



As part of a massive consolidation effort to compensate for recent revenue losses, Comfed Bancorp in the next year will close 10 of its 30 branch offices, including one at 23 Main St. and another in South Windsor, bank officials said Friday.

Patricia Oris, Comfed's vice president for marketing and public relations, said the shutdown in Manchester is not likely to occur for eight or nine months and she could not estimate how many jobs would be eliminated. "Obviously people will be laid off," Oris said, adding that the Lowell, Mass.-based bank would attempt to limit layoffs by encouraging employees whose positions are in jeopardy to seek transfers to other branches with open-

"All employees are being sent listings of open positions when they become available," she said. Oris added that the company will warn employees 60 days in advance of their positions being eliminated and will assist them in finding work outside Comfed if they cannot get jobs within the bank.

There are no plans to shut down Comfed's two other

offices in Manchester, she said. These are at 1007 Main St. and at 217 Spencer St. However, the branch at 29 Oakland Road in South Windsor will be shut down within the next few months. A third office in Connecticut plus seven in Massachusetts complete the closures.

In a news release issued Friday, the bank is calling the consolidations a streamlining to increase the company's efficiency and enhance profitability.
"The past year has been a difficult one for Comfed and for New England banks in general," Jefferson F. Allen, the bank's chairman and chief executive officer is quoted as saying in the release.



Firefighters win pact after 3 years

HARTFORD (AP) — A three-member arbitration panel has settled 60 disputed issues and awarded Hartford firefighters a four-year union contract, ending a bitter, three-year contract dispute. The panel, which began hearings in 1988, issued a 186-page decision Wednesday that awards firefighters long-awaited raises totaling more than 30 percent. The contract also appears to give a number of strongly contested "management rights" back to the city administra-

None of the city's 13 fire stations will be closed and department staffing will remain at 454 firefighters. Of that number, 451 currently belong to the union. The long standoff was marked by angry demonstrations by firefighters, including the release of three rats in City Hall, picketing at the homes of city officials and complaints that administrators slowed negotiations.

Members of Local 760 of the International Association of Fire Fighters, who have worked without a raise since July 1986, will receive immediate pay raises that compound to about 24 percent and lump-sum back payments of \$12,000 to \$19,000, depending on rank. Firefighters will see their base pay jump immediately from \$29,848 to \$36,597, with another 6 percent increase

On the management side, Fire Chief John Stewart was given authority to reduce the current staffing requirements of 86 firefighters per shift by eight firefighters. That decision should allow savings of about \$700,000 from the department's annual \$1.6 million overtime bill, Stewart said. The average firefighter currently earns about \$3,000 in overtime per year.

VERNON (AP) - A million-dollar Lotto winner will be using some of his winnings to make restitution to a gun collector for \$30,000 worth of stolen guns he was convicted of possessing.

Michael A. Napolitano of East Hartford this week authorized the Division of Special Revenue, which pays

out Lotto money to winners, to use the interest on his Lotto earnings as payment to the gun collector. Napolitano split a \$2.2 million Lotto jackpot in August 1986 with another winner. He and his former wife were to receive about \$58,000 before taxes every year for 20 years, said lottery spokeswoman Cindy Chalfant.

Frank to gays: back Morrison

HARTFORD (AP) - U.S. Rep. Barney Frank, D Mass., is calling on gays and lesbians to make campaign contributions to Democratic gubernatorial candidate Bruce A. Morrison, based on Morrison's strong support for gay rights legislation.

Frank is under investigation by the House ethics committee, which is looking into his acknowledged relationship with a male prostitute.

"Bruce would be a great governor. His administration would be a model for how a state should relate to its gay and lesbian residents, not only in the area of civil rights but also in the level of compassion and support for those among us who suffer from AIDS and HIV infection," said Frank in a letter sent to backers of the Human Rights Campaign Fund, the nation's largest homosexual-rights political organization, based in Washington. Gregory King, spokesman for the fund, said that Mor-

rison has received money from its political action com-mittee in the past, as has former Republican U.S. Sen. Lowell P. Weicker Jr., who is running for governor this year as an independent. King said the organization sticks to federal races and would not make an endorsement or a contribution through its PAC in Connecticut's gubernatorial race.

Despite the ethics inquiry into Frank's personal life,

Morrison, a four-term congressman from Hamden, said:

Asked if he thought gay rights would be an issue in this year's campaign, Morrison said, "I don't know why it would be. My experience with people in this state is that they don't believe in discrimination. "We're talking here about private, consensual conduct . (that is) frankly, none of the government's business,"

I have no problem with his support."



R. Dixon Herman

HARRISBURG, Pa., (AP) - R. Dixon Herman, the federal judge who presided over the conspiracy and kid-napping trial of the "Harrisburg 7," which included the Rev. Phillip Berrigan, died Thursday of a heart attack.

Herman, who served as a county solicitor, juvenile court judge and state House of Representative, was appointed to the federal bench by President Nixon on Dec. 11, 1969, and became a senior judge on Sept. 25, 1981. In the 1972 trial, several priests, muns and others, in-cluding Berringan, were charged with conspiring to blow up underground steam tunnels in Washington and kidnap Henry Kissinger, then Nixon's national security advisor.

The group hoped to force the end of the Vietnam War.

A SLIM, SEXY The jury could not agree on the charges and acquitted the seven of all charges except smuggling letters into the federal prison at Lewisburg, Pa.

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Clair Huffaker, a Western novelist and screenwriter who wrote such film classics as "The Comancheros" and "The War Wagon," died Tuesday of an aneurysm. He was 63. Huffaker was an assistant editor for Time magazine in

After publishing his first two novels in 1957, he wrote "Badman" a year later. The novel became the screenplay for the 1967 film "The War Wagon." In 1961, Huffaker co-authored the screenplay for "The Comancheros" with James Edward Grant. He wrote numerous other screenplays based upon his own novels, including, "Seven Ways From Sundown,"
"Posse From Hell," "Rio Conchos" and "Flap," which as a novel was entitled "Nobody Loves a Drunken Indian."

ROME (AP) — PLO chairman Yasser Arafat said Friday that he had had secret contacts with Israeli leaders to discuss the Middle East peace process and the Palestinian uprising in the occupied lands.

But Friday night in New York, an Israeli official

'categorically" denied such contacts. Arafat made his remarks in an interview with Italy's state-owned RAI television, broadcast hours after the Palestinian leader held his third meeting in eight years with Pope John Paul II. Asked whether he had had clandestine contact with Is-

rael, Arafat replied, "Yes, there is. There are many contacts between the Palestinian and Israeli leadership. For example, (former Defense Minister Yitzhak) Rabin sent an emissary with a message for me. Even (Prime Minister Yitzhak) Shamir did so." In New York, Yuval Rotem, spokesman for the Israeli

ISLAMABAD, Pakistan (AP) -Moslem guerrillas fired on a surrender ceremony in Afghanistan Friday in which 10,000 rebels were giving up to the Soviet-backed government and more than 12 people were killed, Kabul radio said. The major rebel organization Jamait-i-Islami said the surrender was a trick, planned five months ago to trap government forces. Two Afghan generals, one of them a deputy security minister; nine guerrillas and several civilians

died in the close-range battle that broke out during the ceremony in northwestern Herat province, the official Afghan broadcast said. Jamiat-i-islami (Islamic Society) is considered the most militarily efficient of the seven Pakistan-based

Food labels confuse, rather than clarify

CODY, Wyo. - At the ice cream case in the IGA supermarket here, shoppers are confronted by a chaotic assortment of conflicting product claims that hardly encourage rational decision-making.

Meadow Gold Light promotes itself as "93 percent fat free." Breyer's Natural Light claims it has "one-third less butterfat than ice cream." Viva Ice Milk says it contains "less than half the fat of ice cream."

Those last two claims require knowledge of the fat content of ice cream. The IGA house brand says it has seven grams of fat per cup - but how many people know what that means?

Breyer's Natural Light also lists its fat content - but as a percentage (27) of total calories. The Darigold package provides no information whatever about the fat content of the ice cream inside.

There isn't much more clarity in the breakfast cereal aisle, where products made from corn, oats, wheat and rice clamor for consumer attention with "high fiber," "whole grain" and "vitamin fortified" claims as well as hints that they confer at least limited protection against everything from cancer to heart attacks.

Food labels that confound rather than clarify are hardly limited to IGA stores, From Ralph's in Los Angeles to Waldbaum's in New York, from Winn Dixie in the Southeast to Fred Meyer in the Northwest, shoppers are constantly assailed by confusing if not contradictory information on food packages. Some examples: · A "light" (or "lite") claim can refer to a food's tex-

ture, taste, density or even its color rather than its caloric content. Similarly, there are no standard definitions of such overused terms as "natural" and "high fiber." "Low calorie" products can contain no more than 40 calories per serving or 0.4 calories per gram (does anybody know how much that is?), while "reduced calorie" foods must have at least one-third fewer calories

than the products for which they substitute. "No cholesterol" or "cholesterol free" products can be high in saturated fats that elevate blood cholesterol levels faster than cholesterol itself does. · "Enriched" foods have had some, but not necessarily all, of their original nutrients added back after being lost

during processing. "Fortified" foods have had nutrients that were not original components added during process- Food producers often list a variety of oils — both high and low in the saturated fats that raise blood cholesterol levels - that might be used in a product without specifying which one was actually chosen. Thus,

a label might say a packaged food contains "soybean oil, com oil and/or palm kernel oil and coconut oil." The U.S. Department of Agriculture requires that "lean" meat contain no more than 10 percent fat and "extra lean" contain a maximum of 5 percent fat. But USD has authorized an exemption to that standard for the single largest source of animal fat in the average


person's diet — the ground beef used to make ham-burgers. It can be called "lean" or "extra lean" even if it contains as much as 221/2 percent fat. USDA regulates the labeling of meat, poultry and eggs, while the Food and Drug Administration establishes standards for all other foods - but the FDA has not made any major changes in its nutritional disclosure

requirements since 1973. As a result, the packages containing thousands of products still offer detailed information about the content of B vitamins almost nobody cares about - riboflavin, thiamine and niacin.

At the same time, the FDA doesn't require - and few food producers provide - data about how much fat, cholesterol, sodium, fiber, sugar and additives are included in products being offered to increasingly healthconscious consumers.





LOS ANGELES - The word is that "Elvis" is not dead, just waiting to make a comeback. The ABC Sunday night television series, which stars Michael St. Gerard as rock 'n' roll singer Elvis Presley, was taken off the air in mid-March after a poor performance in the ratings race.

The critically acclaimed show continues in production, however, as the network looks for a new time period. ABC officials say it could return as early as May. ABC had high hopes for "Elvis," which followed "America's Funniest Home Videos" on Sunday. But several things happened to derail those hopes. The video show became such a runaway hit that the ratings for "Elvis," by comparison, looked dismal.

Even a preview behind top-rated "Roseanne" didn't Next, Fox Broadcasting scheduled the animated show "The Simpsons" against it, and that show creamed "Elvis." Most young viewers watch ABC's "America's Funniest Home Videos," then switch to Fox for "The Simpsons." The rest of the country watches CBS's "Murder, She Wrote" or the NBC movie. In the ratings, "Elvis' came in only slightly

ahead of the Fox also-rans. The decision to pull "Elvis" came after "America's Funniest Home Videos" finished first in the Nielsen ratings for the week ending March 11, while "Elvis" was 45th. ABC felt it had to act because of the enormous drop in viewership. In the overall ratings for the 1989-90 season,

"Elvis" was in 56th place, halfway through the Nielsen ratings of the 112 shows in prime time including those that have been replaced. On the plus side, "Elvis" did better than anything else ABC has tried in that Sunday time slot in a

Young viewers who control the sets early Sunday night apparently aren't aware of Presley. If they remember him at all, it's from his later, bloated, Las Vegas years, Even St. Gerard, who's 27, concedes he wasn't an Elvis fan. St. Gerard, in an interview before the ABC decision, said that he doesn't pay much attention to

the ratings and that ABC executives told him they would stick with the show. "I do my best and after that it's not in my hands," he says. "I figure anybody cool is going to watch us. It's a quality show. The critical reaction has been overwhelming. We set out to do something respectful of an American legend. I never took this as a joke."

The show is filmed on authentic locations in Memphis, Tenn., and St. Gerard strives for an interpretation rather than an imitation. He looks remarkably like Presley even without the benefit of makeup and he possesses the singer's early charm and shyness. He lip-syncs to lyrics sung by Ronnie McDowell

because the scenes require more flexibility than is found in original Presley recordings. St. Gerard was in Los Angeles for a few days after he began filming "Elvis" late last year. He lives in New York, where he played a small role in an ABC Afterschool Special, "The Accident." Regardless of the outcome of "Elvis," St. Gerard

seems assured of a booming career. He previously starred in the movie "Hairspray," and now he's reading nine scripts to see what his next picture will be. First, he was returning to Memphis to film four more episodes of "Elvis."

"I'm anxious to get back," he says. "I love the South, I miss it. I miss my friends there, I miss Elvis, too. It's funny. I miss playing the part.

Focus/Movies Lowe's latest resembles life

BAD INFLUENCE (R) If you don't like thrillers that play with you - that take a tricky, highly charged premise and then work it (and you) into a frenzy — then you probably won't want to bother with Curtis Hanson's latest. If, on the other hand, you love to be creeped by the right movie, then hurry to see this nourish tale of personality transfer between a handsome, sociopathic drifter (Rob Lowe) and a somewhat stodgy, overworked

yuppie (James Spader). Contemplate the canny casting: Rob Lowe, the soft-spoken brat-packer who scandalized everybody with his off-screen (but on video) sexual hijinks. And James Spader, the equally soft-spoken actor who played his "sex, lies, and videotape" for the movies. Together, these two are an inspired pairing, with Lowe playing a character whose behavior is surprisingly close to what has become known as the "Rob Lowe video/sex scandal." In fact, for the literal-minded viewer, this thriller will probably

reinforce the impression of Lowe as sexual scamp. Whatever its secondary effect, "Bad Influence" works on the most primal level - as a pleasurably perverse, enjoyably nasty thriller. Director Hanson is the guy who gave us the suggestive, if hokey, "The Bedroom Window" a few years ago. He also wrote the script for the 1978 sleeper "The Silent Partner," about the strange kinship between a psychopathic department store Santa Clause and a nebbishy bank teller. Here, taking a cue from Hitchcock's "Strangers on a Train," Hanson continues the psychic kinship theme, as the Lowe character introduces Spader to the darker excesses

of L.A. nightlife. This is the kind of thriller that depends upon the buildup of suspense and surprise, so we won't spoil it by revealing the plot. Suffice it to say that the pieces of David Koepp's script fit together niftily, creating an eroticism-tinged puzzle of innocence in conflict with corruption. And wait till you see what Lowe does in the role of a seductive stinker: That narcissistic smile of Lowe's has never seemed so chilling. Pans of movies like "Dressed to Kill." "Dead Ringers" and "The Fourth Man," consider

this review an alert. GRADE: ***1/2 MOUNTAINS OF THE MOON (R) Bob Rafelson, the man who once gave us the minor classic "Five Easy Pieces," hasn't been heard from much in recent years. (He directed the thriller "Black Widow" a few years ago.) So it's with some expectation that one comes to his new film - a big, picturesque movie about 19th century English explorers Sir Richard Burton (Patrick Bergin) and John Hanning Speke (Ian Glen), whose search for the source of the Nile ended in a feud that is still

Rafelson is not the kind of filmmaker to do a straight epic: His sensibility is too offbeat. Indeed, the movie has strange currents running through it. There are traces of home eroticism in the relationship between the two explorers, as well as an emphasis on odd (and sometimes brutal and disturbing) customs among the Africans that Burton and Speke come in contact with. According to the film, slavery didn't need white imperialists to introduce it: It already existed among some of the black tribes

Why isn't the film totally satisfying? This viewer's hunch is that Rafelson brought an innate ambivalence about Hollywood epics to the project, and that this ambivalence, when applied to the already complex saga of Burton and Speke, muddied the movie. But see it anyway. GRADE: ★★1/2

Focus/Music **Pettis finding** his audience

Pierce Pettis calls the music on his "While the Serpent Lies Sleeping" album "post-modern folk." "It borrows from a lot of things that have gone before," Pettis says. "It tramples on convention in a

"I might have a song with guitar and flute. The next song might have synthesizer and electric guitar. It doesn't matter. People in a traditional folk vein would be horrified at that."

Pettis, who wrote nine of the 10 songs and cowrote the other, made the album for an independent label a year ago. A month later, Windham Hill which is expanding the kinds of music it presents - became interested and has re-released it.

They didn't remix it. Pettis says: "They added more punch on some things, things we didn't have money and time to do the first time. Pretty much, it's a straight release of the album the way it was. I don't think Windham Hill has done that before. It was flattering to me."

A friend from college, Steve Vance, who now designs a line of greeting cards, "had made me a promise that when I got ready to do my album, he was going to do the cover." Windham Hill also kept that. Pettis says, "I don't think they've done that before, either."

"Legacy," which is on "While the Serpent Lies Sleeping," was the title song on a Windham Hill folk sampler last fall.

Pettis sees more people being interested in the kind of music he makes. "I think toward the end of the '80s, people began to realize there's nothing wrong with showing you have a sensitive side. Looking out for No. 1 wears a little thin after a while. Audiences like a song that appeals to your heart and means something." Pettis has lived a folkie life, even becoming a

busker in the subways of London. He met his wife when he returned to Florida State University. The next quarter she went to study in London. "I took my savings and followed her to London. I made friends with buskers. Patrick O'Sullivan helped me find a place to live. I made a little money, enough to buy an amplifier and mike and I

started playing pubs. I made more money. They liked hearing a guy from America singing American songs. I did 'Me and Bobby McGee' ad "They liked 'London Homesick Blues,' about a guy from Texas who wants to go home. Gary P.

Nunn wrote that song. It's very funny. "We both decided to come back. I sold my equipment and bought a ticket. I finished college. She went to Chapel Hill to work on her master's and Ph.D. We eventually got married. I continued per-

They live where Meg Pettis teaches college English, previously in the Midwest, now in Atlanta. They have two children and expect a third. "Some of my best songs are about missing my family," Pettis says. "It is hard to leave your kids. Every 4year-old I see, I want to talk to."

Pettis was born in Fort Payne, in northeastern Alabama, and went to high school with future members of Alabama, "I was into rock 'n' roll and folk. I didn't identify with country at that time. I came to appreciate it. It is my roots. It is not so much southern as it is rural. A lot of slick country that came on later I didn't like much." Pettis went to Florida State for two years, where

he partied and lacked discipline. He went to the Muscle Shoals Sound Studios as a songwriter, with jobs on the side — one counting cars for the state to determine locations of traffic lights. "That's when I decided to go back to college."

Focus/Books Smith at home writing stories By Phil Thomas

NEW YORK - "Short stories," says Lee Smith, "are a labor of love. They have to be because you sure can't make much money on them." That's why seven of the 45-year-old Smith's nine books are novels. But the other two are collections of her stories: "Cakewalk" and the newly published

"Me and My Baby View the Eclipse." Smith — an outgoing woman who smiles readily and speaks with a soft accent she describes as "Appalachian, or you can call it 'mountain'" - says: "Short stories were my first great love. It seems as

if I've been writing them all my life. "But, then, you get roped into writing novels. It's hard to get stories published. A lot of my favorite stories have never been published. There aren't that many places to send them. If you really want to make some money, you write a novel. And, it used to be that a publisher wouldn't publish your stories unless you wrote a novel or two, but that's changing now."

Smith, who lives with her husband in Chapel Hill, N.C., supplements her writing income by teaching at North Carolina State University in near-

"Not many writers earn a living by writing," Smith says with a laugh. "So, I'm an English professor. I kind of slipped through the back door since I've only got a B.A. I guess they took me because of my books.

"I'm lucky. I like to teach and I like kids. I teach them fiction writing. I just couldn't write fiction all the time - I wouldn't have that much to say." The teaching fits in with Smith's feelings about the short story. She thinks of it as a "young person's form. So intense. Like a lyric poem. When you are in your 20s, you can't conceive of spending a year or two writing about your characters' whole lives. When you're young, you want to write about intensity of various kinds. The novel is more of a

form for the middle-aged person. "I still love the story, but the older I get the more drawn I am to the novel. And yet, if I'm working on a novel and I get an idea for a story, I stop and write the story. As soon as I get the idea, the story is complete and ready to go. There is no long exploratory process involved like there is in writing a

Smith says she gets the ideas for her work from a variety of sources. "Intensive Care," one of nine stories in her new collection and the first among equals, deals with a man who has left his family to marry the woman he has loved since he first met her in high school. Now, the woman is dying of

"It will take Cherry Oxendine two more weeks to

die. She's tough. And even when there's nothing left of her but heart, she will fight all the way. She will go out furious, squeezing Harold's hand at the very moment of death, clinging fast to every minute of this bright, hard life. And although at first he won't want to, Harold will go on living. ... Eventually Harold may even go back to his family, but he will love Cherry Oxendine until the day he dies." Smith says the germ of the story came to her when my mother was in intensive care. Before she died, I got to know all the families of the other folks in intensive care and the situation presented itself. So often you find you can deal with emotion in a story, but not in reality.

"There's a lot of grief about my mom in that "Me and My Baby View the Eclipse" published by Putnam.





Photography Eastman home now a museum

The International Museum of Photography at George Eastman House has moved into its own spacious quarters, freeing the Eastman Kodak founder's Rochester, N.Y., home to become a living

Inventor and philanthropist George Eastman was a well-known and beloved Rochester resident. His 50-room mansion on East Avenue is considered to be "the largest private residence ever built in Rochester." The house features the faithful re-creation of a

typical scene from 1932. A pack of cigarettes lies beside a cloisonne ashtray. Newspapers and annual reports are scattered on a coffee table. Fresh flowers are arranged in every room, and potted plants hang from chandeliers and in the conservatory. Everything, from clocks to telephones to cleaning equipment, is "state of the art" - at least for 1932. According to Kathy Wolkowicz, curator of Eastman House, previous visitors will be amazed to see the changes made during the recently completed

\$1.8 million restoration. Before it opened as a museum in 1947, Eastman House went through a number of transformations, and much of its beauty was hidden or dismantled. Restorers, using as reference the more than 40 photographs Eastman had made of his home, uncovered the "polished" finish of the conservatory's sandstone columns; rebuilt three walls of bookcases in the living room; re-created cast-plaster details on the dining room ceiling; and remade the Oriental



'Old folks' move up, upstarts out at Masters

AUGUSTA, Ga. - The Masters turned from the upstarts to the old folks on Friday.

Ray Floyd had the lead after two rounds and a pleased Jack Nicklaus, only four back, said, "I'm right there." The 47-year-old Floyd supplanted the first-timers with a 4-under-par 68, using a mastery of the par-5 holes as the centerpiece - just as he did when he set a Masters scoring record in 1976.

Fourteen years ago, Floyd set the 72-hole Masters record at 271, 17 under par, that still stands; he was 15 under on the par-5 holes.

Floyd birdied them all on this cloudy, sometimes rainy day as golf's golden oldies made their moves on the hills of the Augusta National Golf Club. John Huston, who set the first-round pace, drifted back

Nicklaus, seeking his seventh Masters title, extracted a 2-under-par 70 from gusty, swirling winds. "Four back with 36 holes to go," he mused after a look

"I think I have a very good chance," said the 50-yearold Nicklaus, who found a revival of confidence and enthusiasm last week in a victory in his first start on the Senior's Tour.

"It's amazing what playing well for one week does to you," he said, after rallying from a back-nine double "A couple of good rounds ..." he said, letting his sen-

tence trail off. Floyd, four strokes back at the start of play, made his big move with a string of three birdies, two on par-5 holes, beginning on the 13th. He finished with a 138 total, a 1-shot lead and the attention of his juniors. "He's like Nicklaus. When they get in it, they get bug-eyed," said Scott Hoch, who put himself in position to grab the title he left on the 10th green in a sudden-

death playoff a year ago. Hoch, who missed a 2-foot putt that would have won the 1989 Masters, moved within a stroke of the secondround lead with a 68 that put him at 139. Hoch, who called a press conference Tuesday to

answer all the questions about his year-old failure, said his high standing came as something of a surprise. "Tuesday, I thought it would be the last time I would see you guys and gals," he said to the again-assembled

Huston was next at 140 after a 74. Jumbo Ozaki, Japan's leading player for the past two

seasons, followed at 141. He shot a 71. Then came the group at 142: Nicklaus, Peter Jacobsen, former Masters winner Craig Stadler, Bill Britton and Mike Hulbert. Britton shot 74, some of it in a late-afternoon shower.

Stadler had a 70 and Hulbert a 71. Jacobsen, once tied for the lead, was sandbagged by a pair of back-nine double bogeys and finished with a 75. But his problems were as nothing compared with those of Donald, that 34-year-old journeyman who set the pace with a 64 Thursday in his first competitive round at Augusta National.

He went a stroke-a-hole higher on this trip over the old course Bobby Jones built, found all the trouble he avoided Thursday and finished with an embarassing 82. "I'm not ashamed," Donald said. "There's 30 million and, Floyd said, there's nothing to be ashamed of.

"I can empathize with Mike," Floyd said. "There's something about the Masters mystique that does it to you. It happens to all of us. It happened to me. "In 1965, in my first Masters, I shot 68. The next day I was paired with Arnold (Palmer) and I shot 82 or 83 - I don't remember - and missed the cut."

Donald didn't. But Palmer, now 60, did. The four-time Masters winner struggled to an 80 and missed the cut for the seventh consecutive year, this time with a 156 total.

Greg Norman, the muscular Australian who has come so close so often, also failed to make the field that will play this weekend. He matched par 72 and was down the Rookie Robert Gamez, a two-time winner this season,

also missed at 76-149.

Floyd was still well back of the leaders when he made the turn in 35, but but went in front, principally on his pet par-5s, on the back. The husky Floyd, twice a winner of the PGA and a former U.S. Open champ as well, got down in two from the left fringe for a birdie on the 13th. He got a bonus with a curling 18-foot putt that found


