



As we stand at the brink of war, I've found myself comparing my feelings to the only scarier situation in my

I realize that there are many differences between that conflict and this one. But throughout the recent weeks, as I waited for updates from the Middle East, I became aware of a disturbing feeling of detachment: My mind was reacting, but my emotions weren't. I got the same feeling from other people.

The talk centered mostly around possible economic consequences, and no one seemed to feel overly affected. I began to search for comparisons between this situation and the time when my friends and I were anything but detached, when the boys of our generation were the "cash of war," as writer John Ciardi so aptly put it in

Today, halfway across the world from the threat of chemical warfare and nuclear weapons, I still feel safe



and relatively unaffected. Twenty-five years ago when my parents watched the evening news reports about Vietnam, I never heard them discuss the war. I never heard my friends' parents discuss it, either. Did they feel safe?

But I was a teen-ager then, and boys I knew were meant, until the war ended seven years later, I don't remember ever feeling completely safe and never quite detached. #### Liquor industry fights tax

By JACK ANDERSON and DALE VAN ATTA

WASHINGTON - There is one California trend that the liquor industry is desperately trying to stop before it sweeps across the country - increased excise taxes to make liquor pay for the havoc it wreaks.

California voters will decide on Nov. 6 whether to increase the state liquor tax to the equivalent of 5 cents a drink. The money raised would go directly to alcohol abuse programs, battered-women shelters, drunk driving enforcement and other expenses the government must pick up when people drink too much. For 20 years, the powerful liquor in

dustry has kept the state's alcohol excise taxes so low that those taxes now net a paltry \$129 million a year while alcohol abuse costs California taxpayers \$11.7 billion a year in property damage, social welfare programs, health care, reduced productivity and prisons. In the state that s home to "wine country," the tax on wine has not been increased since 1937. Alcohol producers and wholesalers aren't about to lose their sweet deal without a fight. To date, they have pumped more than \$17 million into a campaign to kill the Nickel-A-Drink In-

DEAR DR. GOTT: I have had surgical removal of a

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm experiencing light flashes in one eye, and my ophthalmologist says the vitreous is pulling away from the retina. What are the long-term problems? I was told this is part of the aging process, yet I'm 61 and don't feel old at all. I've had many eye problems and have toxoplasmosis in the other eye, so I feel I know a little something about the problem. Now, I need to know more.

detachment, during which the jellylike filling of the eyeball pulls portions of the retina from the back of the eye. This is a serious visual problem that comes with age. Eventually, the detachment may cause partial or complete blindness. Your best source of information is your ophthalmologist. He or she is familiar with your case and can discuss treatment options with you. DEAR READER: A ganglion is a squishy, painless, benign cyst that often forms on tendons and nerves, especially around the hand and wrist. The cause is unknown. Many years ago, patients used to treat ganglions with he family Bible. In those bygone eras, the Bible was very large and heavy - and was standard equipment in most homes. After the patient lay his or her hand on a firm surface with the ganglion facing up, a family member would raise the Bible and strike the ganglion forcefully, bursting the cyst's wall. Thereafter, the gelatinous material in the cyst would disperse; the problem was

Fortunately, this dramatic cure is no longer practiced - nor do I recommend it for antiquarians. Ganglions do not need treatment unless they enlarge or become painful. If therapy becomes necessary, the cysts can easily be removed by qualified surgeons.

craze is still going strong

To begin with, this column is not mine. The idea behind the column might have started out with me, but for this one we asked for a little bit of help from a relative. You see, my cousin, Barry Wang - you met him about a month ago — is first a school teacher in New York City, but secondly a baseball card shop employee who has seen firsthand the growth behind this

We had a long talk on the subject, and without much further ado, here is the article he mailed the other day. He entitled it "The Cardboard Craze." ...Of course, by now most card shop owners and their workers have heard the story of how some present-day collector's mother, years ago, threw out his baseball

cards that contained Mantle, Mays, Yastrzemski, Bench, Jackie Robinson, etc., cards. Today, if we check our "Beckett Baseball Card Monthly" we'll find that early issues of these cards are worth in the thousands and hundreds of dollars depending upon condition. The better the condition, the more valuable the card. I am a New York City school teacher (history) who, during the summer, works for my friend who owns a col-

lector's shop in East Greenbush, N.Y. The name of the shop is Hudson Valley Coins and Jewelry, but our greatest volume of business is done in sports cards and About 2 1/2 years ago, when many investors lost con-

fidence in the gold and silver market, they turned back to memories of their childhood and startd puchasing baseball cards, especially major stars of the 1950's, '60's

Naturally, there is a scarcity of these cards in near mint to pristine mint condition, hence they command high prices when they become available. With this explosion of baseball card investing many one-time collectors' interests were aroused and they reentered the hobby as reborn collectors or collector/in-

vestors. The cardboard gold rush was on. New shops were opened, many collectible shops now featured baseball cards, old shoe boxes full of cards came off of closest shelves and were either catalogued for collecting or sold to dealers.

The greatest phenomenon is the hundreds of baseball card shows that take place through the country each week. At these shows, baseball cards are bought, sold and traded at a furious pace. Both dealer and collector/investor do well because prices must be competitve due to the large number of dealers sitting in a given area. One of the pleasing things that we experience in the shop these days is the number of fathers who were drawn

back to or introduced to the hobby by their children. Oh yes, let's not forget the females. It's amazing to see how many of them are involved and the breadth of their knowledge. Well, hooray for them. Why not? I love talking to them and sharing their enthusiasm. Excuse me, I must pause to dab a tear from my eye. You see there is one thing about the state of the presentday hobby that bothers me. It's the "loss o innocence" in

the young collector.

You see, when I was young, we'd buy our wax packs and then swap, flip (match heads and tails) or pitch (toss cards to the wall; closest wins all) our cards. We'd place cards in our bicycle spokes, held on by clothespins, to make sputtering sounds (our low budget motorcycles). We'd twist a rubber band around our little stacks of cards and stuff them into our pocket until we got home. Once home, we'd usually place them in a shoe hox or cigar box. We'd often pull them out while listening to games
