DEAR DR. GOTT: Since 1988 I've been plagued with coccyx pain. This condition followed long periods of sitting while writing a book. There are no signs of pain when standing, walking, running or jumping - only when lying on my back or sitting in a relaxed position. Why does the pain continue? DEAR READER: Although the term "pain in the

tail" is often reserved for the sensation we experience in dealing with unpleasant situations and irritating people, Arthritis of the bones in the lower back can cause this nain: however, there are other causes, too. For example, he lower intestine may be the source of such pain. Internal hemorrhoids (swollen veins inside the anus), rectal infections and fissures (cracks) and rectal tumors must be uled out in any patient who suffers chronic pain over the

I remember once seeing a patient who had put up with excruciating pain for days. My first clue to his disorder was a tiny dimple, just below the coccyx, that seeped a little pus. Later, after the patient had been anesthetized, a surgeon discovered a huge abscess, which had arisen in a pilonidal sinus — a congenital malformation consisting symptoms earlier because, judging from the size of the Coccygeal pain can also be caused by gynecological

What Auriemma and company have done is turn a program, with but one winning season before his arrival, into a consistent winner - one that is now being recognized as one of the best in the country. Connecticut (21-3) is working on its third consecutive 20-win season
