



Because there may be anxiety and adult children nor the parents have a monopoly on either trait. One problem is that neither side may be acquainted with the burdens carried by the other, whether they relate to family conflicts, relationships of the grown children with others, income issues, or other concerns. Both the adult children and their parents may not think the troubles on the other side are serious because as one wise man pointed out it is very difficult, if not impos-

sible, to walk in someone else's moccasins. Because you and they represent different generations and your environments during childhood adolescence, and now in adulthood were and are vastly different, you see the world through different eyes. It isn't easy to recognize that fact, of course. But it isn't difficult at least to say that it is so, and then both talk about your early years, outlooks and the varying attitudes you have. Patience, listening, and a willingness to smooth the troubled waters are all important. We may have disagreements or feel rejected by the younger or older generation, but that often happens in human relationships. However, it certainly doesn't mean they have to end.

Sharing some details of each other's problems, achievements, and rustrations may make a dent in the barriers you face. Later you may feel it is necessary to seek professional family counseling assistance, but agreeing to handle the issues on your own may be preferable before

If the 540,000 American soldiers, sailors and airmen of Operation Desert Shield and Desert Storm had been home going about their usual business, more than 200 of them would have been expected to die from accidents, illness, murder, suicide and small combat missions during the six months that the operation spanned. That figure is based on the number of deaths reported in the armed forces last year - 1,574 in a military population of just over 2 million. Last year, more members of the armed forces killed themselves (256) than were killed in the entire Gulf War in

combat and non-combat deaths. Life in the armed forces is becoming steadily safer and healthier over the years. Just 10 years ago, the death rate of military personnel was 112 for every 100,000. Last year it was 77. Reporting casualty numbers is a dicey business for the Pentagon, In Korea and Vietnam, the military held back the actual number of deaths. 





### Norplant as a contraceptive

DEAR DR. GOTT: What can you tell me about the new, implantable contraceptive? DEAR READER: Wyeth-Ayerst Laboratories developed a new method of birth control, which was recently approved by the Food and Drug Administration. Called Norplant, it provides reversible, five-year protec-

The device consists of six thin Silastic tubes (containing the female hormone progestin) that are implanted under the skin of the upper arm. The hormone then diffuses through the tubes and prevents ovulation. Norplant insertion is an office procedure; the capsules can be removed at any time. The method has few complications (primarily, menstrual irregularity) and is highly effective. Because Norplant has just been introduced in the United States, American doctors have no experience with t. However, judging from preliminary reports of its success abroad, it will probably achieve widespread acceptance here. Ask your gynecologist for details of this in-

DEAR DR. GOTT: The mental capacity of my bright and intelligent 85-year-old mother deteriorated over a period of only 11 weeks until her death. Will you please share any information regarding the rare Creutzfeldt-Jakob brain disease? Can it be caused by stress, and is it DEAR READER: Crentzfeldt-Jakob disease is a

progressive, inevitably fatal brain affliction caused by a virus infection. It is not inherited or stress-related; the node of transmission is unknown. The disease affects men and women equally and has a peak incidence in the The disorder begins as a dementia (self-neglect, apathy

and disorientation) and rapidly progresses to profound intellectual defects, poor balance, tremor, weakness, rigidity and visual problems.

The diagnosis is suspected in any patient with accelerated dementia, and is confirmed by brain biopsy or by identifying the virus in the spinal fluid. There is no treatment. Death occurs within a year,

usually from pneumonia. To give you additional information, I am sending you a free copy of my Health Report "Alzheimer's Disease," a similar neurological disease.
