would disqualify this pension plan.

Congress gives full benefits to workers who would be considered ineligible, early retirees in the private sector. In the real world, former Rep. Tony Coelho, D-Calif., would not have been cleared for hefty pension benefits when he left his post at the age of 47. Nevertheless, when Coelho turns 50, the government pension checks will start arriving in the mail.

And a hurricane it is. It's almost impossible to watch a sports event on television without evidence of corporate sponsorship. The marketers hope you remember the sponsor's product. They hope you don't notice that you're receiving subtle sales pitches of non-commercial

This phenomenon is taking place because it makes good economic sense to the marketers. Commercial sup-

port of sports is now so big that entire divisions of public relations and advertising firms are devoted to making arrangements for these "subliminal" messages. As a consumer, you may ask what's going on. As a stockholder, you may question why the corporation is spending its money in this way instead of increasing

dividends. If you're a sports purist, you may wonder what such commercialism does to the game. Only good things, in the view of Jack Mahoney, adviser to John Hancock on sports sponsorship. "It's a way of influencing the way people look at John Hancock. They may not think of us as only a big insurance company after seeing us as special events sponsors. We're more diverse, and this gets that point across," he says. He has in mind the Boston Marathon. Hancock breathed new life into the marathon in 1986 by committing a million dollars a year for 10 years to provide prize

sports organizations to reject support from tobacco com-Ross Johnson (the executive who lost control of RJR Nabisco) signed his company up to sponsor a dozen events, including the Nabisco Prix in tennis and golf, the Dinah Shore golf championship and the Planters Pat Bradley International Golf tournament. Some Johnson critics suggested he did it because he liked rubbing elbows with major athletes, movie stars and ex-presidents

rather than to sell products. Whatever the true reasons, some companies obviously believe they do enormous good for the events they sponsor. They provide infusions of cash for the athletic departments when schools are involved or prize money that attracts the big names in professional sports.







Floods kill 14; thousands homeless

ELBA, Ala. (AP) — A weekend diminish the devastation after two days of torrential rains in southern Alabama, where flooding killed 10 people and forced at least 3,700 to flee their homes.

Water from nearly non-stop rain Thursday and Friday also swelled rivers and streams in Georgia, where authorities blamed flooding for four deaths in auto accidents. Some Alabama rivers were expected to crest at 20 feet or more above flood level today or Tuesday, while some rivers in southern Georgia were not expected to crest until Friday, the National Weather

Service said. Hardest hit was Elba, where an earthen levee ruptured Saturday along the Pea River. On Sunday, though the river was one of the few starting to recede in the state, water still nipped at downtown rooftops, 1,500 of the city's 4,400 people were homeless and roads, homes, schools and businesses were paralyzed.

Elba Mayor Fred Moore es timated the cleanup would cost millions of dollars. "I've never seen anything like it," said U.S. Rep. Bill Dickinson,
