### Bridge

**Test your defense**

Here is another defensive hand involving an assumption necessary to defeat a game contract. If you want to test yourself, cover the South and West hands and plan your defense after West's opening lead. Since West's queen of diamonds denotes possession of the king, the chances of taking four tricks seem poor, but East should still try his best. It may well be that West does not hold the cards necessary to defeat four hearts, but it is still your obligation to picture a minimum opening bid in the South hand and then develop the proper strategy for taking four tricks. Well?

If you led a club back at the second trick, give yourself an A-plus for astute defensive imagination. More often than not, declarer will hold the club queen, in which case there is no defense against the contract. But when South holds a raggad opening of 11 high-card points, the defense must be on the mark.

The defense becomes much more difficult when the opening lead is a low diamond rather than the queen from Q-J-10. Now it may be enough to simply return a diamond. (Whenever West holds the king, he will make a shift through the ace of clubs.) Here there is a chance for the defense only if West holds the club queen and the spade ace. If West holds the heart ace, declarer may be able to play three rounds of spades, shedding a club to still make the contract.

## It's over — sort of — but Assembly's work unfinished

HARTFORD — A last-minute filibuster by former House Speaker Irving Stobberg ended the 1990 General Assembly on a contentious note that spelled necessary for a special session and defeat for a bill putting the state on a two-year budget system.

Other legislative casualties during the session included restrictions on abortion, an easier-to-impose death penalty, an attempt to raise the speed limit on rural interstate highways and a proposal to increase the sales tax

on purchases of gas-guzzling cars.

"There's a lot of stuff on both calendars that the state of Connecticut can live without," said Senate Majority Leader Cornelius O'Leary, D-Windor Locks, as the final push to adjourn began Wednesday. "Civilization will continue."

When the House finally quit work at 11:59 p.m., dozens of bills died on the calendar for lack of action. They included a \$50 million bond program aimed at helping struggling manufacturing firms and a hastily written package of spending reforms intended to pacify conservative Democrats.

The House ran out of time before it could act on a \$451 million bond package to finance highway projects, forcing lawmakers to schedule a special session later this month. Lawmakers want to authorize the bonds before July 1, the start of the state's new fiscal year.

Perhaps the biggest casualty was the biennial budget bill itself. Democratic leaders in the Senate had made it a top priority for months, arguing it would help the state better control spending by forcing legislators to budget two years at a time.

The biennial budget bill was rejected, but the bill became the center of a bitter, last-minute dispute between House and Senate leaders.

Stobberg filibustered against the bill for about 40 minutes, yielding and regaining the floor several times before a vote on the bill at 11:45 p.m.

"It's very difficult for someone who has spent 20 years in this chamber to stand alone while others' bills win," Stobberg said at one point. "It's not my intention to hold any of those bills hostage."

## Town faces pension loss of \$232,000

A \$200,000 investment that Town Treasurer Roger Negro made with Pension Fund money has gone sour, and the fund is likely to lose the money plus the \$32,000 in interest that was to accrue, officials said today.

"I'm not holding out any hope," said Town Attorney Maurice Chmielecki. "Unfortunately I think the money will not be recovered because of the time elapsed since the money was to be paid to the town in January."

She is also pessimistic because the town has been unable even to contact the investment corporation, the Colorado-based Merus Corporation, which she said may no longer exist.

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## State OKs grant for Cheney Hall

Hours after Cheney family here celebrated \$500,000 for the restoration of Cheney Hall, the state House of Representatives gave final legislative approval Wednesday to a bond package including a \$200,000 grant for the project.

The Cheney family's gift — made Wednesday afternoon — has cleared the way for the Cheney Hall Foundation to invite bids on interior renovations to the hall.

Hours later, state lawmakers gave final approval to the package including the new grant, which brings to \$600,000 the amount that the state plans to contribute to the project.

A tentative timetable calls for opening the bids June 27, deciding July 18 whether to award a contract, and if it is awarded, signing a July 28.

Alan Lamson, chairman of the foundation's building committee, estimated that the work might be completed late in 1991.

The \$500,000 donation comes from surplus funds of the Cheney Cemetery Association, which have been set up as the Cheney Family Fund with the Hartford Foundation for Public Giving. Cheney notes the contribution to the hall restoration is the first gift from that fund.

## Top critic of Bush to head Democrats at budget summit

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congressional Democrats are putting a top critic of President Bush's tax policies in the driver's seat of their negotiating team seeking a deficit-reduction pact with the White House.

House Majority Leader Richard Gephardt, D-Mo., will serve as chairman of the talks and will preside except when Bush himself is in the room, House Speaker Thomas Foley, D-Wash., said Wednesday.

The talks were set after Bush assumed congressional leadership there were "no preconditions," not even his previous pledge of no new taxes. White House officials say that without action the federal deficit next year could double the \$64 billion allowed under the law.

The president has proposed a \$123 billion budget for the fiscal year beginning Oct. 1.

Failure to cut the deficit could force huge domestic and military spending cuts under the Gramm-Rudman budget-balancing law that neither party wants, and the Democrats quickly agreed to the talks. But there is no clear path to agreement on spending restraint and new revenue sources to avert the cuts.

Gephardt last year led the Democratic fight in the House against the capital gains tax cut that Bush sought. The debate was so tough that the president, who won the House vote but was blocked later in the Senate, complained to a Republican congressman afterward that Gephardt was making things too personal.

Since then, Gephardt has continued to take on the president — to the point where Bush's remarks seemed to indicate a personal aversion on his part.

Gephardt, who himself made a 1988 presidential bid, earlier this year gave a speech criticizing Bush as lacking in vision and leadership at a time of crucial change in Eastern Europe. The president attacked Gephardt for suggesting aid to the Soviet Union, and quipped, "But I don't want to know the man. Maybe he'll come up with a good idea one of these days."

When Gephardt succeeded Foley as majority leader last year he became the logical person to follow in

## Thoughts

Lettie Powers of the Roosevelt-St. Luke's Hospital in New York City writes that most experts agree the first step in overcoming loneliness is to "realize which solutions do not work and make isolation worse."

"The rescue fantasies" or "if only" do not work: "If only I had a new car, were thinner, more attractive, more intelligent, etc., my loneliness would be gone." These do not work because they do not address the problem within us.

Alcohol and tranquilizers are also common attempts to escape the feeling of loneliness, but are ultimately destructive because they avoid the real problem and only create new ones.

What can we do to rid ourselves of loneliness' inner pain? Do we grip our teeth and stay lonely? Not there are other alternatives, but they require an effort on our part. Dr. Robert Weiss of Harvard Medical School, speaks of developing (1) "supplemental relationships" — those of limited duration with professionals for guidance, groups of transitional nature (i.e. newcomers club, etc.) and emerging in volunteer work; (2) "supplemental communities" in which various supplemental relationships may be formed (i.e. Parents Without Partners, support groups, church groups, etc.) These groups provide opportunities to try out a new self beyond one's present world and serve as short-term relationships which eventually must be left behind as we re-establish permanent social, emotional, and spiritual relationships.

To turn to old ties to find new provisions is often disappointing. Relationships are not easily modified. New relationships take work to develop — one cannot develop them by avoiding them, but rather by doing some very practical things to deal with the root of loneliness, us.

## Military families may get eviction reprieve: Sartor

Military families may be able to stay in their homes in the Nike Site until the end of their tour of duty, according to Town Manager Richard Sartor.

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## Developer vindicated over water assessments

A dispute over water assessments levied on residents on Bidwell Street has resulted in the vindication of a local developer who installed the water line.

Two residents had complained to the town that their assessments were too high, but the developer, The Andrew Anasdi Co., proved later that the fees were installed under the proper guidelines of the town.

The matter first came to the attention of officials in early April when the residents made their complaints at a meeting of the Board of Directors. The assessments were to be approved at the meeting. However, the confusion generated from the complaints prompted directors to delay acting on the assessment until May 1.

Their complaints left the impression that Anasdi had ignored a regulation requiring the acquisition of a permit for the line. But Anasdi showed that he had obtained the needed permits, and the residents had signed an agreement requesting the installation of the line. A great deal of the confusion may have been related to changes in the system used for determining the assessments as well as changes in town staff since the water line was installed in 1986.

There are 32 houses in Nike Circle that the town would like to acquire for low-income and affordable housing.

Last week, the state Department of Human Resources decided against acquiring military properties in Connecticut for use by military welfare families, clearing the way for the town to buy the houses.

## Ill Dem returns for finale

HARTFORD (AP) — Even the most distracted lawmakers paused in the final, hectic hours of the 1990 General Assembly session to watch as Rep. Alex Knopp walked slowly to his seat in the House chamber.

Knopp, a Democrat from Norwalk, had not set foot in the House chamber all year. Stricken with Guillain-Barre syndrome, a rare neurological disorder that once paralyzed him from the waist down, he attended House sessions in a wheelchair until Wednesday.

As he entered the chamber Wednesday walking with the aid of two canes, debate came to an immediate halt. There was applause that lasted for several minutes as Knopp made his way to his desk.

"To be able to walk into the chamber is like icing on the cake," said later. "It's a very upbeat day for me."

That emotional moment stood out in the wild, weary, final hours of the legislative session. The House finished work at 11:59 p.m.; the Senate finished three minutes later. Official adjournment, however, did not come until 12:48 a.m., after a speech from Gov. William A. O'Neill.

Although time was at a premium, frivolous subjects ranging from the cost of air as gas stations to the availability of UConn basketball tickets, somehow worked their way into debate.

Late Tuesday, in a nearly empty House chamber, a voice voted removed the requirement that forces gas stations to offer their customers access to free air pumps.

That angered Rep. Eugene Migliaro, R-Wolcott, who helped write the original law a decade ago. To make matters worse, Migliaro wasn't in the House chamber when the bill passed.

"That's dirty pool," Migliaro

## Abortion, guns, budget part of Legislature's year

HARTFORD — The Connecticut General Assembly bid an emotional farewell Thursday to retiring Gov. William A. O'Neill and adjourned the 1990 session in which it affirmed a woman's right to abortion, tightened gun laws and passed an election-year budget with no tax increases.

Lawmakers refused, however, to make it easier to impose the death penalty and to raise the speed limit on rural interstate highways.

"God save the state of Connecticut," said Secretary of State Julia H. Tullaghan as she gave the session to a close at 12:48 a.m.

But lawmakers could not leave the building before talk began about the need for a special session.

An eleven-hour filibuster on a bill requiring biennial state budgets left the House no time to act on a \$453 million transportation bonding bill. Democratic leaders said a special session would be necessary, this month or next, to act on the measure.

Many feared the November election would preoccupy lawmakers this session. But it was the economy, not politics, that dominated debate despite the decision of one lawmaker, Rep. William J. Cibes of New London, to seek the Democratic gubernatorial nomination.

The General Assembly reduced O'Neill's \$7.24 billion budget to \$7.05 billion and passed \$133 million in tax law changes, including an extension of the capital gains tax to out-of-state residents who sell property in Connecticut.

The 1991 budget represents a 6 percent increase in spending over the current year, the lowest increase

in more than a dozen years.

But anti-abortionists were rebuffed every step of the way and the General Assembly voted up passing a bill designed to protect the right to abortion even if the Supreme Court reverses its historic 1973 Roe vs. Wade decision legalizing abortion.

The bill, already signed into law by the governor, requires that girls age 15 and younger get counseling before an abortion and encourages, but does not require, them to tell an adult relative before an abortion.

Several gun-control bills were debated this year and the toughest, one requiring a two-week waiting period before the purchase of any gun, cleared the House early Wednesday. It was headed to the governor's desk.

Another bill that sparked heated debate this year is aimed at cracking down on crimes motivated by bigotry or bias. The bill calls for penalties of up to \$5,000 and five years in prison for physical assault, violence, property damage or threats against someone because of race, religion, ethnicity or sexual orientation. It defines sexual orientation as a preference for heterosexuality, homosexuality or bisexuality.

O'Neill has expressed reservations about the measure, but has not said he would veto it.

The Senate, on a 26-10 vote, approved and sent to the governor a bill establishing a needle-exchange pilot program in New Haven. It is aimed at preventing the spread of AIDS through dirty needles.

As a result of a U.S. Supreme Court decision last year giving states more authority to restrict abortion, the strong pro-choice movement in Connecticut feared that the legislature would try to limit access to

Valve to hold up launch of shuttle

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — A faulty cooling valve in need of replacement will delay space shuttle Columbia's launch two to three weeks while NASA undertakes the first such repairs ever attempted on the launch pad.

Columbia had been scheduled to lift off May 16 or 17 with seven astronauts and the \$100 million Astro observatory, capable of probing ultraviolet and X-ray radiation.

But engineers this week spotted a problem with the valve, which controls the flow of coolant in the shuttle.

Technicians today were to begin the long process of gaining access to the valve.

The cooling system must be drained on toxic coolant before workers on platforms can replace the valve assembly, said NASA launch director Bob Sieck.

### Arkansas governor raps corps' role in flooding

Arkansas Gov. Bill Clinton called for a probe of the Army Corps of Engineers' flood control techniques as the Arkansas River hit its highest level in 47 years in Pine Bluff, swamping hundreds of homes.

Thousands of cattle were stranded and crops flooded out in Arkansas, where homeowners shot at joy-riding boats rolling the water outside. In Texas, residents began returning to their damaged homes as the water receded.

Heavy rain and flooding in the past two weeks have claimed 13 lives.

At a meeting with angry farmers in Ashdown, Ark., on Wednesday,

Clinton said a task force should look at corps management of the Arkansas River, which runs diagonally across the state from the northwest, and the Red River, in the southeast.

Clinton later said state officials were talking with the corps to see if more water could be held in upstream reservoirs starting today to reduce flooding.

Appearing on ABC's "Nightline" with Brig. Gen. Robert C. Lee, the regional corps commander, Clinton said southwestern Arkansas residents "feel that maybe the Corps could be holding some more water back. The levees have broken there in places, in other places, there's no opportunity even to put the sandbags up."

### Mistake makes Hubble miss mark

WASHINGTON (AP) — It was a math mistake everybody has made in a checkbook, but in this case it caused the Hubble Space Telescope to miss its target by three miles.

Sombody added when he should have subtracted. Or vice versa.

Embarrassed NASA scientists gave that explanation Wednesday for the failure of the telescope to find two bright stars. The telescope missed its target by one-half degree — about the width of a full moon as seen from Earth.

"When we were trying to point the telescope to the center of a pretty rich star field with a high probability of acquisition we were really off to one side of that," said Jean Olivier, deputy manager of the Hubble project for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

### Indians to share natural resources

MADISON, Wis. (AP) — A federal judge, in a decision with far-reaching consequences, has ruled northern Wisconsin's "harvestable natural resources" should be split 50-50 between Chippewas and non-Indians.

The ruling Wednesday by U.S. District Judge Barbara Crabb came in a lawsuit over Chippewa rights under 19th century treaties to hunt deer, but state legal experts say the decision extends to fishing and logging.

Lawyers for Wisconsin's estimated 4,000 Chippewas had no immediate comment on the ruling.

Tom Maulson, a Chippewa active in treaty issues, said the tribe has supported the idea of sharing resources for years. He said dividing the resources will not unfairly deprive the Chippewa of their rights.

### Man facing life in tree poisoning

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — An ex-convict was convicted of poisoning the historic Treaty Oak with a powerful herbicide in an alleged occult ritual at the centuries-old tree and could get up to life in prison.

Paul Steidman Cullen Jr., 46, faces five to 99 years in prison following conviction and problems while on probation.

Cullen refused to comment as he was led from court, but his father testified his son had done no harm to the 60-foot oak discovered poisoned a year ago.

### Social Security credit for women proposed

WASHINGTON (AP) — An advocacy group has recommended that people who stay home to care for children or disabled family members be given Social Security credit.

The Older Women's League said Wednesday that current law penalizes women, who are more likely than men to leave the work force for family duties that give them no credit in the Social Security system.

The group released a report that executive director Joan Kuriansky said "shows in brutal detail what is in store for America's mid-life and younger women."

Rep. Barbara Kennelly, D-Conn., brought members of her family representing three generations to the news conference to illustrate the problems faced by the aged and their caretakers.

HARTFORD (AP) — Testimony is expected to begin May 21 in the trial of Karin Aparo, the Glastonbury teen-ager accused of plotting with her boyfriend to kill her mother.

The last of the 12 main jurors was seated Wednesday morning, but four alternate jurors still have to be selected before testimony in the trial can begin.

Superior Court Judge Thomas H. Corrigan originally forecast a June

start-up date for the trial after anticipating difficulty in selecting a jury. The judge had dismissed about half of the prospective jurors because they said they could not be fair.

Aparo's lawyer, Hubert J. Santos, made a series of attempts to have the case dismissed or moved to a different judicial district, claiming that pre-trial publicity had made it impossible to select an impartial jury. But Corrigan denied those requests.

## Drivers vote with their feet

Now we know. The Democrats are the party in favor of higher taxes and lower speed limits.

Earlier this week, the General Assembly, in its annual foot race to adjournment, killed by one vote a proposal that would have raised the maximum speed limit on the state's limited access highways.

There are a number of good reasons to raise the maximum allowed speed limit. The federal government has threatened to withhold funds from Connecticut for failing to enforce the 55 mph to the feds' satisfaction. It's a problem that states with higher speed limits do not have.

Another reason to increase the speed limit is that there is no good reason not to. The argument is made that lower speed limits save lives. It that true? Maybe. But why not carry that further? Why not a 45 mph, or even 35 mph maximum speed limit in the state? There would be no highway deaths at all if no one drove. But the public is willing to accept reasonable risks. Obviously, there is a point where inconvenience begins to outweigh safety considerations. We believe the justice advantage is not significant enough to justify the 55 mph.

But the most convincing reason for a higher speed limit is to simply make the written law of our state conform to the de facto rule of the highway. Regardless of what the General Assembly does in the future, the fact of the matter is the decision in favor of a higher speed limit has already been made.

Everyday hundreds of thousands of motorists in this state vote on the issue. They vote with their feet every time they step on the accelerator. And the vote is overwhelmingly and convincingly for higher speed limits on our highways.

To continue a law so poorly observed and enforced does nothing but breed disrespect for laws that do deserve to be obeyed and enforced. Considering the wide margin of the "public vote," the narrow margin of defeat in the House is hard to fathom.

## How about a Humanity Day?

For a teen-ager 50 years ago, the Earth Day we just celebrated could be recapitulated in a tender moment of a New King Cole ballad:  
"Spring will come and grass will grow,  
The brook will hum with muffled song,  
If love is good to me."  
Clouds will cry and rain will fall,  
Earth will sigh and drink it all,  
If love is good to me."  
In those days, Earth and humanity seemed blended into a joyously melodic symphony.  
A few days ago, Earth Day 1990 reprised Earth Day 1970, a celebration of life that was humans, by humans and for humans. For years, organizers and the nurturers have been silent heroes in the struggle to cherish and enjoy the spectacular beauty that reigns over all of us.  
Some were personal friends. Try to visualize the Senate-House joint committee meeting in 1965 that I attended.  
On one side of the table, Wisconsin's Sen. Gaylord Nelson, a blue-eyed Norwegian-American, was arguing with quiet passion for an amendment to the anti-poverty program that would fund a corps of elderly citizens to save America's natural resources. Across the table, the urbane African-American from Harlem, Rep. Adam Clayton Powell Jr., wide-bracketed, asking what the hell America's forests had to do with the poverty program.  
Nelson got his amendment — through some good, old-fashioned horse-trading — and proved to be a prophet. He conceived Earth Day 1970, and he was an honorary co-chair of Earth Day 1990.  
"I remember speaking about Earth Day in 1970 at a university," Nelson, a dear friend, told me over the phone. He chuckled. "And two students showed up," a prophet is not without honor, except in his own country.  
Then there's California's Denis Hayes, who helped to organize the first Earth Day and was Earth Day 1990's CEO, and Amory and Hunter Lewis, founders of the Rocky Mountain Institute.  
The Lewises are on the cutting edge of the movement to preserve Earth through the cost-saving use of solar energy (of which I am a strenuous advocate) and recycled materials. Imagine being able to save the Earth and money at the same time.  
But Earth is not the real problem. Humans are. We can reduce air pollution from carbon monoxide, drain our streams of sewage, clean our rivers of disposables, waste, prevent ocean-dumping of life-threatening chemicals (a Greenpeace goal), outlaw toxic wastes in local dumps and utilize "environmentally friendly products" (paper instead of plastic) and take one — just one — dangerously reckless step to neutralize Earth Day's salutary goals.  
Even so, Earth Day 1990 has succeeded in awakening a slumbering affection for Mother Nature. The young people's guru, Arsenio Hall, joined the cause and exhorted his fans, "Let's get back to nature."  
But the issue isn't just the Earth. We need a Humanity Day. Somewhere in America, there is that caring, inspirational spirit who understands the futility of an Earth Day if there is no simultaneous life-saving imperative.  
What does Earth Day mean to America's homeless, unemployed, racially oppressed and elderly poor? To innocent children living with daily gunfire? To Palestinians and Israelis in a mutually assured destruction? To starving Ethiopians, warring Belfast Protestants and Catholics, and persecuted students in China? To black South African waging a two-front war against White Gestapos and black assassins?  
To them, "environmentally safe" means life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness. They — and we — need a Humanity Day as much, if not more than an Earth Day. As we try to preserve this Earth, we're also trying to take care of each other.

## Thurmond stand is confusing

WASHINGTON — Sen. Strom Thurmond led the drive to close the revolving door between government and lobbying, but he hasn't closed the one in his own office.  
Thurmond, R-S.C., is behind the new ethics laws designed to keep government workers-turned lobbyists from putting pressure on their old friends in the federal bureaucracy.  
But Thurmond doesn't seem to notice when the practice involves his own staff. The senator has been lobbied on a controversial issue by one of his former top aides.  
Stephen Cannon was chief anti-trust counsel for the Senate Judiciary Committee when Thurmond was the chairman of that committee from 1981-85. Now Cannon is the lead lobbyist opposing a bill that could save shoppers big money.

Thurmond's bill would clarify the anti-trust laws and allow the supply of goods to continue unimpeded to discount stores. A similar bill has already passed the House. President Bush has threatened a veto if it passes the Senate.  
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Thurmond's stance on the bill is predictable. The big manufacturers who oppose the bill are among his staunchest supporters. Groups such as the American Textile Manufacturers Institute and the American Manufacturers Association have contributed to Thurmond's re-election campaigns.

Thurmond is not the only senator who has contacted his old boss a few times concerning the bill.  
Both Thurmond and Cannon insist that the senator was opposed to the bill long before Cannon started working against it. Thurmond and other critics of the bill use the flimsy argument that it will result in lawsuits, which will drive up the costs to consumers anyway.  
Thurmond is topping his 36 years in the Senate with a re-election bid this year. To make the lead on the revolving-door legislation in the mid-1980s because the issue hit close to home. A former Commerce Department official left the government and went to work for Hong Kong textile manufacturers. The official hired U.S. strategy on textile issues with his foreign clients. Thurmond, who comes from a textile state, was angry.  
His revolving-door bill didn't receive much attention until former White House aide Michael Deaver was convicted in 1987 of lying to Congress and a grand jury about contacting White House officials as a lobbyist for his new clients.  
Cannon has not broken the revolving-door law. It puts former federal workers on ice as lobbyists for only a year, and he has been in the private sector for five years.  
But a one-year ban or even a five-year ban doesn't eliminate the inside track. Lobbyists with friends in high places are covered comfortably in Washington no matter when they left public service.

Branching out  
Drug enforcement sources tell us that at least two celebrated Los Angeles gangs, the Crips and the Bloods, are moving into Arizona. ## Substance can't help memory loss

DEAR DR. GOTT: Is there evidence that lecithin will prevent loss of memory in old age?  
DEAR READER: Lecithin (choline) is a substance abundant in many foods. Also, it is manufactured by the human body. Therefore, it is not associated with any known deficiency in humans.  
Health-food promoters claim that lecithin/choline reduces blood cholesterol and improves failing memory. However, there is no scientific evidence to support these beliefs.  
DEAR DR. GOTT: Please comment on ACE inhibitor-induced cough. I was taking this medicine and went through an inconvenient and expensive series of tests, until my doctor discovered that the drug caused my cough.  
DEAR READER: The newest class of drugs for the treatment of hypertension is known as angiotensin-converting enzyme inhibitors. These compounds deactivate the substance that causes high blood pressure; therefore, they are remarkably free of side effects because they don't affect other body functions, such as fluid balance and arterial constriction. Captopril (Capoten) and enalapril (Vasotec) are the most commonly prescribed ACE inhibitors.  
In the past few months, these drugs have been shown to cause a persistent, dry, hacking cough in about 10 percent of users. The reason for this is unknown. The cough is not harmful, but it is annoying enough that many patients must discontinue the medicine and change to alternate drugs.  
As you stated, doctors who are unfamiliar with this ACE inhibitor side effect often subject their coughing patients to unnecessary investigation, such as chest X-rays, sputum analysis and blood tests. When the testing has been completed and found to be normal, the doctors (and patients) are baffled.  
However, once the ACE inhibitor is discontinued, the cough disappears. This diagnosis can be understandably difficult to establish during the winter months, when flu and upper-respiratory infections are prevalent and act as "red herrings."  
I've prescribed ACE inhibitors to many of my hypertensive patients. In any case in which develop intractable coughing, I have learned to stop the medicine first and withhold testing for those cases in which the cough remains a problem.

## Riviera is back to its old self

It doesn't pay to mess with a good thing.  
Take the 1990 Buick Riviera. Save for some modifications of the instrument panel and more luxurious interior features, the car is virtually unchanged from its 1989 reincarnation as one of America's cherished luxury coupes.  
Thank heavens. In the 1986 model year, when Buick shrank the Riv, sales plunged from 55,546 the previous year to 25,835. By the 1987 model year, sales were down to 19,838, then to 9,241 in 1988.  
The signals were clear: Americans wanted their Riv big and luxurious.  
The 1990 Riviera is that and more. In fact, the Riviera ranked as the top domestic car and No. 2 among imports and domestic cars combined in a study by market researchers J.D. Power and Associates of Agoura Hills, Calif. The study surveyed buyers of 1989 models about initial quality of their vehicles.  
For anyone with warm memories of earlier Rivieras, the 1990 model doesn't disappoint.  
Exterior styling retains the traditional Riv look with the casual roofline crowned by swept-back rear end. It's longer, by 11 inches, than the previous model.  
It's solid — doors are heavy and close with a decided thud.  
The interior of the test car exuded traditional luxury. The wide front seats cradled the body, as did the outer seat areas of the back seat. Leather (an \$895 option) made the test car even more luxurious. Legroom in back was commensurate.  
Three adults could be accommodated in the back seat, and even the person in the middle had a cushioned resting spot. I liked the handles that Buick installed on the door pillars next to the small rear windows — they made getting out a lot easier.  
Oddly, the two front seats offered distinctly different perspectives. On the driver's side, the dashboard and instrument cluster just out of put the radio and ventilation controls within easy reach and the instruments close for easy viewing.  
The instruments, by the way, were rather jazzy — lit up in green circles in an arrangement that seemed befitting an airplane cockpit. This was a simpler design than last year's Riviera, which had an electronic control console that some auto writers criticized as too complex.

### Human animal the worst kind

Not too long ago, I wrote a column about what makes fishing a river, especially the Willamette River, so pleasurable.

I tried to impart the pleasure of the feel of water rushing 'round my legs as I waded the river, and the blessings that nature has given us, in the sights and sounds up and down the stream.

Birds flitting back and forth across the river, the rare occasion, when a deer, being unaware of my presence, picked its way from one side of the stream to the other, and the occasional small mammal skipping along the banks.

Readers will recall, how each year I looked forward to seeing the duck's nest that was generally in the same place on the little island up river from the highway.

Well, this year, instead of the duck, there was a mother Canada goose sitting on a clutch of eggs, pretty near the same spot the female mallard used to build her home.

All of us, the gang that fish the river with any regularity, would wade up around the island on the bank side, so as not to disturb the mother and her forthcoming family.

Well, much to our chagrin, and then anger, just the other day, we discovered the two parents gone, and the eggs broken in the nest. Not broken in the way an animal would break the shells to get at the embryo's inside. But broken so in half, carefully and deliberately. Further examination of the area around the nest showed footprints of a human animal that had destroyed the clutch.

I don't know what kind of jolly people like this get destroying part of nature's fabric of living. And it seems to me that there are more of them out there than we imagine.

His training schedule, approximately 20 hours a week, includes 4-5 miles of swimming, 300 miles bicycling and 80-100 miles running.

CHICAGO — Michael Jordan scored 45 points, but the 10 points from rookies Stacey King and B.J. Armstrong loomed big in the Chicago Bulls' second semifinals playoff victory over the Philadelphia 76ers.

After Jordan had led an explosive third-quarter charge that erased an 11-point deficit and put Chicago ahead to stay, King and Armstrong took over.

They scored the first 10 Chicago points in the fourth quarter while Jordan rested. When Jordan came back, he scored 11 of his team's last 13 points as the Bulls made it 2-0 with a 101-96 win Wednesday night in the best-of-7 series that shifts to Philadelphia for games Friday night and Sunday afternoon.

"Stacey gave us six good points and B.J. gave us four good points," said Jordan. "We did our job," said King. "We came in at a crucial time, and whenever you can keep the lead with Jordan on the bench, you've done your job."

"The 76ers led by as much as 16 points in the first half and were ahead 70-59 with 5:22 left in the third quarter when the Bulls struck with Gary, A 19-7 run, with Jordan hitting three straight free throws, made it 78-77 at the third quarter ended."

Two of Jordan's free throws came on a foul by Rick Mahorn, who also was given a technical for pushing King.

"I was expecting to get popped by Mahorn," Jordan said. "The momentum had changed and it had become more physical than the first game. And it will get more physical as the series goes on."

Scottie Pippen scored 16 points for Chicago, while Hersey Hawkins topped the 76ers with 23 points. Dawkins had 18 and Charles Barkley and Mike Gminski 16 each. Barkley had 19 of his team's 33 rebounds.

# Baldwin's return as owner bodes well for the NHL

ROSEMONT, Ill. (AP) — It wasn't too long ago that things were looking bleak for the NHL.

The Minnesota North Stars were buying financially and owners Gordon and George Gund were threatening to move the team to the San Francisco area.

That would have hurt the NHL in three ways:

The league would have lost a team in the United States' top area of amateur hockey. The league would have lost a \$50 million

franchise fee for one of its primary expansion sites, and the league would have had trouble getting \$50 million for future expansion teams.

"I remember many evenings after talking with George and Gordon and others that I was most discouraged because we saw no light at the end of the tunnel," NHL president John Ziegler said. "There did not appear to be a solution."

Enter Howard Baldwin, former Hartford Whalers chairman and the driving force behind the World Hockey Association's 1979 merger with the NHL.

He put together a deal that satis-

fied all parties, a deal approved Wednesday by the NHL Board of Governors after almost 16 hours of discussion over two days.

"Fortunately, for the good work of many people," Ziegler said, "we have a solution."

As part of the agreement, Baldwin and Morris Belzberg bought the North Stars from the Gund family for about \$38 million.

In turn, the Gund family gave a Bay Area franchise for 1991-92 for \$50 million — the league's first expansion since four WHA teams were admitted in 1979.

In addition to the Gund's

franchise, the league may add up to two more teams for the 1992-93 season. Applications will go out immediately to interested groups in communities like Milwaukee, Tampa, Denver, Seattle, San Diego, Houston and the Canadian cities of Ottawa, Hamilton and Saskatoon.

"This is a positive solution," Baldwin said. "Gordon and George feel the Bay Area is a viable opportunity for them and I feel the Twin Cities is a viable opportunity for me."

So did the owners, who gave the transaction the necessary three-fourths majority approval.

Clung \$16 million in losses over the last three years and lack of support from the Twin Cities community, the Gund family announced in Jan. 30 that they would seek permission to relocate in the Bay Area unless they could get \$15 million in improvements to Met Center.

What they got from the Baldwin-Belzberg partnership was about \$38 million — \$30 million cash, a \$1 million debt payoff and the purchase share of the next three expansion franchise fees (about \$7 million) — as well as 50 young players who currently belong to the North Stars.

The Gund family, who owned the North Stars since they merged their Cleveland Barons with the Minnesota team in 1976, will house their new club in the Cox Palace near San Francisco in 1991-92 and hope to move it into a new arena in San Jose, Calif., the next season.

It will be the first Bay Area hockey team since the California Seals — owned partly by the Gund family — left Oakland for Cleveland in 1976. The Seals were part of the league's first expansion in 1967, when six teams, including the North Stars, doubled the NHL's size.
