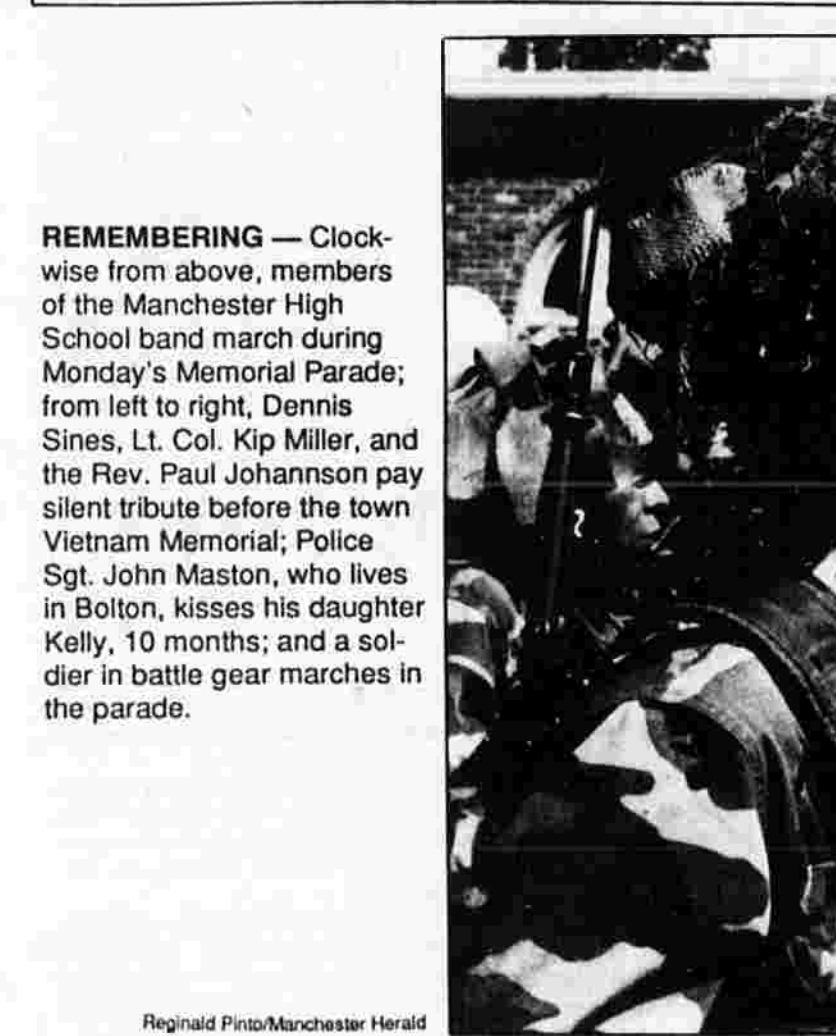

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — Columbia's launch Wednesday with seven astronauts and a \$150 million observatory remains on track despite last-minute repairs to a computerized display unit in the shuttle.

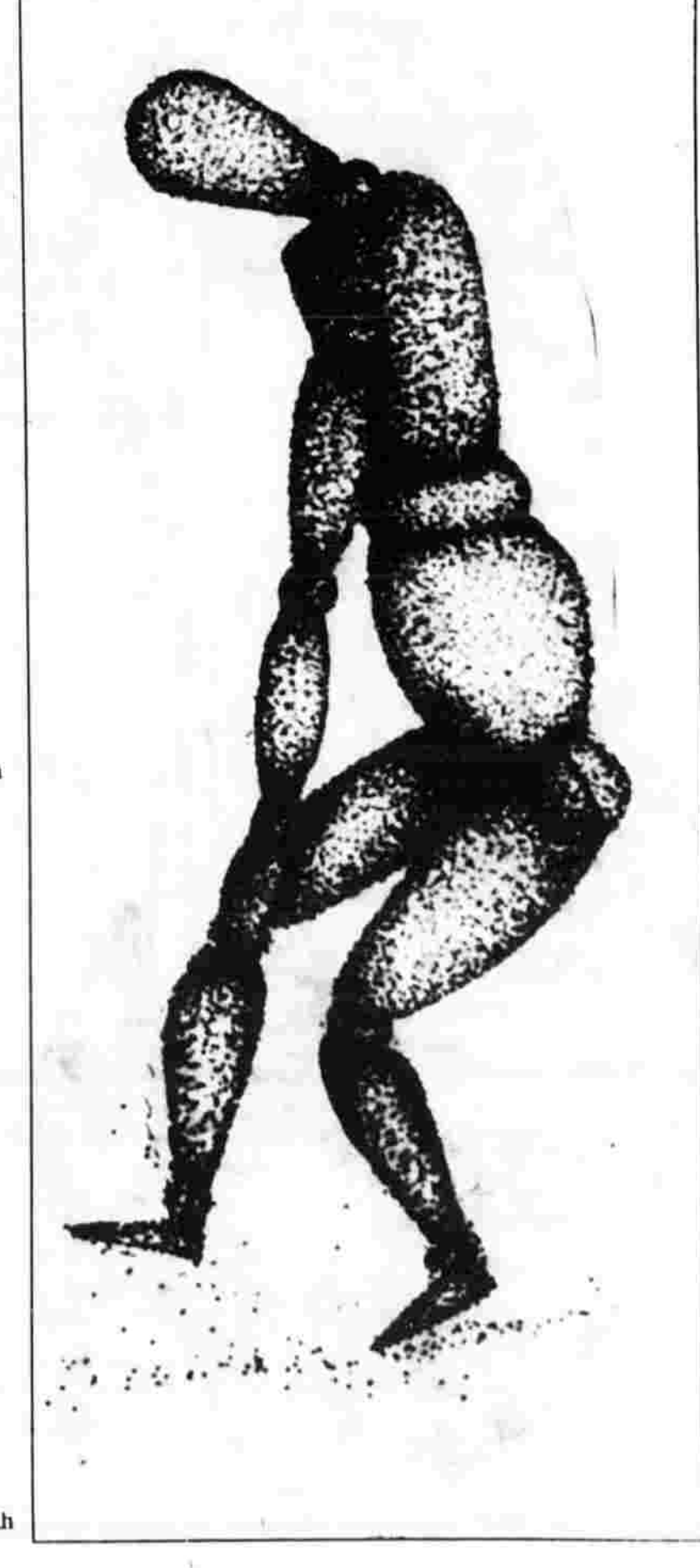

Ed Board wraps up budget By Nancy Foley Manchester Herald

The Board of Education decided Tuesday to cut a secretary from the school program for gifted students rather than cut junior varsity sports in the junior high schools.

City videotapes shirkers PITTSBURGH (AP) - A growing number of cities are secretly videotaping municipal employees on workers' compensation claims, according to the board's calculations.

But, in addition to the proposed cut in junior varsity sports, the school board unanimously decided on cuts to balance its \$44.9 million budget for 1990-1991 at the end of what chairman Richard W. Dyer described as "the toughest budget year I've seen in a decade in this town."

Post office plans announced

The U.S. Postal Service plans to vacate its office at the intersection of Main and Center streets, but the building is not considered appropriate as an expansion option for town operations.

The U.S. Postal Service plans to sell the historic, 53-year-old building in 1991 and move when construction of a \$2.8 million, 32,000-square facility at 111 Sheldon Road is completed.

Coventry budget is reduced

COVENTRY - Frustrated members of the Town Council decided to give voters what they want by cutting a total of \$314,050 from the \$15.9 million budget defeated in a referendum last week.

Bolton ed board takes cuts BOLTON - An expanded high school parking lot, a modular elementary school classroom and entire adult continuing education program will likely be cut from the school budget because of cost cutting necessities, the Board of Education agreed Tuesday night.

Bolton referendum petition BOLTON - A group of about 300 local taxpayers has petitioned to delay until next week a referendum vote on the controversial town budget.

Neither officials from Cox nor the Consumer Counsel could be reached for comment today.

During the recently stalled negotiations, the two major points of contention between the consumer agency and the company were management of public access programming and the control of decisions regarding available channels.

The Consumer Counsel had wanted Cox to include an option for management of public access channels by a separate non-profit organization.

Today's decision does not force the company to offer the option.

The battle over the control of decisions regarding programming had been more heated.
