### Senate votes for partial funding of campaigns

WASHINGTON — Senate Democrats are ramming through partial public financing of candidates' campaign costs as a way to replace political action committees and other special-interest money.

Democrats on Monday overrode unanimous Republican opposition to drawing \$20 million from the government's presidential campaign fund every two years to help Senate candidates buy television advertising time.

The 49-46 vote killed an amendment by Sen. Mitch McConnell, R-Ky., to delete that provision from a bill that would offer the money to candidates as a carrot for complying with new campaign-spending ceilings.

With a bipartisan compromise on campaign finance reform out of reach for now, Republicans appeared content to let Democrats have their way in the knowledge that President Bush will veto it.

"We are faced with a bill that everyone knows isn't going anywhere, since it's a spending-limits bill that President Bush simply will not sign," said Senate GOP Leader Bob Dole of Kansas.

Sen. David Boren of Oklahoma, the chief author of the Democratic

measure, acknowledged the bill will never become law without support from Bush and congressional Republicans. But he expressed hopes the two sides will sit down in September to strike a deal once the House has passed its version.

Speaker Thomas S. Foley, D-Wash., said he hoped to bring two Democratic proposals and a Republican alternative up for votes before the House begins a five-week recess on Friday. Democratic sources, however, expressed doubts it could be fitted into this week's schedule.

House Republicans accused Democrats in that chamber of cynically writing a bill that would establish spending ceilings but also preserve corporate, union and trade association PACs in the face of a certain veto by Bush.

"This is a joke," said House GOP Whip Newt Gingrich of Georgia. "All the reform groups in the country are going to be enraged at them, so they want to get it over with, take their beating and go home."

In contrast to an abolition of PACs first proposed by Bush and reluctantly also endorsed by Senate Democrats, both parties' bills in the House would retain PACs. House Republicans would reduce

### Lawyers' substance abuse made public by Calif. bar

LOS ANGELES — Marshall Bitkower, a former prosecutor, had built a lucrative private law practice. He had a nice home in the San Fernando Valley. He drove a Rolls-Royce.

And then something happened. Bitkower started "borrowing" money from client trust funds. He was arrested and served time for drunken driving. In 1982, to avoid dishonorable discharge, he voluntarily resigned from the practice of law.

What happened to Bitkower was cocaine. His story, it appears, is headed for a happy ending: he has been straight for eight years now.

But the State Bar of California says there are thousands of other lawyers who come to court each day drunk or high. And the bar — which normally keeps its members' personal problems private — is going public with a high-profile campaign to battle substance abuse among attorneys.

"If you're in a high-stress occupation, substance abuse is greater," said state bar President Alan Rothenberg.

"The legal profession is certainly a high-stress profession. If you're doing trial work, that's high stress. If you're in a criminal trial, your client's life or death is at stake. That's about as stressful as anything."

Surveys conducted by the state bars in Washington and Oregon indicate 15 percent to 18 percent of lawyers are alcoholics. The State Bar of Texas estimates the incidence

of substance abuse among lawyers may be 20 percent — twice as high as that of the general population.

The American Bar Association says 86 percent of state bar associations have some sort of program for impaired attorneys; there are about 100 active programs across the United States.

The ABA launched a Commission on Impaired Attorneys in 1988 to serve as a clearinghouse and network for programs like Texas' Lawyers Assistance Program, which has offered confidential counseling since 1982.

"The California bar is the nation's largest. If you figure that one out of 10 Americans has a substance abuse problem and there are 122,000 lawyers in the California bar, then as many as 12,000 may have a problem," said Rothenberg. "Even if it's only 5 percent, that's 6,100 lawyers and that's too many."

But California, with more attorneys than any state and a fair share of celebrity, multimillionaire lawyers, has been slow to voluntarily tarnish its public image. Rothenberg acknowledges that going public was a tough decision.

"We finally decided we had no choice," he said. "The bigger risk was not to do something."

The new program involves referral to treatment programs, and offers insurance coverage to lawyers for such treatment.

### Fourth child in nine days killed by stray gunfire

NEW YORK (AP) — A 9-month-old boy was killed in his family's apartment by shots fired through the door, the city's fourth young victim of a stray bullet in a little more than a week.

Earlier Monday, mourners packed a church for the funeral of 9-year-old Veronica Corrales, who was shot in the head as she slept in a family car.

Mayor David Dinkins seized on the slaying to call for a federal ban on all assault weapons.

"Do we need further proof of what happens when we allow so many people to be armed with so many guns firing so many bullets?" he asked.

"Our children are dying. These young people, these babies, had the

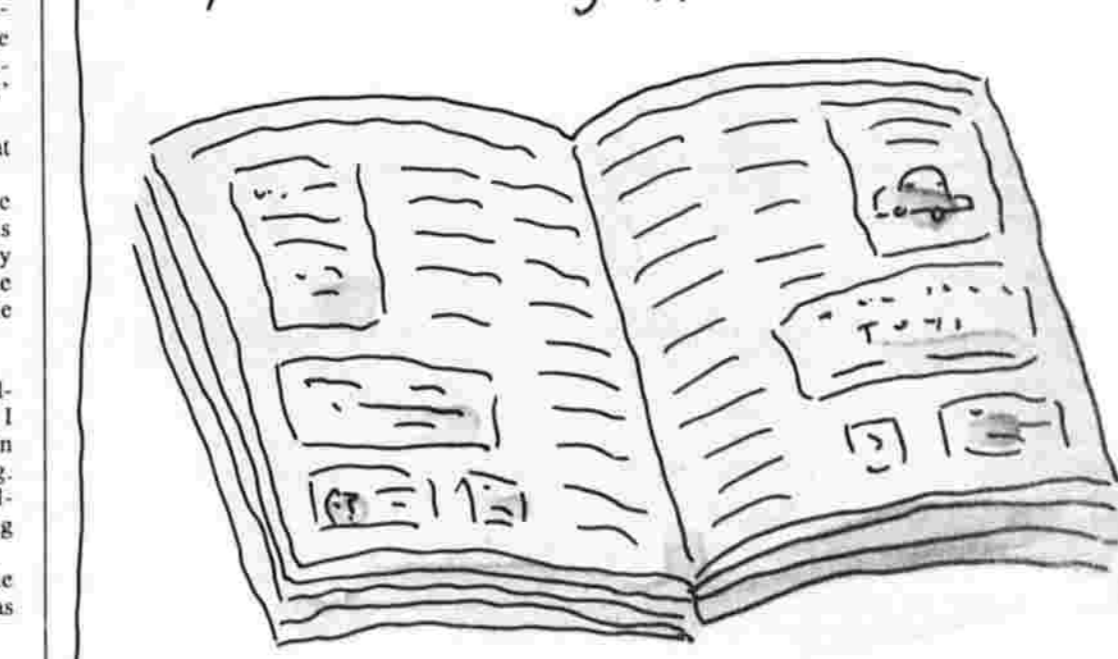
right to life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness, but their rights have been blown away. And for what?"

The latest victim, Rayvon Jamison, was in a walker when he was struck in the shoulder by two of seven shots pumped into the apartment, police said. Nine adults, including his mother, were home at the time.

Capt. John Creagan said police believe the shooting stemmed from an argument between an uncle and at least two other people. No immediate arrests were made.

Rayvon's slaying in a working-class, black and Hispanic neighborhood in the Bronx was the fourth in New York City in nine days of a child hit by a bullet apparently meant for someone else. The three

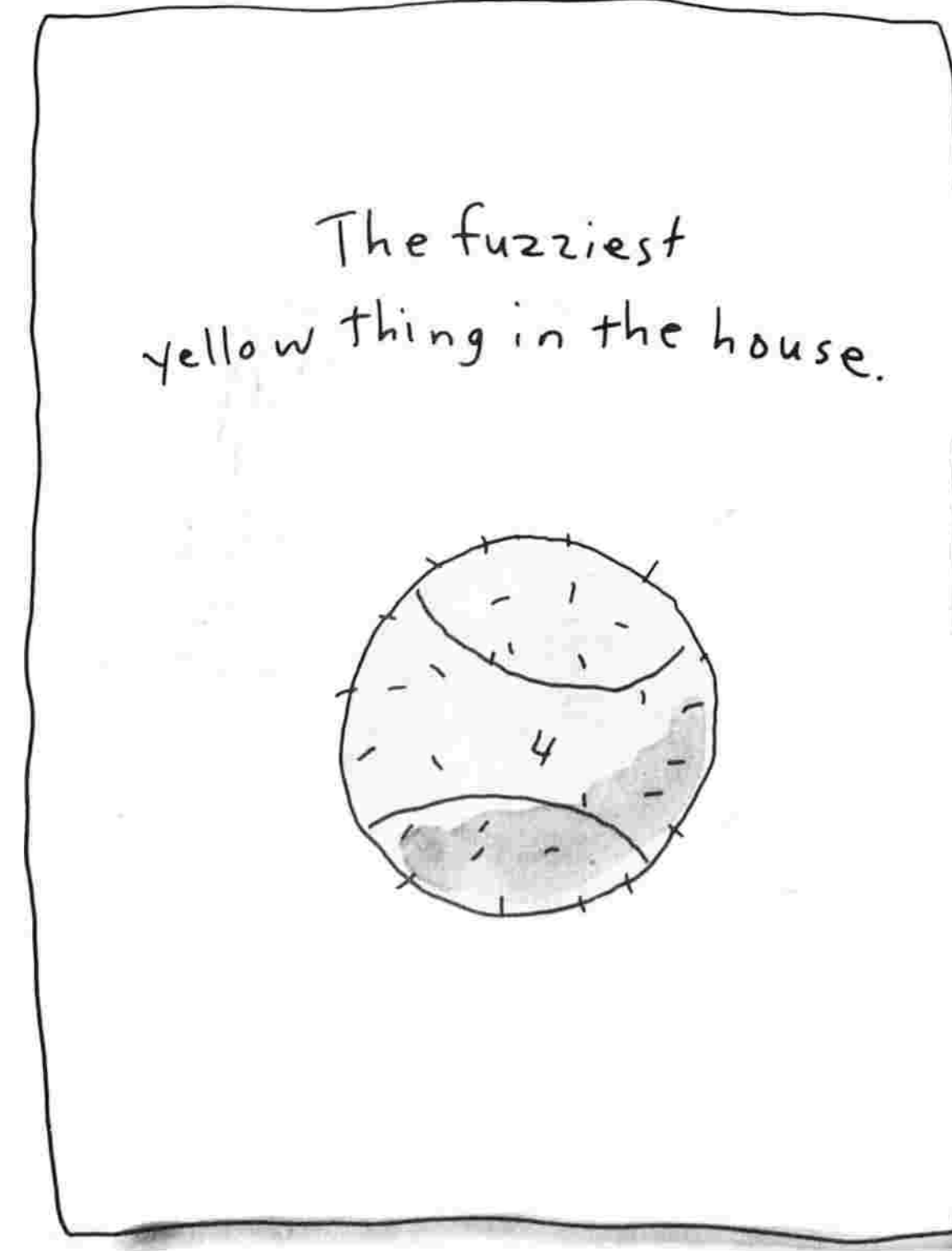
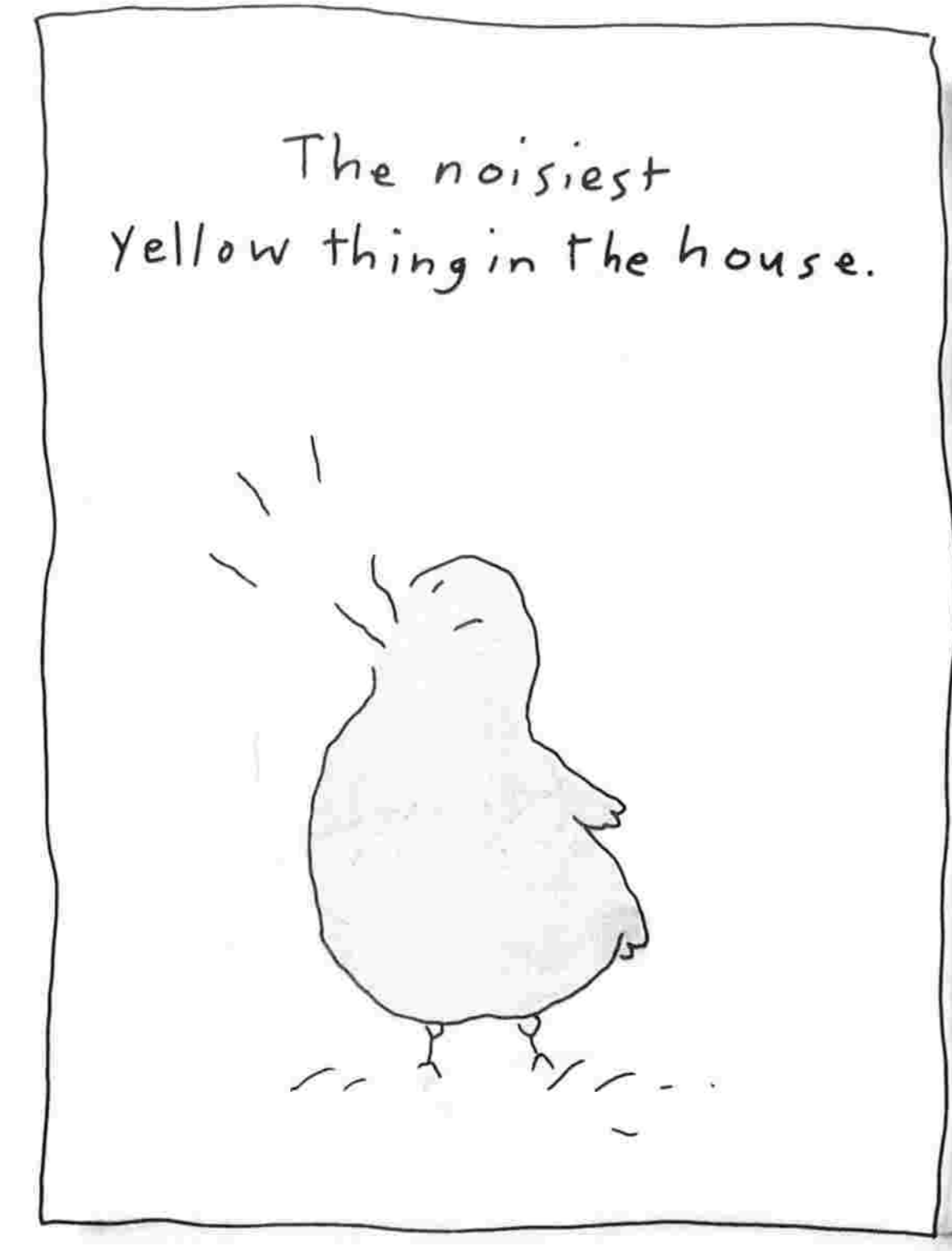

### Ballet seeks macho men, but gets couch potatoes

WASHINGTON — In this city of bureaucrats, lawyers and computer nerds, how many good, old-fashioned macho men are left?

You guessed it, folks. When the Kennedy Center announced auditions for "macho men" to perform as extras in the Australian Ballet's production of "Spartacus" this week, only 36 showed up.

Worse, nearly half of them were politely ushered to the door as impostors.

The audition fliers posted on bulletin boards at congressional offices, gyms and dance studios around town included a photograph of exactly the kind of

guy the Kennedy Center was looking for — a lean and mean Roman gladiator clad in a filmy loin cloth, his rippling muscles straining to burst his leather chest straps.

What shuffled into the rehearsal hall of the Kennedy Center Opera House on Monday evening fell roughly into two categories: health spa musclemen and your standard couch potato.

They were short and tall, portly and trim, balding and long-haired, dressed in jeans, T-shirts and shorts. One wore a striped shirt and tie. Few seemed likely candidates for Hungarian choreographer László Sereg's balletic tale of a slave revolt in ancient Rome.

One who didn't make the cut was Eugene Woodruff, 57, of suburban Annapolis, Va., a supervisor at the U.S. Patent and Trademark Office who took his disappointment good-naturedly.

Woodruff has been a supernumerary, or extra, with the Washington Opera a few times, mostly just standing around on stage, but never in a ballet.

"I'm not a dancer at all," he said with a smile. "I don't take part in any strenuous athletics. For exercise, the only thing I do is rifle shooting. I also mow the lawn and saw some firewood."

The lure for Woodruff couldn't be the money. The 19 extras selected to play Roman soldiers and slaves in "Spartacus" will receive \$28 for four rehearsals and \$40 for four performances starting Friday.

### House passes food label bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — Nutritional labeling on packaged food would be more prominent and easier to read under legislation receiving unanimous House approval.

The bill approved by voice vote Monday would require that specific information about nutritional value and number of calories be highlighted on food labels by larger type, bold type or contrasting color.

It also would require that any claims about the food be consistent

with government definitions. For example, if a product claims to be low in salt or light, the manufacturer must be using the standards set by the Department of Health and Human Services.

The bill does not pre-empt state laws on health warnings, but it does supersede state laws on health claims, nutrition and ingredient labeling for the sake of uniformity.

Similar legislation is pending in the Senate.

The version passed by the House would require that labels state:

- Serving size, or unit of measure customarily used.
- Number of calories per serving and number of calories derived from fat.
- Amount of each of the following nutrients: fat, saturated fat, cholesterol, sodium, carbohydrates, complex carbohydrates, sugars, dietary fiber and total protein.

# Some sad, most glad that George is out

George Steinbrenner, cast as a villain by a generation of New York Yankee fans, is hardly remembered as such by baseball men who worked for, with and against him. "It's a sad day for baseball and also for George," Hall of Fame pitcher Bob Feller said Monday night after learning that Steinbrenner was forced out as principal owner of the Yankees by Commissioner Fay Vincent. "I have a lot of respect for George," said Feller, an executive with the Cleveland Indians. "He's a very charitable guy... But he got himself involved with a possible felon, and evidently he couldn't get himself disengaged."

### Dos and Don'ts

- NEW YORK (AP) — The details of the restrictions against New York Yankees principal owner will be released Tuesday by the baseball commissioner's office. This is what already is known:
- Do**
  - He may "consult upon and participate in major financial and business decisions of the New York Yankees solely in his capacity as a limited partner" with the permission of the baseball commissioner.
  - He may request permission in writing to attend a limited number of major league games beginning next season.
- Don'ts**
  - He may not attend, vote or participate in major league meetings.
  - He may not make personnel decisions.
  - He may not own 50 percent or more of the team's stock. He has six months to get below 50 percent.

The Yankee fans deserve a new chapter," he said. "This one has come to an end." This sentiment was echoed by many Yankee fans, among them Trevor Bockford of Westbury, N.Y. "That's what should happen to any owner that constantly makes decisions to hurt the club," Bockford said.   - Aug. 30, 1974 — Fined \$15,000 by Cleveland federal court.
  - Nov. 27, 1974 — Suspended by baseball commissioner Bowie Kuhn for two years because of guilty plea.
  - March 1, 1976 — Suspension lifted after 15 months because of good behavior.
  - May 31, 1983 — Suspended for one week (June 3 to 9) by American League president Lee MacPhail for statements made May 27 questioning the integrity of umpires Darryl Cousins and John Shallock.
  - July 3, 1983 — Fined \$5,000 by Kuhn for remarks about Chicago White Sox co-owner Jerry Reinsdorf.
  - Dec. 23, 1983 — New York Yankees fined \$250,000 by Kuhn and ordered to pay \$50,000 in legal fees because of Steinbrenner's actions and statements regarding the "Pine Tar" game.

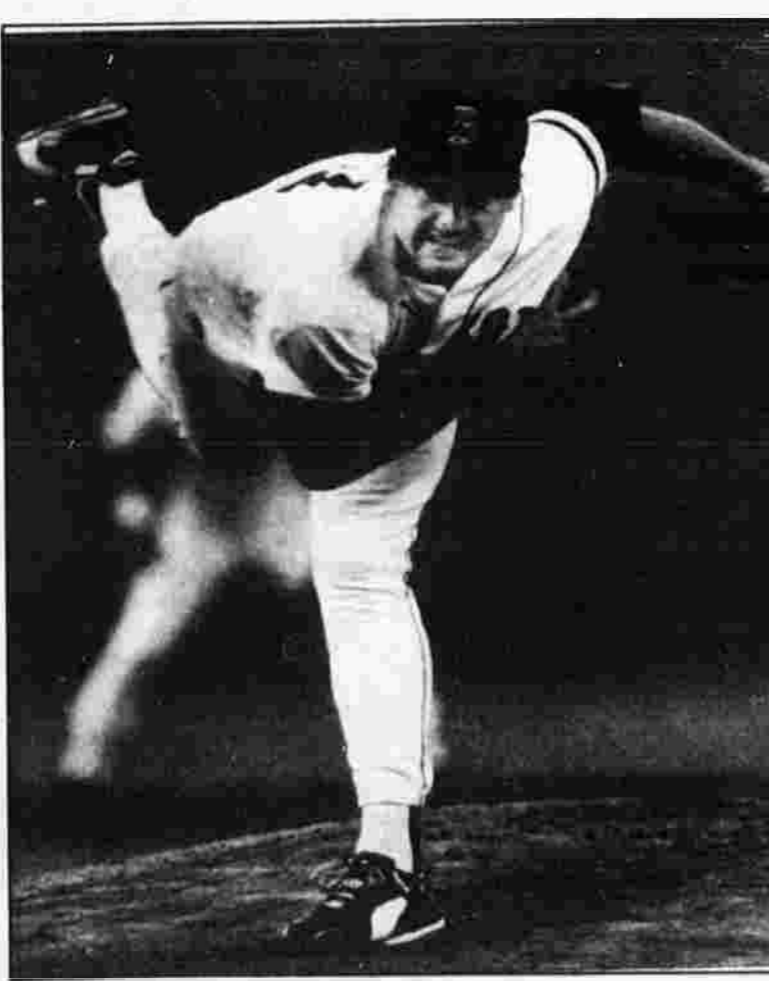
