

House cuts **B-2** bomber spending

WASHINGTON - The House approved a 1991 military spending bill Friday that would cut off production of B-2 stealth bombers at 15 planes and slash President Bush's budget request for the Strategic Defense In-

By a vote of 322-97, lawmakers adopted the overall package that gives \$268 billion to defense, including a \$5.3 billion addition the House Appropriations Committee tacked on this week to meet the revised budget levels approved by Congress.

Overwhelming support for the bill came despite White House statements that Bush would veto the legislation because of wholesale cuts in strategic weapons. A total of 132 Republicans joined with 190 Democrats in voting for the legislation while 39 Republicans and 58

Democrats opposed the bill. Following House approval in September of a defense authorization bill that sets spending ceilings, the legisla-tion cuts Bush's proposal for SDI to \$2.3 billion in the fiscal year which began Oct. 1. He had requested \$4.7



the municipal position. "I'm at a point in my professional career where it is time for me to grow and have more flexibility," Chmielecki said, noting that the switch would be a jump from an associate to a partner status for her. Chmielecki said the joint venture would not require more time than her current position does, so it wouldn't

affect her job as town attorney. "I will be as busy in my new practice as I am now," In fact, the attorney said, that since the new firm will be based in Manchester, it will easier for her to swing by

Town Hall, where her office is located. "I will virtually be two minutes away" from Town Chmielecki said she didn't feel that the move would affect her relationship as Boland's boss when the two are working for the town.







Arms workers DON'T MONKEY will be laid off

ILION, N.Y. (AP) — Remington Arms Co. will lay off 200 to 300 workers next month due to a slowdown in gun sales, a plant official said. The layoffs, most of them permanent, will take effect Nov. 16, according to plant manager John Winske. Employees were notified Thursday. "The layoffs will affect all parts of the organization,"

Winske said he would not have laid off workers if he thought he could call employees back to work next year.
"This shows the nature of our business right now," he

Winske said demand for Remington's products is down, and company management thinks it will continue to decline until mid-1992. "It will take us about two weeks to determine exactly

which jobs we will cut," he said. "Some employees have developed special skills during their years with us, and we'd like to retain them."

Employees with more than 16 years with Remington will keep their jobs, he said. This is the second time in as many months Remington Arms has announced large layoffs. The company laid off

about 150 workers in September, citing sales slowed due to changing attitudes toward hunting.

After the current layoffs, the Remington plant, 12 miles southeast of Utica, will employ about 1,000 people. The company employed nearly 1,500 earlier this

Bob Lesmeister, managing editor of the monthly trade publication American Fie Arms Industry, said the layoffs could be seen as part of a trend as consumers buy fewer


"Guns, like anything else, have gone up in price and consumers have been tightening their belts since last spring," he said Friday. The average price of a rifle this year is about \$500, he said. "Maybe we won't go into a recession, and we can call some of these people back," Winske said. "But it's our opinion that's not going to happen." Lesmeister also noted that Remington may not be

keeping up with current consumer trends toward semi-"I think the taste of the consumer is toward the newer-type guns, as opposed to traditional bolt-action or pumps," he said.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Consumer Product Safety Commission said Friday it has taken the first step to ban infant "bean bag" cushions because of 30 reported cases of babies found dead on them. The commission voted Thursday to publish a notice of proposed rule making in which it will seek public com-ments to help it develop an accurate definition of the

Product.

The cushions are filled with plastic foam beads or other granular material that can conform to the body of an infant, especially to the face, when the infant is placed They have been promoted as resting or sleeping places for infants or devices to prop them upright, but in at least 30 cases have led to death through suffocation.





Leaders say economy will stagnate

HOT SPRINGS, Va. — Top business leaders predicted Friday that the U.S. economy will stagnate during the second half of this year. A minority said a recession is here or on the way.

The Business Council's fall forecast projected a nearly imperceptible 0.3 percent economic growth rate in the second half of 1990, and said oil-driven inflation will climb to 6.1 percent before falling back below current

One-fourth of the corporate economists preparing the report foresee a recession, a minority supported by several of the Business Council members. "As far as I'm concerned, we're in a phase of a recession," said Edmund T. Pratt Jr., chairman of Pfizer Inc. Asked whether he thought the nation was in a reces-

sion, Lewis T. Preston, chairman of J.P. Morgan & Co., The outlook for a short boost in inflation is based on the assumption there will be no war in the Persian Gulf. The forecast was presented to the 100 leaders of the nation's top corporations at their semiannual, two-day

meeting at this mountain resort. Preston, a council vice chairman, noted major differences between the council's forecast last spring and the current one.

The projections prepared by the 19 corporate economists for the May meeting predicted 2 percent economic growth in the second half of the year and 2.5 percent in 1991. The current expectation foresees just 0.3 percent growth in the second half, 1.2 percent in the first half of 1991 and 2.6 percent in the second. "There's an even bigger change in mood" on the part

Los Lobos return to rock music Band once turned away success

ALBANY, N.Y. — Seemingly poised three years ago to supplant Richie Valens as the most successful Mexican-American rockers ever, Los Lobos turned away. Now they're back to reclaim their turf.

"The Neighborhood," a collection of bluesy rockers and pointed social commentary, is the first the rock world has heard from this East Los Angeles band since their cover version of Valens' "La Bamba" saturated the airwaves in the summer of 1987.

Most musicians would sell their soul for a hit of the magnitude of "La Bamba." Los Lobos acted as if they'd stumbled upon a homet's nest.

"We were becoming like a household word," said songwriter Louie Perez. "I was at the checkout stand and I could hear us blaring out of a car radio. That's a real good thing, but it's another thing you have to deal with. It's as scary being struggling as it is equally frightening The 15-year-old band reacted to stardom by recording

tunes. As expected, it was commercial suicide. Los Lobos have a definite love-hate relationship with "La Bamba." In recent concerts, they've pointedly refused to play the one song with which most of the general public identifies them.

That's because it was a cover song by a band that takes fierce pride in its own material. "If it was one of our own songs, I think we would have felt a lot differently about it," said singer David Hidalgo,

who shares writing chores with Perez and Cesar Rosas. "For a lot of people, that was all they were expecting from us. We were getting tired of that and wanted to get

Indian artifacts on display at Illing

By DIANNA M. TALBOT Herald Features Editor

MANCHESTER — In 1910, a young couple by the name of Mr. and Mrs. J. Riley Bailey went to Assam, India, where they became medical missionaries for a fierce head-hunting Indian tribe called the AoNagas.

The couple, who came from Pennsylvania, stayed with the AoNagas until 1928, raising eight children and providing religious guidance and medical services to the tribe. Today, collectibles from that long adventure have been memorialized by their granddaughter in an exhibit

been memorialized by their granddaughter in an exhibit on display at the Lindgren Gallery of Art at Illing Junior High School.

The display was made possible by the Baileys' granddaughter, Barbara Clark, an environmental educator for the Manchester School system who works out of the town's Oak Grove Nature Center. Her mother, who was raised in India, was the Baileys' eldest child who was raised in India, was the Baileys' eldest child. "This is the first time that these items have been exhibited," said Clark during an interview at the junior high school. The exhibit, which includes genuine photographs, tools, weapons, clothes, jewelry, baskets, carriers, animal skins and other mementos, fits in with the junior high school students' social studies cur-

riculum, she said. "It's an excellent learning opportunity for the stu-dents," Clark continued, "I think it shows the ingenuity of the native people. This is all rare material that can only be seen in a museum."

After the exhibit ends, Clark plans to conduct in-depth educational lectures about the tribe for Illing and Bennet Junior High School students. The exhibit, owned by Clark and her siblings, is on display through Friday at Il-ling Junior High, 226 East Middle Turnpike. Gallery hours are Monday through Friday, 8:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. According to Clark, her grandfather grew up in Pennsylvania, worked his way through medical school as a coal miner, eventually becoming both a doctor and a minister. Clark said her grandfather decided to go to India because he felt "called" to help natives who had lit-

tle little knowledge of medicine and religion. The Indian tribe he came to know, the AoNagas, was superstitious and prided itself on the number of enemies it killed and beheaded, according to Clark.


The tribe built many small storage houses, called "Morungs," which were filled with shelves of enemy skulls. The natives also believed that animals and plants had spirits, Clark said. They also dyed the hair of their beheaded enemies red and used the hair to decorate their weapons and war costumes because the color red was Termites were considered an edible delicacy, Clark

One of Clark's grandfather's greatest accomplishments in India was to cure natives of goiters, an illness in which a person's thyroid gland swells due to iodine deficiency, causing large lumps on the neck. He supplied the tribe with edible iodine supplements.

Bailey also used medicine to heal natives' wounds and illnesses, Clark said. In the late 1920s, Clark's grandfather died of typhoid fever after visiting another village in India and drinking tea that was made with contaminated water. His wife was not allowed to stay in India with her children, and the family moved back to the United States.

Clark's mother, Elizabeth, settled in Detroit, Mich., where her children grew up. Clark earned a science education degree from Eastern Connecticut College in Willimantic and later earned her master's degree in science education. She settled in Connecticut and currently resides in Willington.

- To prevent dirt and dust from becoming em bedded in the fabric, give upholstered furniture a thorough vacuuming weekly. Move the upholstery at tachment nozzle slowly over all surfaces, including channels, tufts and welts. Use the vacuum's crevice tool attachment to clean hard-to-reach spots.

tablespoons soap flakes and two tablespoons ammonia in 1 quart hot water. 2. Brush or vacuum the furniture well. After the cleaning solution has jelled, whisk it until a mass of suds forms. Rub suds into a small, concealed area of the fabric. Let it dry. If the area fades, discolors or shrinks, have the job done professionally. If not, shampoo the rest of the fabric.

3. With a suds-covered cloth, gently rub the suds in a small area. When the suds become soiled, scrape them off with the scraper. Wipe the scraper clean on 4. Wet a cloth in the warm water, wring well and wipe sudsed area. Dampen the fabric only slightly,



Camera angles

One of the most important advances in photography recently has been the development of high quality, low-light "superfast" films. These films offer new possibilities for capturing the soft existing light and true feeling of indoor settings. They enable you to shoot indoors without an

on-camera flash, which can create harsh lighting if fired directly toward the subject. Several superfast films have recently been introduced. For color prints, Kodak's Ektapress Gold 1600 and Fuji's Fujicolor Super HG 1600 deliver good results in many indoor situations. However each film has its own distinctive color-grain character, and you should experiment to see which film

suits your shooting preference. In extremely dim light, you may want to shoot with Konica's new ultrafast SR-G 3200 film, which is twice as fast as the 1600 films, but also almost twice as grainy. Major film manufacturers such as Kodak, Agfa, Fuji and Konica offer fast transparency film for photographers who prefer to shoot slides. These films Buster Bear, \$45; Burgess' Animal can also be pushed to higher speeds, creating additional opportunities for indoor shooting.

(When you submit pushed film for processing, you must tell the processor at which speed it was exposed, otherwise your film will be delivered over- or underexposed.)

In addition to fast film, a 28mm or 24mm fixed focal-length wide-angle lens is helpful for shooting indoors. Most wide-angle lenses have a maximum aperture of f1.7 or f2. These relatively wide openings let plenty of light into your camera in a short period of time, enabling you to hand-hold your camera indoors while using a shutter speed fast enough to prevent camera shake.

Zoom lenses, on the other hand, often have a maximum aperture of f3.5 or f4. This reduction in the amount of light entering the camera requires a longer shutter speed, which dictates the use of a tripod or

Another important element to consider when shooting indoors in low light is color. If daylight is the main light source, you will have no problem getting correct subject color with the aforementioned films. It starts to get tricky when daylight is mixed with artificial light, or when artificial light is the main source of illumination.

In situations like these, you may need to use a color correction (CC) filter. To get an idea of the various filters available, you can pick up a free Cokin Creative Filter System booklet at your photo dealer. It has plenty of good information, with good ideas

If you are a fanatic about getting the color correct - not just close, but exact - you'll need a color meter to determine which filters are needed in mixed lighting situations. Your photo dealer can assist you in selecting a meter that fits your needs and your

Gill resurrects sputtering career

NASHVILLE, Tenn. - Vince Gill has resurrected a sputtering recording career with a classic country music weeper about lost love.

Gill was a little noticed singer throughout the mid-1980s who finally asked to be released from his recording contract with RCA Records in 1987. He went without a record deal until he emerged this year with MCA Records and put out the acclaimed single "When I Call Your Name" and the album of the same name. The LP is closing in on gold status (500,000 copies sold) - or 10 times more

than his three previous albums. "A lot of people figured I was done," the amiable 33-year-old Gill said as he reflected on his lean years. "Nothing major had happened, and people started losing enthusiasm.

"I never doubted the fact that I had a hit record in me. It was just trying to find it." Gill found it with "When I Call Your Name, which he wrote and which has become one of the year's top country hits. The song, featuring a whining steel guitar and a compelling piano solo, tells the story of a man who thinks about his lover all day and rushes home to find a goodbye note on the table.

"It's the kind of song that gave me goose bumps," said Gill, former lead singer for Pure Prairie League. "It has a haunting chorus and it's a very lonesome "When I first heard it, I definitely felt that if this

was not a hit, then I could throw my hands up and say I don't have a clue to what is." Gill said he treats records the way a casting director does a movie: "Every part is so critical. There are things that can enhance them or detract and I think we made all the right calls in what we did to the

"It really took off when Patty put her vocals on there. I just love our voices together." Even without his newfound success, Gill had fashioned a rewarding behind-the-scenes career using his velvet tenor as a backup vocalist for recording sessions. By his count, he has sung on records done by more than 100 other singers.

He was with Pure Prairie League from 1979 to 1983, recording three albums and singing their hir "Let Me Love You Tonight."

Gill, the son of a lawyer in Norman, Okla., grew up playing bluegrass and country music. He was considering a career as a pro golfer when he chose to join the group Bluegrass Alliance instead. He later joined Sundance, then hooked up with Pure Prairie League. He arrived in Nashville with dreams of a country

music career, but found himself perceived as a pop singer instead because of his stint with Pure Prairie "I had sung 'Let Me Love You Tonight' and bee on 'American Bandstand,' "Gill said. "But I can't complain that I got to sing a No. 1 pop record and met the Solid Gold Dancers."

He was able to launch his solo career but didn't meet with much success until this year. His album has been near the top of the country music charts and the single was No. 1 during the summer. "It's been like Christmas a few months early," Gill

He called on some old recording session friends to provide guest vocals on the album: Loveless, Emmylou Harris, Reba McEntire, Herb Pederson of the Desert Rose Band and Kathie Baillie of Baillie and "I was there for their careers and helped the

careers and they seemed to have a similar feeling for me," Gill said. "I think it's a good calling card to have them in your camp."

Writer keeps his three plots going

NEW YORK - Theodore Weesner is a writer wh really enjoys writing - so much so that he has three separate novels going at the same time. Weesner says he works on the books-in-progres

until he reaches a point where he decides "which to finish and which to put aside temporarily and resume work on in the future. "I like to write," Weesner, 54, of Portsmouth N.H., says. "I wish I could do it all the time. But need outside work, so I teach short story and screenplay writing on the graduate level at Emerson

College in Boston." Readers who would like to sample Weesner's newest completed work are advised to pick up his fourth and latest novel, "Winning the City" (Summit). It's a finely crafted story about a 15-year-old boy, Dale Wheeler, his betrayal by a system he trusted, his loss of innocence and his coming of age It also contains some of the very finest writing about

the game and action of basketball. "Frustration and instances of satisfaction accomnied them all as they moved back and forth, end to end, raced, grabbed, jumped, tried to pull in needed air. Actor wanted to be evil enough

LOS ANGELES - Playing Lips Manlis in "Dick Tracy" was a cinch, but Paul Sorvino worried that he couldn't act with enough cold evil for the role of the

mafia don in "GoodFellas." "I think I was more attracted to Martin Scorsese and others involved than I was to the part," says the rangy, moon-faced actor. "I never felt the part was sufficiently like me to be really good in it. But I

thought I would take a shot anyway. "Most of the time when I read a part, I know I can do it, and I know how to do it. Very rarely will I take an assignment that I don't have a strong inkling about in terms of its playing. In this case, I really didn't feel I had that kind of lethality that the part called for. But I was willing to make the investigation into my innards and come up with and strengthen that kernel of whatever part of my per-

sonality that might exist." The reviews indicate Sorvino's success. He ha been praised as the figure of stability, albeit evil, amid the trigger-happy "GoodFellas," who include Robert De Niro, Ray Liotta and Joe Pesci. Sorvino is Don Paul Cicero, who directs the misdeeds of a

Brooklyn mob over a 30-year period. "It's not a matter of his actually doing it; he ord explained Sorvino. "He does it with the same dispatch he would order asparagus: 'I don't want to see him again.' To have that kind of stone-like internal persona must come out as absolutely believable in

terms of his remorseless, souless business. "On the other hand, I had to retain a humanity, a love for Henry Hill (Liotta), a love for my children and for all the right things. "I never had any truck with gangsters or tough cople," he said. "Our lives were very different. I never saw beatings. I knew these things existed, as we all did. There were certain gangsters who lived in the neighborhood, but I never saw them, I never had anything to do with them.

"I was like Ferdinand the Bull - 6 feet, 2 inches of poetic sensibility. A good bit of athleticism and strength, but my ideas were more about Keats and Shakespeare and Verdi and Pucci and Constantin Stanislavski."

The husky Sorvino graduated from Brooklyn's Lafayette High School and began acting in summer stock. His acting career failed to take off because, as he once explained, "I had the body of an Olympic athlete but with a cherubic face. The look was off, so I was hard to cast. I sang and acted in New York, but

was only marginally effective." With a wife and three children to support, he veered into advertising and became an agency vice president. But after seeing Jack Warden performing in "The Man in the Glass Booth," he realized he had o return to acting. By this time, the face and the body seemed more compatible, and the jobs kept

Sorvino has appeared on Broadway ("That Cham pionship Season"), in TV series ("We'll Get By," "Chiefs") and in films ("Reds," "Oh, God!," "Slow Dancing in the Big City.") Often he has been cast as a hoodlum: "The Brinks Job," "Bloodbrothers," "Dick Tracy." Never had he faced such a challenge as Paulie Cicero.

"That kind of deadliness is so antithetical to my nature that it took me two full months to find it," he said. "When I crossed a mirror once when I was preparing, all of a sudden I saw that in myself and I was startled. I couldn't believe that existed in me."

PBS to begin streamlined era

The Associated Press NEW YORK - The audience is down, the competition from cable is rising. Despite the heady success of "The Civil War" series, PBS has its problems. but it also has a plan to deal with them. Public television has appointed its first program-

ming mogul, responsible for picking the shows, scheduling them and promoting them. Take a meeting, Big Bird. Jennifer Lawson, the chief program executive, will be able to give faster answers to program proposals, speeding up what has been a cumbersome decisionmaking process, a PBS board member says. Producers of cultural and entertainment shows who would have gone to PBS in past years now have cable networks as a market for their wares, par-

ticularly the Arts & Entertainment and Discovery "There are now so many more people looking for good programs that we're not the only opportunity that people have, as we used to be," says the board member, Henry P. Becton Jr., president of WGBH-

TV in Boston. "We need to be able to be more responsive, to give quicker and more definitive answers, to take more risks in order to have access to the best people and

He said it's likely the board, meeting next month, will approve the final step in the plan that shifts \$105.5 million from various sources to a single program and promotion fund administered by Lawson, PBS' executive vice president for national programming and promotion.

That will complete the process by which she has become the PBS equivalent of moguls like NBC's Brandon Tartikoff — in charge of program selection, scheduling and promotion. In olden days, public TV stations chose and helped pay for about half of the national prime-time schedule through a voting process run by PBS' Sta-

tion Program Cooperative. Come November, that process will be history. Although Lawson will pick programs, she will consult a committee that includes PBS and public TV station executives and, in some cases, minority and independent producers, she says.

"It will not be me making decisions in a vacuum," Lawson, who has spoken of experimenting with educational game shows and bringing more children's programs to public TV, says the full impact of the change probably won't be felt until the 1992-93 season.

That's because many program projects now on the boards have been funded for this season and the next, although next season's schedule will give an idea of what's to come, she says.

But the new system will allow better focus and planning, she says: "It helps us move faster and it helps us move with more intelligence. Before, with the (program cooperative) marketplace, the process itself made the decisions. "It was a voting on a series of programs without

putting them in any context and looking at what that does to shape our profile. The new system helps us react faster to changes in the media environment." It's "no secret whatsover" that PBS ratings have fallen off, she says, even though 24-city ratings for "The Civil War" - national ratings are due this week - averaged a 9.1, the highest in PBS' history. The network's overall ratings dropped 3 percent in just

'Fire Birds' is bad

"Fire Birds" (Touchstone, VHS-Beta, Rated "Fire Birds" is lousy filmmaking at its worst. It isn't amusing enough or quirky enough to be campy: instead, it's pretentious and just plain bad. With a stilted screenplay by Nick Thiel and Paul F Edwards that never quite figures out if it's a silly love story or a contrived adventure, "Fire Birds" jus might be a poor attempt at Hollywood patriotism. Jake Preston (Nicolas Cage) and Billie Lee Guthrie (Sean Young) are part of an elite Army helicopter corps being trained for a secret invasion in South America. Their expert mentor is Brad Little (Tommy

Lee Jones). Training is partly through computerized simulators, which make video games look wimpy, and actual flight maneuvers. The shots, whether com puterized or real, are breathtaking, and provide the

only real excitement in the movie. Jake, in Muhammad Ali bravura, reminds anyon who'll listen that he's "the greatest." And next to Lit tle, he is. Guthrie will remind anyone who'll listen that she's no longer romantically interested in Jake, who stalks her like a greedy ivory poacher. Love in this movie unfortunately does not take back seat to the mission, which is to be a strike against a mercenary named Stoller (Bert Rhine) who

is an ace with fighter helicopters. But there is no clear-cut enemy in "Fire Birds." It's hard to cheer on the boys when we haven't seen the bad guys do anything bad. That part of the story isn't developed; the filmmakers merely slap a tag or a few people and we're to accept it. It just doesn' wash, and makes the mission more of a cartoon than anything else.

What also works against the movie is the romance subplot. It slows the pacing and provides nothing in terms of moving the story or providing a needed dynamic.

David Green has spent most of his years as a filmmaker directing and producing television dramas and documentaries, including "Boy in the Bubble." That small-screen experience shows in "Fire Birds" because there is a limited vision and sweep. Just right for video, but skip this one anyway.

Enemies' works

"Enemies, A Love Story" (Media. VHS-Beta, \$89.98. Rated R) ferman Broder, who's never really been a faithful husband, leads what he thinks is a fairly uncompli-

cated and acceptable life: He has a wife in Brooklyn and a mistress in the Bronx. But when his first wife, whom he had thought was dead, suddenly shows up, his "uncomplicated" life becomes a shambles. Paul Mazursky has adapted a novel by Isaac

Bashevis Singer and crafted it into a richly told human drama, "Enemies, a Love Story." It's a tale filled with irony, humor, joy and tragedy set in the world of Holocaust survivors in New York, 1949. It is a deeply personal movie and does indeed work best as a video on the home screen. Mazursky's touch is masterful. He pulls just the right performances from his ensemble with little ef-

fort, and retains the integrity of each character. His camera is not judgmental. If anything, it acts as an understanding lover. "Enemies, a Love Story," is a deeply felt testament to any survivor at any time, and its universality is in its ability to caress the humanity and joy of everyday

Drexler to get \$8 million deal

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — The Portland Trail Blazers announced Friday that they have extended the contract of Clyde Drexler by one year - an agreement that reportedy will pay the star guard more than \$8 million for the 1995-96 season.

The salary is believed to be the highest ever for one season for an athlete in a team sport. Drexler was in Honolulu for Friday night's pre-season game against the Los Angeles Lakers. The Blazers did not reveal terms of the agreement, but Drexler said Thursday night that the deal would add a sixth year to his contract and would pay him more than \$8 million for that

"I think this shows good faith on the part of the organization," Drexler said Thursday night. "It's a fair contract. I'm happy about it." Drexler, the Blazers' all-time leading scorer and a

third-team NBA all-star last season, will earn about \$1.2 million this season. The Blazers promised Drexler they would boost his pay a year ago after they signed guard Terry Porter to an eight-year deal that pays him a reported \$2 million per

But, because of NBA salary cap restrictions, Drexler's salary couldn't be increased immediately, so Blazers' officials negotiated a one-year extension with a balloon

A similar agreement reportedly pays Larry Bird of the Boston Celtics \$7 million in the final year of his contract. Geoff Petrie, Portland's senior vice president for basketball operations, handled the negotiations with Drexler. "This extension is a fulfillment of the Blazers' pledge to review his contract situation and is representative of

Clyde's value to the team," Petrie said. "I'm happy to have reached an agreement that I feel is fair," Drexler said. "I appreciate the good faith shown by the organization, particularly (owner) Paul Allen and Geoff Petrie, that allowed us to work out an extension. I hope this will enable me to remain with the Blazers for the remainder of my career."
