U.S shields accused trafficker

By JACK ANDERSON and DALE VAN ATTA

WASHINGTON - John Hull is not just any Indiana farmer. He used to have a little spread down in Costa Rica, and, during the Nicaraguan civil war, he used the ranch as a supply depot for the contra rebels. When Costa Rica arrested him for drug trafficking, Hull jumped bail and came home. Now he's also wanted for murder in Costa Rica.

But Hull has little to worry about. The last time Costa Rican officials tried to give him a hard time, 19 members of Congress wrote a letter to Oscar Arias, then president of Costa Rica, hinting that anyone who messed with John Hull could endanger friendly relations between the two countries.

If you bounced a check in Costa Rica. the U.S. government wouldn't think twice about extraditing you there to pay your debt to society. But there isn't much chance that John Hull will be similarly inconvenienced. The record shows that he has led a charmed life.

Here is the list of particulars: According to a 1988 Senate subcommittee report and Costa Rican authorities, Hull allowed his ranch to be used as an arms-for-drugs swap meet. Between 1983 and 1985, the subcommittee found, Hull let pilots fly in with contra munitions and out with cocaine bound for the United States. The same Senate report claimed that

in 1983, Hull borrowed \$375,000 from the Overseas Private Investment Council, using false documentation, and pocketed the cash. OPIC is a government-sponsored program to stimulate U.S. investments in foreign countries. · The subcommittee also alleged that Hull falsified affidavits to a U.S. attorney investigating allegations of gun run-

The leaks forced the agen-cy to ground the shuttle fleet until ngineers found the source of the leaking hydrogen and corrected the Lenoir said tests of Columbia's leaky umbilical determined that hydrogen was escaping from seals near two valves. The flawed umbilical was replaced with new hardware from Endeavour, a space shuttle now being built. Tests showed that the leak on Atlantis was not in the valve seals, but in another place in the maze of pipes that carry liquid hydrogen, Lenoir said. This means, he said, that the leaks were from two separate



WASHINGTON (AP) - The United States could get enough energy from the wind, sun, trees and rivers to eliminate dependence on oil imported from countries like lraq, proponents of renewable energy said Tuesday.

"We should really have learned a lesson 17 years ago, when the first Arab oil embargo struck the United States in October 1973," Ken Bossong of the public interest group Public Citizen told a news conference. "It is strategically dangerous and economically costly to rely on imported oil."

Bossong urged state and federal government action to encourage increased use of wind power, solar energy and biomass to reduce oil onsumption, thus diminishing eliance on imports. "The cheapest, safest, cleanest option overall is simply improving

energy efficiency," he said. Already, renewable sources ac count for about 10 percent of the energy produced in the United States, according to a Public Citizen study published in June. Nearly half comes from hydroelectric projects, but once-marginal projects like windmills, wood-fired generators and solar heaters are growing fast, it



Former Dem leader gets special probation WINSTED (AP) - Former Democratic State Chairman John N. Dempsey Jr. has been given a special form of probation on two charges of campaign-law violations involving a \$1,000 contribution to Gov. William A. O'Neill's 1986 campaign.

The State Elections Enforcement Commission expressed "strong opposition" to the special probation granted Tuesday, saying the charges against Dempsey "are the most insidious of all election viola-

However, Superior Court Judge Morton I. Riefberg granted Dempsey's request for accelerated rehabilitation. Under the program, if he successfully completes two years of probation, the charges against him will be expunged. Riefberg also ordered Dempsey, the son of the late Gov. John N.

Dempsey, to serve 250 hours of community service and pay \$125 in He had faced a maximum of five years in prison and a \$5,000 fine

on each of the two offenses he was charged with. Dempsey was charged with two violations of the Corrupt Election Finance Practices provisions of state election laws. Authorities said he made a contribution of \$1,000 to O'Neill from funds from his own business through a third person.

The state law, designed to prevent hidden campaign contributions, makes it illegal to donate money to a campaign in another person's name. The law also strictly limits contributions by business entities.

■ New York man discovered dead in river BRIDGEPORT (AP) - Foul play was not suspected in the death of

an 85-year-old New York man whose body was found floating in the Pequonnock River, police said. Police identified the man as Walter H. Orr, of Port Chester, N.Y., whose body was discovered Monday in the river at Waterfront Park.

Orr had reportedly been despondent and left a New York State nursing home Monday morning, according to said Bridgeport police Capt. Thomas Scanlon of Bridgeport Scanlon said it was unclear whether Orr died accidentally or had committed suicide, but he had apparently ridden a train to Bridgeport.

Waterfront Park is near the railroad station. Orr's body was fully clothed, police said. His wallet contained more than \$200 and he was wearing a gold ring with a red stone,

NEW HAVEN (AP) - The city has been barred from discriminating against homosexuals in employment and the provision of public

By a unanimous vote, the Board of Aldermen on Monday amended the city charter so that it is against public policy to discriminate on the basis of sexual orientation. The new law applies only to the actions of city government, and not to the private sector. New Haven does not have the authority to enact

The board called on the General Assembly to enact legislation banning discrimination in the private sector. Gay rights advocates said the action by the city would help them in their quest for a state law prohibiting discrimination against

Torres was arraigned Monday in Milford Superior Court on a charge of larceny in connection with a stolen car. Police said Torres was stopped Sunday night on the Boston Post Road for "suspicious activity." He was arrested after police discovered "he was in possession of a stolen car," said Hurley, who said it was unclear whether Torres was driving the car.

Charged with conspiracy to commit larceny and interfering with police officers was Pedro Roque, 18, of New Haven, who was in the car with Torres, police said.

Torres is being held under a \$100,000 bond. ■ Mall store robbed of \$10,000 in jewelry



With world barriers crumbling, and glasnost a ripe concept, it's no wonder that international cuisines have captured the curiosity, not to mention, the hearts of many Americans.

FOOD

The spirit of global unity has even begun to permeate mainstream American cooking and a new cuisine is emerging, often tagged "fusion cuisine." Recipes are now combining the finest culinary traditions from around the world with some American-grown favorites, featuring ingredients commonly found in most local grocery stores. Imagine covering tender, mild fillets of Mississippi Prime farm-raised catfish with a mixture of

A staple of many international cuisines, olive oil can be found in recipes from Algeria, Eygpt, France, Greece, Italy, Portugal, Spain, Morocco, Tunisia, Turkey and Yugoslavia. It is also featured in the dressing for "Mexican Catfish Salad." A jubilee of greens, avocados, tomatoes and corn is the setting for tender strips of farm-raised catfish-marinated in an olive oil-based dressing with tart lime juice and aromatic cilantro, then broiled to perfection.

Cooking with olive oil adds flavor without adding cholesterol. According to the International Olive Oil Council, olive oil is 77% monounsaturated and contains no cholesterol. Well documented studies over the past ten years indicate that olive oil may aid in reducing Low Density Lipoprotein cholesterol (LDL)-the type of cholesterol that builds up and clogs arteries, while leaving the beneficial High Density Lipoprotein cholesterol (HDL) portion virtually untouched. In a recent population study, people who used olive oil as their main dietary fat were shown to have lower blood sugar and blood pressure levels. Olive oil also adds an interesting flavor to the "Hazelnut Plum Tart" dessert. In the Italian

tradition, fresh, sweet plums are sliced and artfully layered in a crumbly hazelnut crust. The dish glistens with a glaze of melted currant jelly, and can be served warm or at room temperature with whipped cream. Try these exotic, but easy-to-prepare recipes, and learn how you can bring international

Wife wrong to intercept mail

DEAR ABBY: After visiting with my brother and his wife and family in another state, I was quite upset with the way I was treated by him during my stay. Be sure drinking water is lead-free

DEAR DR. GOTT: My 79-year-old mother uses hot tap water for her instant coffee. I've heard water from the tap is not good for drinks without boiling because of the lead pipes in our house. Is this true? What effects could DEAR READER: You raise several interesting issues,


he most important of which is lead poisoning. Many old houses have pipes that contain lead. If the water entering the house has even the slightest acidity, it will leach lead from the pipes. A small amount of lead in household water is not necessarily hazardous, unless the water is used for drinking or food preparation. Once ingested, lead leads to a constellation of progressive symptoms, including headache, loss of appetite, vomiting, abdominal pain, constipation and personality changes (such as forgetfulness and dementia) that will disappear if drinking contaminated water is discontinued. Because your mother has lead pipes in her house, she should -- in my opinion — have a water lead concentration test performed (by your town sanitarian or municipal health department) and a blood test to check the level of lead in her body.

Lead in drinking water is not affected by boiling; both hot and cold tap water are equally unhealthful. Also, to my knowledge, there is no danger from drinking hot tap water, providing the water pipes and the water heater do not contain lead. Therefore, in answer to your question, your mother

should not consume tap water in her house until it has been verified lead-free. However, if the water is safe, she can drink it hot or cold from the tap. In the meantime, your mother should find other sources of potable water. DEAR DR. GOTT: I have continued to read, with a great deal of interest, your articles on Pau d'Arco tea for treatment of finger- and toenail fungus. Can this remedy be used for a fungus in the ear? My doctor has prescribed Lotrimin, which helps but never cures my problem. DEAR READER: I cannot endorse Pau d'Arco tea for the purpose you describe because, to my knowledge, it has never been used as therapy for fungous infection of the ear canals. Ordinarily, fungous growth in the ear canals is quite easy to treat with ear drops, such as Cor-

Finger- and toenail fungus is usually much more resistant to therapy, hence the herbal tea treatment. 



School still must be the first priority

It was a little unobtrusive notice in Saturday's newspapers that hardly anyone noticed. You had to look hard for it. It was one those notorious briefs. It didn't take that

The article said that point guard Mike Williams out of Weaver High in Hartford, 6-4 Jerome Johnson out of Harding High in Bridgeport and a third basketball recruit for the 1990-91 season for the University of Massachusetts were ineligible to play because they had failed to get the minimum score of 700 on the Scholastic Ap-

Three quarters of UMass' recruiting class for the upcoming season ineligible. A whole year of recruiting by head coach John Calipari and staff gone to waste. The tragedy is not in that Calipari doesn't have the services of the players he recruited. Those are the risks you take out on the recruiting trail. The real tragedy is for the youngsters, themselves.

When are the Williamses and Johnsons of the world going to understand that it is not basketball first, academics a distant second. The two must go hand-in-Otherwise Proposition 48 rears up its ugly head and

bites down hard. Sometimes the signals that the young athlete gets from the adoring public, media included, are wrong ones. The notion is ingrained, somehow, that what matters most is the basketball That's the wrong signal these impressionable youths

are receiving. Somewhere along the line, whether it is in grammar or high school, somebody had better set the record straight.

Sure, the basketball is important. But for it to take priority over classroom work doesn't make sense. There are two sets of rules in this state. The Connecticut Interholastic Athletic Conference, governing body of athletics in the Nutmeg State, says for an athlete to be eligible, he has to have passing grades in four courses. That's four 'D's and an 'F' if you're keeping tabs. That's passing four courses that he/she is taking for credit. It does not include courses that are being repeated

to improve one's grade. East Catholic High has a modified 'C' rule, according to Director of Athletics Tom Malin. A student with two 'F's is automatically ineligible. A student-athlete with an 'F' and a 'D' has to have his other three subjects at 'C' or above to maintain his/her eligibility. It doesn't make some people happy.

But a student-athlete, who has any notion of going on to college to play ball, shouldn't be under the false impression that what he's doing in high school is going to be good enough for college admission. The basketball, as some like to argue, is what keeps some of these borderline students still in school. Without the basketball, the claim is made, then the youth has nothing to look forward to. That deep-rooted conviction,

somehow has to change. The basketball keeps them in school. But it's the schooling that helps get them ahead. Until that lesson is learned, we'll have many more cases like Mike Williams and Jerome Johnson.
