"I might not wear this too much in public," he said. Eastwood, otherwise clad in a tuxedo, accepted the award Tuesday, joining past honorees such as Paul Newman, Dustin Hoffman and Kevin Costner. The group, the oldest undergraduate dramatic organization in the country, presents the annual award and traditional brass pot to entertainers in a ceremony at the Hasty Pudding Theater.

Last week, Diane Keaton was named Woman of the Year. "I started out in the outside and I kind of like it that way," he said.

Romance novelist Barbara Cartland went to Buckingham Palace to be invested as a Dame of the British Empire, and emerged to defend the royal family against newspaper attacks on its wartime performance.

Queen Elizabeth II presented the honor Tuesday to the 89-year-old doyenne of romantic fiction, who works on her 53rd novel. Dame Barbara later accused the media of "asking too much" by demanding the royal family contribute more to the Persian Gulf War effort.

"The last thing you want if you have suffered an attack from poison gas, for instance, is to have a lot of royals puffing around wanting a lot of attention," she said.

A Sunday Times editorial two weeks ago accused members of the royal family of living it up while the nation wages war. Opinion polls found that many members of the public agreed.

Gov. Pete Wilson joined Arnold Schwarzenegger in urging California schoolchildren to exercise, and even did five push-ups to illustrate the point.

Schwarzenegger, star of "Kindergarten Cop," and Wilson spoke to a physical education class at a suburban elementary school Tuesday. The day before, the governor promised to restore \$700,000 in state funding to physical education programs.

Schwarzenegger, chairman of the President's Council on Physical Fitness and Sports, said he was "appalled" at the poor physical condition of many young people.

Coccyx pain may have many causes

DEAR DR. GOTT: Since 1988 I've been plagued with coccyx pain. This condition followed long periods of sitting while writing a book. There are no signs of pain when standing, walking, running or jumping — only when lying on my back or sitting in a relaxed position. Why does the pain continue?

DEAR READER: Although the term "pain in the tail" is often reserved for the sensation we experience in dealing with unpleasant situations and irritating people, true coccyx pain can be caused by a coccyx fracture. Coccyx pain can also be caused by arthritis of the bones in the lower back that cause this pain; however, there are other causes, too. For example, the lower intestine may be the source of such pain. Internal hemorrhoids (swollen veins inside the anus), rectal infections and fissures (cracks) and rectal tumors must be ruled out in any patient who suffers chronic pain over the coccyx.

I remember once seeing a patient who had put up with excruciating pain for days. My first clue to his disorder was a tiny dimple, just below the coccyx, that seeped a little pus. Later, after the patient had been anesthetized, a surgeon discovered a huge abscess, which had arisen in a pilonidal sinus — a congenital malformation consisting of an abnormal tract or opening between the rectum and the skin. I was surprised the patient had not suffered symptoms earlier because, judging from the size of the abscess, it must have been there for months.

Coccydynia is an unusual, peculiar disorder: lightning-sharp stabs of tailbone pain that occur without warning or when the patient is in certain positions. The cause is unknown but may be a type of neuralgia affecting the nerves near the coccyx and rectum. Treatment consists of analgesics.

Because your pain is present only when you are lying on your back or sitting, I suspect the cause is a bruise of the coccyx, arthritis or infection. I recommend you be examined by an internist, a specially trained diagnostician, who should be able to identify the cause of your problem and suggest treatment.
