MHS bows to East Hartford

Hornets win, 9-5; take CCC East title

EAST HARTFORD - From the time Manchester ner-take-all CCC East title game with East Hartford, to the time Matt Dumeer led off for the Homets, it was quite clear to whom this championship day belonged. East Hartford, which rocked Manchester starting and losing pitcher Matt Helin for six runs in the first inning, went on to post a 9-5 victory and laid claim to its sixth

consecutive CCC East championship. Helin, who suffered his first and only loss of the regular season after a string of seven victories, gave up all nine Hornet runs on eight hits. He walked five, struck out none and was relieved by Joyner with two outs in the

The Hornets wound up 12-2 in the league while Manchester finished 11-3. The Indians (14-6 overall) are seeded eighth in the Class LL state tournament and face 25th-seeded Glastonbury (9-9) Tuesday at 3 p.m. at Kelley Field. East Hartford is 13-6 as it heads into postseason play, also in the Double L division.

Winning pitcher junior Stuart Perry set Manchester down 1-2-3 in the first while Dumeer led off the Homet first with a long double to left field. "I knew yesterday in practice we were ready to play," East Hartford coach Al Lussier said. "He (Dumeer) set the tone for the whole game. That first hitter (Joyner) hit

a hard ball to short and he got him out. And then he gets the double to lead off our first inning." Seat belt law saves lives

NEW HAVEN (AP) - The number of accidents on Connecticut highways has increased slightly over four years, but the odds of being seriously injured or killed in an accident have dropped sharply, according to state police, who credit a mandatory seat belt law for the change.

During a 13-month period in 1985 and 1986 before the state's mandatory seat belt law went into effect, there were about 49,000 accidents on roads patrolled by state police, said Greg Futoma, a spokesman in the department's Office of Safety Those crashes resulted in 138 deaths and 908

Thus, the odds that a person involved in an accident would suffer serious injuries were 1-in-54, and the odds of being killed were 1-in-355. 




Figure 6. Sect. Squandered a miss run of tosses will make him match point before bowing to Bobby Moeller, Sam Betko and Danny O'Brien played Mancini of Argentina 6-4, 6-2, 6-2, losing 18 of the last For Berger, it's been too many shots. well for Eighth. Brian Anderson hit a grand slam homer 23 games. and Ricky Conner and Steve Johnson played well for MJ.

Starting this fall, teachers and other school employees who smoke will have to snuff out those butts. Citing the dangers of secondhand smoke, and the image that teachers

should present to students, the Board of Education decided Tuesday to ban smok ing in all school buildings and grounds." "If we are going to teach, let's teach by example," said Richard W. Dyer, chairman of the school board. "It's very democratic - nobody smokes." Democrat board member Susan Perkins, who introduced the ban, said today that if teachers continued to smoke in the schools, they would be telling stu-

dents, "Do as I say and not as I do." The ban will go into effect with the new school year in September. The board position, adopted by a 6vote, with one member abstaining, found support from the Advisory Board of support the policy for a smoke-free environment at all schools in the Town of

Manchester. The non-smoking policy should apply to both students and staff," Calling himself "a voice in the wind," Democratic school board member Frank Maffe voted against the ban. "This is a norance. How far are we going to carry this?" he said.

BOLTON - An expanded high school parking ot, a modular elementary school classroom and the entire adult continuing education program will likely be cut from the school budget because of cost cutting necessities, the Board of Education agreed Tuesday night.
